Senator Bivins conducts town hall meeting here

The Spearman O'Loughlin Center hosted Texas State Senator Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, Wednesday, November 30.

Senator Bivins was in Spearman as part of a tour of the 31st Senate District where he will be a guest speaker at 15 town meetings. Bivins uses public town meetings to get in touch with the public opinion on issues prior to each legislative session. The 74th Legislative Session will convene January 10 through May in Austin.

Bivins started out the meeting by saying, "I'm here to get my marching orders -- I'm asking for direction from you guys. I'm holding these meetings to hear what's on the minds of voters and that's what I'll take back to Austin."

He went on to say "One issue I will be expected to vote on is casino gambling and that's where your opinion is critical." He then asked to crowd to close their eyes and vote on the issue of casino gambling. The vote came out 10% in favor, 90% opposed. Bivins stated that it was about the same average as every other poll that he had take, so he felt he should vote against that issue when it was presented.

Bivins was excited about the changes that the November 8th election will make. He said, "November

8th brought the most sweeping and significant changes in Texas government I've seen in my life and that sheds new light on issues in Austin. With the new leadership in the Capitol comes a new perspective on state issues."

The issues that Bivins felt would be the ones most addressed by the Texas Legislature were ones involving juvenile justice, education, and tort reform.

The Senator said, "We've got an opportunity to do things in Texas that we've tried to do for quite a while now." He feels that the state should implement federal trucking deregulation to let competition set the rates. Bivins also prioritizes the protection of private property rights. He thinks that a person should have some rights over endangered species.

Education will be a major issue in the 74th Session and the senator continues to support legislation to increase the state's share of public educational funding. "I will also sponsor legislation that requires the state to assist local school districts with the cost of building public school facilities," said Bivins.

When asked by Spearman Police Chief Charlie Morse about the burglars who burglarized the city only getting probation, Bivins said "If

we put first-time offenders in the front door of prisons, we have to let hard core offenders out the back door to make room. So the question is do we want first-time offenders on the streets or do we want murderers and rapists on the street?"

Bivins feels that justice should start with juvenile justice, get tough on juvenile criminals, get tough on habitual disruptive children in schools, and make parents more responsible for their children.

"Start at the level of children and make them more accountable for their crimes and maybe there won't be so much juvenile violence and prison overcrowding," said Bivins.

The Senator was asked how he felt about California's Proposition 187 and if he felt it would be something that the state of Texas should maybe thank about. Bivins' comment on that question was that he felt that something needed to be done about the illegal immigration problem but he was not sure that Proposition 187 was the answer. He felt that there were many different issues that need to be looked at before a solution could be found.

Senator Bivins ended by inviting everyone to visit him in Austin. He said his office is always open to anyone who wants to visit.

Firemen battle large grass fire

The Spearman Fire Department fire five miles east and eight miles north of Spearman. Thursday, December 1, to a grass fire burned about a fourth of

a section of GRP grass belonging to Bryan Jones. The Spearman fire Department was unable to control the blaze alone so they called in units from Perryton, Gruver, Waka and Farnsworth to help fight the fire.

A car was involved in the fire but it is unknown if the vehicle was the cause of the fire or just got caught in it, according to Bill Porter of the Spearman Fire Department. "The car was burned to the point that we could not tell much by looking at it," said Porter.

It took the combined effort of all the fire units about three hours to get the fire put out.

Spearman PD receives 22 calls over weekend

The Spearman Police Department was kept on it's toes this weekend. They received 22 calls for service.

At 6 a.m. on December 3, the police were called to 201 North Endicott where a 1987 Chevrolet pickup was reported stolen. The pickup was later recovered by Officer Bruce Goehring at around 6:47 a.m. in the 100 block of North Endicott. The case is still under investigation.

Also on December 3rd, officers were called to the 300 block of Townsend where they arrested Ramon Villegas, 21, on a warrant for simple assault. They transported him to the Hansford County Jail. The warrant was issued by the Spearman Municipal Court.

