Defeat Stratford 35 - 7...

Lynx win District 1-2A crown

The Spearman Lynx wrapped up the number one spot in District 1-2A Friday night at Stratford by beating

It was a tough defense and and explosive passing that gave the Lynx their victory. The Lynx defense stopped the Elks offense inside the Lynx 20 yard line three times in the first

The first time the Elks took advantage of a Lynx fumble and moved the ball to the Lynx 8 yard line, where they had a first-and-goal-to-go. The defense held the Elks out of the end zone, stopping a 4th-and-1 yard to goal for no gain.

In the second quarter Chad Riggins put a stop to two other Stratford drives by recovering a fumble on the Lynx 11 vard line and intercepting a pass on the Lynx 15 yard line.

Despite the efforts of the Lynx

defense the Elks managed to put together a drive in the first quarter and score the first touchdown of the

In the second quarter the Lynx of-fense began to get on track and move the ball. The Lynx put together an 80 yard scoring drive on their second possession of the second quarter. Khris Kelp got it started with a pass to Chris Strawn for 16 yards. Kelp would go on to have his best passing night of the whole season.

After the pass completion, the twopronged Lynx running attack began to run over the Elk defense. Tim Dooley and Brian Beck added to their "better than 1,000 yard seasons" by gaining 10 yards or more every time they ran the ball. Dooley ended the drive by running last 16 yards for the TD. Kelp completed his third pass of the night to Strawn, to make the score 8-7 with five minutes left in the half.

The third time the Lynx offense got the ball in the second quarter, there were 10 seconds on the clock. They were on their own 43 yard line. You would think that the Lynx would be happy to go into the half with their

8-7, one-point lead.
But no-o-o!! When you find a passing game for the first time all season, why not give it a real test? The Lynx did just that. First, Dooley took a pitch from Kelp and rolled out to right. He pulled up and let go with a 30 yard pass to Riggins. Riggins caught the ball over an Elk defender along the right sideline.

On the next play Kelp threw to Riggins, who crossed into the end zone with no time left on the clock. The extra point kick was missed, to put Spearman ahead at the half 14-7.

In the second half the Spearman defense stayed and the offense continued to score. The Lynx defense let the Elks cross their 40 yard line only one time. On that one time, the Lynx forced and recovered an Elk fumble on the Lynx 10 yard line. Brian Kid-der recovered the fumble.

The Lynx offense scored three TDs in the second half, two of them in the third quarter and one in the fourth

Brandon Vanderburg scored on a 52 yard run from scrimmage for the first second half TD. The Lynx faked the extra point kick and Kelp hit Cody Pipkin for the 2-point PAT.

Dooley scored the next Lynx TD, carrying the ball in from the 3 yard line. Brandon Rex kicked the extra

point to make the score 29-7.

Beck put the last points on the scoreboard when he ran 3 yards for a fourth quarter TD. The PAT kick failed and the score remained 35-7 'til time ran out.

The Lynx' next challenge is the Bidistrict game against Panhandle, at Borger. The kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m. Panhandle defeated the Lynx earlier in the year.

Gruver CC headed for state

The Gruver Lady Hounds cross country team earned its third straight trip to the state meet in Georgetown by finishing second at the 1A Regional meet on Saturday.

Cora Meyer posted her best time on the difficult Mae Simmons Park course to finish second overall and lead the Gruver team. Coach Steve Myatt reported that it was the first time Cora had beaten the first place runner from Claude.

Myatt went on to praise the effort by third spot Gruver finisher, Monica Ward. "She ran her best race ever," said Myatt, "She stepped up and helped us." He was referring to the fact that the team's usual third spot runner, Tisha Ralston, had a sore knee. Despite the sore knee, Myatt said, Ralston passed two Guthrie runners in the last 50 meters of the

Gruver will be joined by Claude, who finished first in the race, and Guthrie at the state meet. Gruver beat Guthrie by only seven points.

Other Gruver runners contributing to the team finish were Kasey Davis, second place on the team and 11th overall; Julic Meyer, fourth place team and 24th overall; Brendi Brown, 5th place team and 25th overall; Ralston, sixth place team and 27th overall; and Holly Venneman, seventh place team and 56th

Myatt said that the Gruver girls, will have to beat the same Claude and Guthrie teams if they want to

repeat as State 2A champions again. The race will be held at the Southwesten University Golf Course in Georgetown. It will start at 10 a.m. on Saturday.

