

Auction caps off '93 H.C. Junior Livestock Show

Editors Note: The judging results from the Hansford County Junior Livestock Show will appear in next weeks paper. They were not available at this time.

The Hansford County Junior Livestock Show concluded the two day festivities with the livestock auction being held at the county barn in Spearman. The auction was composed of the top animals shown in the various classes at the livestock show.

At the auction 121 animals were sold for a total of \$110,586.55, which was down from the \$122,372.95 in 1992. According to Norma Jean Mackie, the difference was in the steers. She explained that in 1992 30 steers were sold and this year just 18 were sold.

The Grand Champion Steer was

shown by Clint Williams. His 1330 pound steer brought \$2261 at the auction. It was bought by Boots Williams.

Tommi Latta showed the Grand Champion Lamb. First State Bank bought the 121 pound lamb for \$847.

The Grand Champion Swine was shown by Randie Renner. The swine weighed 248 pound and was sold to Cargill, Inc. for \$1116.

Showmanship awards were for those who had the poise in handling of their animals. This part of the contest was broken into two different age groups, junior and senior. Those winning the awards were Kevin Williams - Senior Steer Showmanship; Brant Armes - Junior Steer Showmanship; Sharlet Slough - Senior Lamb Showmanship; Leah Mackie - Junior Lamb Showmanship; Clint Williams -

Senior Swine Showmanship; and Brant Armes - Junior Swine Showmanship.

According to Mackie there were 99 swine, 56 lambs and 22 steers exhibited in the livestock show this year.

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Gruver I.S.D. board hears concerns on spring break

The Gruver Board of Education heard concerns on the dates of the 1994 spring break at the regular meeting held Wednesday, March 10.

Two representatives from the community, Jackie Smith and Joe Morris, stated that there was a concern that a late spring break limited the participation in the Houston Livestock Show. The board held a short discussion and then voted to adopt a calendar that was a modification of the one presented to them in February. This calendar shows spring break 1994 scheduled for April 4-8.

In other business Coach Steve Myatt discussed the girls' basketball and cross country budgets for 1993-94. The board approved the budgets with the basketball budget being set at \$10,551 and the cross country budget being \$1,780.

The board amended the 1992-93 budget by \$6,632.56, which reflects the purchase of the ag farm and an increase in costs for the Northwest Texas Special Education Coop, according to Superintendent Barry Haenisch.

Richard Schad met with the board concerning the school farm lease. He explained that he was planning some expensive improvements to the farm and asked for a multiyear lease to ensure financial support for the improvements. The

Spearman City Council considers agreement for fire truck purchase

Spearman City Council members considered entering into an agreement with Houston Galveston Area Council (H-GAC) to purchase a fire truck during the regular meeting held Tuesday, March 16.

City Manager Kelvin Knauf spoke on the advantages of entering into the agreement. He stated that it would allow the City of Spearman to take advantage of volume purchasing power and discounts offered by manufacturers. He listed other advantages as savings in labor because they would not have to do research, specifications or conduct the bid award process.

Spearman Volunteer Fireman Ronnie Antalek described the truck and the options needed. He stated that the total cost of the truck is \$123,433.94, which includes the 1.75 percent administrative fee charged by H-GAC. He continued that the city would receive a 3 percent return of the amount pre-paid to the fire truck company.

Knauf explained that the cost of

the truck was more than was budgeted, but he felt that savings in other areas would be found.

Alderman Mike Cudd motioned that Spearman enter into an agreement with H-GAC to purchase the truck, pre-pay 80 percent of the cost of the truck and hold 20 percent until after delivery and a performance test. Charles Elliott seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

Other business at the meeting was the appointment of Kathy Beck as presiding judge and Pearl Pierce as alternate judge for the Saturday, May 1 election.

The council also considered authorizing Cindy Scribner's appointment as the assistant director of H & S EMS. Knauf explained that the members of the H & S EMS voted that Scribner fill the vacancy of the assistant director which was vacated when Kevin Russell moved to Dalhart. The term is for two years and will expire in November of 1993. A motion was made and seconded. It carried unanimously.

Chamber of Commerce Manager

Cindy Blackman requested that the city lease the rodeo arena and grounds to the chamber. Steve Benton motioned to have city manager Kelvin Knauf draft an agreement between the two parties and present it at the next regular meeting for consideration. The motion was seconded and carried.

Knauf also gave a report on the Regional Solid Waste Plan. He stated, "A sub-regional solid waste committee meeting was planned for Wednesday, March 24, in Spearman. He stated that he hoped that after the meeting they would have more input of what direction the city will take on the subject."

