Townsen earns silver at state

Spearman High School senior, Kimbre Townsen's silver medal finish in tennis was the best of the three athletes from Hansford County at the 2A State Athletic events held in Austin Thursday, Friday and Saturday, May 13-15.

Cody Pipkin, of Spearman, finished fourth in the 800m run of the 2A State Track Meet, and Kim Boone, of Gruver, finished seventh in the State 2A Golf Tournament.

Townsen went into the state tournament with a perfect two year, 52-0 UIL match record. Her record stated perfect through the first two rounds of the tournament.

She disposed of Yong Tran, of Hamilton, in her first match Friday morning. The match scores were 6-1, 6-3.

In her second match of the day, Townsen had a harder time defeat-

ing Jennifer Kaase, of Schulenburg. Townsen won the first set in a tie breaker, 7-6. She won the second set by a service break, 6-4. This win put her in the finals of the tournament.

In the finals Townsen faced Jennifer Craig, of Malakoff. A scheduling mix up put the girls on the court at 8 a.m. instead of 9:30 a.m., as originally scheduled. "I still had my breakfast in hand as we walked out onto the court," said Townsen. "I didn't have time to be nervous." She indicated that Craig looked nervous, and it showed in her play in the first set of the finals.

Townsen won the first set 6-2. "The first set went by real fast," said Townsen. Unfortunately for Townsen the second set did not go as well or as fast. "She (Craig) started hitting in the second set,"

said Townsen.

Craig appeared to get over her early nerves and took control of the match. Craig won the second set 6-0 and the third set 6-2, to win the state 2A title.

Townsen's state silver medal will join her gold medal from last year's state tournament. Her other accomplishments in high school tennis include a third place finish in 2A state her sophomore year and a

Three senior Hansford County 4-H members qualified to compete in the Method Demonstrations contest during the 4-H Roundup June 8-10 at Texas A&M University.

Individuals qualifying for the state competition are Kimberley Wagner, Ronda Renner and Tommi Latta. They earned the right to compete at the 4-H Roundup by placing in the top two of their category on Saturday, May 15, at West Texas A&M University.

Kimberley chose "Cancer, are you next" as her topic in the Focus on Health category. In her presentation she covered the warning signs, symptoms and different types of cancer. She placed second in the competition.

Tommi and Ronda gave a joint presentation in the Farm and

Ranch Economics category. The title of their presentation was "A Bird of a Different Feather." According to Karen Babitzke, Hansford County extension agent, they got a lot of their information from Gina Davis, a local ostrich rancher. In "A Bird of a Different Feather" they spoke on the diversification of how to add to the income of local farmers and ranchers, Karen added. Tommi and Ronda won first place at the competition.

Other Hansford County 4-Hers that have qualified to compete in the 4-H Roundup are Randie Renner, Scott Stedje, Kevin Williams and Galen Slough. These individuals are members of the Hansford County Senior Livestock Judging Team. They won first overall in the District 1 state qualifying contest to earn them a trip to the state competition.

Texas Railroad Commission releases... monthly oil and gas statistics

The Railroad Commission of Texas reports oil and gas production for the month of February 1993. In Hansford County total gas production was 2,808,605 mcf (1,000 cubic feet). Crude oil production in Hansford County totaled 22,979 barrels.

According to the May 11 news release, the Commission issued, statewide, a total of 977 drilling permits in April compared to 685 in April 1992. The April total included 516 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 44 to re-enter existing well bores, 37 to deepen existing holes, 161 to plugback existing holes, and 86 for other wells. April amended drilling permits totaled 133.

Total drilling permits issued in 1993 year-to-date is 3,738, a two percent decrease from the 3,802 issued during the same period of 1992.

Permits issued in April included 414 oil, 193 gas, 329 oil and gas, ten injection, ten disposal, and 21 other permits.

OIL AND GAS COMPLETIONS—In April operators reported 294 gas, 370 oil, and 29 service completions, compared to 153 gas, 477 oil, and 153 service

completions during the same period last year.