On December 4 at 4:21 a.m., a Spearman police officer stopped Dwight David Lakey of Borger for driving while intoxicated. Lakey was arrested for DWI and transported to the Hansford County Jail.

The other 19 calls that the police department received were miscellaneous calls.

Four local shoppers were all smiles Saturday morning after their lucky numbers were drawn in the annual "Holiday Homecoming" drawing.

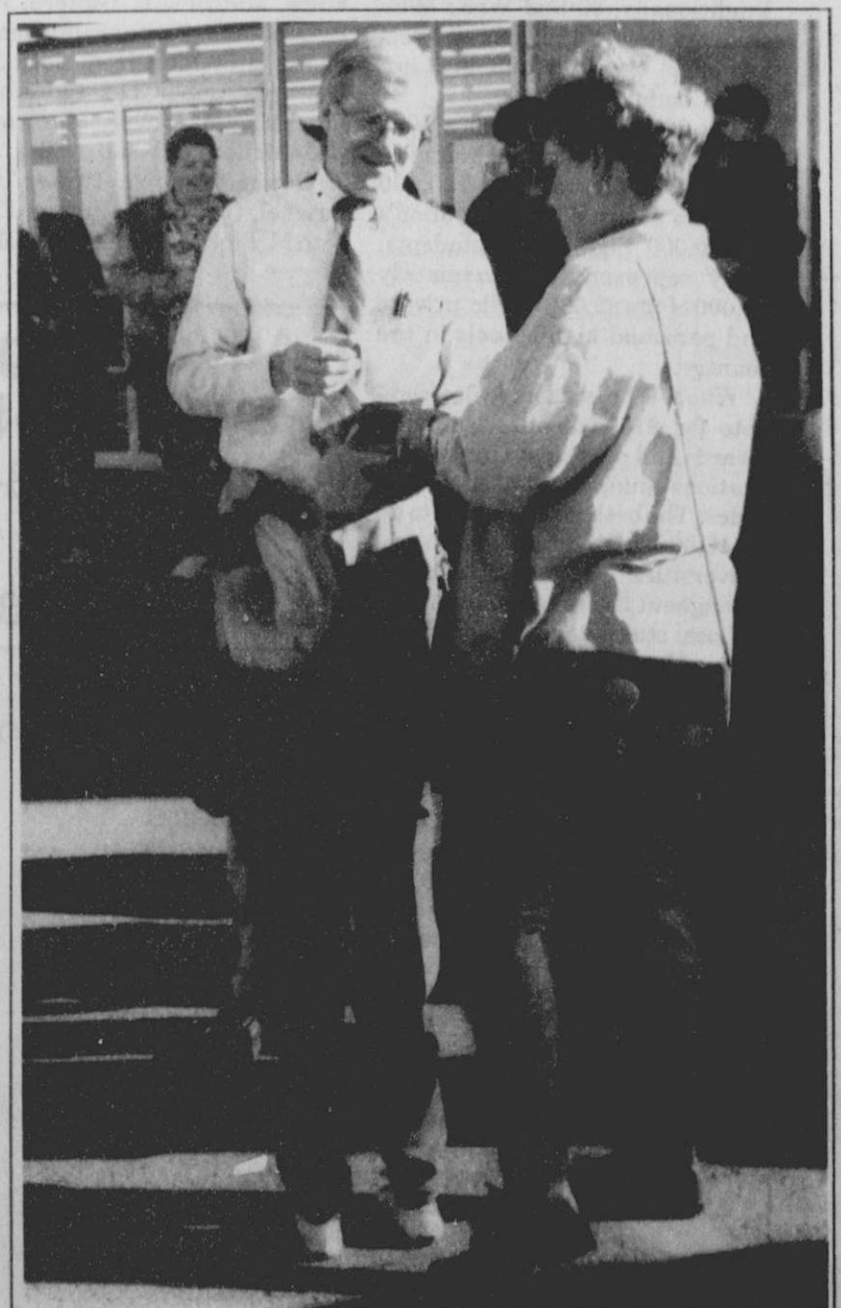

A total of 60 students from this area are including in the 28th Annual Edition of Who's Who Among American High School Students, 1993-94.



