Twelfth annual Germanfest blooms!

Praise has been heaped on Germanfest 1987, and complaints have been notably lacking as assessment of the three-day weekend was made by the directors, committees, foods and booths chairmen, concession managers, sponsoring organizations, thousands of guests and the weary workers and sponsors.

Gate receipts totaled \$51,364.30. A full report of the amounts of food and drink provided may be longer in coming, but will far exceed any previous year. Statistics were unavailable at press time, or at least were incomplete. Attendance has been announced at 46,627. The baseball park was overflowing with RVs and occupants awaiting the Bike Rally and the Fun Run.

Picture perfect weather favored the weekend, although drizzle, clouds and wind marred the beginning of the week. "It all depends on the weather" was the general comment around town.

However, when a clear, crisp and bright Wednesday dawned, spirits lifted and the show was in high gear. Matching that enthusiasm, at the opening ceremony Friday at 4 p.m., Alvin Fuhrman, general chairman, introduced ceremony participants and Monica Hess, entertainment chairman, challenged guests to "Let Your Spirits Soar!" as hundreds of colorful balloons were released to drift over the park.

Official banners of the festival were raised by the six-member col-

or guard of the North Texas State University Sabre Drill Team. The "Star Spangled Banner," "Texas, Our Texas" and the National Anthem of the Federal Republic of Germany were played by Mike Otts.

Alvin Fuhrman compared today's events to the first arrival of pioneers to the young colony when they stepped from a train to find Muenster merely a scrap of paper nailed to a post. Ted Henscheid, mayor of Muenster, gave the official welcome and Monica Hess gave concluding remarks.

An almost non-stop series of entertainments, talent shows, musical programs, dancing, carnival rides for youngsters, and selected features and contests followed for the three nights and days. Harold and Jeannene Flusche of Hofbauer's won the theme award for adherence to ethnic decorations and received a splendid beer stein by Flo's Ceramics.

The city and park were geared up for added security. Chief of Police Helen Tompkins said, "We are eminently satisfied with crowd behavior, fantastic weather and the best cooperation of guests and hosts. The flow of crowds in and out was the best ever..." "The crowd count shows attendance of 46,627. In that vast number, there were two disorderly conduct arrests, nine public intoxication arrests and three minor unrelated fender benders and one report of stolen hubcaps..." "That's an enviable record," Police Chief Tom-

pkins concluded. Police Chief Tompkins hired extra personnel for security and crowd control. Sheriff's deputies and county officers were also on duty and at least five to seven plainclothes officers from the Alcohol Beverage Commission were in park at all times.

The community put its best foot forward, presenting clean streets and well-tended lawns and yards,

and offered a genuine welcome to its guests who experienced German hospitality firsthand.

Entertainment and culinary delights were aimed at emphasizing the ethnic German heritage and culture. Germanfest chairmen and sponsors directed special attention to improvement of entertainment, hospitality, courtesy, security, crowd control and

emergency medical aid.

Leaning strongly toward the ethnic, Germanfest 1987 still presented a somewhat new look this year. While still emphasizing its heritage, sponsors enhanced its appeal by a very selective and stricter control of entertainment, arts and crafts and quality of souvenirs and parking privileges inside the park.

A debriefing meeting has been announced for festival personnel and others interested on May 11.

"And," said Maudine Griffin, executive secretary of the Muenster Chamber of Commerce, "we've already started work on some things for next year." She also told that 14 foreign countries and 28 states other than Texas were listed in the guest registry.

Praise received from accreditation team

A two-member accreditation team from the Texas Education Agency visited the Muenster Public School on April 22 and 23, finding no violations of accreditation standards. While no violations were found, the team found several areas on which to commend the district.

