Among sixty finalists

Fina names two at Muenster High School

Two Muenster High School students are among the sixty high school football players with outstanding records of achievement in the classroom and leadership in school and community activities who have been chosen as finalists for the Fina Academic All-State Football Team. Fifteen hundred candidates were considered by the first panel of judges.

The two students are Robert "Drue" Bynum and Mark "Andy" Burnette, both seniors.

Drue Bynum is president of the

Student Council and has been class president four years. He is a state qualifier in persuasive speaking, president of the Spanish Club and a member of the National Honor Society.

An Eagle Scout, he is also junior assistant scoutmaster and a recipient of the "God and Country" Award. He is president of his church's youth group.

Bynum was co-captain of the football team and played running back and strong safety, winning all district honors. He also participates

in track and golf.

Andy Burnette is an officer of his class and the Student Council and is a regional qualifier on the debate team. He won the 4-H Gold Star Award, the Farm Bureau Leadership Award and the Danforth "I Dare You" Award. He is also a scholarship recipient for the American Youth Foundation National Leadership Conferences.

He is a 4-H Club Council delegate and a member of the Board of Directors of the Texas Junior Angus Association. He has been a leader for several 4-H craft projects and was a delegate to the state 4-H Club Congress.

Burnette has given more than 120 hours of service as a United Way volunteer to assist passengers at Dallas/Fort Worth Airport. In piano contests, he has won a superior rating, an excellent rating and gold and silver awards.

Selection of Bynum and Burnette was based on their academic achievements and participation and leadership in school and community activities. Each is a candidate for selection as one of the eleven members of the Academic All-State Team. Each team member will receive a \$2,000 college scholarship.

Sponsors of the program said Wednesday that it is a distinct honor for any school represented by the 60 nominees, adding that it is most unusual for a school to have two nominees.

Muenster, Tx...Tourism, the second largest industry in Texas, next only to petroleum, is already important to Muenster. Germanfest has placed this community in the tourism business. This \$16 billion industry has invaded our community with its clean dollar, causing growth in the sausage making and restaurant businesses, gasoline sales, motel rooms rented and other less evident areas.

Tourism is a fast growing industry and for each dollar invested you can expect to get a \$3 return. Two of our local businesses realize the value of this clean dollar and good return. Bayer's Kolonialwaren und Bakerei and Fischer's Meat Market joined with the Muenster Chamber of Commerce to do some national advertising. A full page, full color ad about Muenster is currently appearing in the East Texas Vacation Guide. This guide may be obtained free at any of the state's 12 Tourist Bureaus, at auto club offices nationwide, and at more than 100 host cities, lakes and attractions in the 72 counties of East Texas, including Muenster. Or, copies may be ordered direct from East Texas Chamber of Commerce, Box 1592, Longview, Texas 75606. Enclose \$1 to help cover mailing costs. Copies may be obtained locally from the Chamber of Commerce.

More than 350,000 copies of the East Texas Vacation Guide will be distributed by host cities, volunteer East Texas Tourism leaders, and the East Texas Chamber of Commerce. Tens of thousands of copies are taken by interested persons visiting 14 sports and vacation shows in various parts of the United States.

The 1987 edition of the Guide invites the visitor and native alike to "Have another big time in Texas." It is a virtual textbook for

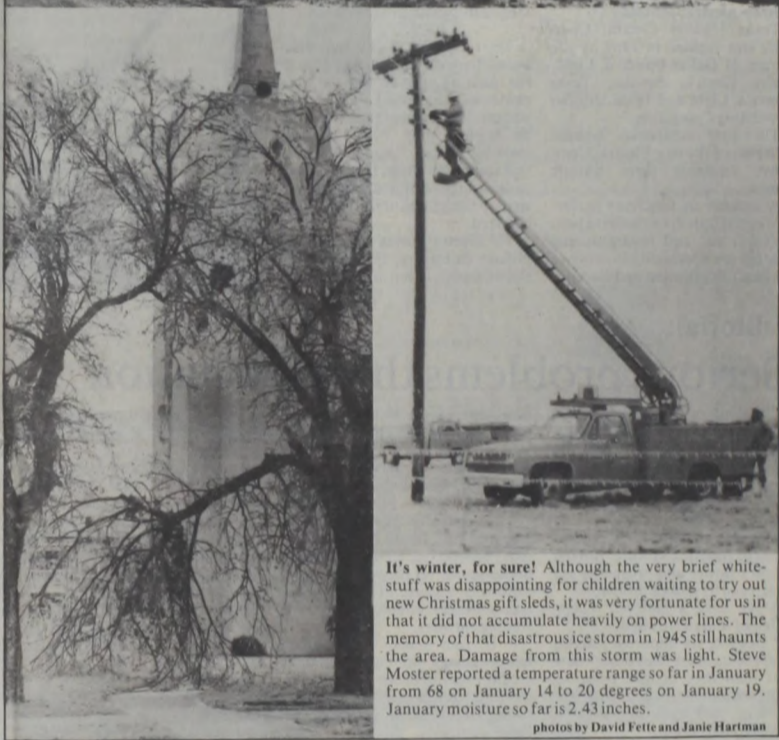
travelers and folklore buffs in the vast eastern third of Texas. It's free for the asking.

