Long and varied agenda keeps Muenster City Council busy

Items ranging from results of Saturday's City Council election to the lead concentration in Muenster drinking water made a long and diverse agenda for the City Council at its meeting Monday night.

Celine Dittfurth, city secretary, administered oaths of office to three aldermen elected Saturday. Pat Dennis received 126 votes to win Place 1, incumbent Aubrey Tuggle received 122 votes to win Place 2 and incumbent Claude Klement won Place 4 with 130 votes. None of the positions were contested. A total of 142 ballots were cast in the election.

New business for the Council began with Steve Gilland of W. Scott Whaley, an auditing company in Bowie, reporting on Muenster's financial operations from October 1986 through September 1987.

Included in Gilland's report was the fact that general revenues of the city during the fiscal year were \$455,151 but expenditures were \$482,593.

"But your sales tax income has been very stable, and that's good for the city," Gilland said. "I've seen some (cities) lose as much as 25 percent."

Also appearing before the Council was Ronnie Felderhoff, a manager of Muenster Milling Co. Felderhoff said construction on a new mill for the business on South Main is set to begin within eight weeks. He requested that the Council consider granting a five-year tax abatement for the new facility similar to tax relief given by the Council in 1977 for construction of Valenite Metals on West Hwy. 82.

"I'm not asking you to cut my taxes out all together," Felderhoff said. "Just help me hold them down for a little while."

The tax abatement would save the business about \$7,500-\$10,000

each year for five years, he said. John Pagel, president of the Muenster Chamber of Commerce Industrial Board, said the board supports the abatement, stating that the new mill will increase employment and sales tax income for the city.

"We members of the Industrial Board are here to voice our opinion in favor of the abatement," Pagel said. "This is just one thing we can do to encourage new businesses and growth here."

Council members expressed their approval of the abatement but could not take action on it because of a possible legal procedure that must be followed.

participation of Muenster police officers in a four-county task force to combat crime in Montague, Grayson, Fannin and Cooke counties.

"We promised the citizens we'd do anything we could to help them out, and this seems like a good way to do it," Alderman Klement said.

Construction of new tennis courts at Muenster City Park was discussed by Council members, but action was tabled until specifications of Texas Power & Light could be discussed with the Muenster Jaycees. In an agreement, the Jaycees will pay \$20,000 for construction of the courts,

Rezoning of lots in block 42, the block east of the post office, from residential to business was discussed by the Council. Muenster Mutual Insurance had requested to build an office on a lot there, but a public hearing on an ordinance to rezone the block must be held before the Council can grant the building permit.

while the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will pay the remaining \$20,000.

The area of the park judged to be most suitable for the new courts lies under TP&L transmission lines, east of the new restrooms. One of the TP&L specifications that concerned Council members was a requirement that no gates or fences higher than 8 feet be constructed in the area.

In other action, the Council: - Approved paving of Seventh Street from the east end of the existing blacktop to the Muenster Public School driveway going north. The school will pay the

Welcome back, Leon! MISD prepares for summer

Leon Klement, who previously served a term of office on the Muenster ISD several years ago, was welcomed back to the Public School Board of Trustees in the election held Saturday, May 7.

He was the winner in a 3-way contest for Position 7, receiving 100 votes; Ray Wimmer received 50 votes; and Gerald Walterscheid received 48 votes.

Not contested were Positions 3, 5 and 6. Tom Flusche received 180 votes; Harold Bindel drew 175; and D.J. Hellman drew 173.

The Muenster School Board has hired two new teachers to add to the faculty for the 1988-89 school year.

Joe Brad Bass will be the new vocational agriculture teacher, replacing longtime teacher Edgar Dyer, who is retiring at the end of this year.

A graduate of Vernon High

School and Texas Tech University, Bass has traveled more than 250,000 miles in both the United States and in foreign countries representing the Future Farmers of America as both a former state and national president. "We had a lot of applicants, and took a lot of time in selecting a teacher for this position," said Charles Coffey, Muenster superintendent.

The school board has also hired Noma Bass, Joe's wife, as a high school math and computer math teacher, replacing Mrs. Ward who will be teaching in Gainesville next year. A graduate of Grand Saline High School and the University of Texas at Tyler, Mrs. Bass has taught for two years at Plainview.

The school district has also approved a list of summer projects to prepare facilities for the fall.

