## Paving contract awarded and budget adopted at council meeting

The City Council came to the last step in a long and arduous journey Wednesday night. They awarded the paving contract for the much-debated Endres Addition project to Zack Burkett Company, based on their low bid of \$3.60 per square yard of hot lay asphalt mix rolled to a one-and-one-half-inch layer. The project is guaranteed to start no later than Oct. 15 and last no more than 30 days. They are expected to start sooner.

Councilmen were relieved to have reached this point and also relieved in the next matter when Juanita Bright volunteered to contact a list of possible committee members for the celebration of Muenster's centennial observance

in 1989. With the city's authority, Mrs. Bright will ask many local residents to serve on steering committees and working committees to organize and implement plans for Muenster's 100th birthday. Mayor Ted Henscheid expressed his thanks and that of the city for Bright's involvement.

The first meeting of an ordinance amendment necessary to allow sales of alcoholic beverages outside the fire zone by special permit was held. The purpose is to allow beer sales at events such as the Autofest planned for Oct. 24, at the city baseball park.

In the new business area, the subject of most conversation was the new budget and its 5.5% employee

pay raise. This is the first raise in 24 months and matches the current increase in the cost of living. Councilmen finally agreed that the raise was needed and justified and started to approve it. Then Police Chief Helen Tompkins addressed the council saying that she felt the police department deserved an 8% raise. She cited the points that some city employees had received raises in the past when the police didn't. Also, police must work longer hours and are not allowed overtime pay. Taking compensatory time is not really possible for police because of the nature of the work and the small number of personnel. Tompkins said, "Fair is fair, and I think we deserve either a raise or

overtime pay." Some councilmen agreed with her points, some didn't. They said that the budget and tax rate had to be adopted tonight and voted to adopt it as submitted by Joe Fenton. The tax rate for the coming year will be 45 cents per \$100.00 of valuation. The council did agree to discuss the police salary issue in closed session soon to see if a solution can be found within the new budget. Chief Tompkins said she was confident that the council would be fair in addressing her request.

In other action Wednesday night, the city council:

## Court grants test period for tower

Judge Jack Gray has granted a 30-day test period to Muenster Telephone Corporation. During this time, they may mount antennas on the 200-ft. communications tower, which has been the focus of controversy since last spring. The antennas and connecting wires may not be permanently attached and must be taken off at the end of 30 days. Muenster Telephone Corporation, the plaintiff in the law suit, was required to post a \$1,000.00 surety bond payable to the City of Muenster and Celine Dittfurth, City Secretary, defendants.

The matter will return to the courtroom Nov. 30, 1987, when Judge Gray has ordered that trial upon the merits of the case should begin.

Such is the substance of the order granting temporary injunction issued by the 235th District Court.

Telephone Corporation manager, Alvin Fuhrman, indicated that the antennas will be placed on the tower at their proper locations for testing purposes at the higher levels and the 45-foot level. "We can operate a 45-foot tower without a special use permit from the city. If the tower must be removed, we may have to erect a 45-foot tower and place the antennas on it. At this height, we would be limited as to the amount of television we could provide," said Fuhrman.

The city's reaction to the ruling was limited. City Manager Joe Fenton, after viewing the antenna

collection, pointed out that they (the antennas) did not conform to the description listed in the minutes of the Feb. 23 zoning board meeting. At that meeting, Alvin Fuhrman said there would be two quads and a single antenna on top.

Fuhrman indicated that the antennas going up were new designs, intended to be less visible and not hang over neighboring property. But they might not receive as well during bad weather being more subject to channelling.

The phone company has the

same crew that put the antennas up scheduled to take them all down in 30 days.

Both parties in this controversy agree that the legal procedure is costing a lot. Joe Fenton said, "I just signed off on another bill for legal services in this fight and the cost of this thing makes me sick. The people are paying for this whole thing and they need to express their opinion publicly."

Mayor Ted Henscheid was not available for comment after **The Enterprise** received word of the ruling Wednesday after news deadline.

## County seeks opinions on better EMS

The Cooke County Commissioners' Court is requesting public input concerning its Emergency Medical Services. The announcement in recent months that the Muenster Ambulance Station would probably be closed for economic reasons met with understandable opposition in the Muenster area and from Emergency Medical Technicians themselves who felt that the service was important and wanted some solution or compromise.

At the urging of many Muenster area residents at a public hearing in Muenster, the commissioners agreed to use the local media to seek public opinion as to their willingness to be taxed for more extensive emergency medical service. **The Enterprise** is glad to cooperate with the commissioners and the short survey is printed on page 2 of this issue. However, some explanation is needed to make the survey and surrounding situation understandable and render the information gathered useful to the commissioners' court.

The county tax rate and budget are set for the next year. The Muenster Ambulance Station is not included on a full-time or part-time basis. The survey information is for future EMS policy development.