Myatt expects the team to leave Gruver on Thursday, about 8:30 a.m., and drive to Abilene. They will work out there that afternoon and leave for Austin the next day

Myatt expects that, with the exception of Ralston's sore knee, his team will be in the best shape of the season. "Everybody is peaking just right for this race," he said. If something does happen to one of his seven starting runners, he feels he can rely on his alternate runner, Tracy Crawford, to fill in.

SISD board discusses renovations needed by junior high building

Borger on Friday, Nov. 15 to decide the bi-district championship.

The Spearman school board of trustees, at their regular meeting on Monday night, discussed what possible changes will have to made in the Spearman Junior High building to make the upstairs more handicap accessible and safer in case of fire.

Larry Butler, Spearman ISD superintendent, reported the board was apprised that the junior high building would need to be altered to conform to state codes. The alterations would need to allow for alternate escape routes from the second floor in case of fire. The second floor would also need to be made more accessible to handicapped students.

Butler concluded by saying that the board discussed what might be done, the cost and where the money might come from, but that no action on the matter was taken.

In further business the board heard reports from Holly Simpson and Wynette Mullins. Simpson, of Brown, Graham and Co., delivered the SISD 1990-1991 audit report to the board. According to Butler, she reported that the audit looked fine.

Mullins reported on the progress of the district's Gifted and Talented Student program. Butler indicated that she stated that the program was fully operational from Kindergarten through 12th grade.

Butler reported that the board met in closed executive session for a while. During the session the board discussed the administrative personnel evaluations and student discipline problems. Butler indicated that the discussion of administrative personnel was part of the yearly general procedure. Butler indicated that the student disciplinary discussion dealt with a specific event that occurred, and general discipline in the SISD schools

The open meeting was reconvened and no action was taken by the board on the matters discussed in closed session, according to Butler.

Butler reported that during his report to the board he updated them on preliminary results from the monitoring and compliance visit by TEA last month. He stated that it went well and that the district received only a few minor downgrades. He expected that a more complete and final report will be available in December.

Butler further reported that his office had received a letter of thanks and appreciation from Cal Farley's Boys Ranch. The letter was to thank SISD maintenance person Tino Ortega, for his help in repairing a bus. The bus broke down on the night of the Spearman and Boys Ranch football game.

The board was informed that the specifications for the new science classroom laboratory furnishings would be ready next month. He

Gruver Independent School District will not have to borrow money to remain operational through the end of the year, according to Superintendent Tom Cathey.

School loard members had feared the district would need to borrow money because funds had not been received from the county education district before the board's last meeting. But Cathey said that GISD has now received \$128,336.31 from CED 20 and has also received \$40,192,40 in local taxes, along with \$54,913 from the State of Texas through the foundation program.

The GISD Board of Trustees met in regular session Wednesday, Nov. 6 and opened bids for track equipment and supplies. Cathey said the bid was split and awarded to Buck's Sporting Goods of Amarillo and Sports Connection of Liberal, Kan.

The district's Educational Improvement Committee had previousdrawn up goals and a mission statement for the district. At the meeting, Cathey presented the district goals and mission, which the board accepted. Cathey noted that a copy of the goals and mission is on file in the principal's office on each campus, and in his office. The copies are available for public review. The board had its first reading of

TASB Policy FFFF, which Cathey explained is a local policy dealing with rules of conduct for students who ride buses, and procedures for discipline of bus students. He said that after adoption, the policy will be added to the 1992-93 student hand-

In executive session, board members discussed the replacement of Bill Duncan, who will retire at the

end of this year as principal of Gruver Junior High School. Other discussion in executive session concerned student discipline.

A staff development plan for 1991-92 was adopted by the board. Cathey explained that the plan allows certain teacher in-service training to be credited.

The board approved TASB Policy Update 40, which Cathey explained as a "cleanup policy due to recent legislation ... tying up some loose

In other business, the board set a flat rate of payment for substitute bus drivers. Previously, said Cathey, a separate rate of payment was in effect for each bus route.

Approval was given to adding Angie Clawson's name to the list of approved substitute teachers.

In his report to the board, Cathey said discussion of a possible tuition charge for out-of-district students will probably be on the agenda for the December school board meeting. He said GISD does not currently charge for students attending Gruver schools from outside the district.

The board approved payment of bills in the amount of \$43,845.02, said

September rate at 6.4 percent, compared to the August jobless rate of 6.2 percent. The Texas figure is considered average when compared to all other states, with the national average unemployment rate at exactly 6.4 percent, said TEC Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers.

The monthly rate is up slightly from last month, but that is expected as a result of coming out of the peak summer period of employment. Every major industry sector recorded downturns in September, except government.

