WTAMU Offers Internet Course

WTAMU will offer an introduction to the Internet course from 6:30-9:30 p.m. Wednesdays January 15-May 7. Participants will explore the Internet, its origin and future applications. Students will learn how to connect to the Internet and what hardware, software and access services are needed. Experience with e-mail, discussion groups, telnet, gopher, file transfer, freenets, University information services, electronic libraries and Internet search tools will be part of course material. Emphasis will be given to the World Wide Web, Netscape and HTML web page construction. The course can be taken for undergraduate credit as CIS 499 or graduate credit as CIS 5499. Students may also enroll for non-credit. Cost of the course is \$200. The deadline for registration is 5 p.m. Monday, January 13. Emergency Farm Loans

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by drought, high winds, hail, tornado and flooding conditions which occurred from January 1, 1996 through July 9, 1996 and continuing are being accepted at the USDA, Farm Service Agency office located in Spearman, FSA Ag Credit Manager, James M. Heck said today.

Hansford County is one of nineteen counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Dan Glickman, as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought, high winds, hail, tornado and flooding which occurred from January 1, 1996 through July 9, 1996.

Heck said farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer

must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an emergency loan," Heck said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 16, 1997 but farmers should apply as soon as possible.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

Lynanne was the first woman president of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce, and was president of the Texas/Oklahoma Panhandle Group of the National Association of Bank Women, now called Financial Womens International. She is also a member of the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce, and the First United Methodist Church.

Re: The new Swine Feeding Facility, location 5 miles south of Spearman from the intersection of Farm-to-Market Roads 759 and 760, and then 1 mile east from the intersection of Farm-to-Market Road 760 and an unnamed County road in Hansford County, Texas.

The Hansford County Commissioners' Court realize we have limited power concerning this application. Never-the-less, we would strongly oppose any

additional swine facility, including the one 5 miles south of Spearman. We feel the proximity to Spearman will cause, at times, an odor affecting the quality of life of Hansford County and the Spearman residents.

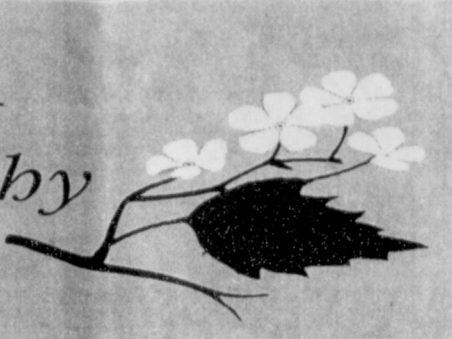

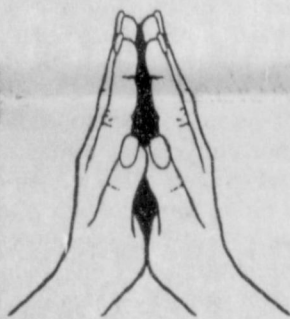

Focus On The Family

QUESTION: We have a 1-year-old daughter, and we want to raise her right. I've heard that parents can increase the mental abilities of their own children if they stimulate them properly during the early years. Is this accurate, and if so, how can I accomplish this with my baby?

DR. DOBSON: Research indicates that parents can increase the intellectual capability of their children. This conclusion was one of the most important findings derived from a 10-year study of children between 8 and 18 months of age. This investigation, known as Harvard University's Preschool Project, was guided by Dr. Burton L. White and a team of 15 researchers between 1965 and 1975.

They studied young children intensely during this period, hoping to discover which experiences in the early years of life contribute to the development of a healthy, intelligent human being. The conclusions from this exhaustive effort are summarized below as reported originally in *APA Monitor*.

1. It is increasingly clear that the origins of human competence are to be found in a critical period of development between 8 and 18 months of age. The child's experiences during these brief months do more to influence future intellectual competence than any time before or after.
2. The single most important environmental factor in the life of the child is his mother. "She is on the hook," said Dr. White, and carries more influence on her child's experiences than any other person or circumstance.
3. The amount of live language directed to a child (not to be confused with television, radio or overheard conversations) is vital to the development of fundamental linguistic, intellectual and social skills.
4. Those children who are given free access to living areas of their homes progress much faster than those whose movements are restricted.
5. The nuclear family is the most important educational delivery system. If we are going to produce capable, healthy children, it will be by strengthening