However, if the commissioners receive a favorable response, (many people willing to accept increased taxes for increased service), they will seek to keep the Muenster station open on some kind of basis. They may locate remote EMS stations in western, eastern and southern parts of the county in upcoming years. If they receive a negative response, the commissioners will draw the opinion that the people don't want increased service. In that case, the Muenster station may be phased out. County Judge Jim Robertson said Tuesday that the county will maintain the lease agreement on the current building in hopes of working something out at least through December no matter what. He said, "We could work out

something if the survey indicates positive."

The first survey question addresses a 25% tax increase to have three new full-time mobile intensive care units, one west, east and south in addition to the existing service. The increase would not come over just one year but at this time, that's what the cost estimate is.

The second survey question concerns a first responder, advanced life support system, also in west, south and east areas. Chief EMT David Cleveland enthusiastically supports this plan.

This plan uses one paramedic in a small vehicle with equipment and radio. The purpose is to reach and stabilize the victim as quickly as possible, then call in ambulance support if necessary. It would be faster and cost less than half as much, especially if stationed in outlying areas. Cleveland said, "We need to reach a victim in no more than 6 minutes to do any good statistically. Response time from

Gainesville to Muenster even in good conditions is twice that and it's 30 or 40 minutes to Bulcher or Dexter. I think people should send letters along with the survey to convey their feelings."

Cleveland wants to work for this first responder plan no matter what the survey results are but a positive response will help implement the plan and hang onto the Muenster station at least for future use. "If I can get at least a significant percent to say 'yes, we want it,' then we know whether to get out and work," Cleveland said.

The survey is opinion only and non-binding. Any tax increases must be studied first and implemented in future years.

Precinct 4 Commissioner Rosalee Bayer encouraged everyone to respond and extend thanks to Precinct 1 Commissioner Danny Knight for his help in developing the survey.

Judge Robertson said, "This is a chance for those who can't attend meetings at the courthouse to express their opinion."

### SO THAT'S WHAT IT MEANS

"But Mom, everybody's doing it."  
"If everyone jumped in quicksand, would you do that too?"  
Sounds like dialogue from "Leave It to Beaver," but it comes close to illustrating the way things work in the "mediocracy."

All but a rare few people must get their views of the world from the media, since their direct experience with world affairs is next to nonexistent. Unfortunately too many journalists also get their views from the media. Bowing to deadline pressure, to laziness, to fear of challenging the received wisdom, they parrot what was said yesterday, itself a parroting of what was said the day before yesterday.

Anyone who doubts this should read what happened to H.L. Mencken's "bathtub hoax." Mencken wrote a fake history of the bathtub, and the piece was repeatedly cited in journals and encyclopedias as serious scholarship by a leading authority on tubs.

Fondness for goosestepping is not limited to journalists, but their role is supposed to be to expose, not perpetuate, popular pishposh. Their frequent neglect of that role can have serious consequences.

It would be hard to cite a more outrageous example than the press's handling of the "glasnost" reforms being undertaken by Soviet General Secretary Mikhail Gorbachev. Mr. Openness. Perhaps nothing has been given more front-page play over the last year or so. And since glasnost has been translated to mean "openness," the natural questions are: Is it really spingtime in Moscow? Is Gorbachev really opening the closed society?

Or, as we skeptics prefer to ask, is it chiefly a public-relations ploy to take advantage of the West's unsinkable penchant for wishful thinking? That, after all, is the very kind of ploy that Soviet regimes, starting with Lenin's, have specialized in.

Journalists might help us better understand what's going on inside the Kremlin if they themselves understood the meaning of the word that has come to symbolize the new Soviet regime: glasnost.

As the *Washington Post's* Stephen Rosenfeld points out, the word really means publicity, not openness. An article in *Foreign Affairs* by William Luers, an expert on the Soviet bloc, notes that "publicity" is the meaning listed in Russian/English dictionaries. "The English-language media and scholars seriously distort its meaning, in my view, by translating 'glasnost' as 'openness,'" he says.

Reviewing old news files, Rosenfeld discovered that Reuters, the British news agency, was correctly translating the word when it first gained currency, while the Associated Press was describing it as "openness or publicity"—evidence that some journalists were trying to grapple with the complexity of it all—but in more recent times almost all of us have succumbed to the convenience of "openness." The result, Rosenfeld points out, has been "the uncritical spreading of this one definition of glasnost by the journalists and others who are supposedly the guards of the linguistic gates."

Meanings of key terms are basic to any profession. You'd sue a surgeon who removed your spleen because he thought it was your tonsils. Is it too much for the boys and girls of the press to consult a dictionary?

As Rosenfeld acknowledges, wishful thinking, along with carelessness, explains "some part of this pervasive misreading." But it's hard to believe that carelessness and wishful thinking, which are lesser sins than willful distortion, can explain all of this.

