Royal candidates interviewed

Co-chairmen Carol Henscheid and Carolyn Bayer of the committee to conduct the selection of the King and Queen (Koenig und Koenigin) of the Muenster Centennial have requested interviews with the five couples, before the final stages of the contest.

They specified that interviews are to be held alphabetically, to avoid favoritism. Candidates for the royal honor to represent the community during the Centennial Year are expected to tell about their family background, record of community involvement, and reasons or hopes for aspiring to act as spokespersons for Muenster.

Alois Hess, son of Justin and Margaret Klement Hess, grandson of Muenster pioneers Franz and Mary Hess and Andrew and Rosina Klement, was born in Muenster as was his father, Justin. Antonia is the daughter of Joseph and Emily Flusche Hundt of Lindsay, granddaughter of Anton and Antonia Flusche (one of the founding Flusche brothers of Muenster) and Christopher and Catherina Hundt.

Al attended Sacred Heart School of Muenster. Toni was born in Lindsay and attended St. Peter's School there.

Al and Toni Hess were married on Oct. 2, 1940 in St. Peter's Church of Lindsay. They made their home just northwest of Muenster where they farmed and operated a dairy. They were blessed with seven children who spent at least their most formative years on the farm where they enjoyed their pets and the farm animals.

After 22 years, Mr. and Mrs. Hess sold the farm and purchased Scott's Furniture Store, which they operated as Hess Furniture until their retirement, at which time they sold the business to their son, Dennis, and his wife, Kathy.

Children: The firstborn, Carol Ann, is married to Bob Fitch of

Dallas where they own and operate a sales business at which they both work, they have four children. Veronica teaches Remedial Reading in the Dallas school system, she has a son. Dennis married Kathy Walterscheid, they own and operate Hess Furniture Co. in Muenster, they have three children. Jane married Roy Monday, they own Hamric's Mens' Wear which she operates, they have two children. Diane married Terry Johnson, both are graduate nurses, he is an administrator of the psychiatric department of Yuma Regional Medical Center, Diane is County Health Nurse at Yuma, Arizona. Alan married Debbie Foreman, he is employed as a Service Supervisor for a computer chip manufacturer in Carrollton, they live in Irving, and have two sons. Myron lives in Austin and is employed as a lawyer for the Resource Protection Division of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Local voting results

Cooke County voters defeated a local referendum to increase the county property tax exemption from \$8,000 to \$30,000 by a 56 percent margin for taxpayers 65 years old or older and for the disabled.

The vote was 6,092 against the exemption compared to 4,747 for with all 25 precincts plus absentee reporting. Opponents said the increase was too high, and represented an undue burden on young taxpayers.

Incumbent Cooke County Sheriff John Aston swept to vic-

tory over write-in candidate W.A. "Wally" Johnson, garnering 82 percent of the vote. Aston, a Democrat, tallied 7,135 to Johnson's 1,508.

Gerald W. "Gerry" Jones easily defeated two write-in candidates for Constable, Precinct 1. Jones, a Democrat, received 4,741 votes, winning by 82 percent of

the vote. David Cleveland had 812, and Bobby Henry tallied 191. Cleveland and Henry were write-in candidates.

Other county races were unopposed with a straight Democratic ticket. Jerry Woodlock will be the new 235th District Judge, replacing Larry Sullivant who did not run for re-election. Janelle

Haverkamp won another term at county attorney; Phil Adams, district attorney; Joyce Zwinggi, tax assessor-collector; Jerry Lewis, commissioner of Precinct 3; W.D. "Danny" Knight, commissioner of Precinct 1; Bill Freeman, Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace; and Mike Montgomery, Constable, Precinct 4.

Local reaction to vote

The Republican Party gained some inroads locally at the top of the ticket, but local Democrats feel those gains are not reflective of local candidates.

George Bush carried Cooke County just as Ronald Reagan did in both 1980 and 1984. Although he lost the District 30 State Senate race to Steve Carriker, Republican Bobby Albert took Cooke County. Republican Beau Boulter ran close to Lloyd Bentsen, who swept his U.S. Senate race on the statewide level.

Michael Dukakis' candidacy hurt those races for the Democrats in Cooke County, but does not really reflect the shift in the county from Democratic to Republican, said Bill Sullivant, Cooke County Democratic Chairman.

"Mr. Dukakis hurt the other Democrats on the ballot pretty substantially," he said. "They just didn't run well in North Central. Please See ELECTION, Page 2

Council meeting is quiet

Muenster's City Council dealt with a wide variety of issues Monday and dispatched them all quickly and quietly.