Health briefs

HOUSTON - Cervical cancer rates are on the decline because diagnosis and treatment have improved.

"Physicians can now detect abnormal cells in the cervical lining before cancer has time to develop," said Dr. Alan L. Kaplan, an obstetrician and gynecologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Once diagnosed, often through a Pap smear, most of these precancers are easily treated in a physician's office using a laser or a freezing procedure called cryotherapy.

HOUSTON - A new weight-loss publication stresses that fad diets do not work and can create health problems for those caught up in "yo-yo"

The brochure, containing information from nutrition experts at The DeBakey Heart Center of Baylor College of Medicine and The Methodist Hospital in Houston, advocates weight control through good nutrition, good eating habits and regular exercise rather than temporary diet regimens of denial.





Safe Turkey Handling Tips For Holiday Meals

The turkey, the traditional holiday bird, is a tasty, healthy choice for holiday meals. Don't let the risk of foodborne illness from improperly handled turkey spoil the holiday fun.

Turkey is a highly perishable food and requires special handling in thawing, preparation, cooking and storage. Follow these tips on handling turkey safely:

• If shopping in advance is necessary, frozen turkey is the best bet. Look for one that is solidly frozen. Keep it frozen at zero degree or below until ready for thawing. Allow two to three days, depending on the size of the turkey, for thawing in the refrigerator.

 Fresh turkey is highly perishable and should be bought no more than a day or two before cooking. If shopping must be done in advance, a frozen turkey is a better choice.

 In determing what size turkey to buy, allow about one pound per person. This will provide generous servings with enough leftovers for other

 Thawing a frozen turkey in the refrigerator is the preferred method for safety reasons, but you can also thaw it in cold water. The important thing is to keep the turkey cold while thawing to prevent bacterial growth. To thaw in the refrigerator, put the turkey in the original wrap on a tray or in a pan to catch dripping juices. An 8- to 12-pound turkey will take one to two days to thaw; a 16 to 20 pound turkey will take three to four days. For faster thawing, put the turkey package in a water-tight plastic bag and submerge in cold water. Change the water every 30 minutes to keep it cold. Depending on size, this can take from 4 to 12 hours. Do not thaw turkey on the counter. Bacteria can multiply rapidly at room temperature, and outer portions of the turkey may thaw and reach room temperatures before the inside is thawed. Small turkeys can be thawed in the microwave according to the manufacturer's manual instructions, but the turkey should be cooked immediately after thawing.

· Wash the turkey with water inside and out before cooking, removing neck and giblets from the cavity. To prevent spread of bacteria, wash hands, utensils and the sink after contact with the turkey.

· Turkeys stuffed with dressing present special problems because bacteria can easily multiply in the stuffing and cause food poisoning. Cooking stuffing separately is the safest method. But if a stuffed bird is the choice, take special precautions. Never stuff the bird ahead of time; stuff just prior to putting in the oven. Never stuff a bird that will be cooked in the microwave. It may not cook

· Cook turkeys to an internal temperature of 180 degrees to 185 degrees. A meat thermometer can be used to check for doneness. If the turkey is stuffed, check the stuffing for doneness. It should reach at least 165 degrees. When done, remove all stuffing from the bird immediately and put in a separate container. Harmful bacteria is more likely to grow in the stuffing if it sits in the bird after cooking.

· Never partially cook a turkey one day and then complete cooking later. Interrupted cooking increases the possibility of bacterial growth.

· Take care of cooked turkey and stuffing leftovers promptly and properly to prevent the risk of foodborne illness. These foods should not be left at room temperatures for more than two hours because the bacteria that cause illness multiply rapidly at these temperatures. Never store these foods in a warm oven or on the kitchen counter for the next meal. This will encourage bacterial growth.

Divide large quantities of the leftover turkey and stuffing into smaller portions. Store in the refrigerator in several smaller, shallow containers. Leftover cooked poultry will keep in the refrigerator for three or four days. Stuffing and gravy should be used within a day or two. Bring leftover gravy to a rolling boil before serving. Freeze food for longer

• And if plans change - you bought a turkey and then didn't use it remember that frozen turkey can be stored in a freezer at a temperature of zero for up to one year without much loss of quality.



Near the end of the school year, start checking out scholarship options and make appointments to visit colleges during your summer vacation. Start compiling information about yourself so that filling out college application forms will be easier next year.