In regular business the council read and approved the minutes from the previous meeting; and approved the revenue and expense reports for February. The monthly fire, ambulance, police, municipal court and animal control reports for February were also presented and approved. The council approved payment of bills in the amount of \$318,542.13.

May 1 election, eighteen candidates to run for offices

Editors Note: For those candidates wishing to make a formal announcement of their candidacy *The Hansford County Reporter-Statesman* will accept type written copy up to 200 words for publication in the April 15 issue. Deadline candidate information is noon on Thursday, April 8.

With the March 17 deadline passed, 18 applications for positions on the ballot were filed for the 12 various position up for re-election throughout Hansford County.

The Spearman I.S.D. board positions are highly contested, with six candidates running for the two seats. Those seeking election to the school board as they appear on the ballot are Sheri Benton, incumbent Carl Kunselman, incumbent Craig Schumann, Scott Beedy, Richard Pipkin and Allen Varnon.

Only two other entities have contested races. They are mayor of the City of Gruver and positions on the Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. Board.

Two candidates are vying for the position of Gruver City Mayor. Those running are Archie Nelson and Charlie Johnson.

There are four candidates vying for the three positions on the Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. board. Those seeking the positions as they appear on the ballot are Charlie

Kiser, incumbent Clay Reid, Kerry Phillips and incumbent Clyde McCloy.

All other offices at the various entities are uncontested.

Running uncontested for Gruver City Commissioner is Roy Mayhew.

Individuals applying for a place on the May 1 ballot for the two seats on the Gruver I.S.D. board are incumbents Corky Chapman and Stan Seagler. Chapman has served one year on the board and has draw the first position on the ballot. Seagler has been on the board for six years and is second on the ballot.

Those appearing on the ballot for the three alderman positions in the Spearman City Council as they are listed on the ballot are incumbents Mike Cudd, Steve Benton and Ed Garner.

Cudd was elected in April 1985. He has served four, two-year terms, for a total of eight years, according to Cheryl Gibson, city secretary.

Benton has served one, two-year term.

According to Gibson, Garner was

first elected as alderman in April 1980. He served four, two-year terms and then did not run for the position in 1988. Then in July 1990

Hansford County Hospital Administrator... LaRochelle tenders resignation

Hansford County Hospital District Board of Directors accepted Hospital Administrator Albert LaRochelle's resignation during the regular meeting held Thursday, March 18.

LaRochelle has accepted a position as the chief executive officer of the Carlos Otis Health Care Center Incorporated in Townshend, Vermont. He explained that it is a non-profit health care organization composed of Grace Cottage Hospital, Heins Home Community Care (a personal care facility), Stratton House Nursing Home, McConnell Professional Building as well as

some physician clinics and office buildings.

His last day at the Hansford County Hospital will be May 14 and he begins work in Vermont on May 24. LaRochelle's wife, Sheila, and their three children plan to stay in Spearman until their oldest daughter, Alisha, graduates from high school next year.

LaRochelle said that it was time professionally and personally to move on. "Basically I feel that my work here is done," LaRochelle said. He added, "It was an opportunity that came along and it was just too good to turn down at this time in my life."

He also explained that his mother has been ill recently and that by making the move he will only be 100 miles away as compared to the 1700 miles he travels from here.

He concluded by saying that the area is beautiful and it is the best of two worlds. He explained that it is two hours from Boston and four hours from New York.

In other business Carol Dunihoo requested that an old ultra-

sound/electrical stimulation unit that recently broke be replaced. The board approved the purchase of an Intellect 700C unit at the cost of \$4,090.

The board reviewed the area of the hospital that currently houses central supply and the old operating room (O.R.) area. LaRochelle addressed the board, explaining that it would be beneficial to move sterile supply from the central area into the old O.R. He added that this would separate sterile and non-sterile supplies as well as adapt the physical layout to accommodate centralized purchasing for the whole District. It was requested that the board approve retaining

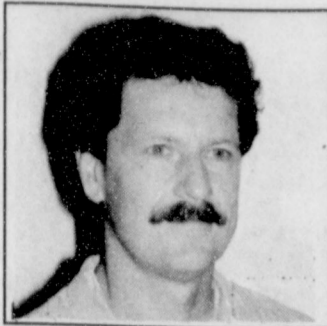
the architectural firm Hannon, Daniel and Dickerson to do a preliminary study since the project would require architectural and engineering work. The board approved an expenditure of up to \$4,000.

A special meeting for Wednesday, March 24, was called for by the

THE NEW AGE IS AGE OLD 1 John 4:1

"There is nothing new under the sun." Solomon was right when he spoke that. In the past 25 years an old "product" has received new packaging. Plain old witchcraft or anarchy has become the "New Age." It has its own music, promoters and publishers. Inside the wrapper, however, is the same destructive lie: man is the measure of truth and is indeed "god".