Henderson to get doctor degree

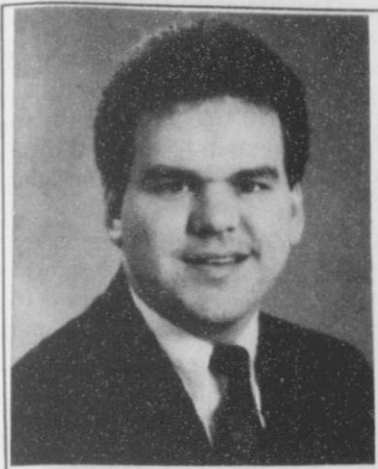

FBC Choir to present Christmas musical

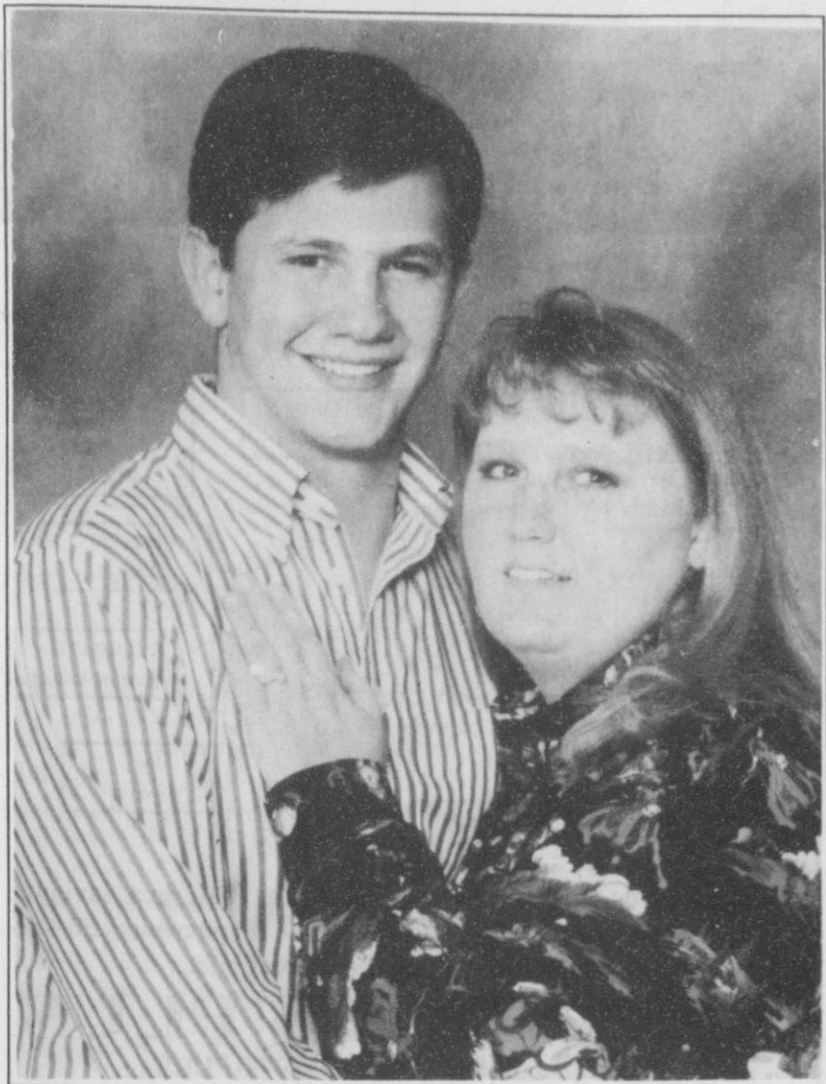

Hints for dealing with the upcoming holidays

This time of year stretches our budgets and may leave us with financial problems in January. We feel the pressure to spend more money than we can afford and then think, "Well, it is a special time".