Why haven't more journalists asked why, if Gorbachev were really high on openness, he didn't start by opening his own borders, which still lock in millions behind barbed wire, land mines, guard dogs and watch towers. Then he could move on to ending his genocidal occupation of Afghanistan and endless other outrages.

Sure, a byproduct of glasnost may marginally be more freedom for some Soviet citizens. But what it means essentially is more sophisticated propaganda.

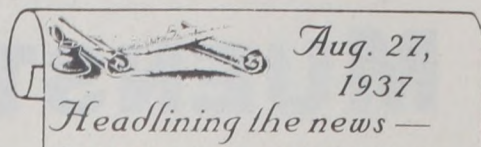
Indeed, we now witness propaganda about propaganda. In other words, propaganda peddled as "openness" and hence made more credible. No wonder one of the three men recently "elected" to full membership in the Soviet Politburo is A. N. Yakovlev, whose glorious career took him to the top of the propaganda apparatus of the Communist Party, where he serves as one of Gorbachev's most trusted advisors.

I again wonder: does it really take two years to look up a word?

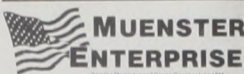

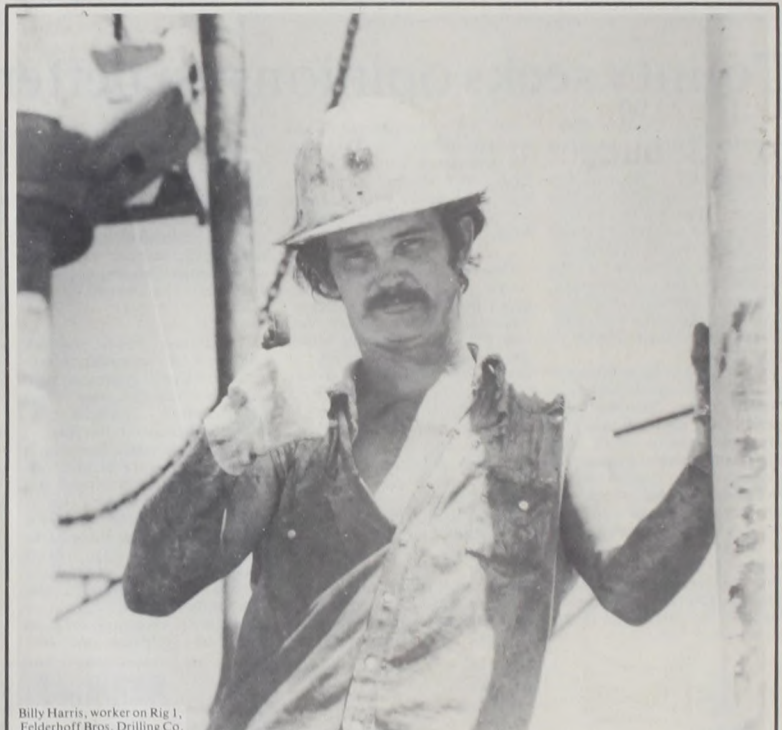
## POSTMASTER GETS LETTER SEEKING HEIR TO ESTATE

Postmaster Herbert Meurer is in receipt of a letter from a person at Wichita Falls inquiring the whereabouts of a William H. Wadkins. The letter in part is as follows:

"Am writing you in regard to a young man that served with me in the Spanish-American War of 1898. I have been told this man lived at or near Muenster. There were three brothers of them, but before the Civil War there were four brothers, one having been killed under 15, and another died in 1863. The father was seriously wounded in the same battle and died soon after this war, and I believe the remainder of the family came to Texas shortly thereafter.

"This friend looked like he might have been German, but dark complexioned, black hair, about five and one-half feet in height, and would weigh around 160 pounds. He had a brother named Sam, who was killed near Jacksonville when he was 18 years old. Their mother's name was Laura Case. There seems to be an estate left, this person being one of the heirs."

## Traffic deaths down from '86

The Texas Department of Public Safety is estimating that as many as 42 persons will die in traffic accidents during the 78-hour Labor Day period. The period begins at 6

p.m. Friday, Sept. 4, and ends at midnight on Monday, Sept. 7.

"We are seeing a decline of approximately 13 percent in traffic fatalities reported in Texas so far

this year compared to the same period last year," said DPS Director Leo Gossett. "I'm hopeful that we'll be able to add 1987 to the downward trend in Texas traffic deaths which began in 1982."

There were 48 deaths reported at the end of the 1986 Labor Day period in Texas. The addition of later deaths due to injuries received during the period raised the final count to 51. Thirty-eight of the 51 deaths resulted from accidents where speed or DWI was a contributing factor.