Team captain Max Hewlett, accompanied by team member Wendall Davis, led the exit visit on Friday morning, April 24, at which all three administrators and three school board members were present. In his presentation, he lauded the school district for producing a quality curriculum designed to fit the students' needs, the high expectations of staff members which in Hewlett's words, "is making these kids so successful," and for district-wide academic success. As one example of that success, he pointed out the recent appointment of two Muenster High School students, Andy Burnette and Drue Bynum, to military academies. Regarding in-

struction, Hewlett observed, "Teachers demonstrate sound knowledge in instructional skill in the areas of planning instructional strategies, classroom management and organization, presentation of subject matter, positive learning environment, student assessment and evaluation, use of an organized lesson procedure, and effective teaching practices." He characterized the teaching staff as a really strong staff. Before leaving to return to Austin to file a more detailed, official, written report which will be sent to the district in about three weeks, Hewlett closed by saying, "The cleanliness, just the buildings themselves, your whole environment, is also commendable. Your kids, your custodians, your teachers and your administration take a lot of pride in their facilities and they're keeping them clean and it's just a beautiful place to go to school. The bottom line is that you are fully accredited."

Bike Rally is a whopper!

They came and they came and more came! ...to participate in the sixth annual Germanfest Metric Century Bicycle Rally on Saturday, April 25, 1987 in Muenster.

From an initial entry of 119 bicycles and riders in 1982, growing to 800 in 1984 and 1367 in 1986, the Bike Rally swelled to 2145 riders in 1987.

The sight of the take-off at 11 a.m. was spectacular to an enormous crowd of spectators, and the scenic route traveled by riders was "a pleasure," they said.

Sponsored by the Bluebonnet

Extension Homemakers Club and the Muenster Volunteer Fire Department, assisted by six paramedics, family members and friends, the event counted 196 volunteers who conducted the rally.

Monetary sponsorships and donations were received from Old Milwaukee and Cooke County Distributors; Coca Cola USA; Quaker Oats; NashBar Bicycle Supply Catalog Co., Bike

Nashbar, Division of Nashbar and Associates, Inc. of Youngstown, Ohio; Dairy Inn; Fischer's Meat Market; H & W Kountry Korner; Dole Bananas; Muenster Chamber of Commerce; and Denton County Peddlers Publicity.

The 35K course, 65K course and 100K course left the KC Hall in Muenster and wound along toward Rosston, Forestburg, Saint Jo, Bulcher and back to Muenster, with shorter routes marked for the shorter K courses. There were seven rest stops and aid stations.

There was a Bicycle Rally Riders Party beginning at noon and as riders continued to come in, there was always a goodly supply of refreshments waiting.

Of the 2145 registered riders, 1460 were pre-registered and 685 signed registration cards Saturday morning.

They came from Dover, Ohio, Oklahoma, Arkansas and 104 Texas cities.

Patti Bayer represented the Bluebonnet Home Extension Club; Ben Bindel represented the Muenster Volunteer Firemen and Eileen Fisher was in charge of pre-registrations; Monica Hess was in charge of publicity and Sharon Wolf was map chairman.

All members worked the rest stops and sag wagons. The rally gave away 1000 T-shirts to the first 1000 registrants.

Not a race, the rally is a "proceed at your own pace" fun time and sporting event.

Proceeds are used to support charities and projects of the Bluebonnets, including United Way; Vacation Bible Schools (Sacred Heart and Baptist); Cooke County Development Center; Leukemia Society; Cooke County Fair Assoc.; Cooke County Friends of Family; Cystic Fibrosis Foundation; New Fire Truck Fund; and Individual Families in Need.



MUENSTER JAYCEES were at the city park late Monday afternoon, cleaning up after Germanfest and at work on their new beer van, when a call came from Harold Flusche telling that fire struck Sloan's Superette in Valley View about 4:30 p.m., destroying the store's meat cooling facilities. He suggested taking the refrigerated van to lend assistance and relieve disaster. Muenster Jaycees George Grounds, Larry Gobble, Willie Wimmer, David Flusche, Neal Flusche, Shawn Flusche, Jack Flusche, Damie Hellman, Bert Walterscheid, Dale Swirczynski, Mark Klement, Alan Miller, Brian Herr and Ron Trubenbach borrowed Chick Stoffels truck to pull the van to Valley View and joined Harold Flusche

there. So Germanfest was closed less than 24 hours earlier when the van was again pressed into service. An exhausted John Fortenberry, son of owner Sloan Fortenberry, watched gratefully as the Jaycees carefully transferred contents of the store's walk-in coolers onto the refrigerated van. The fire originated near the top of the walk-in at the rear of the store. Fire departments from Valley View, Gainesville and Myra responded. Extensive fire, smoke and water damaged the rear of the store. Limited store operations have resumed. Lindsay UIL qualifiers named

