The use of gasoline in ridding chickens of intestinal worms has proven very successful with a number of poultry demonstrators under the supervision of County Agent Lehmburg.

Floyd George, whose flock consists of 435 White Leghorns, Spencer George's 400 White Leghorns and Vernon George's 300 White Leghorns treated their flocks with gasoline several weeks ago.

In speaking about this treatment Mr. George said, "One has to be careful with the gasoline treatment for intestinal worms because of the danger of strangling the birds."

In 1935 Mr. Buzbee planted 1 1/2 acres of his sandy land farm to Irish potatoes, which were heavily fertilized with barn yard manure.

In 1936, the 1,012 Brown County farmers cooperating with the Agricultural Conservation program grew 19,219 acres of cowpeas, sudan grass, soy beans, green manure crops and other crops which checked erosion by wind and water and returned fertility to the soil.

These same farmers will receive \$156,050.31 from the government for cooperating with the 1936 Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act.

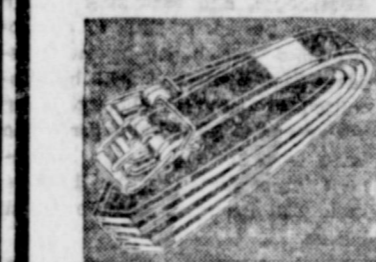

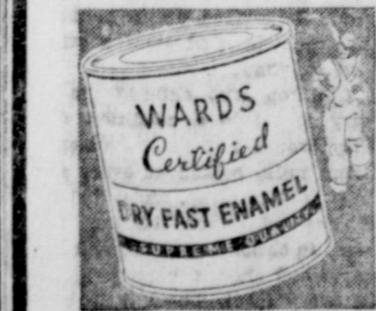

**AID OF SCHOOLS IS  
NEEDED IN CAMPAIGN  
TO HALT AUTO DEATHS**

Public schools of Texas must join in the State-wide effort to bring about a decline in the number of automobile accidents, declared C. J. Rutland, chairman of the Governor's Traffic Safety Commission of 1936 and widely known Safety Engineer, following the National Safety Council's report that 38,500 persons were killed in the United States by motor car accidents in 1935.

"At the recent State Traffic Safety meeting in Austin," said Mr. Rutland, "much was said about the 'three E's' of safe driving—engineering, enforcement and education. There is a growing realization that education of youthful drivers and drivers-to-be is one of the most potent methods of attacking the problem of traffic safety."

Mr. Rutland asserted there is a need for a handbook on safety for use in Texas schools. The Cordova Press of Dallas this week published a manual, "Safe Driving and Accident Prevention," which E. B. Cauthorn, assistant superintendent of the Dallas Public Schools pronounced "one of the best we have found for this type of work."

Authors of "Safe Driving and Accident Prevention" are Elsie Smith Parker, Texas educator and author of several school books, and Booth Mooney, associate editor of The Texas Weekly. The book stresses the necessity for knowledge and application of safe driving principles and contains a large number of definite projects designed to make the individual student conscious of the factors entering into safe driving.

(Continued from Page 1) happened, and at this time I got afraid that she would poison me for she told me that if she could not live with me no one else could. From this time on I lived in fear. I was afraid she would put poison in my food. I knew she was awfully jealous of me.

**Details of Killing**

After we moved to the farm in McCulloch county, Texas, our troubles didn't improve any. On Friday January 22, I fixed a bed to plant potatoes in and that afternoon I carried a wheelbarrow home that I had borrowed from Mr. Wright Jones. I came back home, we had supper, cleaned up the dishes. My wife had been fussing at me for staying so long while I was gone to Mr. Jones, said she knew I was over there to see another woman. She seemed very angry at me. When we finished the dishes we went into the front room and was playing the radio, when I mentioned that I had to go to the barn and feed the horses. I think this was about seven-thirty p. m. I went on to feed the horses. I noticed my wife was following me. She caught up with me just north of the house before we got to the barn. I knew she was going out there to fuss at me some more, as she would never fuss at me around her brother, who was in the house. We went out to the barn and put out some feed to the horses. She had fussed at me until we were both mad. We were walking toward the south part of the house lot just before we got to the fence my wife was still fussing and I was very mad. Before I thought I picked up a piece of a roll and hit her on the head with it. As I remember I hit her left hand and she was a little in front of me. After this I don't remember everything that happened, but I do remember picking my wife up and speaking to her, and at that time called her brother, Tom, who was in the house, talking to make him hear me. I went to the house and told Tom to go to my brother-in-law's and phone for a doctor. I left my wife in the lot while I run to the house to tell him that. I went back to the lot and got my wife, and brought her to the house and put her on the bed. I got a pan of water and a rag. I washed the blood off her face. I was doing all I could for her. After I had hit my wife, I decided to claim that a horse had kicked her. After I finished bathing my wife's face I went to the horse lot and got the piece of rail that I had hit her with, carried it to the woodpile and chopped it up and carried it into the fireplace where there was a fire and put it on the fire to burn it up. This was all done before anyone got there.