"The new state law which prohibits consumption of alcoholic beverages while driving went into effect today," Colonel Gossett reminded motorists. "Violators of this statute are now subject to receiving citations from our troopers and may face a maximum fine of \$200."

George Gustafson, spokesman for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts and president of the Texas Safety Association, joined the DPS in cautioning drivers.

Additional troopers will be placed on duty during the Labor Day driving period to enforce traffic laws and assist motorists.

The DPS Public Information Office will be providing updated traffic fatality counts three times each day during the Labor Day period.

term member to be appointed to the Legislative Budget Board.

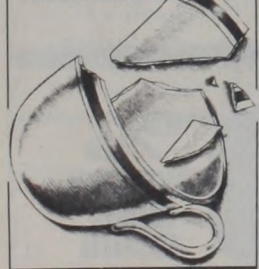

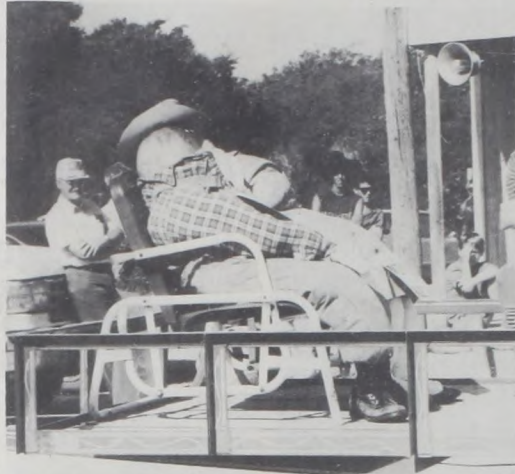

## Lifetime licenses a great sportsman gift

AUSTIN - All hunting and fishing licenses expired Aug. 31, so now would be a good time for sportsmen to purchase lifetime hunting,

fishing or combination licenses. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said by paying a one-time fee the lifetime purchaser will receive a new license automatically each year for the rest of his or her life.

The department to date has sold 510 lifetime licenses, bringing in \$229,800 in revenue. The funds are placed in a special endowment fund, the interest from which may be used by the department to obtain, develop and manage public hunting and fishing areas, or for use in fish hatchery operations.

In order to be eligible, applicants must be residents of Texas for at least six months.

So far the most popular lifetime license has been the combination hunting/fishing license, priced at \$500. The lifetime hunting license and lifetime fishing license each are priced at \$300. Application forms for the licenses are available at department offices across the state.

**County Agent's Report** by Craig Rosenbaum

Each year we spray various pesticides with ground rigs and in many instances have varying degrees of success. Proper pesticide application should go hand in hand with good sprayer calibration. It is very critical in many instances to apply the correct amount of product per acre and some pesticides require extra water for thorough coverage to crops.

There are several methods to calibrate spray equipment. One easy method is to use a catalogue for agricultural spray nozzles. These catalogues generally tell the spray nozzle, pressure, and ground speed. From this, producers are able to get a good idea of the amount of liquid being sprayed per acre.

The following are three methods for sprayer calibration that can be used.

- Method 1: Exact Known Area**
1. Fill tank to known level with water only.
  2. Spray exact known area (1 acre, 1/2 acre or 1/4 acre) at desired speed and pressure.
  3. Refill tank to known level, measuring the amount of water used.
  4. Calculate gallons per acre. Example: If you sprayed 1 acre, then gallons/acre will be amount measured back into tank. If sprayed 1/2 acre - gallons replaced x 2 equals GPA. If sprayed 1/4 acre - gallons replaced x 4 equals GPA.

- Method 2: Known Area Method**
1. Measure a distance in the field to be sprayed. A good distance is 660 feet.
  2. Fill the sprayer tank with water to a known level.
  3. Select a tractor throttle or miles per hour setting in the gear to be used.
  4. Select a pressure setting within the recommended range for the application.
  5. Spray the measured course.
  6. Refill the tank to the known level, measuring amount of water required.
  7. Measure the swath width sprayed in feet.
  8. The application rate in gallons per acre may now be calculated by this formula.

$$GPA = \frac{43,560 \times \text{gallons used}}{\text{length (ft.)} \times \text{swath width (ft.)}}$$

- Method 3:**
1. Partially fill tank with water.
  2. Measure off desired distance to travel (100 ft. - 200 ft. - 300 ft., etc.).
  3. Determine time in seconds it takes to travel over the measured distance at the desired pressure and throttle setting (speed) you will be using when spraying.
  4. Measure swath width sprayer puts out.
  5. Catch spray from cluster for number of seconds it took to travel the measured distance and measure in gallons.
  6. Calculate gallons per acre (GPA) as follows:

$$GPA = \frac{43,560 \times \text{gallons used}}{\text{length (ft.)} \times \text{swath width (ft.)}}$$

With the cost of pesticides and the specific nature of their application, time should be taken in proper calibration of spray equipment.
