## Hornets win respect with district title

Meet Paducah at Iowa Park

The 1988 Muenster Hornet football team beat back their pre-season fourth place prediction and earned a district co-championship and number one seed in the playoffs with a 14-0 victory over the Windthorst Trojans last Friday night. With a 9-1 regular season mark, the Hornets tied the best regular season mark in team history, and became the fifth district champion in gridiron history.

Coach Bill Jump spoke with pride of the team's rise to the top. "We're proud, and the rest is icing on the cake," he said. "These guys are hard workers, the staff works hard, and with the support the community gives, we're glad we could bring a championship to Muenster."

The Hornets will travel to Iowa Park Friday night for a 7:30 kickoff with the Paducah Dragons, who are 5-5. This game will be for the Area Championship. Due to the realignment by the ULL, Muenster and Lindsay both received byes in the bi-district rounds and advanced directly to the Area round.

"Paducah is a big play team that is better than most 5-5 teams. We will have to control the line of scrimmage and not turn the ball over. They have some talented players." Paducah is in an 8-team district. They lost the three non-district games, were upset 38-22 by Motley County and lost to district leader Munday 29-6.

The Dragons are led by all-state pre-season pick Allen Hurd, tackle

Tyron Brisco and guard Jay Mahorney. "Hurd's not as good as last year," said Paducah Coach Tony Martinez, "he was injured in an early game against Electra along with our quarterback, so Allen moved to the quarterback position." The Dragons' fullback is known to be big, fast and aggressive. The team averages 165 pounds on the line, smaller than last year, and consists of 33 players.

"Looking at the tapes, Muenster is a sound ball club," continued Martinez. "Tradition has kept us in the playoffs. We just hope not to make any mistakes so we can stay in the ball game."

Muenster enters the playoff after their shutout of Windthorst, 14-0. But without the Trojans' 17-16 win over Valley View, the 9-1 Hornets would be staying home. Fortunately, the Trojans had no more miracles as they gained less than 100 total yards against the stingy Hornet defense. Bobby Thornhill paced the Big Red with 10 tackles. Offensively, it was Scot Vogel with 19 carries for 79 yards and J. Shane Wimmer with 3 receptions for 93 yards and a score; he also had an interception.

Quarterback Jerry Brawner hit Wimmer for the first score early in the second quarter on a beautiful 48-yard bomb. Weldon Hermes kicked the PAT.

Late in the fourth quarter, senior Chris Klement iced the game when

The ravages of Diabetes is of special concern to many people in the country as one person in 20 is stricken with this disease and its serious consequences, and no one knows whose family will be hurt next.


Many have donated money over the years and much research has gone into finding a cure—but nothing really positive has come out of it since the discovery of insulin which controls but does not cure.

## Veterans Day message: Our fallen soldiers, an eternal testament to valor, devotion

This article is dedicated to the memory of my departed friend and comrade, Mr. Guy Beasley, one of our nation's honored veterans and life member of the Disabled American Veterans.

America is a great nation, embraced by a heritage of freedom, democracy and human rights. On this day we proudly celebrate one of the reasons why we have sustained that heritage - the American Veteran.

A significant event occurred in world history on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918. All became quiet on the Western Front. Nearly five million Americans had donned a uniform to serve during the "war to end all wars," and 116,000 of them lost their lives. For 70 years this nation has taken time to remember and honor its veterans on this special day. So as we gather across our country today, we continue a tradition that has been with us for many years. And it is certainly proper that we do so again this year. Our veterans deserve our thanks and our respect. They have been there when they were needed at every stage of history. We should reflect on the great debt we owe all of our veterans. The lives of more than one million Americans have been part of the price. So have the dedication and sacrifices of the 27 million veterans who are living today.

There's something pure about ideals that have been tempered by sacrifice for America. The strength of those principles is certain when they've been tested in the rigors of battle. And ideals that stir the hearts of our nation's veterans have permanence. You can see that in the youngest men and women in our ranks - those who still wear the uniform of our armed forces. Take the Americans who serve in the Persian Gulf today, for example, in their commitment, you'll see a mirror image of the patriots who fought under George Washington in the Revolutionary War.

The idealism of men and women under arms has been with us since the beginning. In many ways, veterans have continued to serve long after the guns of war

have gone silent. But the preservation of that idealism is, perhaps, the greatest service they render. This is not to say that we veterans are the same young people who wore our nation's uniform in the World Wars, Korea or Vietnam. As individuals, all of us change as we grow older. None of us is the same young person who bore arms on the soil of France, the South Pacific, the Chosin Reservoir or the Mekong Delta. If age had not changed us, the history of this century certainly would have, this incredible century has changed everything.