Here are some hints for spending:

*Set spending limits for food, entertaining, gifts, and decorations. If you want to spend more than budgeted on some items, cut spending in another area.

*Try to limit spending to one or two credit cards. The interest rates will vary so try to use the ones with the lowest rates to save finance charges. It is better to spend cash and not charge at all, but either way, spend only what you budget.

Holiday times also bring the joys and challenges of eating. It does take some commitment to keep holiday eating healthy. Try to plan around special events by following these hints:

*Watch what you eat the day before and the day after a special holiday event. Do not skip meals that day but eat lower calories foods allowing for special foods at the event. Not eating during the day

can cause you to be so hungry you will overeat.

*Before you attend the event, eat a snack of crackers, fruit, or raw vegetables to help curb your appetite. Stand away from the food area, take only small portions of food, and no seconds. Eat larger amounts of the low calorie foods to fill you up.

*Don't look at foods as being good foods or bad foods. Take small amounts of all foods and then you have been deprived.

Gift baskets can solve your problems for many on your gift list. Try some of these:

*Assemble a pasta basket with prepared sauce, pasta, loaf of bread tucked into a basket or colander.

*Try an assortment of dried and fresh fruits along with some nuts.

*Line a basket with cloth napkins and add fresh muffins and cocoa mix.

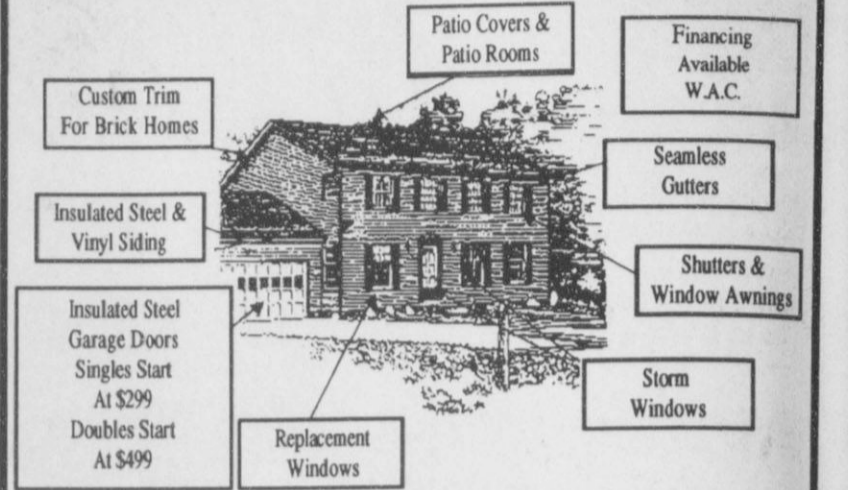
*Assemble a selection of flavored coffee and holiday cookies on a decorative plate.

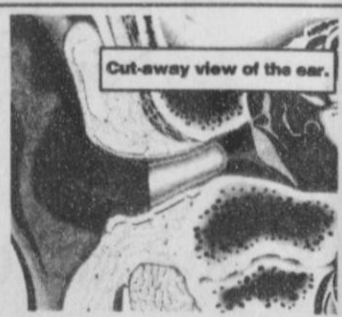

Out at the Lake

Hoping to see the bald eagle, Pauline Hale and I drove out to the lake Saturday afternoon. We stopped on the south side of the shore line, rolled the windows down as it was a nice day, and began scanning the trees and the sky. A covey of bob whites distracted us first by passing right by us. They moved at a leisurely pace except when they would be out in the open crossing the little road that had been mowed. They would put their little legs in overdrive as they sped across it, and then would slow down as they felt safe by the bigger weeds.

