

When you thought I wasn't looking, I saw that you cared and I wanted to be everything that I could be.


When you thought I wasn't looking, I learned most of life's lessons that I need to know to be a good and productive person when I grow up.



will be his God. Abraham is told that circumcision of male believers shall be a 'sign' of this covenant. God also gives a covenant to Sarah God made these covenants because of the faith of Abraham which was perceived by God as 'righteousness'. The Psalmist cries for deliverance and praises God for his relieving the afflicted, his feeding of the poor, his mercy to those who seek Him.

As we examine ourselves in this season of Lent, we read a passage that changed the history of the church and led the way to reformation. In Romans, Paul tells the faith community that it was Abraham's faith which brought the promise of God. That God's promise is based on God's grace toward us. Consider that faith is our hope in the certainty of God's promise of salvation through Jesus Christ; "Grace" is God's gift of salvation to us, which is neither earned nor deserved by us. There exists in this country a certain "ladder theology" which indicates that "I chose to believe in God", "I did many works for Christ therefore I am Christian", "I reached out for God ... ". Balderdash! There is nothing that "I" can do to earn the love of God; there is nothing "I" can do to present myself as righteous before Him. It is God through the Holy Spirit who allowed my heart to open to Him; with that opening came faith in Jesus Christ through His grace; in baptism I received the sign of His new covenant and received the Holy Spirit. Cecil R. Biggers deserved none of this, Cecil R. Biggers through the love of Jesus Christ received all of this. The same is true for you, dear Christian.

In Mark, Peter sees "who" Jesus is, but fails to understand what Jesus' mission on earth is. Peter an immature believer at this point, acts as 'satan" in this instance. Previously in Mark we have seen the power and authority of Jesus; henceforth, we shall view the teachings of His suffering and death.

As you reflect on your life, on your need for repentance during Lent, consider the words of Mark Twain, "Many people are bothered by those passages in scripture which they cannot understand. But as for me, I always noticed that the passages in scripture which troubled me more, are those which I do understand". May the Holy Spirit keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus during this season of Lent.



March 6, 2006 - Lake level -22.86 feet

Change is in the air at the lake, lately. The water temperature is edging up. Some trees are budding. The Great Blue Herons are preparing their nests. The Bald Eagles have gone north. Warm weather is bringing a few campers, and fishing is picking up. It is time to dust off your gear, and replace your fishing line. It is still early for

some of us, but if you are after a record Catfish or Walleye, this is a good time.

The picture is of Elaine Limbocker, from Liberal, Kansas. She caught this 24.5-pound. Blue on Sunday. I think this is the lake record, for a female angler. The official record is 28.78-pound caught last year, in April. A number of catfish have been caught in the last two weeks. The lake is down so much, the odds of catching one should be better.

Many of you may wonder when the lake was this low. In June of 1996 the lake level was 21.60 feet. The previous low was 17.75 feet in May of 1995. The all-time high was in May of 1999, at 66.50 feet. I prefer to remember that picture! If the lake were full, it would be 77 feet deep.

Jack Lane, of Stinnett, Margarette Evans, and I, attended the Texas Water Conservation Association annual meeting March 1-3, in The Woodlands. Low water levels and lack of rain were popular topics at the event. Most of Texas depends on surface water for their drinking water. When the lakes are low, there is much concern. Other subjects discussed were, desalinization of salt water and brackish water, regional water planning, emergency management lessons from recent hurricanes, groundwater management, environmental stream flow, management plan for the Arkansas River Shiner in the Canadian River, to name a few.

By the time this paper comes out, I will have attended a meeting at Lake Meredith on Tuesday, of the Canadian River Commission. Representatives of Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico, meet once a year, to report on what is happening in the Canadian River Basin. Also, a meeting of taxing







Gruver guard Matt Messer also produced key plays throughout the game and finished with a teamhigh 14 points.

Blake Nelson and Michael Cervantes combined to score 33 of New Deal's 43 points.

Gruver, the heartbreak story of the Texas Panhandle football season, poured its heart and soul out Saturday afternoon, winning a trip to the Class 1A Division I state boys championship game in triple overtime against No. 1-ranked Martin's Mill.

Gruver overcame several deficits and four players combined to score all six points on free throws in the third overtime, lifting the Greyhounds to a dramatic 59-55 1A Division I state semifinal win over Martin's Mill at Fort Worth's Wilkerson-Greines Arena.

This wild ride of a game saw six of the 10 starters foul out, Martin's Mill tie the game in regulation on a free throw with five seconds to play and Gruver erase deficits of four and five points in the first and second overtimes.

"This was just awesome. I'm not sure I have ever been quite this happy," said Gruver senior guard Tyler Lane, who scored a teamhigh 25 points and buried a clutch 3-pointer in the second overtime. "We have a great group of guys who never say die. We weren't going to let this trip to Austin get away.

"The game was insane," said Gruver senior post Tanner Irwin, who made two free throws with about 10 seconds to play to tie the game in the first overtime.

Ten of the 14 Gruver players suiting up Saturday were motivated members of the Greyhounds football team that went 9-1 last fall

Gruver was the only 9-1 team in Texas not participating in the playoffs as it lost a three-way coin flip that included eventual Class 1A state champion Stratford.

Program Overview

Parent Student Workshop

The purpose of the Parent-Student Workshop is to orient participating parents and students to Shattered Dreams, give them an opportunity to meet the other participants, complete all necessary forms, and create the mock obituaries that will be used during the program.

Living Dead

The Living Dead component increases students' awareness of the number of people dying in alcohol related crashes. Traditionally, students have been taken by the Grim Reaper every fifteen minutes based on the rate of drunk driving deaths in 1998. Removing students every 15 minutes allows more students to participate and increases the impact on the entire student body. At the time this manual was printed, it was estimated that one person died in an alcohol-related crash every 33 minutes in the United States.

Mock Death Notification

The Mock Death Notification component provides parents with a realistic experience of what it would be like to find out that their child was killed in an alcohol-related crash. The key to accomplishing this activity is gathering accurate locator information of parents.

Mock Crash

The Mock Crash is a realistic portrayal of an alcohol-related crash for the student body. When planning the crash, keep in mind that this is just one way of increasing awareness of the consequences of underage drinking and impaired driving.

Student Retreat

While the Shattered Dreams program has an emotional appeal, the primary purpose is to create an opportunity for learning and behavioral change. The Student Retreat provides an opportunity to create meaningful and lasting changes in a youth's behavior. This is not accomplished through the crash reenactment, as some might think.

Parent Retreat

The parent retreat should be held on the same night of the student retreat. The parent retreat is specifically for those parents whose students were participants in the Shattered Dreams program. The aim of the parent retreat is to teach parents some skills that will help them deal with the problem of underage drinking and impaired driving, while their teen is also learning many similar skills.