We may view that change as good or bad. We can focus on the massive growth and progress of 20th century laid at our feet. Or we can choose to look at the pain and conflict of this century. Surely all of that is present, and all of it has affected veterans. But one constant remains even as I see the change that life has wrought in me, in my nation, and in the human race. And I see that constant in my fellow veterans. Some forces are too compelling, too true to ever change. So it is with hearts of the men and women of honor who have served this nation so well.

For me, these veterans are - and always will be - the focal point of the pride I feel in being an American. As a result, I feel the same thrill of patriotism this Veterans Day, for me it will be no different than past Veterans Days. I've gone through many changes over the years, but my pride in being a veteran - and pride in those fellow veterans who served courageously and well - is no different today than yesterday. And I know it will not waver tomorrow, and I know, too, that the same rock-solid belief I have is shared by millions of Americans.

The unchanging nature of the pride grows more important to me each year. All of us have had our faith in mankind badly shaken by the deceitful or dishonest action of others. Our faith in our friends, our neighbors, our communities and our government have all been tested at one time or another. Our nation's call to service for many of us was the ultimate test of faith. Those who served America honorably and well passed that ultimate test. And that is something that can never be taken away from America's veterans.

The extraordinary thing is, America continues to produce such men and women, true patriots continue to step forward. Today's Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps are rich with young people of absolute conviction, unwavering duty. They cherish, just as dearly as their parents, the special privilege of being an American, and the special duties which that citizenship requires. They clearly see their obligations and enthusiastically embrace their challenges. They too have discovered a constant in their lives, they share a pride in country and their fellow servicemen and women that cannot diminish with years.

The veterans of World War I, through the decades to the newest, youngest veterans of the Persian Gulf, Beirut and Grenada, form the bedrock of my pride. I shall salute them all on Veterans Day. For me on Veterans Day this election year, the voices of meandering, mudslinging politicians will fade. In their place will be the sounds of praise and pride that echo from the deeds of our nation's veterans. For me, on Veterans Day, pictures of poverty

## Plan to attend Gainesville's Christmas Parade Saturday

More than 70 parade entries will be featured beginning at 2pm Saturday during the annual Gainesville Christmas Parade. The parade route has been extended this year, proceeding from West California Street to Lindsay Street, and then back west on Main Street to the Gainesville Civic Center.

The Muenster Telephone Company's float will be included in this year's Gainesville parade, said Charles Sullivant, parade chairman. Also featured will be a variety of bands, floats, drill teams, horseback riders and commercial entries. The parade is sponsored annually by the Gainesville Downtown Merchant Association.

## Chief appraiser position filled

Former Fannin County Chief Appraiser Pat Pickett will begin her new job Monday as the chief appraiser of the Cooke County Appraisal District, CCAD board members decided during a special meeting this week.

A Commerce native and graduate of Wichita Falls High School, Ms. Pickett started as a clerk for the Fannin County Central Appraisal District in Feb. 1983. She worked her way to personal property appraiser, deputy chief appraiser, and moved to Carrollton where she has worked for a water filter distributorship. Ms. Pickett expects to receive dual certification as a registered professional appraiser and registered tax assessor within two years.

"We're just optimistic that she's going to do a real good job,"

said Jim Zachary, CCAD board president. "She knows how to deal with people."

Ms. Pickett was selected from about 20 applicants for the position. She will initially serve in an administrative role in organizing the CCAD office and bringing records up to date before beginning any extensive field work, Zachary said.

The board has informed Ms. Pickett that she will be the seventh chief appraiser since the district's inception in 1983, and about the very active political involvement of local taxpayers, Zachary said. "Her greatest challenge will probably be getting the confidence of the people in the appraisal district functions," he said. "It's so important to have a person with the right attitude in there."

Fannin County has about 35,000 parcels of property, compared to Cooke County's 65,000. The two districts are similar in size

where personal property is concerned, however, because about half of Cooke County's parcels are minerals, while Fannin has no real mineral parcels, Pickett said.

Saying she has already had an informal discussion with several members of the Cooke County Taxpayers Association, Ms. Pickett said she looks at her new position as a challenge, and an opportunity to get back into appraisal district work.

"I think a very important part of the job is to care about the people you're involved with," Ms. Pickett said. "When you educate people and taxpayers about the regulations of the State Property Tax Board, you've eliminated a lot of your problems."

## Lindsay City Council seeks new alderman

The Lindsay City Council is looking for a replacement for Councilman Jerry Kneupper, who has resigned to take a position with a company in Irving. His family will move to the Southlake area.