We saw and heard a big flock of Canadian geese come in from feeding. They landed up nearer to the dam and on the east side of the lake. Next we saw a golden eagle land in one of the dead trees some distance away. Then at last we saw a huge dark bird with bright white head and tail coming across the lake toward us. The bird was doing a lot of gliding. All too quickly he disappeared behind the dead trees, and we could not tell where he had gone, but we were excited that we got to see him.

Different writers use different statistics when they tell of how near we came to losing our national symbol. In recent Amarillo Daily News Ray Sasser quoted the U.S. Fish

and Wildlife Service as saying that the widespread use of DDT reduced the bald eagle numbers to as few as 400 pairs. Another book said only 300 birds of the southern subspecies remained. When DDT was banned in 1972, the bald eagle began a comeback. Since 1990, more than 3,000 pairs of adult bald eagles have been recorded in each year in the lower 48 states.

There is no problem for most of us in telling the difference in mature golden eagles and mature bald eagles, but people do tend to confuse the immature birds, because the immature bald eagle have a dark head and tail often with some white on the breast and wing linings. The immature golden eagle has a white tail with a broad dark terminal band.

About 70 per cent of a bald eagle's diet consists of fish, either captured fresh or stolen from other birds of prey. The bird may also consume carrion, waterfowl, upland game, and rodents. The ones at the lake are winter visitors, but there are a rare few that live in the area year round.

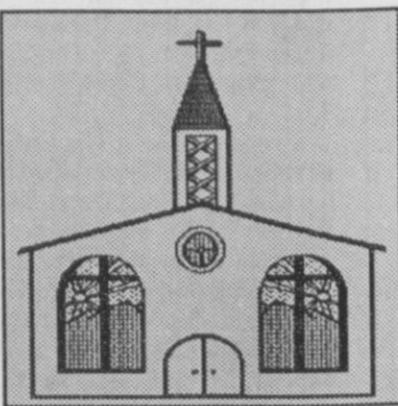

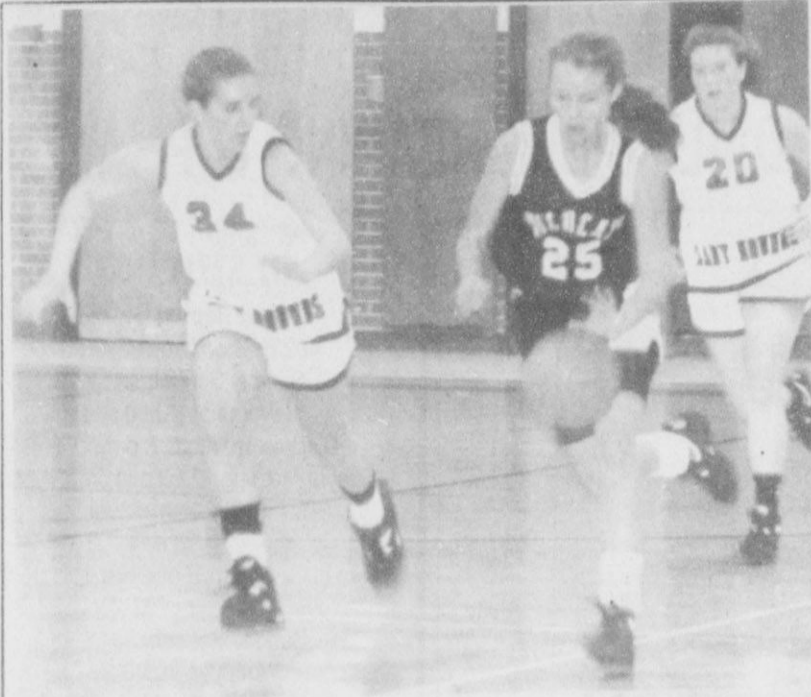
