**Former Resident of Brown County Dies**

News of the death of Amos H. Richardson, Sr., of Los Angeles, California, and former resident of the Delaware community in Brown county, was received in Brownwood this week.

Mr. Richardson died Wednesday, March 17, following an operation and was buried in the Englewood Cemetery by the side of his wife who passed away in June, 1936.

Mr. Richardson was 83 years of age at the time of his death. He was born in Tennessee and was married and reared his family in Austin, where he was a farmer until 1916. He then moved to Los Angeles, where he was in the grocery business until his retirement in 1933. He had been a member of the Methodist Church for a number of years.

Surviving are his four children, Amos H., Jr., Thomas E. and William Richardson, and Mrs. Annie Goates. Also nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild; a sister, who lives in Fort Worth, one brother in Austin and one brother, Tom Richardson, of Brownwood.

The Rev. Bob Shuler of the Trinity Methodist Church in Los Angeles officiated at the funeral services.

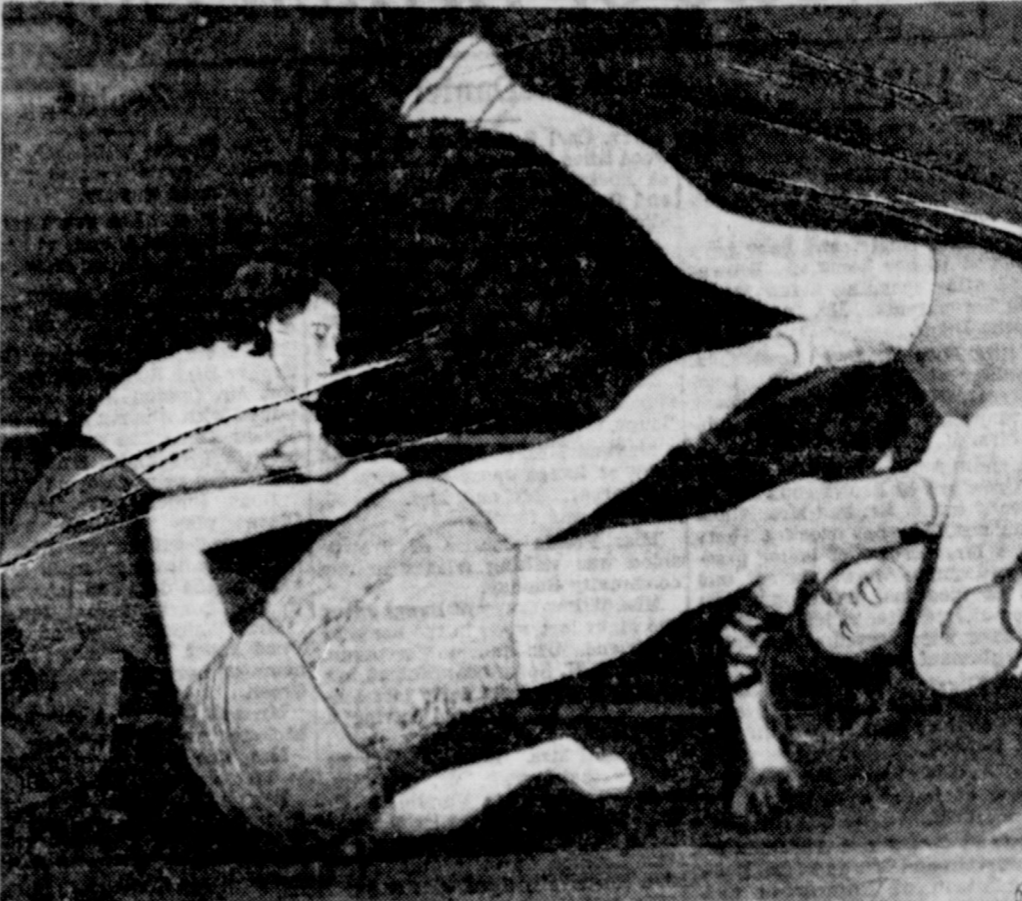

Subject of the third group conference, which also will be held Tuesday afternoon, is Oil Development. Chairman for this conference will be J. S. Bridwell of Wichita Falls. Mr. Bridwell is a prominent oil man and ranchman in the Wichita Falls area.

Speaking Contest

Twenty-five towns and cities have entered contestants in the "My Home Town" speaking contest to be held at the 19th convention. The contest is expected to draw 75 or more entries this year. Entries have been made to date by Gatesville, Iraan, Slaton, Lubbock, Albany, Abilene, Archer City, Borger, Breckenridge, Colorado, DeLeon, Eastland, Electra, Floydada, Midland, Olney, Olton, Ranger, San Angelo, Santa Anna, Spur, Vernon, Weatherford, and Wichita Falls.

Winner of the contest will receive the Thomas Etheridge loving cup. Other prizes include scholarships to several Texas colleges and several cash awards. Scholarships have been offered by McMurry College, Abilene; Howard Payne College, Brownwood; Texas Christian University, Fort Worth; Abilene Christian College, Abilene; and Central Texas School of Oratory, Brownwood.

New Contest

The Activities Contest, to be held for the first time this year, has attracted considerable interest throughout West Texas. The contest will be held in two divisions, and any Chamber of Commerce in the West Texas territory may enter one or both divisions. Suitable awards will be presented to the winner in each division. The first division will be for the best annual report of last year's activities. The second division will

be for the best work program for the coming year. Reports in this division will show objectives for year and how the organization expects to accomplish them. Towns entered in the contest to date are Slaton, Vernon, Haskell, Floydada, Kerrville, Shamrock, Sweetwater, and Roswell, New Mexico. Wichita Falls is the first city to bid for the 1938 convention. Word was received at 1937 convention headquarters in Brownwood Tuesday afternoon from the Wichita Falls organization that the city will make an aggressive fight for the meeting. The city will send an organized delegation and a band aboard a special train to the convention here May 10, 11 and 12 to extend the invitation. Ed Crump is president of the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce and Wilburn Page is secretary. W. B. Hamilton, Walter D. Cline and O. R. Burden are directors from Wichita Falls in the WTCC. Wichita Falls was host city to the WTCC in 1927, and has been a contender for the convention for the last three years. Abilene is the only other city to enter its bid for the 1938 meeting to date.

SHORT CUT TO SUCCESS

Here's a quick way of doing it that will help you out of many a tight spot: First mix 3/4 of a pound each of ground steak and lean pork with a cupful of fluffy bread crumbs, an egg, 1 1/2 teaspoonfuls of salt and a whiff of pepper. Form this into 2 dozen small balls and fry in 3 tablespoonfuls of limpid golden Olive Oil. When the balls are about half done add a large green pepper, a clove of garlic and two sprigs of parsley all chopped up fine together. Cook this a little while longer until the vegetables are tender; then pour 2 large cans of racy flavored Spaghetti cooked in a Tomato Sauce over the whole concoction and let it simmer until the Spaghetti is heated through.