Covering 72 counties plus four parishes in Louisiana, the Guide contains highway maps of the region, data on dozens of lakes and hundreds of attractions, 111 host cities, and a calendar of hundreds of events, all packed into digest-size volume.

Germanfest is mentioned in the Guide and therefore is pushing us to the forefront of the tourism business. Germanfest attracts 40,000 visitors to Muenster for a three-day party. Statistics show the average tourist spends \$28 per day. This means the town should take in \$1,120,000 during Germanfest. In the park at Germanfest 1986, the gross was \$247,390.85. This amount does not include the bicycle rally or the German Fun Run since that money, \$40,883 was raised outside the park. These figures would indicate that businesses in town made approximately \$830,000 during the weekend. This isn't bad for three days of work in a town of 1,450.

These figures do not include the money that changes hands in town in preparation for Germanfest and for clean up afterward. The Chamber of Commerce spent \$16,408.92 in preparation and clean up to local vendors, many of whom have neither concessions nor a connection to Germanfest. These people profit from Germanfest just as surely as if they had a concession in the park.

It is time to begin thinking about Germanfest again and what improvements can be made to benefit our visitors. The main thing that keeps people coming back year after year is the friendliness of the people in town. This is something we need to be aware of and work at doing year 'round. Make our visitors feel welcome and let them know "we are glad you are here."

Heavy ice bypasses Muenster

Broken tree limbs and a few losses of electrical power, but no personal injuries due to falls seem to be the extent of local concern during Muenster's recent cold snap.

Icing conditions affected Cooke County Electric Co-op's local lines in Muenster and west toward and

including Nocona. The most damage occurred north of Nocona, which was mostly individual wire breakage. Repairs included replacing quite a number of conductors and six electric poles.

Crews were out Saturday afternoon, throughout the night and all day Sunday, completing oil field repairs by Tuesday. No residences were without current overnight.

The hazardous weather caused

the worst ice storm in recent years for the electric system.

Texas Power and Light Company reported two outages Sunday from customers, service poles breaking on oil leases. Monday's melting caused the wires to short out, tripping the breakers on the transformer on West 7th Street leaving 8 or 9 houses without power for a short time.

Public hearing ahead for Cable TV tower

The newest feature on Muenster's skyline will be the subject of a public meeting at city hall Tuesday, January 27 at 7 p.m. The 199 foot tower recently constructed by Muenster Cable TV is not covered by an August 29, 1984 building permit made for a 12 x 10 prefab concrete building also on the site.

City officials said the meeting and notification procedure are completely within normal zoning ordinance requirements. Even after the fact, ordinance requires that construction not included on the list of permitted uses may be issued a specific use permit by: making a request to the planning and zoning commission, holding a public hearing after individual notice to all neighbors within a 200 foot radius, and following recommendations to the city council by the planning and zoning commission.

Although the meeting is open to the public and notice is posted in City Hall, public notice is not required.

Muenster Cable TV manager, Alvin Fuhrman feels that he has a valid permit for construction. "My permit and my canceled check indicate that the building and the tower are both covered. I have given city hall copies of both," he said. Fuhrman also checked with city hall and city manager Joe Fenton before the tower construction began. Fenton indicated that the ordinance was not checked completely and added that when they talked he felt Fuhrman certainly knew whether the permit was valid.

The ordinance states that a permit will be effective for one year. If the project isn't finished the permit must be re-issued.

