Hansford County Commissioner's Court approves \$15,700 bid for 4X4 pickup

Hansford County's Commissioner's Court approved a \$15,700 bid from Gruver Ford for the purchase of a four-wheel drive pickup truck for use in Precinct 4 at the regular session held Monday, Jan. 11.

Two other bids were received for the truck, said County Judge Jim Brown. Lubbock Shamrock Chevrolet bid \$12,394 and Gillaspie Auto and Truck Center bid \$15,640. Precinct 4 Commissioner Val Winger recommended the Gruver Ford bid and it was approved. Precinct 4 in the southwest part of the county and includes Morse, explained Brown.

Another item of business at the meeting was the approval a new contract with the cities of Spearman and Gruver which allow the towns

to put inmates in the county jail, committee are Sheriff R.L. Brown said. The contract approved is basically the same as last years, Brown add. He then explained that the contract calls for the cities to pay the county \$20 per day per inmate and \$4.25 for meals. Now the contract must be approved by the city councils of Spearman and Gruver, he conclude.

The commissioners also signed a contract to continue ambulance service with the City of Spearman. It is the same as last year, Brown said.

A grievance committee was then appointed. Brown explained the process, saying that all of the names of the people who served as Grand Jurors in 1992 were placed in a hat. Then four names were selected. They are Roy Mayhew, Bill Winn, Donna Hendrickson and Kathleen

McFarlin, Jr., Tax Assessor and Collector Helen Dry, District County Clerk Amelia Johnson, County Attorney John Hutchison and County Judge Jim Brown.

"If an elected official has a complaint on salary and can't settle it in the commissioner's court then it is taken to the grievance committee," explained Brown.

Another business item at the meeting was whether to advertise to sell surplus fire equipment and office equipment. It was discussed and approved. They are planning on striping the fire truck that burnt in 1992 and selling the items, according to Brown

Overtime pay for holidays worked was another item discussed. It was decided that the employees would draw straight time plus time Other members of the grievance and a half for all county authorized

reviewing Hansford County headlines

Editors Note: This is the second article in a series of four that will be printed in January, 1993. Each of these articles looks back at the headlines for three months of the 1992 year. The below story covers April, May and June.

APRIL 1992

'Hansford Hospital Bonds... voting on Tuesday at four locations" At 7 a.m. on Tuesday, April 7, 1992 Hansford County voters began regular voting on the issuance of \$4.7 million in bonds by the Hansford County Hospital District.

"Hospital bond defeated" The unofficial results of the residents' vote on the Hansford Hospital District Bond issuance were announced on the evening of Wednesday, April 8, 1992 with 353 for and 1228 against.

'Stationmaster's House Museum receives donation" Post Master George Finley presented the post office boxes from Spearman's old post office to the Museum. On hand for the occasion were Chamber of Commerce Manager Cindy Blackman, Clementine Renner, Melba Rasor, Jennie Blankenship, Joyce Johnson, Juanita Pierce, Sylvia Robertson and J.D. Wilbanks.

"S.I.S.D. candidates introduced" Nine of the twelve candidates for the Spearman School Board took advantage of the Reporter-Statesman invitation to submit news releases announcing their candidacy and express their ideas to the public. The nine candidates that submitted pictures and information were Bob Boxwell, Sheri Benton, Archie Smith, Carolyn Gressett, Richey Thompson, Tom Latta, Albert LaRochelle, Larry Butts and Billy Brown.

"S.I.S.D. Board of Trustees vote no on the band program" After months of both private and public discussions, the issue of reinstating the band program in the Spearman Independent School District was formally decided with the Board of Trustees voting 5-2 against reinstatement of the band.

"Gruver grows by annexing" Gruver City Council members passed ordinance #228, annexing Cooper Street and State Highway 278 in to the city at the Wednesday, April 8, 1992 meeting. Only half of Cooper Street was in the city limits before this ordinance

Spearman City Council... votes \$1,000,000 in certificates of obligation at meeting' A motion was made to adopt ordinance #608, authorizing the issuance of Certificates of Obligation and approve the sale of the Certificates of Obligation to Merrill Lynch and First Southwest Company for the lowest interest rate. The interest rate was 6.567869% and cost \$611,259.17. The motion was carried unanimously

'Palo Duro River Authority selects dam inspectors"The Palo Duro River Authority Board met Tuesday, April 14, 1992 to consider a resolution on the annual dam inspection. The resolution was discussed and passed. Freese and Nicholos are performing the annual inspections.