Lindsay ISD has qualified three students for the UIL State Academic Contests May 7, 8 and 9 at the University of Texas at Austin. Qualifiers include Lucy Fuhrmann, 1st Headline Writing, 1st Science, 1st Biology, 1st Chemistry; Jacques Sandmann, 1st Poetry; Monica Johnson, 1st Prose.

The students earned eligibility by placing first at the UIL Regional held at Kilgore, Texas on April 24.

Each year, more than a third of the total participation in UIL activities involved academic contests, dispelling the myth of the UIL as a "sports organization," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, UIL

director. "Texas has the nation's most comprehensive slate of academic contests," Marshall said. "Long before other academic-based competitions, the UIL was sponsoring contests in speech, journalism, the sciences and math. In fact, the League was created as a forensicleague in 1910."

Contests range from headline writing to Lincoln-Douglas debate, from calculator applications to poetry interpretation. Of the more than 1 million students who participated in UIL activities in 1986-1987, more than half competed in one or more of the 19 general academic contests.

Many of the academic champions will also qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. During the 1986-87 school year, the TILF provided more than \$362,000 for scholarship grants to 282 college

students who competed at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1987, the TILF expects to award an estimated 300 new and renewed scholarships, valued at approximately \$400,000. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals, and families. Recently the TILF reached a goal of \$1 million in endowment funds.

Twelfth Fun Run is outstanding success

The Knights of Columbus German Fun Run, in its twelfth annual 15K and 5K event on April 26, was spectacular and carried out smoothly, expertly and efficiently in near storybook weather.

Co-chairmen were Dan Hamric and Ronnie Hess. A visiting celebrity official starter was Joe Weisbaum of Dallas who holds outstanding credits in World Championship and Olympic Track and Field events.

First Texas Savings and Loan Association co-sponsored the presentation of Fun Run T-shirts to the first 3500 registrants and also provided wide advertising of the event, a recognized feature and trademark of Germanfest.

The 15K and 5K course is run over paved and unpaved roads in the rolling hills north of Muenster. It is fast, scenic and challenging.

All runners and spouses were invited to a huge runners' party in a beer garden south of Germanfest with free beer and soft drinks available.

160 trophies and other awards were presented at awards ceremony at 5 p.m. Sunday.

All profit realized by the German Fun Run is spent entirely on charity, and youth and senior citizen-related activities in the Muenster area.







FOR 36 YEARS, J.B. Wilde Chevrolet Co. was at this location on Main Street, built in 1925, the same time as the Wolf Hotel (building at the left, presently The Ranch). Wilde started his dealership in this building with four Chevs, but also sold Texaco and Indian gas, Dayton and Badge tires and tubes, Willard and National batteries and Case tractors. New modern electric gas pumps were used at other gas stations in Muenster, but Wilde kept the old hand-pumps and was able to pump gas during power failures. Regular gas sold for 20¢ a gallon! Wilde also sold white gas (unleaded), which was "a couple of

cents cheaper." To the north was Charlie Pagel's Store (right side of picture), with a radio repair shop located in the back. Bought by Wilde in 1946, Ray's Auto Parts took over Pagel's, until the building was torn down in the early 1950s. Wilde Chevrolet moved to their present location on East Hwy. 82 in 1961 and Fischer's Meat Market moved into the remodeled garage from their old location just north of the old theater. Fischer's extended the building west to the end of the canopy and added on the back, then later built The Butcher Block.

Camp Sweeney provides haven

Every summer, over 300 young people between the ages of six and 18 attend a very exclusive camp near Gainesville. The entrance requirements are strict: the child must have diabetes.