Kneupper was in his second term with the council, being elected in May 1986 and re-elected in May of this year. The council expects to appoint Kneupper's replacement at its December meeting. The new council member will serve to May 1989 when an election will be held for the re-

mainder of Kneupper's one-year unexpired term which runs through May 1990.

In another matter during its November meeting, the council heard that repairs to the sewer system will be completed this week. Total cost of the project was about \$7,200, said Mayor Don Metzler.

The council accepted the resignation of John Hoberer from the city's Planning and Zoning Board, and discussed changing the city's auditor at the December meeting.

## Muenster ISD ranks high in TEAMS test

The Muenster school district has been notified that its students have placed in the top 25 percent in the state in 1987 scores on the Texas Assessment of Minimum Skills Test (TEAMS).

The Texas Education Agency rates schools according to a scale score which takes into consideration various factors concerning a district's demographic makeup. The TEA then ranks schools in the top 25 percent, middle 50 percent, or lower 25 percent.

While the Muenster scores are very good, the statewide rankings don't mean a lot because school districts are so diverse, and Muenster Superintendent Charles Coffey. "We're blessed with having a stable student population and good students," he said. "Many districts aren't as fortunate."

The good news, according to Coffey, is that the district improved again in its scores over the preceding year. The high school registered an 8-point gain in its scale score, while the elementary

school had a 1-point gain.

Coffey said there were several other school districts in Cooke County which also placed in the upper 25 percent statewide in its TEAMS scores.

In an unrelated matter, Coffey reported to the school board at its regular November meeting that the district's average daily attendance rate for Oct. was 369, just a little lower than last year. The figure is important because the district's state aid is based on the figure. Total enrollment is about 388 students. The district had a 97 percent attendance rate during the month, Coffey said.

The board approved the purchase of a new 19-passenger school bus at a cost of about \$20,000. They also approved the local sections of the district's 1987-1988 Annual Performance Report, and were informed that Jerry Wimmer's term expires at the end of this year as a member of the Appraisal Review Board for the Cooke County Appraisal District.

## Knights capitalize on miscues Eagles fall apart in loss to Knights

While the Valley View defense was holding Lindsay last Friday night, the Eagles' offense was falling apart. Valley View lost two fumbles - one led to a Knight touchdown - a bad snap on a punt and blocked punt set up Lindsay's other two TD's.

Lindsay scored early in the game when John Fangman recovered an Eagle fumble on the second play of the game, giving Lindsay possession on the 23-yard line. Coach Grady Roller ran Mike Dieter three times in a row where Craig Neu carried the ball in on a 5-yard run. Bob Fleitman booted the extra point for a 7-0 advantage.

Both teams exchanged possession several times for the remainder of the first quarter.

Neither team could strike a blow in the second period. Lindsay lost the ball twice, fumbling to the Eagles, but regained possession with Brad Neu recovering a fumble and Mike Dieter intercepting a pass.

The halftime score remained 7-0.

But the night belonged to Lindsay. On 4th and 14, a bad snap to the punter gave the Knights the ball on the Eagles' 17-yard line. Craig Neu and Bob Fleitman moved the ball to the 1-yard line. Kevin Parsons scored on a 1-yard run and a PAT by Fleitman gave Lindsay a 14-0 lead with 4:50 left in the third period.

Lindsay's defense held the Eagles, stalling on the 40-yard line, where Regi Klement blocked the Eagles' punt and Craig Neu covered the ball on the 23-yard line. A combination of runs by Dieter, Neu and Parsons put Lindsay on the 4-yard line. With one second left in the quarter, Bob Fleitman scored on a quarterback keeper, the PAT was no good and Lindsay extended their lead 20-0.

Valley View's offense ate up the clock in the final period, but couldn't get on the scoreboard. An exchange of ball ownership swapped teams as time ran out.

Despite the final score, Valley View outrushed Lindsay 170 yards to 158 and passed 13 yards to the Knights' 7.

Craig Neu led the Knights' rushing attack with 73 yards on 13 carries while Mike Dieter drummed up 67 in 18 carries.

Leading Lindsay's tacklers were Jeff Arendt and Tracy Huchton with 17 tackles each, assisted by Brad Neu's 16 and John Fangman's 12 tackles. Other defensive standouts for the Knights, Regi Klement, Curtis Weems, Bob Fleitman, Tracy Huchton and Craig Neu, all recorded quarterback sacks.