Eric Gray, German language teacher at Sacred Heart High, described a tour of Germany planned for June 1989 and asked if the city wished to participate in any way. The mayor will probably send formal greetings to the city of Münster, Westfalen and our official flag. Other possibilities are working.

Lots 1 and 2 in Muenster block 53 were rezoned from residential to business. The structure on that location, at the intersection of First and Oak Street, is being renovated and will be the new office for Dennis & Muller.

The council heard a park board recommendation to remove the diving boards at the municipal swimming pool because of the injury liability risk. The report claims that the Muenster pool is one of the few left in the area still using diving boards. The mayor hopes that the public will respond to council members regarding this possible diving board removal.

The city will install a telephone at the Centennial Museum. No outgoing long-distance calls will be possible.

An agreement with TU Electric was signed by the mayor. The agreement allows new tennis courts to be built under the electric transmission lines in the city park. It also allows 12-foot fences around the courts. Construction should start very soon according to the Jaycees who are funding the project.

City Manager Joe Fenton updated the council on the reconstruction project planned for the Ash Street bridge over the Brushy Elm Creek. The job will be 80 percent federally funded and is estimated to cost \$150,000.00.

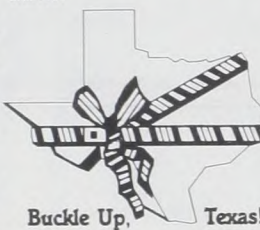
There will be no garbage pickup on Thanksgiving Day or the Friday after. City employees will have the two days off. Police will be on duty regular hours. City employees will each receive a ham for Christmas, a longstanding tradition.

Monthly bills totaling \$83,512.26 were reviewed and approved for payment. Included in the first quarter payment for 1988-89 tax collecting payable to the Cooke County Auditor for \$352.37. Also \$72.77 share of legal fee payment to the Tax Appraisal District.

Councilman and Police Commissioner Aubry Tuggle received permission to solicit in Gainesville for the Cooke County Crimestoppers with help from one of the Muenster police officers.

According to Tuggle, Muenster's contributions to Cooke County Crimestoppers comprise most or all of the \$1,100.00 donated in 1988. He hopes to balance the scales some by going to Gainesville himself and taking a Muenster officer along.

After a short, executive session, the council meeting was reopened. Mayor Henscheid announced that the city will further pursue a potential landfill location on Herman Grewing land north of Muenster. Test holes will be dug and legal proceedings will be started.

tral Texas." Had Dukakis not been at the top of the ticket, Sullivan feels Bentsen would have fared well in Cooke County.

Local Democrats, however, don't really align themselves with the national ticket in Cooke County, so Sullivan expects the local Democratic Party to retain its stronghold. He said the election two years from now may give a better indication of whether a shift is actually occurring locally.

"Cooke County Democrats pretty accurately reflect the mainstream of Cooke County, so there's no reason for the Republicans to gain at the local level," he said. "The national Democratic ticket is perceived as too liberal for this part of the county."

Local Republicans see the Albert and Bush win and Boulter's close race in Cooke County as a continued shifting that has already taken place in other North Central Texas counties, such as Denton County, said Debbie Hess, Cooke County Republican Chairman.

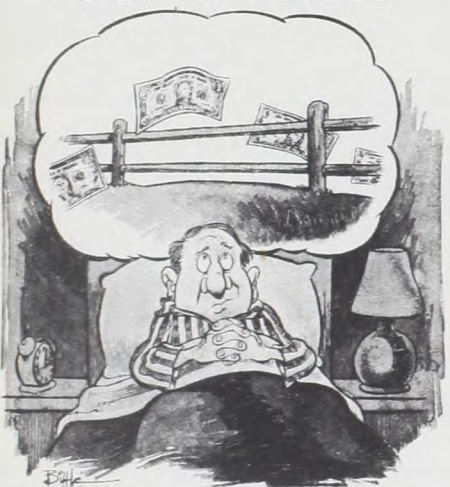
"Counties coming up north are going Republican, and I think Cooke County is starting to show a trend to lean that way," Mrs. Hess said. "It seems that, at each election, we make gains a little farther on down the line."

Cooke County has been affected by the shift to conservatism nationwide and through shifting voting age groups, Mrs. Hess said. "They're not picking Republicans, they're picking conservatives," she said. "I can see Republicans making inroads within the next couple of elections."

The county's voting groups are also shifting, she said. Older, "die-hard" Democrats are fading away and are being replaced by younger voters who are conservative and not necessarily aligned with either party, Mrs. Hess said. She has also found that many people moving into Cooke County are Republicans.