Too often, regular summer camps turn away a child with diabetes because of their special diet and medical needs. But Camp Sweeney, organized over 35 years ago, is a place for the diabetic to learn while having fun. All of the activities of a regular summer camp are offered: horseback riding, swimming, boating, fishing, arts and crafts, riflery and many more sports, plus movies, dances and carnivals in the evenings. Sandwiched between the fun things are interesting sessions on medical and dietary information to help the campers take care of themselves and learn to live productive lives with their affliction under control.

Diets are formulated according to each individual's needs, giving the diabetic valuable examples of how to exchange foods to include an occasional "treat" so he won't feel left out around his friends at home.

Located on rolling wooded acreage 10 miles northeast of Gainesville, the site is bordered on the south by a 34-acre lake. Three, three-week sessions are held every summer, with the opening session scheduled for June 7. Others begin on June 28 and July 19. A medical staff and experienced counselors are always present and keep a close eye on the campers in a one-to-four ration, many of them former campers themselves.

The camp is a United Way agency, and scholarships are available for any child whose family is unable to pay the full session's fee. No child is turned away because of race, religion or national origin.

Established in 1950, Camp Sweeney was the first educational and recreational training center in the South for children with diabetes mellitus. Thousands of

youngsters are living a self-sufficient, healthy life due to their training at Camp Sweeney.







Snacking can be healthy for you

Snacking between meals can be healthy if you're careful not to overeat and you choose your snacks wisely.

"There's a good case for snacking," advises Addison A. Taylor, M.D., president of the Texas Affiliate of the American Heart Association. "It can be especially important for growing youngsters, active teens, pregnant women and nursing mothers."

In order for a snack to provide value to the diet, it should be loaded with nutrients and low in fat, cholesterol, sodium and calories.

If you have a snacking urge, select snacks made of familiar, wholesome foods, with minimal processing. Look for labels that describe the product's protein, fat, carbohydrate, cholesterol, sodium and calorie count. If the protein and carbohydrate numbers are higher than the fat count, it's a better bet than a high-fat snack. Of course, fruit or vegetables from the produce section of your grocery store don't contain ingredient labels. Most tree- or vine-ripened fruits and vegetables are fine for snacking.

Avoid the popular fried snacks such as most chips. They're high in fat, calories and usually sodium.



County Agent's Report

USDA urges landowners to take action soon

People who own cropland and lease or rent it to others need to take a close look at the conservation provisions of the 1985 farm bill.

If your land is highly erodible, or if it falls under the swampbuster or sodbuster provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985, you and your tenant could lose most USDA farm program benefits by Jan. 1, 1990 unless you take action soon.

Contact the Soil Conservation Service where your land is located this year to find out if the following four provisions of the Act affect you:

1. The conservation compliance provision affects you if you or your tenant plants annually tilled crops on highly erodible fields. To remain eligible for program benefits, you and your tenant must develop and be actively applying a locally approved conservation plan for those fields by Jan. 1, 1990. The plan must be fully implemented by Jan. 1, 1995.

If your land needs terraces or other structural measures, your tenant may not be willing to install them unless you pay all or part of the cost.

2. The sodbuster provision applies if annually tilled crops are planted on a highly erodible field that was not used for crop produc-

tion during the period 1981-85.

If you or your tenant plows out such a field, a conservation plan is needed this year and installation of the plan needs to start during 1987 to remain eligible for USDA program benefits.

3. Swampbuster applies if you or your tenant converts naturally occurring wetlands to cropland after Dec. 23, 1985, the date the Act was signed. With some exceptions, your tenant must discontinue production of annually tilled crops on newly converted wetlands to remain eligible for farm programs.

The loss of USDA benefits applies to all the land you and your tenant farm...not just the affected fields.

4. The conservation reserve program offers producers help in retiring highly erodible cropland. If your land is accepted into CRP, USDA will share up to half the cost of establishing permanent grasses, legumes, trees, windbreaks, or wildlife plantings on your highly erodible cropland.

Under 10-year contracts, USDA will make annual rental payments as long as the terms and conditions of the contract are met. The land will be ineligible for farming during the 10-year contract.