The district win gives the

Knights an 8-2 season record and pits them against District 9A leader - the Munday Moguls, 9-1. Munday's football teams have advanced in the playoffs since 1984. After defeating Valley View 29-19, they went on to win the state championship in 1985; in 1987 they were semi-finalists; and in 1986, regional champions.

The Moguls are coached by Jim Edwards, who coached the state championship team in 1984 and returned to Munday this season.

Edwards expects a real tough game against Lindsay, but Munday has a winning tradition that's hard to beat. With a scoring average of 36.4 points per game, the Moguls' defense has given up an average of only 8.1 points. They have a balanced running and passing attack, completing 12 of 14 passes during the last two games.

Munday's lone loss was to Class 2A Holliday, 20-19, the second game of the season.

The big guns for the Moguls are brothers Perry and Terry Collier, sophomore backs. The starting fullback is also a sophomore. Last year's all-district player, Chad Bordovsky, will not play Friday night. Eight seniors will be starting against Lindsay.

Game time is Friday, Nov. 18, at 7:30 p.m. at Graham, Texas.

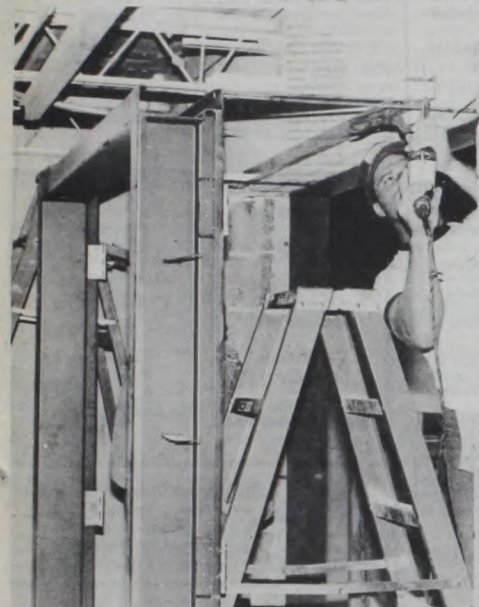
All members made tray favors to take to the rest home at our December meeting.

## Game Thief program still getting violators

**AUSTIN** - Officials of the state's Operation Game Thief program say the reward program has received excellent public support in its first seven years, but more is needed.

The Game Thief program, patterned after "crimestoppers" programs in urban areas, allows a person seeing a game or fish law violation to earn a cash reward by calling the toll-free number, 1-800-792-GAME. Callers may remain anonymous.

During its first seven years, OGT has been responsible for the arrest and conviction of 1,450 violators. These cases resulted in more than \$311,000 in fines, and callers received \$67,350 in rewards.

Officials said the program is made possible by donations provided by individuals and

conservation-oriented organizations across the state. "The program has been highly successful, but we need to broaden our financial support to assure that the program can continue in the future," said Capt. Wayne Chappell, OGT coordinator.

Any person, firm, sportsmen's club, or other group wishing to support OGT may send tax-deductible donations to Operation Game Thief, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX 78744.

The funds and reward payments are administered by a nine-member OGT committee appointed by the TPWD's executive director. The committee serves without pay and meets twice yearly to consider reward payments and monitor the fund.

# Farm & Ranch

## Texas Farm Bureau holds meeting Dec. 4

State and national issues affecting farmers and ranchers will be the main concerns when the Texas Farm Bureau holds its 55th annual meeting at the Bayfront Plaza Convention Center, Corpus Christi, Dec. 4-7. Theme of this year's convention is "The Spirit of Agriculture."

More than 1,300 voting delegates from 216 organized counties will decide policies for 1989 and elect a president and directors from even-numbered districts.

Main state issues include public school financing, reform of workers' compensation, farm chemical regulations and control of water. On the national level, the first work will begin on a new 1990 farm program.

Approved resolutions dealing with state matters will become the organization's policy for next year. Adopted resolutions on national issues will be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting Jan. 8-12 in San Antonio.

William Banowsky, vice president of National Medical Enterprises, Inc., of Los Angeles, will be keynote speaker on the morning of Dec. 5. Banowsky was president of Gaylord Broadcasting Co. from 1985 until earlier this year. He also served as leader of the Dallas-Fort Worth Superconducting Super Collider Authority.

TFB President S. M. True of Plainview will speak that same morning. TFB Secretary-Treasurer Neal Burnett, also from Plainview, will make his report at that session.

Warren Newberry, TFB executive director, will give his annual administrative report Tuesday morning, Dec. 6. The business session will also begin that morning and conclude Wednesday afternoon with the election of directors and a president.