MISD trustees set annual election April 4

The Muenster ISD Board of Trustees passed a resolution setting the annual school election for Saturday, April 4, 1987, during the Jan. 8 monthly meeting.

Positions three and four on the board are the offices to be filled. Trustees appointed L.B. Bruns to serve as election judge with Robert McDaniel and Edgar Dyer assisting as clerks.

The board and superintendent completed Section II of the Texas Education Agency Compliance Form required for a Texas Education Agency monitoring visit scheduled for March 4-8. During this inspection all academic and curricular offerings will be checked to insure that required state standards are being maintained.

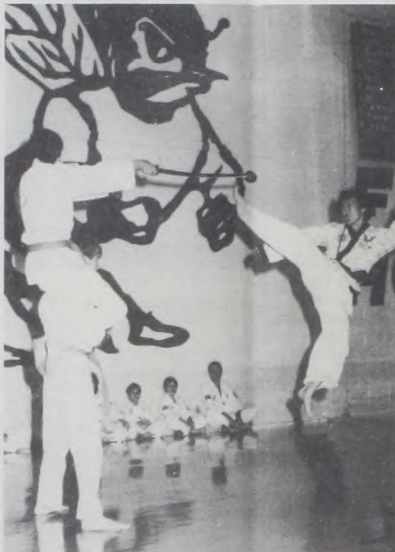
Trustees approved required amendments to the 1986-87 MISD Student Discipline Plan to comply with recent legislation passed by the Texas Legislature. A new board policy specifying remediation efforts the staff may utilize to assist

students who fail the Texas Educational Assessment Minimum Skills in grades seven, nine or eleven received approval during the meeting.

The board went over the cumulative annual performance evaluation of Superintendent Charles Coffey and extended his current contract for one additional year.

Spring sports budgets for golf, tennis and track were approved during the meeting.

Board members were each given a copy of the district's annual performance report for the 1985-86 school year, to study for approval at the February meeting. The report, compiled by the local administrative staff and the Texas Education Agency Staff, upon approval will be made available to the news media or to any patron. The report contains numerous information concerning academic, financial, attendance, discipline, test scores, class size or other data for the 1985-86 school year.

Electric companies unite under one name, logo

DALLAS (Jan. 16, 1987)—A new corporate identity, "TU Electric," as well as a new logo, is being adopted companywide by Texas Utilities Electric Company.

Texas Utilities Electric Company was formed in 1984 by the merger of Dallas Power & Light, Texas Electric Service, Texas Power & Light and Texas Utilities Generating Companies.

The four companies became divisions of the new Electric Company, retaining their historic names.

A number of functions performed by the four divisions have been consolidated, and organizational changes are continuing in order to eliminate duplication and improve

efficiency. Use of a single name for all of Texas Utilities Electric Company will help bring about further cost savings and efficiencies in serving customers.

The transition to companywide use of the new identity and logo and the phasing out of the division names will be gradual. In many instances, the new name and logo will be applied only when existing material and equipment is replaced. Therefore, it is expected to be a matter of years before all signs, vehicles and uniforms will be changed.

TU Electric serves more than 2 million customers, or about one-third the population of Texas.

Editorial:

Serious problems threaten nation

The Book of Joshua tells of the people of Gibeon who, recognizing they could not compete with the approaching Israelites, were satisfied to win for themselves a place as hewers of wood and drawers of water.

The fate of Gibeon is not my vision of America's future. But our nation's power and prosperity are threatened by serious problems.

* We have a national budget deficit of some \$210 billion.

* In 1986, we imported roughly \$160 billion more than other countries than they bought from us, while countries like Japan and Germany had trade surpluses exceeding \$100 billion.

* In six years, we have lost two million jobs to trade problems. Half of those were skilled, full-

time, high-paying jobs in manufacturing. Ninety percent of the new jobs created since 1980 were in retail, trade or services - low-paying and often unskilled or part-time jobs.

* Three times in 1986 we were net importers of food. We have the most productive, efficient farmers in the world, yet they have trouble exporting because of the barriers and subsidies established by our trading partners.

* In four years, we've gone from being the number one creditor nation in the world to the world's largest debtor nation - owing more than Mexico and Brazil combined.

If those trends continue much longer, American workers may well end up like the people of that Biblical village. We must pull together to find solutions.