It really doesn't make any sense for local Democrats to shy away from aligning themselves with the national Democratic Party since they are pledged to support their platform, Mrs. Hess said. She feels it's just a matter of time before candidates feel that they'll be able to win in Cooke County on the Republican ticket. "As the incumbents leave office and newcomers seek office, I can see them running on the Republican ticket here in Cooke County," she said.

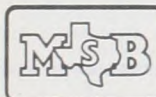
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Muenster Chamber continues Christmas preparations

Littlest Angel opens fifth year

Cooke County residents who will need a little help putting Christmas presents under the tree this year may apply for assistance through the Cooke County Littlest Angel Program. Applications will be distributed to all children in area schools this week. Completed applications must be returned to P.O. Box 336, Gainesville, or taken to the courthouse during the week of Nov. 14.

In its fifth year of operation, the Littlest Angel Program assists

families and older adults in having a Christmas they ordinarily wouldn't have due to financial hardships. Paper angels bearing the child's or older adult's first name, age, sex, clothing size and a code number will be placed on a Christmas tree in the Muenster State Bank on Nov. 23.

People who wish to help may then choose an angel and purchase gifts for the child or elder it represents. The gifts are then delivered by hundreds of volunteers. Food baskets are given to older citizens and, in some cases, entire families are provided with food and gifts.

More than 345 families with over 850 children were helped through the Littlest Angel Program last year.

The students make a five-week trip to Germany each year. The trip must be financed by their parents. There is no funding by the school. They belong to the GAPP (German-American Partnership Program) similar to the student-exchange program.

Activities other than the Dance Group's program are carried on all year long, mostly scholastic, and are extracurricular, in addition to a full academic load. One of the activities is "Winterfest," in which contests are academic, beginning at the local level, advancing to regional and progressing to the state level of competition. The Dance Group also competes.

The research project is carried on every year by third and fourth year students of W.T. White High School.

On Monday, the group was divided into teams and spread out across the community for their interviews, visiting a number of individuals and businesses, where the hosts welcomed the opportunity to "interview" their guests.

The Muenster Enterprise congratulates the teacher, Mrs. Gail Cope, and the students on their excellent programs at the schools and on the admirable manner in which they conducted their interviews. All were courteous, well-informed and intelligent. We hope they will return another time and give more people an opportunity to enjoy the Dance Group's program.

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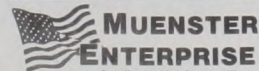

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Health BACK TALK

NERVE INTERFERENCE

Every muscle and organ in the body is linked to the brain by a vast network of nerve fibers. Thirty-one pairs of nerves pass through openings (intervertebral foramen) in the spine to form the vital connection between the brain and virtually every cell in the body. If any one of these nerve fibers were to be interfered with, the body part to which it is linked would suffer. The chiropractor knows that likely area of nerve interference is the opening in the spine where the nerve branches out to its eventual destination. Were this opening to distort due to a misalignment (subluxation) of adjacent vertebrae, the nerve's ability to relay information would be compromised. In such cases, it would be the chiropractor's task to detect the subluxation, correct it, and restore the flow of nerve impulses to the affected body part.

The chiropractor plots areas of numbness in the body to discern which nerves are experiencing interference.

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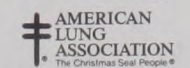

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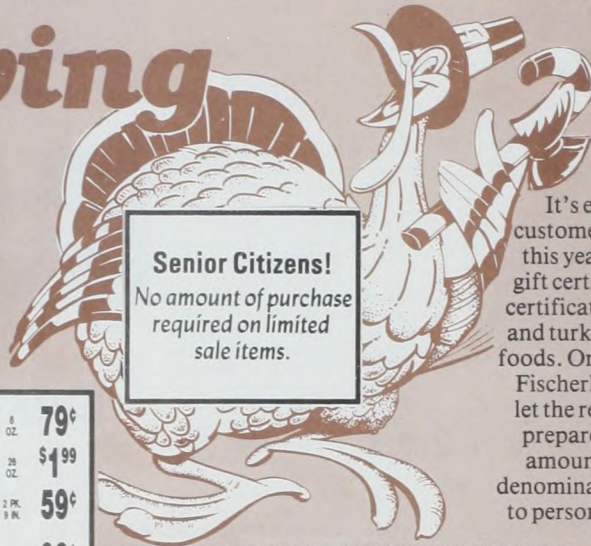

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Turnovers hurt Tigers

Turnovers hurt the Tigers in last Friday's 16-0 loss to the Tyler Street Christian Crusaders. "Our number one downfall was turnovers," commented Coach John Sims. "It took a quarter to get the center problem settled and we failed to take advantage of the opportunities given to us."