The district has decided to pave a section of Seventh Street just in front of the school building at a

cost of about \$19,000. Some improvements will be made to the pole vault and broad jump pits at the track, and some new gravel will be added to the stadium parking lot.

The district will replace three cafeteria doors with new glass doors; will purchase four new electric typewriters and one new word processor for advanced classes; will perform normal bus repairs and maintenance to band equipment.

Muenster Telephone Co. has received the bid to upgrade the district's telephone system. The board has also asked Coffey to obtain information concerning a drip irrigation system for the football field, and the board accepted a bid from Star Bus Sales of Huffman for \$778 to sell a 1973 model surplus school bus.

Era Board denies request

For the second time in two months, the Era School Board has denied a request that its district boundaries be changed in the Myra area.

Sam and Peggy Sparkman of Myra requested the board de-annex their property because they said they resided closer to the Muenster school. The board rejected the request because the district did not want to set a precedent of allowing district boundary lines to change, said Era Superintendent Dale Smiley.

The board in February turned down a request from two property owners in that same area that they be allowed to swap school districts. Larry Vogel, who lives in the Era district, wanted to exchange with Dwayne Balthrop who owns land in the Muenster school district.

In an unrelated matter, the board this week turned down 12 transfer requests of students who attended Era schools this year. The board took into consideration how the transfers would affect the district's 22:1 students-teacher ratio which will extend through fourth grade next year, but almost all were turned down for disciplinary reasons, Smiley said. "We just feel we have an obligation to our own students and teachers," he said. "We'll continue to accept transfers as long as they come in and behave themselves."

Both the Lindsay and Muenster school districts have recently stiffened their transfer requirements as school districts statewide become less receptive to accepting transfer students because of state-mandated class requirements, in-

creasing student enrollments and other regulations. The board also:

- Accepted 48 transfers of both new students and students who are currently attending Era.

Lindsay School Board hires teachers

The Lindsay School Board hired three new teachers for the 1988-89 school year and made plans to address district needs during its regular May meeting.

Warren Dale Elrod will be the new Social Studies teacher. Elrod, who served for six years in the military, is currently a Special Education teacher in Del Rio. He will also help with the football program.

Rosanna Webb was hired to teach third grade. She has done student teaching at Edison Elementary in Gainesville and was a former teacher's aide at Callisburg.

Patricia Schully will be the new eighth grade teacher. Schully, who is currently a teacher at the Gainesville Middle School, is qualified to teach in the Fine Arts and English areas, something that is needed at that grade level, said Principal Henry Schroeder.

The school board has identified future needs of the district. They have already voted to implement some programs to address the needs, while others will have to wait until the next school year.

The district has tightened its transfer policy to help officials deal with potential discipline or

other problems. All transfer students who have attended Lindsay schools for at least one year will be evaluated annually before the month of April. Student transfer requests will be turned down if there are problems, said Schroeder.

The district has also implemented a screening program for new potential transfers which include a review of academic and discipline records from former schools and interviews with parents and the students. Lindsay is expecting about 160 total transfer students for 1988-89.

The board has allocated about \$4,500 for upgrading the district's library materials. Schroeder said the district already has the required 10 books per student, which is state-mandated for 1988-89, but old books need to be weeded out, new books purchased as well as audio-visual materials.

Three new IBM compatible computers will be purchased to improve the computer hardware of the district. A need was also expressed for a lower-level computer program in the high school, but not enough students signed up in order to offer the class for next year, Schroeder said.

School officials surveyed the teachers' workbook needs for the next school year, and estimated cost for the materials was \$8,000. Schroeder said the board has not yet committed to spending that much on workbooks.

Lindsay will offer Journalism in the high school for the first time

next year. Officials will work to improve overcrowding in Physical Education classes if it can be done without causing a strain on academic course offerings. The district is also working to improve its tutorial program and purchase more VCR equipment for classrooms. They plan to wait until the 1989-90 school year, however, to implement a state-mandated gifted and talented program at Lindsay.

Schroeder said next year will be the last time high school teachers will serve as sponsors for fundraising projects for the prom. After that time, parents or other sponsors outside school will be responsible.

In other business, the board: - Canvassed the votes from Saturday's election. Dr. Jim Neidhardt received 107 votes and Carol Fuhrmann received 103 votes to be re-elected to the board. Tom Eberhart received 40 votes and Mark Metzler received 39 votes.