"Southwestern Bell to introduce new system" Southwestern Bell Telephone hosted a reception to demonstrate the new services available to Gruver residents beginning April 25, 1992. There were benefits, but the bottom line-This was when you had to start dialing all seven numbers.

MAY 1992

'Hansford County Election results announced" "Super Saturday" election day was finally finished. Spearman, Gruver and Pringle-Morse residents had elected their representatives for the cities and the schools for another year.

For the Spearman ISD Board of Trustees Tom Latta was re-elected, and Bob Boxwell and Archie Smith were elected. For the Gruver ISD Board of Trustees George Lowe, Jr. and Kevin Holt were re-elected and Charlotte Bergin was elected. For the two positions on the Pringle-Morse CISD Board of Trustees Betty Womble and incumbent Alan Leach were elected.

In the Spearman city elections, Donald E. Reed received 267, while Charles Elliott received 255 votes. Mayor Burl Buchanan was reelected with 316 votes.

For the City of Gruver Buster Davis was re-elected for commissioner with 152 votes.

ASCS reminds farmers to inspect stored grain

"We hope Hansford County producers are checking the quality of their farm-stored grain under loan," Keith Martin, director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said.

Because farmers maintain responsibility for the condition of this grain, they are encouraged to check it for insects and mold growth, not only in warm weather, but during the fall and winter months as well. Martin said year-round inspections are necessary to preserve the quality of stored grain destined for future markets.

The market value of infested grain may be substantially reduced if the number of insect-damaged kernels is sufficient to lower the grade of the grain. Discounts against the price paid per bushel are often assessed by the buyer if live insects are present in the grain.

"Producers can use prescribed grain storage and handling methods to eliminate wasted grain and lost profits," Martin said.

Before applying for a grain loan, he said farmers should check their storage structure to see if it is adequate to control insect infestation, and then apply an approved insecticide to the grain when it is placed in storage. "This treatment usually protects the grain from insect damage for almost one storage season. However, it is very important to inspect the grain regularly because the longer it is in storage the more apt it is to become infested.

Martin said any time producers are in doubt as to the quality of farm-stored grain, whether it is in the commodity loan or the reserve program, they should contact the county ASCS office at once.







Health Brief -INCREASE MEASLES

AMONG HISPANICS HOUSTON-Lack of adequate immunization is the primary cause for an unusually high rate of measles cases among Hispanics. Statistics from the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta show the rate of measles among Hispanics for the past two years is more than double that of blacks and five times

greater than that of whites. Many poor families in the metropolitan areas can be immunized at community health centers, but it is often more difficult for those in rural areas to find a clinic or center offering low-cost or free immunizations, said Dr. Michael Tristan of Baylor College of Medicine in Hous-

"It is important for people in rural areas to call a county or state health department office to find out where they can receive free or lowcost immunizations," Tristan said.





MY FAVORITE WINTER PROJECT

Saving money (for important items like new lures) and working with kids can make a great project on a cold winter's day. Add some hot chocolate, several good fishing stories, and watch an afternoon turn into a treasured memory for old and young alike.

Most experienced anglers know that using marker buoys to identify lake structure or locate active fish can really improve your fishing, but marker buoys can retail for \$5 each. Gather up the kids, the grand kids, or some neighborhood munchkins and make some homemade marker buoys that will save about four dollars and can make great gifts.

Assemble the following items: an old cheap styrofoam ice chest (even new they only cost a couple of dollars), some old tire weights from a full service gas station, and some 50 lb. nylon fishing line or nylon twine from the surplus store.

Using your buddy's filet knife or a safety razorblade, cut the ice box into 4x6 inch rectangles. Insert some small tire-balancing weights, so one side of the rectangle will ride low in the water (This keeps the wave action from unwinding your buoy). The length of line to be tied to the buoy is determined by the depth of structure in your favorite lake. I have found that about 50 feet of line covers most fishing conditions. Tie on a large tire weight, and the job is complete except for an optional paint job. Give the kids some waterproof felt pens and watch them apply some original art work.