Five special conferences will be conducted from 1 p.m. to 2:30

p.m., Dec. 5. These include farm programs - 1990 farm bill; animal rights, biotechnology and environment; state legislative session outlook; economic services, communication and information; and labor relations.

They will be followed by eight commodity conferences from 2:45 p.m. to 4 p.m. These include wheat, feed grains and cotton, rice and soybeans; peanuts; beef; dairy; hay, forage, forestry and pecans; sheep, goats and poultry; and wildlife.

Youth activities will include the selection of Miss Texas Farm Bureau and winners of talent find and free enterprise speech contests. The TFB this year is awarding a total of \$35,800 in scholarship money to participants. Contestants have already won district competition and are assured of a scholarship, with the opportunity to increase their awards in the state contests.

The speech and talent find contests will be Sunday evening, Dec. 4. The Miss TFB contest will be Monday evening.

Announcement of the winners of the Outstanding Young Farmer/Rancher and Outstanding County Young Farmer/Rancher Chairman awards will be made during the Miss TFB Pageant Monday.

Both winners will each receive one year's free use of a 1989 1/2-ton Ford pickup provided by Bird-Kultgen Ford Co. of Waco.

The Outstanding Young Farmer/Rancher couple will also receive an expenses-paid trip to attend the AFBF annual meeting in Jan. in San Antonio.

All six finalists in the two awards will receive a trip to the TFB Young Farmer/Rancher Legislative Development Seminar in Washington, D.C., in April. Two additional couples from the winning county will also attend that meeting.

## SWC District sponsors essay writing contest

Clyde Hale, Chairman of the Board of Directors, announced that the Upper Elm-Red Soil and Water Conservation District No. 524 will again sponsor an Essay Writing Contest to students residing in the District.

## County Agent's Report

by Craig Rosenbaum

Now that the 1988 gardening season has come to a close, why not take time to "winterize" your lawn and garden equipment before putting it away.

About this time of the year, many gardeners will roll up the hose, push the lawn mower into a corner, put the sprayer away, and promptly forget about them until spring. However, in order for your lawn and garden equipment to operate smoothly and efficiently come spring, they really need a few minutes of your time and attention now to carry them through the winter in good shape.

All of us know what a small fortune we have invested in garden tools, equipment and supplies. So it just makes good sense to protect these investments. And it only takes a few minutes to do so.

Here are some suggestions aimed at helping you winterize your lawn and garden equipment.

Lawn mowers, rototillers, gasoline edgers: Run engine until empty. Do not leave gasoline in tank over winter unless owner's manual instructs you to do so. Add gas treatment if needed. Once engine has cooled, clean housing thoroughly, scraping off accumulations of dirt and grass clippings. Disconnect spark plug wire. Remove and sharpen mower blade. Clean or replace air filter. Drain Oil. Tie a reminder tag on the handle to fill with oil in spring. Store in garage or storage building out of the weather.

Rechargeable electric shears, edgers, etc: Most of these products suggest they be stored discharged. However, some avid gardeners recommend to recharge them fully and run them several times during the winter. Clean and oil the blades before storing.

Sprinklers, hoses and other watering devices: Protect from

freezing weather. Sprinklers have tiny reservoirs and passages that collect water. If allowed to stay out during the winter, the water freezes and can easily break the equipment. Hoses should be drained, rolled and store inside. The high quality flexible hoses are fairly durable and can remain outside provided you do not step on them or try to move them while they are frozen.

Fertilizer spreaders: Rinse carefully and thoroughly if you have not already done so. Let dry a few hours, then wipe over with an oily rag to protect metal surfaces. Oil all moving parts. Really it is best if you will follow these steps each time you use the spreader.

Spray equipment: Wash thoroughly with detergent and warm water if you failed to do so the last time you sprayed. Put the equipment under pressure to clean out the nozzles. Clean any screen filters. If your compressed air sprayer fails hold pressure, you may want to buy a set of new leathers now to be ready for spring. They are easily installed and available at any of our good hardware and garden stores.

And finally, look over your arsenal of pesticides and discard any that are old. It is best to purchase fresh products.

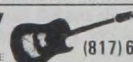

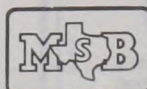

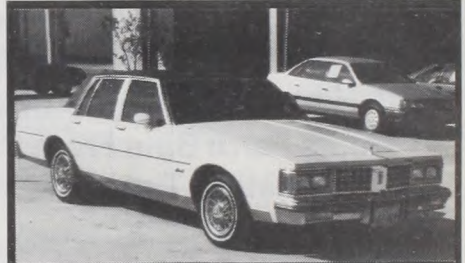
