

POLITICAL POT WILL START BOILING AGAIN IN TEXAS NEAR FUTURE

HOT TIME IN OLD HOME STATE IS ANTICIPATED; USUAL QUOTA IN BROWN COUNTY.

Political year has arrived again and it will not be long until the candidates for various offices will be shaking hands and delivering speeches in every part of Texas. Candidates will be in the field from governor down to constable.

At least one candidate has practically announced that he is in the race for gubernatorial honors--Hon. Lynch Davidson of Houston, and it looks at this time as if he might have no opposition, unless some candidate from Dallas or that locality gets into the race.

Every member of the Texas congress will be a candidate for re-election, and it is understood that the Texas Tax Club will put a candidate in each congressional district to defeat the present members because they were to a man opposed to the present federal inheritance tax.

Just who the opposition is to be against the other Texas congressmen is not yet divulged and even Hon. Whit Davidson may not enter the race, even if the report has become current that he might do so.

STONE MOUNTAIN COIN MEMORIAL HALF DOLLAR IS NOW BEING SOLD

To Texas has been assigned a quota of 475,000 half dollars coined in honor of the Stone Mountain Memorial. The banks of Texas will in large measure have charge of the sale of these half dollars.

It is not necessary to go into a detailed description of the Stone Mountain Memorial. The story has been published time and again in practically every newspaper and magazine in the United States.

So the great epic is being carved on the side of Stone Mountain. It is believed the quota of Brownwood and Brown county, which will be announced on the afternoon of January 19--which is the birthday of General Robert E. Lee, and the necessary chairman and committees appointed to the end that work may begin without delay.

Work resumed. Carving was resumed on December 19th, and again the welcome music of steel on stone is rolling off the mountains.

The Association has in cash and good subscriptions an amount sufficient to carve the central group, assuming that the cost estimates of the sculptor and the engineer will be approximately realized.

Although the Monument is dedicated to the soldiers of the Southern Confederacy, and will perpetuate their memory as long as the earth endures, it has received national sanction and national support. Its affairs are in charge of a Board of Directors representing every Confederate organization in every State in the South.

It has furnished the most important and far-reaching expression of national solidarity since the republic was founded.

Milk Condensery Proposal Still Being Considered

H. G. Lucas, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, said this morning that Brownwood's chance to secure the milk condensery, being considered by a large eastern organization, was still very good.

Mr. Lucas in discussing the proposition, related an incident in a small town of Mississippi where a condensery was built two or three years ago. During the last year, a tenant farmer residing near the town, realized more than \$1,600 from his milk sales to the condensery and he also had a fairly good cotton crop.

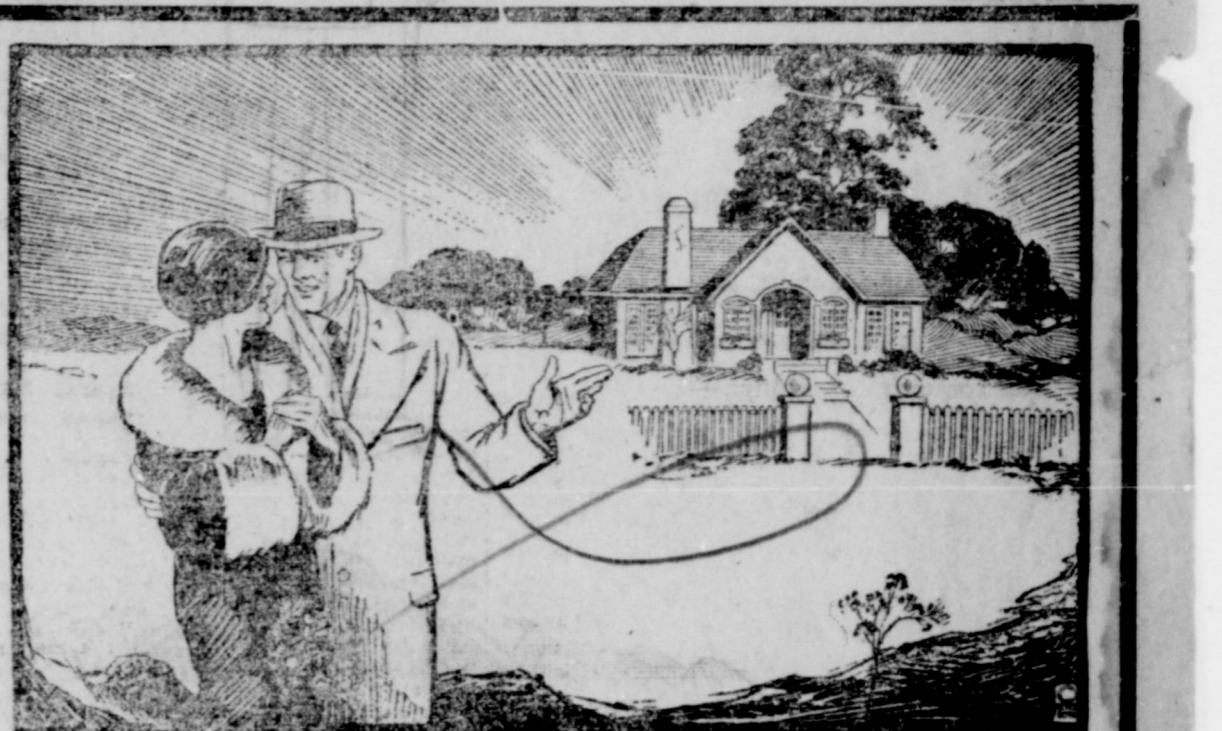
