The immediate problem is plain and the solution is simple. We produced last year more cotton than the world appears willing to buy and use at a price profitable to the grower. The surplus does not appear to be very large, perhaps 500,-000 bales, but any surplus will depress values. We have been in this condition many times before, and we have always managed to effect reduced production, and thereby to no doubt will be done. It was first thought that Dr. An-derson had sustained a broken arm



THE BONDS ARE STILL VALID.

THE ACTION of the Frisco Railway Company in declining to pay special road district taxes assessed against the company's properties in this county came as a distinct surprise, inasmuch as the Santa Fe and the Brownwood North and South and other large taxpayers had paid the entire tax assessed. If the example of the Frisco should be followed by a large number of tax-payers, the situation would become alarming, not only because it would involve involuntary repudiation of the outstanding road district bonds, but because it would deny the county the use of current revenue for the payment of its operating expense. When the taxpayer declines to pay any portion of the tax assessed. the whole tax becomes delinquent. Thus, if other taxpayers should do as the Frisco has done, the county cipal and interest on the road bonds, but would be un-

It seems to us that the Frisco has been more hasty than the circumstances warrant in declining to pay the special road district taxes assessed against it here. 




