Fight over land goes back to District Court for another round

Monday, October 10th, George K. Lamb and L. Mike McLain were back in court.

On August 26th the case between George K. Lamb versus L. Mike McLain, wife Diane McLain and Damon D. Gregg, wife Chalsea B. Gregg was presented to a jury. The jury heard arguments that George K. Lamb sold land to L. Mike McLain with closing date pending until clear title could be obtained. Due to circumstances out of the control of Lamb the closing date was delayed, by the time Lamb as able to close on the land the crops had been harvested. The way Lamb read the contract he was entitled to a percentage of said crops, McLain

on the other hand did not read the contract in the same way.

After hearing testimony from both sides the jury came back with a verdict for George K. Lamb, but the judgment was pending.

On October 10th, Lamb and McLain went back to court. District Judge Bill Smith heard a Motion for Judgment and Petition for Temporary to prevent Defendant, L. Mike McLain from foreclosing upon first lien.

This lien was with Metropolitan Life Insurance Company and was taken out on June 11, 1972. In order to preserve the status quo Judge Smith ordered George K. Lamb to put up a \$7,000 bond.

McLain was granted temporary possession of the land, he was also ordered to pay all court costs. Judge Smith took all other judgements

'You have a voice in government'

As we approach the November General Election, I am concerned with the amount of voter apathy and disinterest in the electoral process in the State of Texas. The most fundamental right we have in our democratic system of government is the freedom to vote. That freedom stands as an invitation to take part in a government where the supreme power is vested in the people and exercised by them directly and indirectly at the ballot box. But, only half of the Texas electorate registered to vote take part in the system.

If we are to successfully address the policy issues in this state and nation, we must first address the issues of voter apathy and voter disinterest. We must aggressively and emphatically attack the conven-

niently and popularly held political fictions that government is not responsive to the people, and that one individual vote does not make a difference in the outcome of an election. I characterize these as political fictions, because we know they simply are not true.

Television has brought us amazing footage from around the world. Pictures that prove that the economic and political philosophy of this country - our country - is intellectually, emotionally and spiritually preferred. In 1989 we observed the dissolution of a communist Soviet Union. Shortly thereafter, we witnessed the citizens of East and West Germany tearing down the Berlin wall. This very year we were spectators to the most inspiring elections in history as the citizens of South Africa went to the ballot box to vote in the first open, free, and all-

race election in their history. And who can forget the record number of people turning out to vote in Mexico. In each case, these countries used our government as their prototype. Ultimately, they want what you and I have - a voice in government.

Individuals with practically little or no political portfolio and of modest means have altered the course of history and changed the world in which they lived. It is indisputable that measures such as civil rights, voting rights and equal rights have radically changed the power individuals have to change the community and ultimately the country in which they live. Mohandas Ghandi in India, Dr. Martin Luther King and Caesar Chavez in the United States, and Nelson Mandela in South Africa changed the world in which they lived through their ac-

tions. The common denominator in each case was determination. Determination to have a voice in their government and consequently a voice in their day to day lives.

You have a voice in government. A government for the people and by the people. Declining to exercise your voice in that system leads to a passive surrender to the status quo. If you find a failing within your government, take a good look at your activity in its process, and when you find a flaw in it address it on the next election day at the ballot box. Your vote is your voice.

Lack of participation is not confined to Texas. It's a national problem. Let your voice be heard at all levels of government. Dwight D. Eisenhower said it best, "There is nothing wrong with America that the faith, love of freedom, intelligence and energy of her citizens cannot cure."

Voting dates to remember are as follows:

October 9 - Last day to register in person to vote in the November 8 General Election.

Last day a voter who has moved to a different election precinct within the county may submit a transfer of registration to be eligible to vote in the precinct of their new residence.

October 11 - A voter registration application postmarked by this date is timely for the November 8 General Election.

October 19 - First day to vote early in person.

November 1 - Last day for early voting clerk to receive an application to vote by mail.

November 4 - Last day to vote early in person.

November 8 - Election Day - 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. the polls are open.

