Muenster receives a Christmas present

A Christma's present to the citizens of Muenster - a gift too targe to wrap - arrived here Saturday from the north. This gift, a new pumper fire fruck, was specially ordered in Juy by the Muenster Volunteer Fire bepartment. The truck comes with a \$108,000 price tag. De Fenton, Muenster city manager, said a new truck was speeded by the city in order to comply with state insurance by with state insurance bequirements.

ply with state insurance requirements. "Our other pumper is 29 years old," Fenton said. "When a truck gets to be 30 years old, the state doesn't recognize it. The State fire marshall office mandated that we must have a new truck to satisfy safety requirements. "The old truck still has a lot of good use left in it," he said. "The two trucks used together will com-plement each other." The new truck, completed about six months ahead of schedule, was manufactured by Smeal Fire Apparatus, Inc. in Snyder, Neb. Representatives of the company drove the truck to Muenster last weekend and demonstrated its modern features and equipment to Muenster firemen.

Herbie Knabe, Muenster Volunteer Fire Chief, said the truck gives the fire department "more firepower." "Everybody's pleased," Knabe said, speaking for the 24 volunteer firemen. "It's exactly what we ordered."

ordered." The main function of the truck, Fenton said, is to pump water -1,000 gallons of water per minute. Eight hose connectors are on the truck, carrying 1,850 feet of hose. The truck's maximum water out-put can be achieved in less than 30

seconds from the time the truck arrives at a fire, Fenton said. Powered by a 215 horsepower Caterpillar diesel engine, the truck

as much as expected. - An increase in land diversion (set-aside or acreage reduction) some of which may be paid.

An assessment on milk pro-ducers to avoid a cut in the price support level.

(Ronald Knutson) Dairy Program Compromise The deficit budget agreement debate in Congress is holding up the decision by the Secretary of Agriculture whether to lower the price support \$.50 on Jan. 1, 1988. The Congressional decision depends on the dairy program's share of the \$900 million cut in acticultural programs. Latest inshare of the \$900 million cut in agricultural programs. Latest in-formation suggests that dairy sup-port programs are scheduled for a \$100 million reduction. To meet this reduction, Congress has the following options: - Passing a 10-cent assessment on producer marketing. - A 2 percent drop in the sup-port price from \$11.20/cwt. Con-gress must pass \$80 million off to another segment of agriculture if it accepts the 2 percent cut in the price.

Congress is also considering whether the scheduled 50 cent cut in support levels might itself be enough to meet budget reduction requirements.

All terrain vehicles not safe for small kids

With sales of more than 2 million in 1986, an all-terrain vehi-cle may sound like an ideal gift this Christmas. But according to the December issue of Texas Medicine, use of the three-wheeled ATV has caused serious and fatal injuries

All-terrain vehicles are motoriz-All-terrain vehicles are motoriz-ed off-the-road three- or four -wheeled vehicles with balloon-like tires for use on sand, mud and other surfaces. A study of ATV -related injuries from July 1984 to June 1986 in Beaumont shows that more than 25 percent of hospitalizations for trauma remoted it two hoering were due hospitalizations for trauma reported at two hospitals were due to motor vehicle accidents and that ATVs were responsible for 25 injuries, with two deaths restulting from severe head injuries, states the official journal of the Texas Medical Association. Authors Drs. Mark J. Kubala and Carl E. Shrontz. Beaumont, note that Shrontz, Beaumont, note that most of the patients were young white males, and only one wore a protective helmet.

protective helmet. The authors say design of the vehicle, road conditions, and the ability and judgment of the driver are important factors in the ability to control an ATV. They add that the four-wheeled ATV is more stable than the three-wheeler and that nationally 74 percent of three -wheel ATV accidents started with tipping or overturning compared to 59 percent for the four-wheeled version.

to 59 percent for the four-wheeled version. "Children below the age of six years old are physically to small and insufficiently coordinated to operate even the smallest ATV models..." write the authors. They add that children ages 6 through 11 do not have adequate judgment needed to operate an ATV and that their reaction time is too slow. Poor judgment was noted in 31 percent of fatal ac-ATV and that their reaction time is too slow. Poor judgment was noted in 31 percent of fatal ac-cidents and insufficient ability in 22 percent, according to a Con-sumer Product Safety Commis-sion ATV Task Force study. It also showed "that all drivers under 16 years of age had a relatively higher risk of injury on adult-sized ATVs..." The article notes taking risks, such as driving after drinking alcohol, not wearing a helmet, and excess speed dramatically increase the chances of an accident. Thirty percent of all fatal ATV accidents were associated with use of alcohol, according to the Commis-sion's report.



BEWARE! Grain bin hazard

Grain storage bins are a common

Grain storage bins are a common sight on farms and ranches that may appear to involve little risk. But there are potential hazards that should be recognized. One of these dangers is acciden-tal suffocation. This often happens during the unloading of the bin when grain may form a "bridge" and the operator must break the bridge to get the grain flowing again. Bridged grain may look per-fectly safe to walk on from the top, but it could hide a cavity that will collapse and hopelessly submerge

collapse and hopelessly submerge an operator almost immediately. Furthermore, an operator who enters a grain bin with the unloader running may sink in the flowing grain before he realizes what has happened. Once submerged, suf-focation follows in seconds. It only takes a few inches of grain coverage

to cause suffocation. These mishaps can be prevented. Ladders should be installed in all bins. This will provide an exit if you

need to get out as well as a safe way of getting in. But remember, even if there is a ladder in the bin, you must be able to get to it. If you walk out to the center of the bin and get caught in the flowing grain, you may not be able to reach the ladder. If grain bridges, shut off the unloader and use a pipe or some other long object to break the bridge and get the grain flowing again.

Never enter a grain bin while the unloader is operating. If you mus enter a bin, disconnect the power source and lock it out to make sure no one can turn it on while you are

Always tie yourself off with a rope and harness before entering a bin so you will have a way to pull yourself out or to be pulled out by its the days others stored by its others. Have others stand by in case something happens. If the grain should start flowing for some reason, stay near the outer wall and keep walking until the grain flow stops or the bin is empty.


