EXCELLENT PROGRAM PLANNED TO BE STAGED AT HOWARD PAYNE.

"Two hundred girls from surrounding high schools are expected to attend a conference of the Interscholastic League Girls' Athletic Association to be held at Howard Payne College March 26 and 27th, according to an announcement from Dean Thomas H. Taylor and Miss Catherine Padwick, director of girls athletics in Howard Payne College.

"This will be a district meeting and girls from Brown, Coleman, Comanche, Hamilton, Kimble, Mason, Mills, McCulloch, Menard, and San Saba counties will be present. Dean Thomas H. Taylor is director general of this work and A. S. Brannon of Brownwood is director of the Girls' Athletic Association work. This work is similar to the work of the Women's Athletic Association in Howard Payne College."

Friday, March 26th, which is opening day, Dr. Godbold, president of Howard Payne, will deliver a message of welcome, and following which the following themes will be the program: Music, "The Athletic Girl of Today," "The Drawing Room Girl of Yesterday," "Why Go to College?" "General Athletics," "Preferable to Specialized Athletics," "What the W. A. A. has done in Howard Payne College," "Sportsmanship," "A Girls' Problems and College Town," "Lunch at the Dormitory," "Stunts to Entertain," etc. In the afternoon there will be games that entertain, stunts, track meet, tennis tournament, a trip through all the college buildings, the first lesson in campusology, a reception at the girls' dormitory, novel introductions to college societies, and on Saturday a swim before breakfast at the Hot Wells, breakfast, camp fire style, G. A. A. work, its purpose and how to organize, physical exercises that make for happiness, health and beauty. Sandwiches handed out. Start on trip to see the sights of Brownwood.

MOUNT VIEW SCHOOL PUTS ON VERY FINE EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY

SCHOOL IS UNDER SUPERVISION OF MRS. A. V. YEAGER ASSISTED BY MRS. DAVIS.

The school display in one of the windows at Roussel-Robertson store, put on by Mrs. A. V. Yeager, principal of the Mount View school, near Brownwood, is regarded as one of the finest of its kind ever seen in this part of Texas.

It is very creditable from every point of view, and in getting up this fine display, the utmost patience, industry and perseverance is exemplified. There are nine grades in the school, and the work was done mostly by the eighth and ninth grades. The story of "Evangeline," that ever-living story of Acadia, is shown and written in a wonderful way. The story itself is illustrated with suitable pictures by the pupils, and then to cap the climax and bring the historic interest to the highest pitch, Mrs. Yeager wrote letters to parties living in the locality where the story had its origin, and received in return, she and her pupils many letters written by people in that locality.

It is well worth while to hear Mrs. Yeager tell just how this wonderful historic feature of the school work was planned and executed.

Then there is the feature representing a vast stretch of Roman history—Romulus and Remus being nursed by a wolf, the entrance into the Eternal City, as Rome was called through pagan ages, of the conqueror of many nations that fell before the fearful Roman platoon, the conqueror on his victorious throne, followed and surrounded by captives, and all the booty that went with the sack and pillage fashion of those days of war and bloodshed. The Roman Senate is shown, the Roman prisoners and slaves, the animals for sacrifice, and all the paraphernalia that belonged to the returning conqueror.

In addition to the Roman history feature, there were many other fine features in the window, each of which shows the high class of work that is being done by the Mt. View school under the direction of Mrs. Yeager and Mrs. Davis.

Eight Barrels Producer Comes in on Childress

HOUSE COMMITTEE ASKS IMPEACHMENT OF FEDERAL JUDGE

MANIPULATION OF BANKRUPT- CY PROCEEDINGS IS AMONG CHARGES.

WASHINGTON, March 10.—(AP)—The House will be called upon within the next two weeks to decide whether Federal Judge George W. English of the Eastern Illinois district shall be tried by the Senate on charges of "high misde- meanors in office."

The judiciary committee appoints a subcommittee to draft the articles of impeachment and report back March 16. The committee plans to place the matter before the House within two hours after these ar- ticles are submitted to it, and its report will have right of way in the House over all other business.

Since the well came in it has proved to be a very good producer and it would take a large sum of money to buy even a small interest in it.