November 10 - First day Commissioners Court may canvass votes of the election.

Center to observe domestic violence awareness

The Panhandle Crisis Center will be observing Domestic Violence Awareness Month throughout October.

It was in 1984, that a group of concerned Perryton citizens saw a need for a crisis center to aid victims of domestic violence and sexual abuse. These citizens were instrumental in establishing the Panhandle Crisis Center which now serves approximately 21,000 people in Hansford, Ochiltree, and Lipscomb counties of the Texas Panhandle.

The PCC has previously averaged serving approximately 30 women and 45 children per year in the shelter. In August 1984, the shelter housed 8 women and ten children.

The PCC is funded by the Department of Human Services, a VOCA grant, and donations from the various communities and individuals.

The PCC offers the following services free of charge for victims: shelter, 24-hour telephone hotline, emergency transportation, counseling, help in getting legal aid, advocacy, and help with seeking employment.

The PCC staff would like to thank the people of Hansford County for their support. It is only through your generosity that we are able to strive for goal which is to stop the cycle and bring an end to family violence and sexual abuse in our society.

Museum Musings

The Vietnam Memorial at the Stationmaster's House Museum is most impressive. Red and black drapery surround paper rubbings of Hansford County boys' names direct from the Vietnam Wall in Washington, D.C., where the names of our casualties of the Vietnam War are listed. Juanita Pierce designed the display.

Rosa Roberts and Karen Hardey, daughters of J.L. and Juanita Pierce went to the Wall to obtain the rubbings, papers put over the stone and rubbed with pencils to show an imprint of the names. The search orders they obtained to find our Hansford County sons, calculator tapes with the boys' names and where their names are located on the Wall, are also included in the case.

A brochure from the Vietnam Wall says, "In Honor of the men and women of the Armed Forces of the U.S. who served in the Vietnam War. The names of those who gave their lives and of those who remain missing are inscribed in the order they were taken from us." Contributions of seven million dollars made the construction of the Wall possible.

Juanita Pierce is currently gathering pictures of the boys we lost to put in the display.

The Moving Wall, a one half size replica of the Vietnam Wall, will be on display at Llano East in Amarillo, October 15 through October 21. It will be open 24 hours a day. The entrance is visible at 24th and Arthur. Admission is free. Donations will be accepted.

According to Dory Lacy, general manager of Llano Cemetery, the Moving Wall is six feet tall and 254 feet long. All the names of the lost in Vietnam are on the replica. Their names will be read aloud during the week. The structure is as close to the original as it can be without using marble material to construct it.

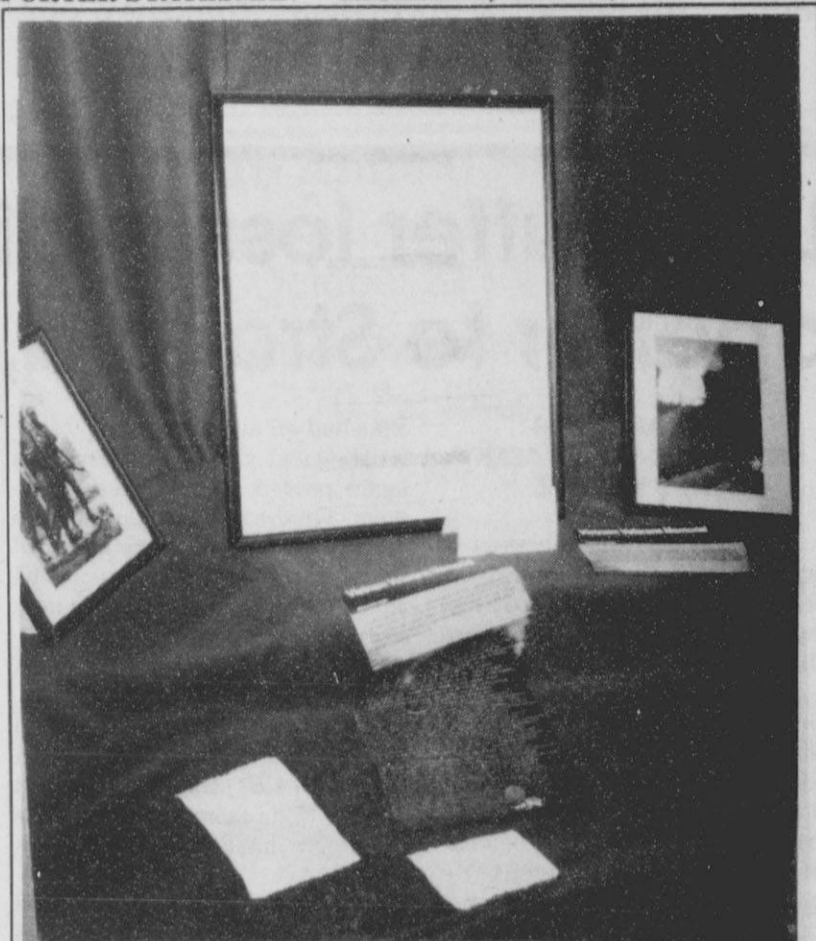
Youth Day at the Moving Wall will be Tuesday and Wednesday, October 18 and 19.