The total of well completions recorded for 1993 year-to-date is 2,925, a 12 percent increase from the 2,588 recorded in 1992 year-to-date.

Operators reported 978 holes plugged and 177 dry holes in April, compared to 1,572 holes plugged and 186 dry holes reported during the same period last year.

FEBRUARY CRUDE OIL PRODUCTION—Texas preliminary February crude oil production averaged 1,588,658 barrels daily, down from the 1,674,896 barrels daily average of April 1992.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for April is 44,482,411 barrels, down from the 48,571,991 barrels reported in February 1992.

FEBRUARY NATURAL GAS PRODUCTION—Texas oil and gas wells produced 423,569,563 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in preliminary production for February, down .01 percent compared to February 1992's gas production total of 423,145,820 Mcf.

Texas gas production in February came from 175,777 oil, and 45,151 gas wells.

The early voting for the U.S. Senate seat run-off election began Wednesday, May 19 and will end at 5 p.m. June 1. Regular voting will be conducted on Saturday, June 5 from 7 a.m. to

7 p.m. It is important to note that the voting precincts have been consolidated for this run-off election. In both Spearman and Gruver there will be just one polling location. Spearman's polling location is in the foyer of the Spearman varsity gym. This is for Commissioner's Precincts 1, 5, and 6.

Gruver voters will cast their ballots at the Community Bible Church in Gruver. This polling location is for people in Commissioner's Precincts 3, 4 and 7.

Other polling locations are as follows: Commissioner's Precinct 2 will vote at the Renner Ranch; and Commissioner's Precinct 9 will vote at the Morse Community Building.

Literacy Volunteers of America, Inc.... looking for volunteers

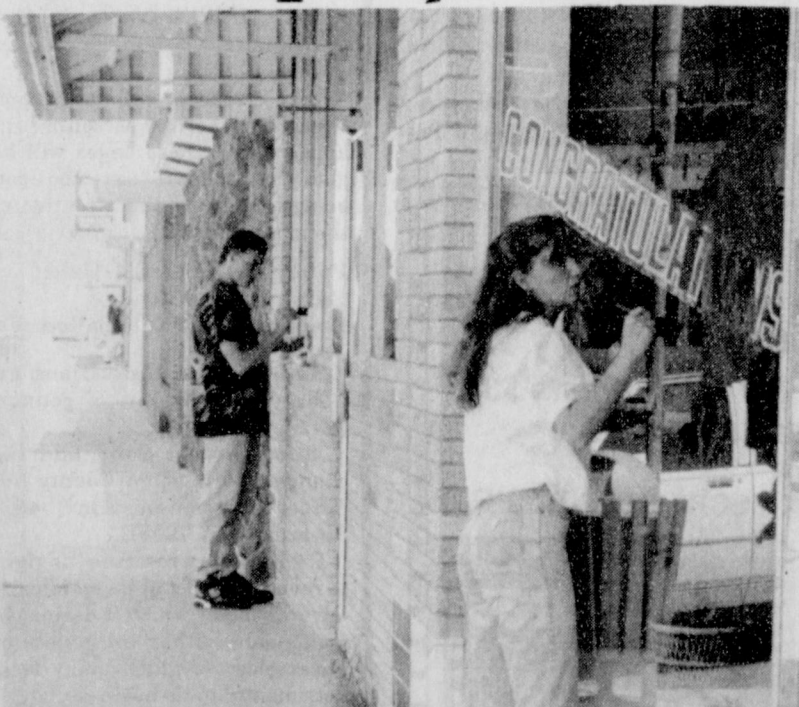

team roping, steer wrestling, bareback riding, saddle bronc riding, bull riding, breakaway roping and barrel racing.