There are no quick fixes, but it's obvious that a tough, comprehensive trade policy is part of the answer. Trade is at the top of my agenda as chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

Whenever anyone suggests the present world trade system is unfair or ineffective, dark mutterings begin about protectionism and the Smoot-Hawley tariff.

I am not a protectionist. I am a pragmatist who believes in changing the international trading

system to create an environment where world trade can grow, benefiting all nations.

America still has the leverage - as the world's most attractive marketplace - to press for tough, long-overdue changes in the way world trade is conducted. We can make our trading partners see that the benefits of world trade carry with them responsibilities.

If the Europeans and Japanese, for example, would buy goods from the Less Developed Countries at the same per capita rate we do, world trade would expand by \$250 billion a year.

Our own trade laws must be modified to reflect the unequal assistance given to foreign exporters by their governments. It's simply not fair to ask even the most effective, efficient, enlightened American farmer or corporation to compete against the treasuries of foreign governments.

We have the right to demand that nations who export to America grant us equal access to their markets; to insist that each nation do its fair share to increase trade; and to demand a rollback in protectionist, non-tariff barriers.

But we must also look in the mirror for answers. It's time to make some fundamental policy changes. We must reduce our \$210 billion budget deficit. We must in-

crease productivity, provide incentives for investments, and match our education system and management talent to the challenges of the future.

I believe we can work together - Democrats and Republicans - to map out an economic revival policy for America, for we do not want our children's children serve other nations as hewers of wood and drawers of water.

While others took charge of the one dead person Mr. Hellman carried the injured man to his car and rushed him to the Gainesville hospital. By using his horn constantly he secured that right of way and brought the dying man to medical aid in record time but still too late to save the man's life.

Muenster Public School jet race car finals

Students of the eighth grade woodworking class at Muenster have just completed a jet car project, which consists of building a carbon dioxide powered miniature car and sending it streaking across the gym floor.

The assignment begins with designing the vehicle within specifications of a racing car. The first step is to make a sketch of the creation and after approval make two more drawings resulting in a full scale three-view sketch of the

car. The drawing is transferred to a styrofoam blank which is then cut along the lines to make the car's body and further trimming produces the desired shape. This object becomes a pattern, its measured specifications to be followed in cutting out a piece of white pine. Next, the car is trimmed to the desired shape and holes are drilled for two axles and the carbon dioxide motor. The car must weigh 75 to 100 grams before painting. Then plastic wheels are mounted and the painting is finished.

Finally students came to the excitement of the project, a double elimination race before envious seventh graders to determine whose car won the championship.

Chad Bayer won the race with Chris Reyling coming in second and Jefflyn LeFeure finishing third. Rudy Koesler is their instructor.

Red Cross blood service begins new hepatitis testing

The American Red Cross Blood Services Red River Region has recently implemented a program of testing designed to reduce the incidence of post transfusion non-A, non-B hepatitis. All blood donated is tested to determine the level of enzyme normally present in the serum alanine amino-transferase or ALT. Damage to the liver, such as

occurs in hepatitis, can cause elevations in the level of this enzyme. Units with elevated ALT levels will not be used for transfusion.

The recommendation to implement the ALT test is the result of studies that have suggested that institution of such surrogate testing

could decrease the incidence of post transfusion non-A, non-B hepatitis, which is usually a mild disease and not associated with any clinical symptoms. "Because of screening procedures already in place, the blood supply is safer than it ever has been," said Polly Brumfield, Director of Communications for Red River Region. "I want to emphasize the continuing need for healthy volunteer donors to assure that a safe blood supply continues to be readily available for our 34-county region." A second surrogate test will be implemented in the near future which will also be a test for non-A, non-B hepatitis.

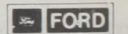

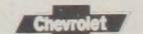

Another Lake Fork bass makes lunger program

TYLER - A Grand Prairie veterinarian caught a 13-pound bass from Lake Fork Jan. 6 and loaned it to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, less than two months after the state record 17-pound, 11-ounce bass was caught from the same lake.

Both fish are being kept alive at the department's Tyler Fish Hatchery, and they comprise the first two entries in the new "Share A Lone Star Lunger" program started in December.

Hatchery superintendent David Campbell said Dr. Mikel Athon caught the new entry on almost exactly the same type of lure that tricked the state record bass caught by Mark Stevenson during November. The lure was a weedless jig with live rubber legs, fished with a crawfish-imitation plastic trailer.