In Sacred Heart's first possession, on the third play, the Crusaders intercepted a pass, moving the ball to the 4-yard line where the Tiger defense held. The Tigers moved the ball to the 19-yard line and lost on a fumble. Tyler Street carried the ball in from the 14 and ran the PAT and took a first quarter 8-0 lead.

Sacred Heart fumbled again early in the second quarter, but returned the favor when Chad Fleitman recovered a loose ball. Possession exchanged hands throughout the remaining first half, with the Tigers having the ball intercepted once more before going to the locker room.

The Tigers dominated the third quarter, picking up 4 first downs and moving the ball 94 yards. A 39-yard pass from Darrell Dangelmayr to Shawn Dangelmayr gave Sacred Heart possession on the 1-yard-line, where a holding and intentional grounding penalties pushed the team farther from the goal. An intercepted pass stopped the Tigers' drive.

Sacred Heart's defense held the Crusaders deep in their own territory with a threat to score at the beginning of the final quarter, but the Crusaders picked off another Tiger pass. Sacred Heart defense held again, forcing the Crusaders to punt. Taking over at midfield, Chris Hess picked up 9 yards on 2 plays, then romped 44 yards for a Tiger touchdown, only to have the play called back on a clipping flag. The ball then went over on downs. The Tigers took over again near midfield. A combination of runs by Glen Swirczynski and Chris Hess took the ball to the 25-yard line where Darrell Dangelmayr connected with Ryan Bayer for a touchdown pass. After some official discussion, the referees reversed their decision and accused Bayer of trapping the ball. The Crusaders took over possession, after going 10 yards, speedster John Strnad broke the Tigers' line and ran 65 yards for a Tyler Street touchdown. The PAT was good and with 3:27 left in the game, the Tigers trailed 16-0.

Sacred Heart attempted a comeback but the Crusaders' pass defense stopped any attack as time ran out.

"The kids played as hard as they could with the injuries and missed players," said Coach Sims. "Troy (Berres) and Jason (Endres) did exceptionally well stepping in." Four offensive starters didn't play including Curt Bayer who played on defense with a shoulder injury. Glen Swirczynski also played with an injured ankle.

"Running backs Glen (Swirczynski) and Chris (Hess) ran extremely well," said the coach, "even though Tyler neutralized Chris. The defense played well except for that long run," continued Sims. "Ryan (Bayer), Glen, Randy (Miller), Troy, Shawn (Dangelmayr) and Curt Bayer played outstanding."

Sacred Heart led the Crusaders in first downs 10-8, but 6 turnovers and 2 returned touchdowns balanced the scales to Tyler Street.

The Tigers picked up 157 yards and 37 carries led by Glen Swirczynski with 80 yards and Chris Hess picking up 65. Tyler Street gained 180 yards on 36 carries and picked up only 20 passing yards compared to the Tigers' 55 yards. D. Dangelmayr completed only 3 of 13 passes, 2 by S. Dangelmayr for 47 yards.

"Tyler Street played their best ball game of the year," concluded Coach Sims.

Of the eight quarterfinal teams, the Tigers are rated fifth and will take on the Brookhollow Lions of DeSoto who are 9-1 and are the number one TAPS Class A team in the state. Teams include five Dallas area teams and three Houston teams.

Other teams include Dallas Temple (7-2-1) vs. Balch Springs (5-); Lexington (8-1) vs. League City Bay Area of Houston; and

Houston Broadway vs. Houston Greenwood Village.

The Lions have three excellent running backs including Chris Manning who credits himself with 1,277 yards and Ken Bates with 948. Manning also has 120 points this season. Their quarterback, David Edwards, is one of the top rated in the state with 70 completions on 161 attempts for 1,178 total yardage for the season. Down the field will be receiver B.J. Nooner who has 28 completions for 492 yards.

Brookhollow's offense totaled 4,306 yards, 3,105 rushing and 1,201 in the air, with the defense holding their opposition to 1,727 yards for the season.

"We'll have to play mistake-free ball," said Coach John Sims, "and hope we can take advantage of their kicking game."

Kelly Bell returns to the lineup this week, with Curt Bayer playing defense, but questionable as an offensive player. Glen Swirczynski will again play with an injured ankle.

The Cubs finished the year with a 3-3-1 mark.