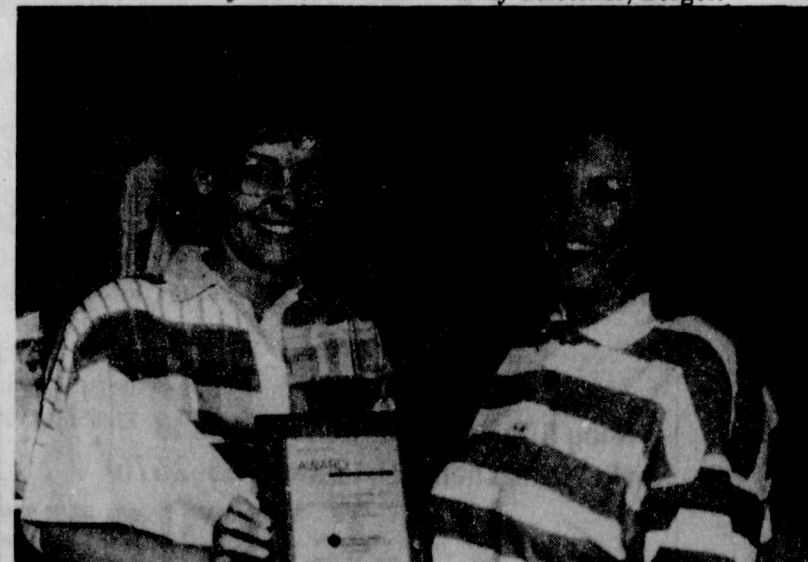

Grazing period to close on June 1

Keith Martin, CED of the Hansford County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said the official grazing and haying period will close June 1, 1993 for acreage conservation service (ACR) and conservation use acreage (CU) for payment.

Farm program participants are not authorized to hay or graze these acres between June 1 and Oct. 31, 1993. The wheat, and feed grains program prohibit haying and grazing of designated acreage during the principle growing months. Farmers who fail to comply with these restrictions could lose program benefits.

He explained that cropland designated as ACR or CU for payment must have been devoted to a row crop, small grain, or another annually planted crop in one of the last five years, and must meet certain size and width requirements.

ACR and CU for payment must be maintained in accordance with the program contract, and must be protected from wind and water erosion through approved cover crops or conservation practices. ASCS official Keith Martin said farmers will be out of compliance if they do not carry out proper conservation measures, or fail to comply with grazing, haying, harrowing, or weed control restrictions.

Texas Senate Week in Review

AUSTIN—The Texas Senate met Monday morning and passed CSSB 589 by Sen. Mike Moncrief of Fort Worth which creates the Health Care Provider Referral Act. The bill attempts to address concerns regarding conflicts of interest in the form of doctors—or other health professionals—referrals to services and facilities in which they have an investment or ownership interest. The bill prohibits health care providers from referring patients to a health care facility in which the health care provider is an investor. The bill now goes to the House.

The Senate Education Committee met Tuesday (May 11) afternoon and passed CSSB 7 by Senate Education Committee Chairman Sen. Bill Ratliff of Mt. Pleasant. The bill, which is an attempt to meet the June 1 court deadline, allows a portion of the commercial property of the richest school districts to be transferred to nearby less affluent districts. The intended result is that richer districts will still be wealthy enough to maintain their curriculum, but not so excessively rich that they subject the entire state to further legal challenges.

On Wednesday the Senate met and passed CSSB 7 by Sen. Bill Ratliff. Also passed was SB 1377 by

Sen. Bill Ratliff, which is a companion bill to CSSB 7. SB 1377 sets up a committee on student learning to make recommendations to the state board of education. This bill includes tests to measure student performance and academic excellence indicators to measure individual school and school district performance. Both bills now go to the House.

On Thursday, the Senate passed CSHB 1368 by Rep. Elliot Naishtat which requires security devices for certain rental dwellings. Currently, Chapter 92 of the Texas property code requires a landlord to install a "security device" upon request from a tenant. The bill does not apply to hotel or motel rooms or housing operated by an accredited college or university.