The primary tenet of New Age theology is people discovering for themselves that they are god. That lie is the one used by Satan in the garden of Eden (Gen. 3:5). Scripture teaches that nothing good dwells in us, and that we are dead in our sin until we repent and believe on the Lord Jesus Christ. New Age teaches we can save ourselves. Scripture teaches that only God in Christ can save us.

New Age is a wide-mouthed religion much like Hinduism. A Bible-reader knows something is deathly amiss in such teaching. Jesus said He alone was the way to God. To accept anything else is a mockery of the Cross, and leads to destruction.

The means by which antichrist encourages New Agers to discover their "god-potential" are many: astrology, divining, witchcraft, Ouija boards, spiritists, channelers, mediums, necromancy, unScriptural meditation (like TM), some forms of self-talk, mind-control methodologies, use of crystals for their healing qualities, etc. People are paying hundreds and thousands of dollars for such damning, God-forbidden information.

Twenty plus years ago I was a hippie. On Broadway the musical "Hair" was a smash hit. One of the most famous songs of that generation comes from that play. Its title, "The Age of Aquarius", refers to the astrologer's chart, called the Zodiac. That chart is divided into 12 epochs representing sections of stellar space. Every person's birth and life, connected to one of these epochs, is supposedly controlled by the particular stars of their sign. The song spoke of the dawning of the Age of Aquarius—of anarchy or the spirit of antichrist. Now we can see why the noon day is like it is.

The only new age worthy of the name is the one to be inaugurated by Jesus Christ when He returns. Don't be fooled! Live your life in expectancy of His return and the REAL new age.

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Spiritually Speaking

I guess I'm still a scientist at heart, even in my appreciation of Scripture. The excitement of that "moment of discovery," the thrill of new inspiration after hours or days or weeks or years or a lifetime of searching the present and re-searching the past until "Wa-La!", "Ah-Ha!", "Eureka-I've-found-it", or simply "Wow!" greets me, and I can sit back, catch my breath, and savor the precious moment.

This has been my experience over and over again, but in particular and lately with regard to the phrase "son of man" (or "Son of Man") found so frequently in the gospels. We of the post-resurrection faith community are likely to pass over it too quickly, it seems to me, our minds automatically referring the phrase to Jesus as a simple and fast way of putting all that there was/is to say about him in one neat and single package. Since one of my most dearly attended guests has been the person of Jesus himself, it naturally occurs to me to slow down each time I come across it, to pick it up and look at it more carefully...to try to search out each new "treasure" about Jesus that may stand out in each different setting that it is given in the gospels.

A particularly intriguing aspect of the phrase is that, not only do the gospel writers place it upon the lips of Jesus himself, but that it usually contains a statement of Jesus about himself. What more wonderful source could we ask for information about Jesus than Jesus himself!

Several years ago at seminary, I researched the available Biblical scholarship concerning this "son of man" phrase and wrote a paper on it. At that time, a relatively recent

breakthrough had occurred, one that shed considerable light from an interpretational standpoint. But, more exciting to me, was the result that a personal detail about Jesus was given historical reality. Here was something tangible, even if only a few words...a kind of "artifact" of the way in which Jesus referred to himself when he talked to people, to his disciples long ago, to us now.

This phrase which the original Greek text renders literally "the son of the man" turns out to be, not the "title" of Messiah-Christ as we of the post-resurrection church usually understand it, but the Greek rendering of the everyday Hebrew-Aramaic expression which refers its speaker as "one" or "a person" with the intended meaning "one such as I." (For example, "One should think before one speaks.") What a wonderful tool this can provide as we look more closely at how Jesus understood himself to be involved in the course of his lifetime and ministry on his journey to and through the Cross!

To me it's like coming upon an ancient relic from the past, mostly buried in the sands of time...so full of potential knowledge and potential strengthening of faith...lying, waiting for a searcher, a "crusader" not unlike myself and you, perhaps, to catch a "glimmer" of its presence, to feel an emerging "texture" beneath our fingertips as we hold our breath and gently brush away the sand.

This Lenten Season as we follow, as it were, Christ's journey to the cross, let us "slow down" as we come upon the gospels' "son of man" that we may come closer to knowing this person Jesus who was in the habit of referring to himself simply as "one such as (you and) I."

The relationship these two bond becomes almost symbolic of that of a father and a son.

