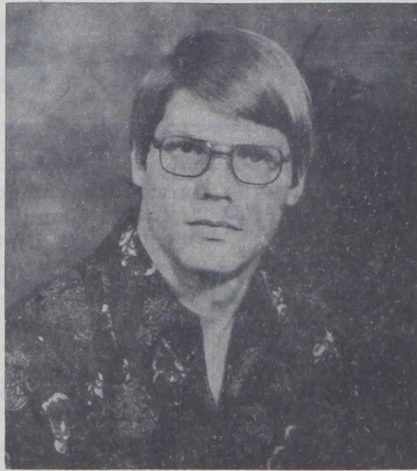
Janet was named "Girl of the Month" for May at Grand Prairie High School and was also named Tex-Anne of the Month for April by the Noon Optimist Club.

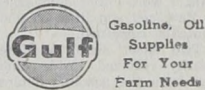

### Texas Production Of Oil Declines 4.3% in Past Year

Texas' crude oil production declined last year for the fifth consecutive year. The downward trend continued in spite of another year of production at or near the maximum effective recovery rate in nearly all fields.

The output of the nation's No. 1 oil producing state in 1977 was just over 1.1-billion barrels and pushed the state's cumulative production since 1889 to almost 42.7-billion barrels. But, last year's production was almost 51-million barrels below 1976 production and more than 162-million barrels below the all-time peak production year of 1972.

H. B. (Hank) Harkins, Alice, president of Dallas-based Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, blames the continuing decline in large part on federal price controls on crude oil. "Only increased developmental and wildcat drilling, combined with expensive secondary and tertiary recovery projects, can brighten Texas' oil production and reserves picture, strengthen the state's economy, and reduce our dependence on imported oil. But, we must have the cash flow necessary to finance this activity. It will not come under price controls," says Harkins, an independent producer and drilling company executive.

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### Muenster Garden Club Receives Three Awards at State Convention

For the first time in its 40-year history, the Muenster Garden Club has received three major awards at the State Convention of Texas Garden Clubs, Inc., held in McAllen in May.

The awards were for the calendar year of 1977. They were for 1) sponsoring a contestant in the Youth Communication Speech contest through all levels, local, district, regional and state and for winning third place in State; 2) a non-competitive gold Horticulture Rating for 637 points, an outstanding record, and 3) a competitive first place award for the President's Report, Class I.

And for the first time the President's Report won 1st place. Three master judges rated it as "Excellent" and wrote into it many complimentary remarks.

Prepared by Mrs. Paul Endres, president of Muenster Garden Club, the report listed study programs, projects and activities of the club and its members. Included were Project Mini-Park, the Myrick Play Center, additional play equipment and landscaping; an Easter party for senior citizens; member participation in Germanfest; member participation with other civic organizations in a beautification and clean-up campaign; a city-wide project for planting of crape myrtles to be developed in 1978; the Yard of the Month project; planting flowers in two circular beds at the Rectory; participation in the beautification of Heritage Park, participation in the Plant Exchange in April; sponsorship of the Youth Communication-Speech Contest and Poster Contest — two contestants were entered — one represented the Muenster Club, the other represented the Gainesville Council — one advanced to the State level and won third place at the State Convention.

Special activities included a pilgrimage to the Dallas Garden and Flower Show on March 5, 1977 for most of the day. Six members of the group served as clerks for the flower show. Also observed was Arbor Day, by donating and planting 6 trees at Muenster Public School, Sacred Heart and the Muenster Baptist Church.

**SAVING TIPS**

on electric air conditioning



Air conditioning provides lots of comfort during the summer months, but for many thousands of homeowners it is also the biggest factor in the cost of electricity. On the average, air conditioning accounts for about half of summertime electric bills.

Here are ways you can hold down the cost of air conditioning and still enjoy its comfort.

**Central Systems**

1. Set thermostat on 78°, or higher, during the summer. Turn unit off if you'll be away from home several days.
2. Keep equipment at top operating efficiency. Have it checked seasonally by qualified serviceman.
3. Check filter every 30 days. Dirty filters cause equipment to use excessive electricity. If filter is permanent, clean by manufacturer's directions; if it's disposable, it should be replaced when dirty.
4. Keep furniture, draperies away from air outlets and returns. Clean grills often.
5. Close draperies and blinds to keep out direct sunlight.
6. Keep fireplace damper closed.
7. Proper home insulation keeps the heat out, cuts energy use. Insulation questions? Call TP&L.
8. Shade on roof and walls can reduce energy needed to cool. But trim trees, shrubs away from outside compressor unit. Keep it free of leaves, debris. If air flow is blocked, unit uses more energy.
9. Weatherstrip doors and windows; caulk cracks to prevent drafts and cool air loss.

10. Keep windows closed. Open outside doors as little as possible.

**Window Units**  
Follow above suggestions, plus these:

11. Buy units with highest "energy efficiency ratio" (EER). Uses less electricity to cool. If EER is not on sales tag, ask for it or figure it yourself. Divide "wattage" into "BTU" capacity. Both figures are on unit.
12. Place unit where it'll get as little direct sun as possible.
13. Aim air outlets at lower half of doorway to next room to allow warm air from that room to enter at the doortop for recooling, recirculation.
14. Never vent air conditioner into garage. Ventilation is usually too poor for top performance of your unit.

Conserve electricity and you help conserve one or more of the fuels needed to produce it. Conserve fuels and you help assure that there will be enough to meet essential needs for electricity in the future.

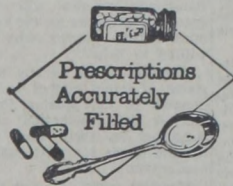

### Confetti - - -

An essential to the big plant is its cooling reservoir for condensing steam from turbines back into water. It also supplies water to carry heavy ash to its storage pond and other uses. Normal capacity of the lake is 40,000 acre feet, and surface area is 2000 acres.

Dimensions of the plant's two smaller smokestacks are 400 feet tall and inside diameter of 21.5 feet at the top. The large stack is 600 feet tall with exit inside diameter of 25.5. Also, the plant now has 475 employees and will have about 650 when all three units are in service.

The significant point about the Monticello operation is that a number of expensive procedures are justified by the cheapness and abundance of lignite, a fact which assures substantial savings as well as long time service.