The Senate Criminal Justice Committee met on Friday morning and passed HB 1776 by Rep. Ron Wilson of Houston. The bill would allow Texans who pass a criminal background check and a proficiency course to carry a concealed handgun. The issue was put on hold last month by Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock after Gov. Ann Richards threatened to veto the bill. The bill has now been resurrected and could be taken up by the full Senate as early as Monday.

Spiritually Speaking

PEOPLE WHO CAN'T PRAY

We find in life that there are situations in which there is no other answer, in which there is no way out, in which you have done everything that you can do; in which you have done everything that money can do. There is no other answer except prayer.

But from wide experience you know that in such situations there are people who cannot even get their answer from God. There are people who can't pray.

First of all the reasons that they cannot pray are many. But of these the most important is that they have no faith.

We have become used to living in a mechanical age. We have become used to getting all we need out of coin machines. God will not let anyone treat him like a coin machine. Prayer is a personal, an individual, not an objective and mechanical thing. God doesn't answer on the insertion of the coin: God answers only that heart that feels the fellowship built up between the person and God.

The world and its ways tend to destroy our faith. It is a faith-destroying world because of its skepticism. There are too many in our world—people who need faith in God—who can't have it because they believe only in the skepticism of our modern times.

It is a faith-destroying world not only because of its skepticism but because of its greed. There are things that people have put above faith in God. Because we want possessions that make life comfortable we have shut out the consideration of personality. If we have no consideration for personality, no respect for the sacredness of other people, we certainly cannot have faith in God.

This is a faith-destroying world not only because of its skepticism, and its greed but because of its

profaneness. We have profaned the things that are sacred. We have made light of things that ought to lie deeply and sacredly in our hearts. When we have profaned things that ought to be sacred, we can't expect to have faith in God.

I think the deepest reason that those people who can't pray don't have this faith is that they have never met the Master. Until we meet him, we shall never be companions of his in prayer. Prayer ought to be like the ears that bring to our hearing the sounds of footsteps that are unseen. It takes acquaintance to hear footsteps of God as it takes acquaintance to recognize the footsteps of anyone we know.

Second these people who can't pray—not all of them, but some of them—fail because their lives won't let them pray.

There are a great many reasons why life doesn't let us pray. We can't expect God to change things at his end without allowing him somehow to change things at our end. Our lives are rushed so much that we don't have time to pray.

Those people who can't pray ought to ask themselves what their hurrying and their rushing is doing to their contact with God.

Sometimes our lives are so sinful that we can't pray. Sin shuts prayer out of a life. It takes away the possibility of having friendship with God.

We have compromised as individuals with the desire of our hearts and the temptations of the world. Compromise with sin keeps us from prayer because it shuts out our wholehearted allegiance to God, because it closes us off from him who could help us.

Thirdly some people who can't pray fail because they have waited too long.

Those who can't pray sometimes fail because they have failed to build up the equipment of prayer. There are people who get into the deepest, darkest hole of life, and

try to pray, they don't have the skill to pray and the art of prayer. They try to fellowship with God and have his power in their lives, who have never practiced prayer before.

PEOPLE! The only way for us to get the world back on its feet is for Christians to get back on their knees. There are those who can't pray when they have to, but one who can pray and doesn't is very little better off than the one who can't pray at all. I think we can change it, make it so there are fewer people who can't pray and more people who can pray, because we do pray.

It is only you who can "CONSENT TO SURRENDER". Christ is Lord, not you. This is the crucial step. If you slur this over, then nothing will come out right. The step is simple. Everyone goes into the shrine of the heart and bends the knee to something; something has the place of supreme allegiance. Some bow the knee to what others say, they look around before they act. They don't act; they only react. Their god is public opinion. "EVERYONE DOES IT," decides for them. Others bend the knee to themselves. Self-interest is supreme. Their first reaction is: How will that affect me? Their god is self. We could name others: money, sex, ambition, fear—any of these may be the center of allegiance. Everybody bends the knee to something. If so, I choose—I choose Christ. I am not God; He is! I whisper the inner consent, the consent of abdication. He commands: I obey. From this moment I do not belong to myself. I let go of the one thing I won—myself. I am free from self-domination; I choose Christ-domination. I let go at the center.