- Re-elected the same board of officers including Jim Myrick, president; Neidhardt, vice president; and Fuhrmann, secretary.

- Voted to cancel taxes due this year on the Red River Country Club since it has been given to the City of Gainesville to be used for a senior citizen center. The district will receive payment for all back taxes.

- Increased required credits for graduation from Lindsay High School from 21 to 22.5.

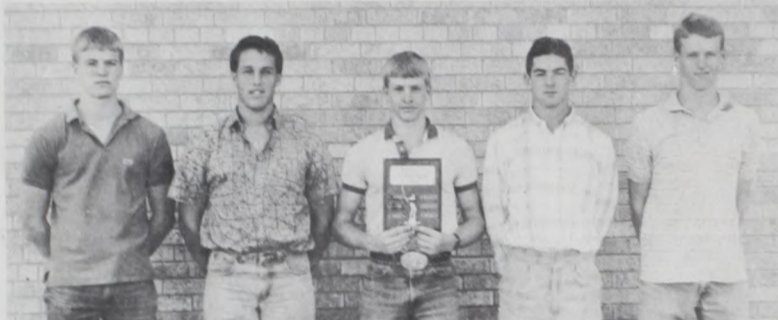

County Agent's Report

Chinch bugs are causing some damage in fields in Cooke County. They feed on the plant at the ground line or below the soil, about 1/2-inch deep. They suck plant juices from the plant, giving the plant the appearance of drought stress. They may be in spots in the field and also may be found near borders of the field. As the plants grow, the infestation of chinch bugs moves up on the leaves and feeds behind the leaf sheath or in the whorl of the plant. Chinch bugs are about 1/4-inch long with black bodies and milky white wings. The young are red when first hatched, then following a molt they become dark colored to black with a white line across the back. Chinch bugs will continue to feed on plants all summer. Wet damp weather slows their increase in numbers.

Insecticides must be placed at the base of the plant rather than up on the leaves. Ten to 20 gallons of water must be used to obtain control. Aerial application has proven to be ineffective for chinch bug control.

Lorsban, Furadan, Sevin and Parathion have given control when applied according to directions. It may take two to four days before a reduction in infestation following treatment can be seen.

To inspect a field, make five random checks in the field. Insecticide treatments should be applied when two or more adult chinch bugs are found on 20 percent of seedling plants less than six inches tall. On taller plants, apply insecticides when immature and adult bugs are found on 75 percent of the plants.

Infestations in each field may be different - check them - do not make assumptions.

Admission is \$2.50 each with exhibitors and children under 12 free.

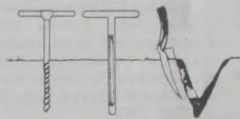
Procedures for taking samples

Soil tests can be only as accurate as the samples on which they are made. Proper collection of soil samples is extremely important. Chemical tests of poorly taken samples may actually be misleading because they do not represent the area to be sampled.

Take one composite soil sample from each uniform area of 10 to 40 acres in a field.

The composite sample should be taken from the area. This can be done by taking small cores or slices of soil from 10 to 15 different places. Place these in a clean container (plastic bucket,

paper sack, etc.), mix thoroughly, and take out approximately 1 pint for the composite sample.



When taking the soil samples, use a spade, soil auger or soil sampling tube as illustrated. Scrape the litter from the surface. Make the core or boring 6 inches deep in the soil. (For permanent sod, sample to a depth of 3 to 4 inches). To use a spade, dig a V-shaped hole and take a 1/2-inch slice of soil from the smooth side of the hole. Repeat in 10 to 15 different places, put in a clean plastic bucket, thoroughly mix and remove a pint as a composite sample representing the field or area.

Some precautions in taking Soil Samples include:

1. Avoid sampling spots in the field such as small gullies, slight field depressions, terrace waterways and unusual spots.
2. When sampling fertilized fields, avoid sampling directly in

fertilized band.

3. Do not use old vegetable cans, tobacco cans, matchboxes, etc., to submit samples.

4. Do not use heat to dry samples.

5. Be sure to keep a record for yourself as to the area represented by each sample.

6. Be sure sample numbers on the boxes correspond with sample number on the information sheet.

For further details, soil test sheets and shipping boxes, contact our office.