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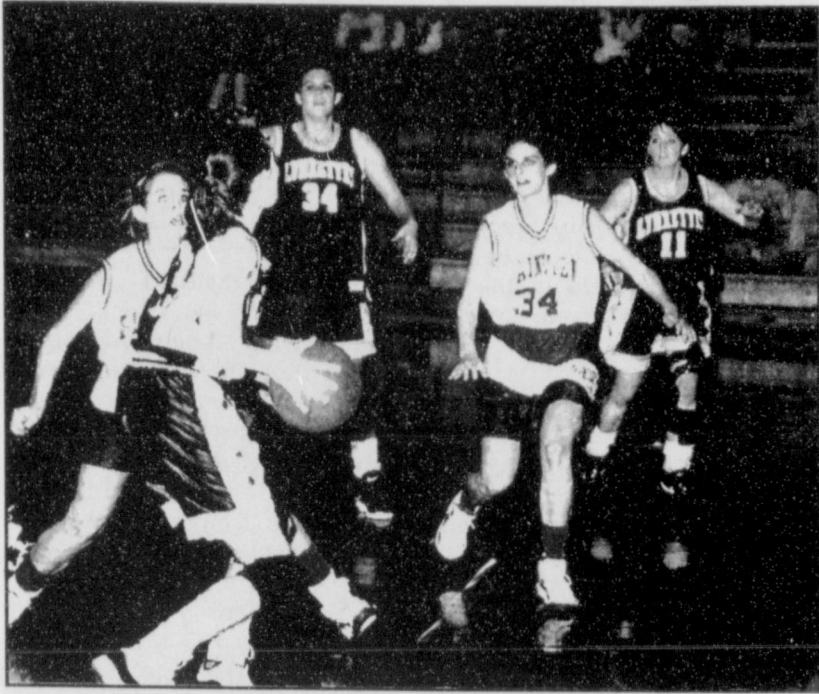
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Lynx/Lynxette Basketball

family units and by improving the interactions that occur within them.

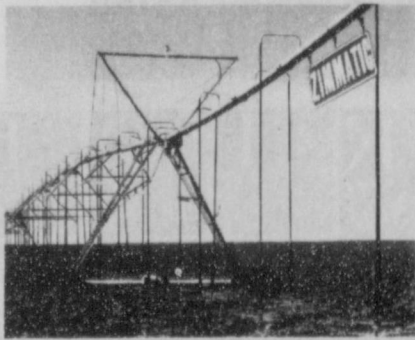
6. The best parents were those who excelled at three functions:

1. They were superb designers and organizers of their children's environments.
2. They permitted their children to interrupt them for brief, 30-second episodes, during which personal consultation, comfort, information and enthusiasm were exchanged.
3. They corrected their children when necessary, while simultaneously showing great affection for their children.

These conclusions are exciting to me, for I find within them an affirmation and validation of the concepts which I have devoted my entire professional career: the dedication of mothers during the early years; the value of raising children; the stability of the family, etc.

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Dear Editor,

If you saw last Sunday's episode of sixty minutes on T.V. you now know the truth of what to expect from the invasion of corporate pork production in Hansford County. Their record for water, land, and air pollution follows them wherever they go. While we fight to keep our landfill open for dumping solid wastes they are allowed to hold millions of gallons of liquid manure in unlined pits. Dead carcasses are dumped in open pits where maggots and flies aid in their decomposition.

Thanks to our senator, Mr. Teel Bivins, they are no longer required to secure water and air permits which allowed local opposition to air their complaints and petition for an open hearing. Under subchapter K rules permits are granted by the Texas Natural Resource Committee by approval of submitted plans of the corporation based on technical merit. The only distance requirement for the site is that it must be at least (1/4) one fourth mile from the nearest occupied dwelling. Plenty of room to put one on the land located south of our high school and football field!!

As for the economic impact on our community, it has proven to be negative in every respect in all other previous locations. Land values decline, taxes increase, quality of life is disrupted by the stench and flies, and social gatherings turn into neighbor

against neighbor. The monetary benefits from created jobs is minimal if not a deficit since minimum wage labor is their only need. There is a big turnover of the work force due to the toxicity of the decaying slurry and the humidity encountered in the workplace. Respiratory problems are the norm for these workers.