If you are ever at a loss to support a flagging conversation, introduce the subject of eating.

GOD AS SURGEON

Proverbs 3:1-8

Several years ago I read a story of a man who suffered from a benign brain tumor. Seeking medical help he had several experienced surgeons turn him away as inoperable. They counseled him to live as fully as he could until the tumor finally killed him. The man refused to give up home.

Searching across America he found a surgeon who was confident he could remove the tumor. The operation took the greater part of a day and was the most arduous ever performed by the surgeon. The man fully recovered, and the tumor did not return.

You and I have a relationship with sin that is very similar to that man's with his tumor. In truth, there is no such thing as benign sin. Just as the tumor would have killed that man, unless removed, so sin is deadly, unless discovered and removed.

The surgery we must undergo is long, drastic and stressful, but guaranteed successful, if we do three things. First, we must submit to the examination of God and receive His diagnosis. Scripture plainly reveals that everyone has a terminal case of sin.

It's not enough to humble ourselves to God's diagnosis. We must then believe in His willingness and ability to "operate" on us, and to bring us completely back to health.

Finally, the believing patient must go under, and stay under the knife, God's Word. It heals even as it cuts. Those submitted to it are given a perfect prognosis, eternal life.

There were 10 animal control reports filed during the reporting period.

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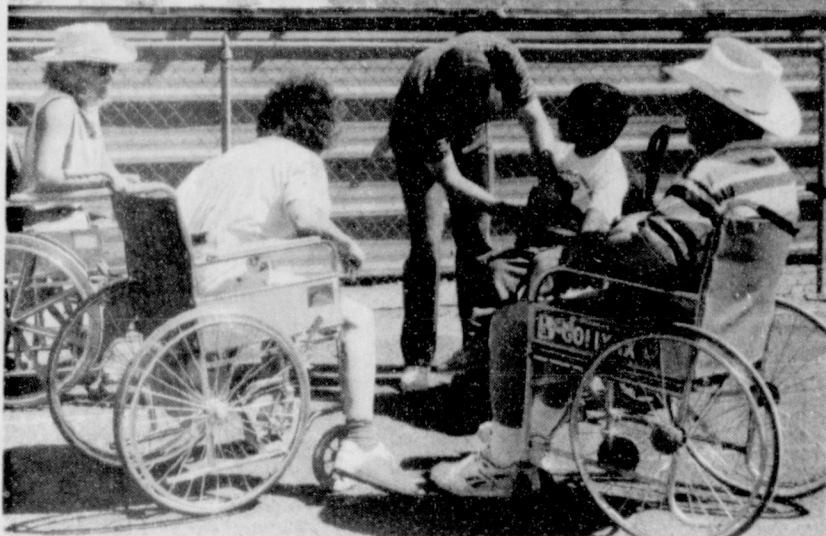

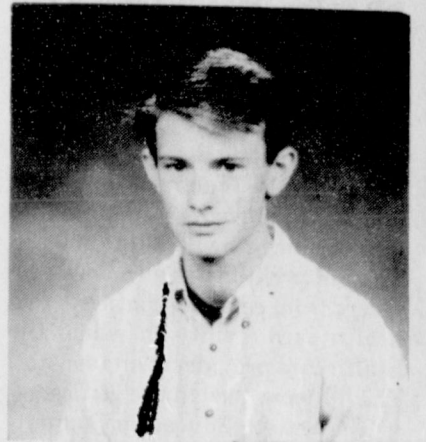

Pool places in five events, wins Memphis Tri-State Rodeo All-Around

Gruver's Brady Pool is seemingly unstoppable on the rodeo trail as he won the Memphis Tri-State High School Rodeo Boys' All-Around Saturday, May 15.
Pool added this title to the various honors he has received in the 1992-93 rodeo season by placing in five of his six events.
In the bareback riding, Pool scored 67 points on his ride. This score won him the first place prize money. Second place was won by Ryan Burrow of Boys Ranch, with a 65 point ride.
Pool scored 63 points in the saddle bronc riding event to earn him a second place finish. He was four points off the winning ride of 67 points performed by Brook Bearden of Dumas.
In the calf roping former Spearman resident, Matt Eakin,