Mrs. Chris (Melyn) Johnson of the Oslo Community has sent us copies of two Guymon newspaper articles on the killing of George Aitkin in 1907 and one on the release of Mr. Simmons on bond. The Guymon Democrat and the Guymon Herald both agreed that the killing happened on a Sunday morning and was caused by Aitkin's hogs being in J. M. Simmons' alfalfa field. The Democrat was not as partisan toward Aitkin as the Herald, but it said that Simmons had a fiery temper. Quoting from the Herald:

"Sympathy appears to be with the dead man, but that doesn't avail him much, just now. Simmons does not seem to be the most popular man on earth with his neighbors. His disposition borders on arrogance, and his reported nature is petulant. The dead man has the reputation of being a peaceable and inoffensive fellow, but at the same time possessing enough temper to command respect for his wishes when it became necessary to press his demand".

Both papers reported that Aitkin had gone back to Scotland for a visit

and the birth of a child had taken place.

There was agreement that Aitkin was shot in the neck and died instantly. The Democrat was more graphic--"the shot taking effect in the neck tearing his head nearly from his shoulders."

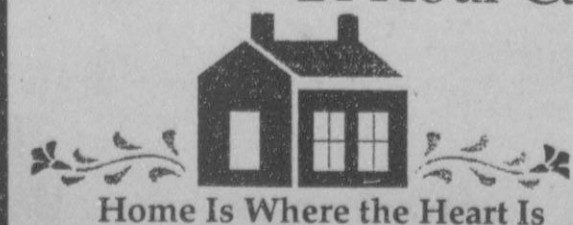
The Democrat added these extra details--that the only witness was Simmons' thirteen year old son, who was also armed; that "After the shooting, Simmons would not let Aitkin's friends touch his body until he had some of his own men view the remains. His idea was most probably to have witnesses to the fact that Aitkin was armed and trespassing." And that Simmons has a wife and several children. Mrs. Simmons is liked by all her acquaintances who express deep sympathy with her over the trouble that has entered her home."

The third article was from the Guymon Democrat, July 11, 1907, page 6, Mr. J. M. Simmons was released on an \$8000 bond, signed by Messrs. Powers and Andrews, pending the hearing of the grand jury. Mr. Simmons secured them with cash.

Lynx suffer loss in district opener to Stratford, 34-15

After anticipating the start of district all year, the Spearman Lynx were sadly disappointed last Friday, as they lost to the Stratford Elks, 34-15.

At first, the game started off very normal; no hint that it was going to be a blow-out. Spearman held the Elks to 20 yards on 5 carries, which was capped off by a blistering hit on the Elk's top running back Clint Vincent by Spearman's Clay Neff. The hit came on a fourth-and-one play, but thanks to Neff, the Elks were forced to punt.