The question most often asked is what can I do? Or more often What's the use? To do nothing is to surrender to a corporate entity that is interested in our land and water for their benefit with no concern for the future when the water is no longer available and the land is polluted they can move to a new location and start anew.

There is a group that is doing something about the dilemma!! It is a group of Ochiltree and Hansford County Farmers known as accord (Active Citizens Concerned Over Resource Development). They currently have an active suit in Austin to rescind the subchapter K rules and restore our rights to control our natural resources and preserve them for future generations. SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans

Businesses in some Texas counties have until January 6, 1997 to file applications for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster

Loans are available for businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses from excessive high temperatures, drought conditions, unseasonably cool temperatures and an early freeze which occurred from August 1, through December 31, 1995 and continuing. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply.

Businesses in the following counties are eligible to apply: Childress, Hansford, Lipscomb, Wheeler, Collingsworth, Hardeman, Ochiltree, Dallam, Hemphill, Sherman.

Some of these counties may be included in other disaster declarations with open filing periods. Applications and further information can be obtained by calling the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired.

These loans are intended to assist businesses in offsetting working capital losses which they suffered as a result of the weather reducing the crop income of the area farmers and ranchers. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the weather are not eligible.

News From The Post Office

The Postal Service is proud of the job we do. We process and deliver 580 million pieces of mail daily, not yearly or monthly but daily. We handle 40% of the world's mail. You can see why we say mail early. We are also proud of our Postal Eagle, and our American flag. After seeing the Flag on the front of the Amarillo paper that someone flew upside down in protest, it made me think about the voice for the Folding of the Flag. This is a time of great respect.

Our Flag is folded in a triangle to teach us our Government is formed in three inter-dependent bodies, Executive, Legislative, and Judicial. There are thirteen folds - one for each of the original colonies. All are encased in the Blue Field to remind us that they, as well as we, are under the love and care of Almighty God...a Free and United Nation.

Instructions for folding flag: Flag is lifted from the casket or table by the color guard. Fold #1 - We fold to the left as a symbol of Life, and again (fold #2) to the left as an emblem of our belief in the eternal life. Fold#3 - We fold to the left for that is where our hearts lie and it is through our hearts that we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands. One Nation Under God, Indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for All. Fold#4 - We fold again to the left representing our weaker nature for we Americans Trust in God and it is to Him we look for guidance at all times. Fold#5 - We fold to the

right as a symbol of our sword arms for for it is with our swords we protect this Flag and it's inaritions against all enemies what so ever. Whether they be found within the boundaries of our Nation or without. Fold#6 - We fold again to the right as a tribute to our Country. In the words of the immortal Stephen Decatur, "Our Country, in Her intercourse with other Nations may she be right but our Country, RIGHT or WRONG". Fold #7- We fold to the left in tribute to one who entered the Valley of the Shadow in order that we might find Life, and this fold is made to honor Mother for whom this Flag flies on Mother's Day. Fold#8 - We fold again to the left as a tribute to our Womanhood for it has been through their Loyalty, Love and Devotion, that the characters of the man who have made this Nation Great have been molded. Fold#9 - We fold to the right as a tribute to Father for he too gave of his sons to this Nation since the days the Republic was born. Fold#10 - We fold from the stripes toward the stars for as the stripes symbolize the thirteen original colonies that founded our Republic, now embodied in the fifty sovereign States of the Nation so when the Flag is secured the Stars cover the Stripes. Fold#11 - We fold to the left as a triangle. This represents to the Hebrew Citizens the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies in his eyes, God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost. Folds #12 and #13 are done and the end is tucked in and the flag is passed to Color Guard member

who is to present it.

Each time the Flag is passed it is turned over, and when released a hand salute is given. When the Flag is secured, the Stars cover the Stripes ever reminding us of our National Motto "IN GOD WE TRUST" and the shape of the flag is like that of a cocked hat, again reminding us of the Soldiers who served under George Washington and the Sailors and Marines who served under Captain Paul Jones, who followed by their Comrades and Shipmates, in times of Peace as well as in times of War, through their Loyalty, Love and Devotion to this Flag and its institutions have Preserved for us American Citizens, the rights, privileges, and freedom we now enjoy.

The next time you look at our flag, stop, and remember what it stands for.

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


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

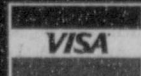