placed sixth, and Pool placed seventh. Eakin roped, flaked and tied the calf in 13.238 seconds. Just 0.149 seconds behind Eakin, was Pool. Pool's time in the calf roping was 13.387 seconds. The winning time in the calf roping event was 8.668 seconds turned in by Jim Locke of Canadian.
Team roping partners, Sage Britain and Pool, roped their steer in a rapid 6.160 seconds to bring home the first place check. Not far behind them was the team of Brandon Brown and Adrian Meaz, with a time of 6.545. Then taking almost a four second jump is the third place team of Ryan Rankin and Heath Mitchell. This team turned in a time of 10.111 seconds.
Rounding off Pool's placings at the rodeo, was a third place finish in the steer wrestling event. Pool threw his steer in 11.559 seconds to earn the third place check. First

HOT NEW FISHING LINE
After hearing rumors about a new 'super line', I finally laid my hands on a single 100 yard spool. The key ingredient is something called Spectra fiber. Developed in Germany and now produced under license by Allied Signal, Spectra fibers are braided into a revolutionary new fishing line.
Unlike popular monofilament lines, this new line has virtually no stretch or reel memory. It is very sensitive, super strong, and very thin. The forty pound line has a diameter similar to most 12 lb. monofilament! This line comes in several sizes including 35, 40, 70, or 80 pound. It is so abrasion resistant that a nail clipper can barely cut it, and anglers are warned against trying to cut it by biting. Sounds too good to be true, doesn't it.

Remember the good old days of setting the hook hard enough to 'cross their eyes'? This new line has virtually no stretch, and anglers are warned to modify their hook set or risk breaking those high-dollar graphite rods. My package also suggested anglers should 'carry a small dowel to wrap line around when trying to free' hung up lures.
Several major companies are working overtime in order to supply eager anglers with this new

line. It will soon be available in quality tackle stores and major catalogs under several brand names including Lazer or Tuf line.
Anchor Marine in Amarillo received a small, preview supply called LAZER LINE from the Phantom Products and quickly sold out. This new line will not be cheap but it should out-fish that old kinky stuff that lays coiled on our reels. When you get some, let me know what you think and we will share your views with our other readers, okay?
"Game fish live in an eat-or-beaten world: if something acts like it is hurt, something else will eat it. That's why your lures need to change directions, pause, or bump into something," according to leading professional angler Gary Klein of Dallas. Klein is an expert with the finesse baits, those tiny plastic baits that are used to catch the wary bass that reside in clear water lakes. Next time the fish stop biting during a normal weekend of heavy fishing pressure, try using some smaller lures on lighter lines and catch a few extra fish.

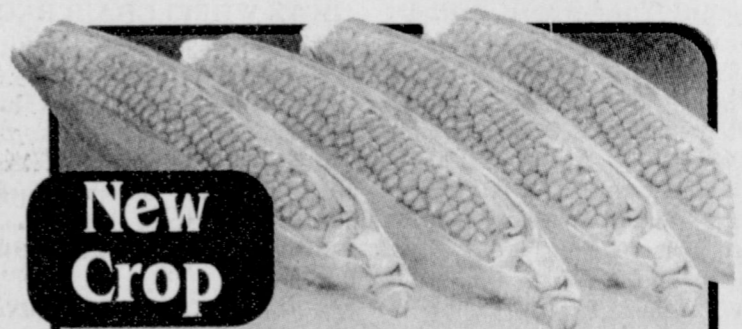

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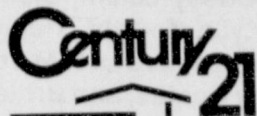

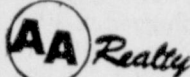