The lease of hunting rights on CRP land is permissible, so some

landowners are establishing plants preferred by wildlife. No other harvest will be permitted during the contract.

More than 2.3 million acres of land has been accepted into CRP in Texas during 1986 and 1987 while 19.3 million has been accepted nationally.

The average bid accepted in Texas during the February 1987 sign-up was \$39.70 and the average contract size was 228.8 acres. Nationally, the average bid accepted was \$51.17 and the average size was 124.6 acres.

the goal under CRP is to retire 45 million acres of highly erodible land from cultivation to reduce erosion and the production of surplus crops.

Farm Bureau system to be maintained

"We are pleased that the American Farm Bureau Federation has a plan of action to maintain the Farm Credit system," according to Leonard Hartman, president of the Cooke County Farm Bureau.

The nation's largest farm organization is calling for an immediate line of credit from the federal government to be repaid when the system is back on its feet, with infusion of funds made directly to the district banks needing assistance.

The recommendations were announced recently at a Washington, D.C. news conference and delivered to all members of Congress. "Farmers in this area will be seriously affected if action is not taken to solve the Farm Credit system problem," Hartman said. "We believe that the plan put together by the AFBF can be the solution," he said.

The recommendations followed several months of discussions by an AFBF Agricultural Credit Committee consisting of eight state Farm Bureau presidents, including Texas Farm Bureau president, S.M. True of Plainview.

The local farm leader said the plan should be effective because it provides for:

- 1) Restructuring of loans.
- 2) Orderly sale of acquired properties.
- 3) The "work out" of loans at the district and local level.
- 4) An infusion of capital which is needed to save the system.
- 5) Federal oversight for the assistance.

"This assistance should result in

lower interest rates for Farm borrowers," the county FB leader said. "Farm Bureau's goal is to keep as many of the current borrowers on the land as possible."

Farm Bureau is recommending that a Financial Assistance Commission be created to implement and administer the rescue package. The commission would draw on a line of credit from the U.S. Treasury and oversee the aid.

Farm Bureau has called for an end to transfers within the system, saying there is not enough surplus available in the stronger institutions to transfer to the weaker ones.

Lindsay 4-H Club sees method demonstration

The Lindsay Senior 4-H Club met at the home of 4-H members, Donna and Michael Lutkenhaus, at 6 p.m. on April 10. Nine members were present at the meeting.

To open the meeting, Jeff Alexander and Tony Keen gave their first place method demonstration for the Lindsay club. The two Mountain Spring 4-H'ers are preparing for district competition.

Next, Debbie Nortman called the roll. Members participating in method demonstrations and livestock shows informed other members of their awards. Donna Lutkenhaus went over the newsletter. The meeting was adjourned at about 7:30 p.m.

April has been unusually hot and dry, and that means homeowners must give careful attention to watering their yards and gardens.

Here are some tips on getting the most from irrigation water so as to keep plants and lawns healthy while keeping water costs down.

1. Practice slow, deep watering to allow roots to penetrate deeper so that plants become more stress-resistant.

2. Soaker hoses and drip irrigation systems work well on trees and shrubs. It's more efficient to water at night or early in the morning because evaporation is less. However, night-time watering can promote more disease problems.

3. Too much water can be as detrimental or even worse than not enough. The rate at which water is applied should be no more rapid than the rate at which the soil can absorb it. Never fertilize landscape plants when soil is dry. It's best to water the area one day, apply fertilizer the next day, and then water again. Fertilizer will do no good unless it is dissolved and moved down into the soil.

4. Shrubs and trees near foundations, under eaves or on southern and western exposures need frequent watering because they often get less benefit from rainfall and have to deal with heat reflected from walls.

5. Plants on mounds or slopes

suffer from drought stress more easily than those on level areas, so these require more frequent watering.

6. Use an organic mulch of pine bark, chopped straw, hay or similar material to reduce irrigation needs.

7. Treat water as a valuable resource. Use it to water plants when needed but do not waste water. Although considered a renewable resource, good water supplies are becoming scarce in Texas.