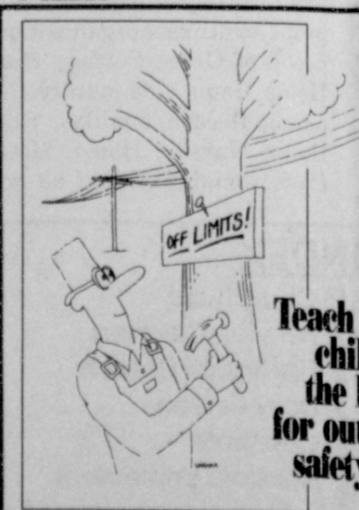

the moral and ethical standards of people in various occupations.

Small business owners ranked at the top of the survey with a 64 percent positive rating. Members of the U.S. Congress ranked at the bottom with only a 19 percent approval rate.

The survey showed that the people who Americans respect and admire most are those who create jobs, deliver honest value, keep their promises and contribute to society. Perhaps there is a message there for Congress and our President.

Although small businesses rated at the top of the survey, more than one of three respondents thought there was room for improvement. Therefore, to gain respect and ensure repeat customers, every business must be consistent in delivering quality and service that exceeds customer expectations.

Respect is one of those words that has many definitions, but is difficult for most of us to define. I believe we place less value on re-

spect in today's society than we did when I was a teenager. Or perhaps the meaning of the word has changed. I hope the following true story will help you understand my personal definition of the word respect.

Respect by example

Helen was only 32 when her husband died. He left her with a heavily mortgaged farm and two young sons to raise. The boys were only three and six years old. For their sake, Helen decided to try to hang on to the farm.

The hardships of the seventeen years that followed might make a book worth reading, someday. It would be a book about overcoming fear. Like the fear that came late at night when a car drove down the isolated dirt road that lead to the farm. Was it someone lost or was it someone with evil intent toward an attractive young widow living alone?

It would be a book about hard

work and doing without. Helen could not afford even simple luxuries like indoor plumbing and bathroom facilities. She milked the cows by hand. All summer long she worked in the garden so there would be food for the winter. The boys clothes were hand-me-downs from older cousins.

Finally, it would be a book about courage, love, honesty, self-sacrifice and leadership by example. Helen taught her boys to read, to work, to fear God and to love their country. She showed them by example the importance of integrity, the meaning of honesty and the value of respect.

I know Helen's story well. You see, I am the youngest of her two little boys. I learned the meaning of respect by her example.

Thank you mother for your example. Today, I am beginning to understand and appreciate the sacrifice you made for me. I love you

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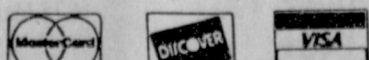

MARCH MADNESS

For those who enjoy fishing, it requires a liberal dose of March Madness to brave the unpredictable snowstorms and gusty cold fronts while trying to enjoy a successful fishing trip. Logically we should wait until May or June when the weather calms down and the icy blasts become mere cool snaps.

ALBERT HARTMAN was guilty of a little March Madness last year, when he caught a huge 12 lb. hybrid striper at Lake MacKenzie near Silverton. His secret bait was a Super shad by Renowsky. March is not a time for catching lots of fish, but if your goal is catching a trophy fish, now is the best time of the year because some

of the biggest fish in the lake are in the shallows.

Catch and release, while not a factor in fishing for the sterile hybrid stripper, will decide the quality of largemouth and smallmouth bass fishing on our lakes.

LAYER UP, LAYER DOWN
Experienced anglers in this part of the world dress in layers of lighter weight clothing instead of a single parka-like outfit. As the morning chill gives way to midday warmth, you can shed a layer or two thereby maintaining your ideal comfort level. This layering process is reversed during the afternoon cool down.

Looking for an exceptional gift idea? The one indispensable item of clothing during any season is a good rainsuit. Comfort in the great outdoors disappears anytime you are soaked. For quality in rain suits look for the Gore-Tex label. A Gore-Tex jacket will cost about \$100 and will protect against the rain while allowing perspiration to es-

cape. Get one that is big enough to allow a couple of extra layers of clothing on those cold winter days. The 10-X Company has several styles of excellent rain gear. My favorite has a built-in hood because it offers the best protection against the drips that plague other styles.

NEW HOOKS The creative people at PRADCO (the Heddon, Bomber, Rebel, and Riverside lures) have developed a terrific new treble hook called the Excalibur. The most common problem when using crankbaits is having fish pull lose. **JOE HUGHES** of PRADCO claims that Excalibur solves this problem by giving "the treble hook a rotating action so that when the first point makes contact with a fish, the hook turns (counter-clockwise), embedding at least one of the other points." The more a fish turns, twists, and otherwise resists, the more these hooks turn to secure your lure to the fish. Available now at either K-Mart or Walmart, these fish-catching devices cost about fifty cents each.