Athon hauled the fish back to his Grand Prairie home in an ice chest equipped with an aerator. He contacted Stevenson who helped him contact Parks and Wildlife personnel at Tyler.

The lunger program offers Texas anglers who catch 13-pound-plus bass to donate their fish for hatchery use. The department thereby has a source of brood fish with genetic potential for growth.

Anglers can benefit from publicity through being in the "Lone Star Lunger Hall of Fame" and by participating in the "Lunker of the Year" competition.

Stevenson's record fish already has created a stir in Tyler, with about 1,200 persons visiting the hatchery to see the fish which was named "Ethyl" by her captor. The facility also has received more than 300 telephone calls inquiring about the fish.

Stevenson indicated he will have Ethyl released back into her Lake Fork haunts after the department completes spawning work with the big fish.

Persons catching bass that might qualify for the program may call toll-free 1-800-792-1112 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays.

Texas Beef Checkoff Program

According to the Texas Beef Industry Council, over \$1.2 million was remitted for October and \$1.017 million in November for the Beef Promotion and Research assessments.

"We are very excited about the compliance with the law these dollars indicate," said Roy Wheeler, Treasurer of the Texas Beef Industry Council. "This compliance rate, coupled with the small number of refund requests we've received, indicates to us there is broad support for this program in Texas. In addition, we've visited a number of collection sites and received many phone calls, and almost always we are hearing very positive comments."

The checkoff program, part of the 1985 Farm Bill, mandates that each time a producer sells cattle a \$1/head be collected and funneled to state and national agencies for the promotion and research of beef. Anyone who has had cattle for more than 10 days, such as feedyards and cattlemen in the country, are considered producers. Their assessments are collected by the buyers - packers, order buyers, feedyards and other cattlemen who bought through private treaty - and then remitted to their state beef councils.

Although producers are required to pay the \$1 assessment at the time of sale, they have 60 days to request a refund. October refund requests totaled five percent of the revenue. Figures for November are still

unknown, because of the law allowance of 60 days for refunds.

Almost 70 percent of Texas revenues will be spent on national promotion, education and research. Those funds will be sent to the national Beef Promotion and Research Board, who have contracted directly with the Beef Industry Council of the Meat Board. Network TV, radio and print ads featuring Cybill Shepherd and James Garner as spokespersons began Jan. 12. It is estimated that the ad campaign, financed entirely from checkoff assessments, will cost about \$25-30 million.

Small Grain Marketing Seminar

Today's farming requires sharp marketing skills to earn consistent profits. As the marketplace for agricultural commodities continues to become more sophisticated, a farmer's success depends, to a much greater extent, on his marketing ability. Only those farmers with limitless resources can afford to gamble on the cash price of a commodity. Without those resources, a farmer can't afford to bear the risk associated with fluctuating prices.

A 5 to 10 percent decline in the price of a commodity during the course of the growing season may, in many instances, make the difference between making a profit and taking a loss. In order to

manage this risk, an effective marketing plan is needed.

Over the decades, the emphasis in farming has been on production. The ability to produce greater and greater quantities on the same amount of land has been the primary defense against changing prices. However, with current market volatility, this defense is less and less effective. Today, the best defense against fluctuating prices is a good offense. The various marketing alternatives and how they can be implemented to help producers develop this offense will be covered at a marketing workshop 9:00 - 12:00 January 29, at Gainesville National Bank Meeting Room, 2nd floor.

To arrive at the best marketing

alternatives for producers, Dr. Ken Stokes, Extension Economist-Management will help producers estimate their production costs, develop a marketing price objective, and map out a marketing plan. Whether the goal of the marketing efforts is to maximize income, enhance cash flow, defer income into the following tax year, or a combination of these, a fundamental knowledge of marketing will help producers attain their goals.

A follow-up Futures and Options Workshop with Dr. Ed Smith, Grain Marketing Economist as the instructor, will be held two weeks later on February 12.

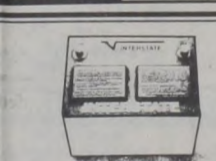

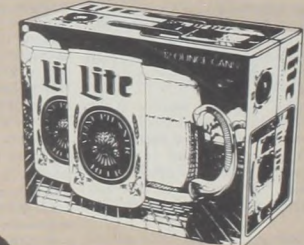