Spearman fans soon got a taste of how the night was going to go soon after the punt. After 2 great runs by Wilkerson on the option for 10 yards, tragedy struck once again for the third week in a row for Spearman. Just like Perryton, Fritch, and now Stratford, a confusion in the back field forced a Lynx turnover early in the quarter.

Fortunately, the Lynx defense, as well as a holding penalty on the Elks, held Stratford to just 3 plays, and they were forced to punt back to Spearman.

However, it was in the cards for Stratford to score early. After several mis-understandings between Chad Wilkerson and his receivers, Oscar Baeza stepped out of his hole to make 20 yard touchdown interception for Stratford. Baeza went on to kick the extra point, and the

Elks had an early lead, 7-0.

The next drive for Spearman again proved to be a disappointment. On the Lynx first play of the drive, the Elks forced a cough-up of the ball, and Baeza quickly pounced on it. This led to Stratford's next score.

This time the Elk's head coach Brad Thiessen used his main back, Vincent, who took the draw and ran 30 yards to give Stratford another score with 4:52 still left in the first quarter. The extra point was wide to the right, but Stratford was dominating 13-0.

The Lynx next drive included several plays and anything from penalties to incomplete passes. Spearman running backs Brent Collins, Shawn Moore, and Jermy Blan all ran for hard earned yardage, but they, along with the rest of the Lynx offense, could not seem to click, and their possession ended, as well as the quarter, with an early lead for Stratford. Elks 13 Lynx 0.

As the second quarter began, the Lynx had an hopeful burst of luck. On Stratford's second play of the quarter, the option failed, as Stratford fumbled to Jarrod Huddlestone with 11:22 left in the second quarter.

Spearman counted on Moore and Sanders to give the Lynx their first score. Unfortunately, their efforts were not enough, and Spearman was forced to punt the ball away.

Stratford, determined to rub Spearman's nose in the dirt, scored again in this quarter. This time

