# shows county business up

City sales tax rebates from the month of April to the month of May from the State Comptoller's office Gruver show that business was

In the April sales tax rebates, the City of Gruver received a check for \$3,991.85 while in May the city received \$3.590.82. Spearman received a check for \$13,358.13 in April, while in May the city received \$16,420.27.

Gruver's April city sales tax rebate was up 36.28% from the \$2,929.26 which was received in April 1991, while the May rebate was down 6.36% from the \$3,834.65 received in May of 1991.

Spearman's receipts for April showed a 22.81% increase from the April 1991 receipts of 10,876.87. to Spearman show that business The May receipts also showed an was up, while sales tax rebates to increase from the 1991, although it was only an increase of 0.59% from the \$16,323.33 rebate check.

Payments to Gruver have totaled \$20,672.66, up 13.54% from the 1991 payments to date, which was \$18,206.59. Spearman's payments to date (\$76,531.53) were also up. However, they are only up 9.82% from the 1991 rebates of \$69,685.13.

Statewide, State Comptroller John Sharp said that sales tax rebates to Texas cities and counties totaled \$9.9 million for the month of April, up 8.1% over last April's rebate of \$9.2 million.

In May State Comptroller Sharp said that sales tax rebates to texas cities and counties totaled \$150.8 million, a 4.3 % increase over pay ments received in 1991

Texas cities received \$136.6 million. This is a 4.2% increase from the \$131.1 million received in rebate checks last year.

Counties received a total of \$14.2 million in May rebates. This years rebate checks were a 5.2% increase over the May 1991 rebates which totaled \$13.5 million.


# Bort to live in Italy


At 9 a.m. merchants along Main Street and along 7th street open their doors and moved out onto the sidewalk for a sidewalk sale.

Extension Agent THE COST OF GETTING MARRIED

The summer months are just as popular for wedding today as they were in the good old days. But the price tag on today's weddings has nothing in common with the good old days. Today, the average cost of a formal wedding has soared to

The dilemma facing young couples planning to pay for most weddings themselves is that they face many other expenses at the same time. Home furnishings, automobile loans, student loans and new wardrobes can drain the budget, even when there are two earners. Squeezing in the wedding expenses is a major challenge. And with a wedding, expenses generally must be paid immediately, not stretched out, unless the couple has borrowed money to finance the wedding. With today's costs, financing a wedding on time can be a burdensome as an extra car payment.

The money squeeze means that the couples must make some "wedding affordability" decisions and then shop carefully to get the best value for the goods and services

they plan to purchase. Those who plan to get married should consult couples who have been married a year or two for advice on realistic ways to make the wedding more affordable.

First, decide what is most important, where you are willing to spend the most money and where you are willing to spend the least. If the reception location is the most important aspect of the wedding, then identify ways to economize on other items that are less important. Prepare a written budget for the wedding expenses. Figure out from the onset where the money will come from to pay expenses. Keep tabs on bills to avoid "cost over-runs."

Formal gowns are expensive so some brides are renting instead of buying. The difference between a \$75 rental fee and a \$750 purchase price represents substantial savings. Rental fees will vary, depending upon the original price of the gown and the size of the community. Another purchasing alternative is to buy from a consignment shop that sells previously worn



# Spiritually Speaking


A few weeks ago I had the opportunity to visit the remains of the homes of the Anasazi Indians in New Mexico, homes that were built and abandoned centuries before Columbus encountered the New World. Here in this place there once was a great city, but with the passage of time it disappeared. It caused me to pause and consider how God not only gives us the gift of life but also the gift of time in which we live our lives. Whether our years be long or short, God gives us this time in which to live and enjoy his creation. As Ecclesiastes 3, 11 says: "He had made everything beautiful in its

Yet it seems that there is a modern fetish to escape the limitations of time. We want everything instant: instant coffee, instant communications, instant pleasure. We have a great deal of trouble waiting in lines. Even the Concorde, which can whisk us across the ocean from New York to Paris in a few hours, is too slow. We go much too fast to pause and smell the flowers, to linger a while and enjoy God's creation

Yet, as we read in Scripture (Eccl. 3, 1 ff): "There is a time for everything, and a season for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven: a time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to uproot, a time to kill and a time to heal, a time to tear down and a time to build, a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance..." We misuse one of God's greatest gifts if we use time only to pack it full with our multitudinous activities and never pause to thank God for giving us time.

During these summer months it would seem that God gives us a chance to slow down a bit and enjoy more, his many gifts. For many people summer really begins (no matter what astronomers say) when school is out and ends when school begins again. The days are longer, the warm breezes beckon, the smell of growth surrounds us. Summertime is a time for families to spend more time with each other. Perhaps now families can take more time to discover God's riches in creation together, and as they do so, they will also have the time to discover each other better. It can happen in the rapidity in which we live our lives that members of a family really don't know one another. It takes time to know another person. How many whirlwind courtships end in whirlwind di-

Let's slow ourselves up a little this summer, and take more time to reflect. We need to take time to know God and to know one another. It was only "when the time has fully come," did God send "his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to redeem those under law, that we might receive the full rights of sons" (Gal. 4, 4-5). It took God time to prepare the world for the coming of his Son. We too have to take time to prepare for God's coming to us. When he comes the gift of time, precious as it is, will pass into timelessness, and we will be fulfilled for "He has set eternity in the hearts of men" (Eccl. 3, 11).







Local bass anglers are discovering the joy of trying to solve the mystery of catching bass during something called post spawn. Anglers who last week could easily catch a limit of quality bass now return with empty live wells. (Note the paltry results of recent tournaments at Meredith and Greenbelt.)

dresses and gowns at a fraction of the purchase cost. Some garments may be new-a result of cancelled wedding plans.

The size of the wedding will affect total cost. Having fewer attendants lowers the cost of flowers and gifts. Having fewer guests lowers the cost of the reception.

Comparison shop on printing costs, contracts with caterers and reception sites, florists, photographers and other goods and services. Use the summer flowers at the ceremony and reception. Consider the least expensive time of day for a reception. Afternoon tea receptions are less costly than full meals. Use family cars instead of rented limos. Keep photography costs down by contracting with the best photographer, but taking the least expensive options offered. Supplement the photography by providing friends with film purchased in bulk to take candid photos.

One way of managing costs is to delay the wedding trip until cash flow is re-established. Couples should plan for wedding costs that fit within the budget so that married life does not begin with major debt from wedding expenses.