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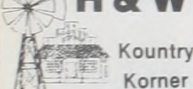
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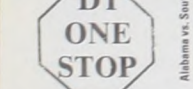

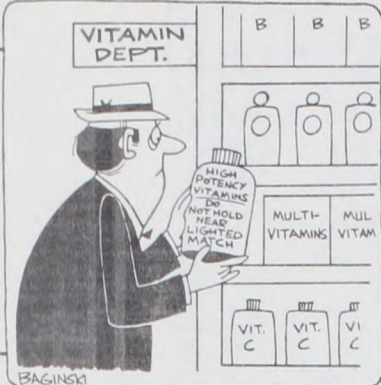

Farmers see corrections

"On the last day of Congress, farmers and ranchers got two big corrections in tax laws," reports Leonard Hartman of Muenster, president of the Cooke County Farm Bureau.

One dealt with the diesel fuel tax and the other, the so-called "heifer tax," pertained to an income tax provision regarding production expenses, he said.

One correction restores a tax exemption on farm-used fuel at the retail level. The so-called "heifer tax" restores preproductive expensing of livestock.

"Both tax corrections are very

important to the farmers and ranchers of this county," Hartman said.

The Budget Reconciliation Act, passed by Congress last December, changed the collection point for the diesel tax from the retail to the wholesale level, forcing users to pay the tax and then apply for a refund. The change became effective April 1. In most instances, producers would have to wait for an entire year to get a refund.

Both taxes have now been repealed by the Technical Corrections bills passed just before Congress adjourned, the local farm leader said.

The local county Farm Bureau received a letter from Texas Farm Bureau President S.M. True, congratulating local leaders for the two successes.

"Your hard work has paid off, and the Texas Farm Bureau's top legislative priorities have been accomplished for 1988," True wrote.

The American Farm Bureau Federation credits Texas producers with playing a key role in obtaining final passage of the bills. AFBF reported that hundreds of letters were received by Texas members of Congress, he said.

County Agent's Report

Most Texans usually think of fall as a time when leaves turn bright colors before falling, gardens are terminated by autumn frosts, and shrubs and trees stop growing and go dormant. It will be a few months before warm spring weather once again triggers new leaves and flowers to appear, which also triggers spring planting fever in most gardener's blood.

But a small gardener will take advantage of mild fall weather to make major advances in the landscape and garden. Fall offers wonderful opportunities for planning and establishing many types of plants. It is cooler in the fall, which gives newly transplanted trees and shrubs several months to establish a vigorous root system before the dry, hot, dog days of summer strike again. Even though the above-ground portion of woody perennial plants do not make new growth at this time, the roots can actively grow until the

soil temperature gets really cold. Root development continues when temperatures are in the 40°-50° range and the leaves have fallen.

Nurserymen also know the benefit of fall planting and consequently bring in fresh shipments of trees and shrubs at this time. Since most folks wait until they have come down with "spring fever" to visit their local nursery, you will avoid the crowds by shopping in the fall. With fewer people requiring help, you can get more individualized attention from nursery personnel. Shoppers can choose from a wide assortment of fresh plants, and bargain hunters may find closeout prices on last spring's stock.

Now is a good time to reevaluate your landscape, and select and plant new trees and shrubs. They'll get off to a rapid start in spring and be well established by next summer.

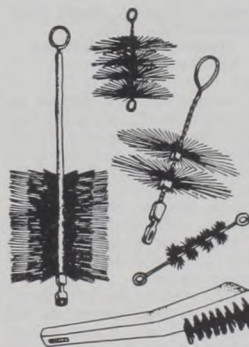
How to prevent a chimney fire

Chimney fires occur when large deposits of creosote are exposed to very high temperatures. Creosote is a black, tarry liquid that results from the condensation of wood gases not burned in the combustion process.

Since the formation of creosote is an unavoidable byproduct of burning wood, cleaning chimneys is also an unavoidable chore. Generally, frequent cleaning is best. Check your flue every couple of weeks when you first use it to establish a rate of creosote formation. Many installations, particularly wood-burning stoves, require monthly cleaning but in no case should you wait more than one year between cleanings.

Although some people clean their chimneys by burning a very hot fire for a period of time each day, all chimneys eventually will require manual cleaning. There are commercial chimney sweeps who will do the job for you, but it is simple enough to do yourself.

The best method is to use a wire chimney brush made just for chimney cleaning. These are sized and shaped to exactly fit almost any flue. They can be pulled up and down the chimney by tow ropes (one person pulls up from the roof, one person pulls down from below), or by a weight and rope.

Another easy way to do the job is with a brush and extension handles. This method allows cleaning from below by one person.

To prevent rapid creosote build up, you should avoid burning the types of wood containing high levels of pitch and tar (such as pine). Oak is much better since it contains less tar.