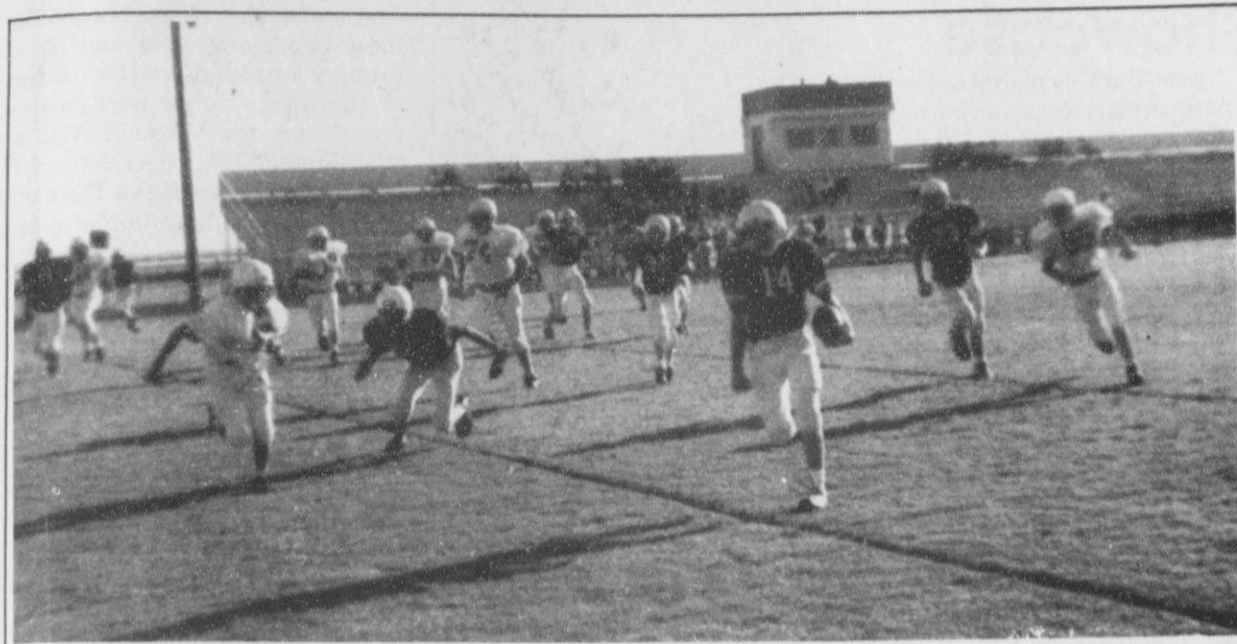

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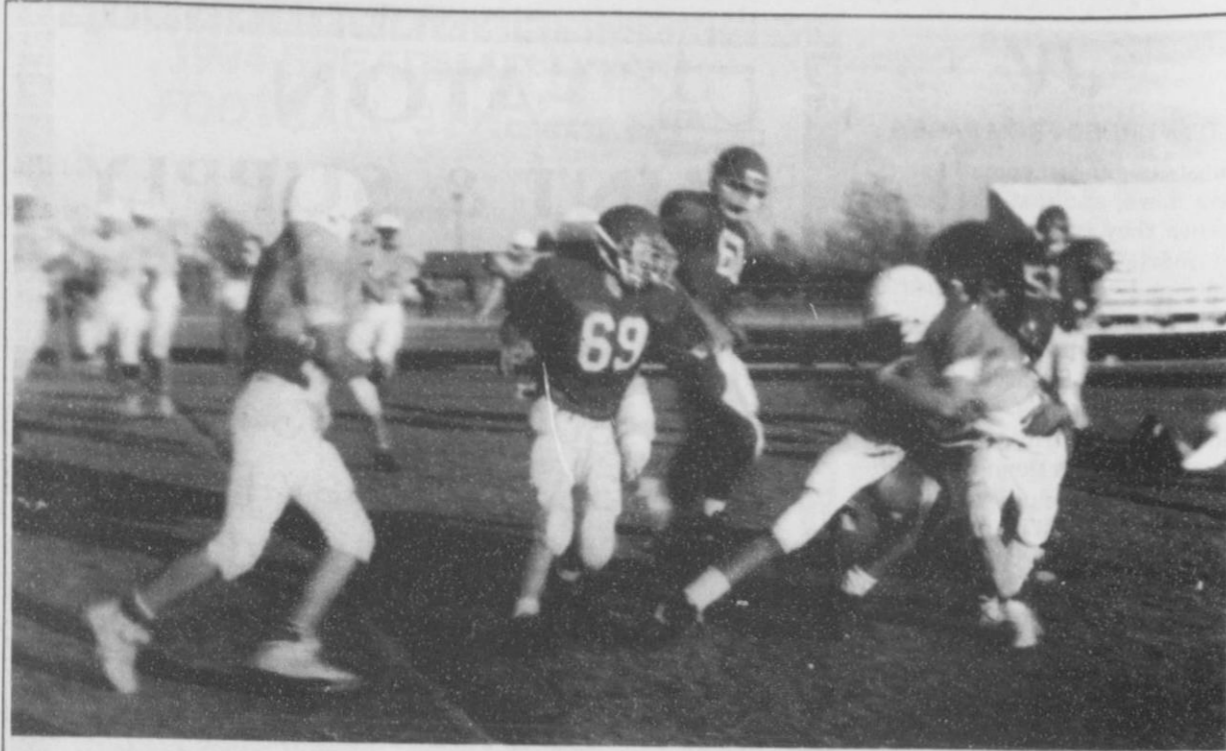

Greyhounds open district play with a 46-0 BR romp

Yes, the Gruver Greyhounds came into their game this past Friday night October 7 at Boys Ranch against the Roughriders as a 24-point favorite according to the Harris Rating System, and an 18-point favorite according to Jim Lexa of the Amarillo Daily News. Everyone thought they'd win big - including myself - I had them picked favorably 33-0. But no one quite expected the extent of that domination.

The 46-0 victory over the Roughriders gives the Hounds a season record of 5-1, 1-0 in district 1-AA play. They have recorded three consecutive shutouts, and in their last four games they have outscored the opposition 156-6. The Hounds have given up 53 yards rushing, total, in their last three games, including -6 yards rushing to Boys Ranch. Over three games, that is an average of only 17.6 yards gained rushing per game. Their defense is simply playing awesome. They had four blocked punts against the Ranch, and totally dominated the game, giving up only 27 yards of total offense.

The only competition for excellence right now for the Hounds defense comes from the Hound Sound Marching Band, which performed impeccably, as usual. They are looking for a "one" rating in the Marching Band Contest Saturday October 22 at Borger. Darby Johnson, Manuel Morales, and Wesley Miser will have a trio, and will perform one song.

Gruver's offense came alive again, despite the loss of starting

Gruver's offense came alive again, despite the loss of starting running back Jarrod Hoel, who was in the game for just one play. The Hounds had 173 yards rushing and five touchdowns on 44 carries; and the two quarterbacks were 8-12 with one interception for 209 yards and 2 touchdowns. In total offense the Hounds out-gained the Roughriders 382-27. What a superb effort!

The seven touchdowns - Wylee Maupin, Travis Ferguson, Jace Dawson, Bailey Barkley, Eric Wright, Aaron Frick, and Daniel Bort. Nothing was lacking in this all around effort for the Hounds.

"Our defense played superb," said Hounds Head Coach Doug Frick Saturday morning. "Our defense was the key. It was team defense. Everybody shined. Whoever we put out there got the job done."

"They love to play defense," added Hounds Defensive Coordinator Lonnie Burnam. "Their confidence is getting a little stronger each week. In the fourth quarter, we had nine subs in on defense, and they did not give an inch."

The offense also shined. According to Coach Frick, "Our offensive line just keeps getting better each week."

But it was the defense that dominated. "Our secondary makes it easy for the up-front people," said Coach Burnam. Coach John Duncan interjected, "Our up-front

people make it easy for the secondary." Coach Burnam concluded, "If one person gets a hit, then everyone's adrenaline gets going. They feed off each other."

In the first quarter, the Hounds took a 7-0 lead, as Wylee Maupin caught a deflected 9-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Jace Dawson, and Aaron Frick booted the extra point. The pass was intended for Eric Wright in the end zone, but the ball hit Wright high in the chest area and ricocheted off, and Maupin dove and made the reception.

Gruver added 14 more points in the second quarter to take a 21-0 halftime lead. Travis Ferguson had a one-yard plunge to make it 13-0; then Dawson had a nice 5 yard scamper, and quarterback Jace Dawson hit Maupin on a great pass in the end zone for the 2 point conversion, to make it 21-0.

In the third quarter, the Hounds made it 27-0. Barkley bulled in from one yard out on the quarterback sneak.

And in the fourth quarter, the Hounds scored three times for 19 points. Wright caught a nice 13-yard pass from Bailey Barkley; Frick had a beautiful 30-yard run for the next touchdown; and Daniel Bort capped the scoring with a 45 yard dash up the middle and to the right - thanks to the offensive line which opened a gaping hole. Bort, who is listed at 5'4" and 120 pounds, the smallest member of the team, was toted high in the air by Dawson following the touchdown, with enthusiasm. It is a psychological boost when he scores, and this was his third touchdown this year.

Final score was 46-0. Here are some stats. The Hounds out-gained the Ranch 173 to -6 in yards rushing; and 209-33 in yards passing. 382-27 in total offense.

Bort had 3 carries for 51 yards with one TD; Frick 12-46 with one TD; Ferguson 12-42 with one TD; Dawson 13-23 with one TD; Barkley 3-7 with one TD; and Hoel 1-4.

Dawson was 3-4 passing for 66 yards and one TD; and Barkley was 5-9 passing, with one interception, for 143 yards and one TD.

Maupin caught 3 passes for 99 yards (and he caught a two point conversion) and one TD; Wright caught 4 passes for 83 yards and one TD; and Joe Bravo caught one pass for 27 yards.

In first downs, it was all Hounds, 20-4. Can they possibly do more to dominate a game?

Coach Frick talked about the loss of Hoel, who suffered a knee injury. "Jarrod called this afternoon (Saturday) and they're going to wait 10 days, and retest the knee. He may still have surgery, but regardless, according to the doctor, he will be out of football for the year. That is a big loss."

Coach Frick also scouted the Elks, this week's opponent. "They are pretty good - very balanced. They pass and run. T.D. Baskin is their quarterback. Clint Vincent and Oscar Baeza are the running backs. Dusty Stewart is a good

receiver. They like to run the option, with Vincent, of course. Julian Licon is a good center, and they have a good offensive line. Lawrence Aguilar is a good tackle. They run out of the split back and I formation."

The game between the Hounds and the Stratford Elks is set this Friday, October 14, at 7:30 P.M. at Greyhound Stadium in Gruver.

Stratford threw the pigskin 12 times, but they only had 3 completions for 37 yards. Spearman had 1 interception, by Goodman, while Stratford was unable to pick any of Spearman's passes. The Lynx also had 3 fumble recoveries, Clement, Varnon, and Josh Bynum all recovered fumbles, compared to only 2 by Stratford.

Individually, Dominguez ran the ball 25 times for 134 yards, which averaged for 5.4 yards per carry. Beedy was second with 12 carries for 55 yards, with an average of 4.6 per carry. Goodman, who was third, carried the ball only 3 times, but managed 40 yards, which brings him to the team leader on average with 13.3 yards per carry. 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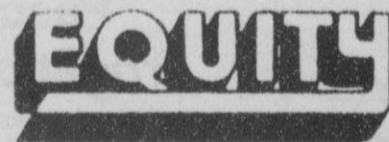
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For The Sport Of It

history, and the big victory, 46-0, and the Hounds are now 5-1, 1-0 in district play. Would you believe against the Roughriders the Hounds had seven touchdowns scored by seven different players!? Wylee Maupin, Travis Ferguson, Bailey Barkley, Jace Dawson, Eric Wright, Aaron Frick, and Daniel Bort scored TD's.

It is time to turn our attention to an awesome ball game coming up this week, Friday, October 14 at Greyhound Stadium in Gruver. The Stratford Elks will be here at 7:30 P.M., 5-1, 1-0 in district play, fresh off their big victory over the Spearman Lynx, 34-15, at Stratford this past week.

How have the Stratford Elks fared against the Gruver Greyhounds throughout history? The Hounds are 15-21-1 (.419), and this is the 38th meeting between these two schools in the past 41 years. Stratford has dominated in recent years, winning big routs in many cases. But last year, the Elks were favored big, and the Hounds turned in their finest performances of the year at Stratford, losing only 14-11 in a game they should have won. Jace Dawson had a fine game, as I remember.

The last time the Hounds beat Stratford was way back in 1988, and they have lost five straight to the Elks. The victory in 1988 was the opening game of the year, and a huge surprise, as the Elks were favored by 2 touchdowns. Junior Ramon Ortega came out of nowhere and rushed for 240 yards, as the Hounds pulled the 28-14 upset in Greyhound Stadium. The next week, against Turpin, Ortega rushed for 222 yards. Was he ever

a big surprise! The Hounds started 6-1 that year, 1988, but failed to make the playoffs, and it was very disappointing. The Hounds finished 6-3-1.

The next year, 1989, was even more disappointing, as Ortega didn't play as a senior, and the Hounds went 3-6, including a season-opening 16-0 loss at Stratford. In 1990, the Hounds lost to the Elks 40-0, in 1991, 35-7, and in 1992, 32-0. Not much luck against the Elks, out-scored 137-18 the last five years, with five losses!

But this year is another story. The Hounds, unbelievably, have three straight shutouts, and have given up only six points in their last four games! They have outscored the opposition during the span 156-6!

Meanwhile, the Elks have not been patsies, as they have won five straight games since a season-opening loss to the number one ranked class A team in the state, Sudan, 49-7. West Texas lost to Sudan this past week, 53-6. Stratford has up-ended Dalhart 19-14, White Deer 47-6, Wellington 48-6, Wheeler 29-14, and Spearman 34-15, in succession.

A comparative score can be made with Wheeler, whom the Hounds beat 14-7 at Wheeler. (Stratford played Wheeler and beat them 29-14 in a home game.) It would be Stratford over Gruver 15-7, or perhaps 21-13. Take away points from Stratford for home field advantage against Wheeler, and take away points from Stratford for home field disadvantage against the Hounds. At three points for each, it now becomes Stratford over Gruver 14-12, or perhaps 22-20.

I think the Hounds defense is truly awesome and can hold Clint Vincent, Oscar Baeza and company to one touchdown, like Sudan did. I think their offense has unrealized potential this year, while recognizing their big wins over Highland Park, Booker and Boys Ranch, especially their passing attack. The Hounds passing attack did click against the Roughriders. The Hounds will be fired up. Gruver, in a big upset, 22-7. The fact that they win is not so much the upset. It is that they win by 15, that is the upset.

This is the stepping stone game for the Hounds - the one that will really propel them towards the playoffs. Believe it!

A victory would make Coach Frick's winning percentage an even .600, third best in Hounds history, closer and closer to Coach Corky Chapman's .623 and second place. A loss would drop Coach Frick back into fourth place all-time, behind Coach Austell Burris.

The district 1-AA cross country meet will be held at Stratford Country Club, on Monday October 24 at 4 P.M. Coach Steve Myatt is really pleased with the effort last week at Wheeler, as the Lady Hounds garnered 5th place, and he is looking forward to the district meet. "Tisha Ralston is still not running," said Coach Myatt, "and we lost Molly - she was our fifth runner last year, and she was the difference between our going to state, and not going last year - without Molly, we wouldn't have gone to Austin." Last year, Myriam Alvarez finished a

ASC Industries offers services for residents

ASC Industries, Perryton is a community service agency that many folks should be aware of. You or someone you know may need the help of ASC now or in the future.

Mentally retarded residents of Perryton and surrounding areas which include Hansford County which have used ASC are living more productive and independent lives than they would if they had not known about the ASC Industries services.

Mental retardation is evident in all levels of society and can occur in any family at any time. A person who has mental retardation is more like you than different from you. Mental retardation is not mental illness, but a slowness in one's ability to learn. About 75% of adults with mental retardation could become self-supporting with the proper training, which is most beneficial when begun in infancy. However, many of those who are now teens and adults were not provided with such training in their early years. Thus, intensive social and vocational training for these people, as adults, is necessary.

The Amarillo State Center is a state facility that provides services for those of all ages who have retar-

dation and who live in the Texas Panhandle. The Perryton Workshop is this area's branch of the State Center and provides training for competitive retardation. Services are provided at the workshop according to the needs and goals of each person. Training is done on an individual basis in an effort to challenge each person's vocational skills. While developing vocational skills, each worker in the workshop is paid for the work he produces. Local contracts currently produced are picnic packs for catering services, restaurants, reunions, parties, and celebrations. Paper shredding, pintag assembly, and caring for the planters on Main Street are others.

The workshop is located at 1701 S. Jefferson and provides services not available from any other community agency. It is open five days a week from 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. If you need help or other information, please phone 435-4970. Carolyn Thurman, workshop director or assistant, Karen Peters, would be glad to discuss services with you. The staff are also available to present programs to interested groups or clubs by appointment.

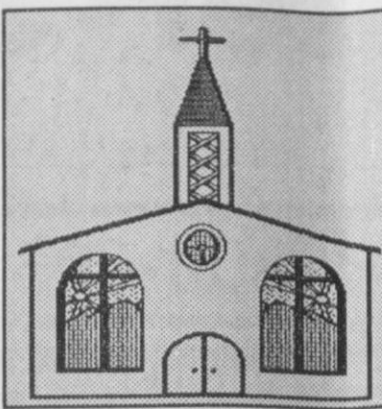

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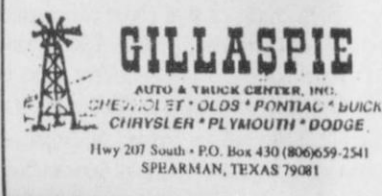