If you are a senior, January is an important month. Standard application deadlines for many colleges and universities are Jan. 1 and 15, Feb. 1 and 15, and March 1. Parents should organize tax records they will need to complete financial aid forms. File financial aid forms after Jan. 1. Make sure high school guidance offices send transcripts of first semester grades to schools to which you have applied.

Above all, have a game plan for getting into a college or university that interests you. Start early and solicit help from those around you who can provide guidance.







SPS with Cap Rock Southwestern Public Service Com-

pany and Cap Rock Cooperative, Inc. have announced an agreement in which SPS will provide wholesale power to Cap Rock, which serves 17 West Texas counties.

Delivery of electricity under the agreement will become effective upon completion of transmission lines between the two companies, expected in mid-1993.

Cap Rock is headquartered in Stanton, 18 miles northeast of Midland, and serves more than 20,000 customers. SPS is a regional, investor-owned utility serving about 350,000 customers in the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, eastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

Cap Rock will become the 17th rural electrical cooperative to which SPS provides wholesale power.

Cap Rock Director of Power Supply and Regulatory Affairs Steven E. Collier said the agreement with SPS is good news to co-op members.

We constantly seek wholesale power from many sources, searching for the best deal for our customers. Collier said. "Our contract with SPS will result in lower power supply costs and more flexibility."


He said the agreement with SPS will result in lower rates for Cap Rock Electric's consumer-members than would have resulted otherwise.

SMU linebacker is no country bumpkin

Editor's note: The following story is reprinted with permission from the Dallas Times Herald.

Jason Bednarz, inside linebacker for the Southern Methodist University Mustangs, is the son of David and Davida Bednarz of Slaton, Texas. Davida Bednarz, formerly Davida Zoe Vanderburg, graduated from Spearman High School in 1960. Her classmates and friends knew her as "Dee Dee."

Jason is the grandson of Ellzey and Charlotte Vanderburg of Lubbock, and the nephew of Joe and Kim Vanderburg and Ernie and Joyce Vanderburg, all of Spearman; and Dee and Lisa Vanderburg of Moberly, Mo.

The Vanderburg family is very proud of Jason, who stands 6 feet, 2 inches and weighs 235 pounds.

When Jason Bednarz arrived at SMU before the 1989 season, everybody thought the kid from Slaton was nothing but an awshucks, country bumpkin who looked strangely out of place on the Hilltop.

And for a while, Bednarz really did look out of place. He drove an old brown and white pickup truck with a loud, obnoxious muffler. All that was missing were silhouettes of naked women on the mud flaps and a gun rack.

His parents, David and Davida, were cotton farmers from West Texas. They enjoyed a comfortable living but not one that could afford to pay for their son's education at SMU, where tuition costs about \$16,000 a year.

But as the SMU players got to know Bednarz, they realized they shouldn't stereotype him. Bednarz, who originally walked on as a quarterback, quickly proved that just because he is from a small town doesn't mean he isn't as intelligent or as good of an athlete.

In less than three seasons, Bednarz has made the conversion from high school quarterback to accomplished collegiate linebacker. For his first two seasons, Bednarz really wasn't sure what he was doing at linebacker but still finished as the third-leading tackler both years.

This season Bednarz said he is more comfortable at linebacker and

has been playing more on instinct. He leads SMU with 42 solo tackles and 24 assists so far this year, and is one of the reasons the Mustangs' defense is greatly improved. Bednarz has two quarterback sacks for 20 yards, and has logged one fumble recovery, one fumble forced and four

tackles-for-loss for 28 yards.

SMU's defense, previously ranked 24th nationally, has allowed an average of 357.3 yards per game, as compared with last year's average of 466.3 and 546.1 for the year before. In their 31-17 victory over Tulane in New Orleans, the Mustangs (1-6 overall, 0-5 in Southwest Conference play) held the Green Wave to 279 yards, 138 through the first three quarters. It was the third time this season SMU has held an opponent to fewer than 300 yards after accomplishing that

only once the previous two years.

"It used to be Bill Kiely and Cary Brabham who led our team in tackles," SMU coach Tom Rossley said. "Other guys were not making them. But now Kiely is third and Cary is second. Other guys are making the tackles first. Kiely and Cary are the same old players, but they're getting help, and that makes us a

better defense."

Bednarz wanted to help Kiely and Brabham on plays during his first two seasons but often was out of position. There were many evenings when Bednarz would return to his dorm room and complain about making mistakes and not improving.

"He'd come in and say, 'Man, I made this mistake," said center Matt Wisenbaker, who used to be Bednarz' roommate. "I'd tell him, 'Jason, you just started playing defense. Relax. Give it time. You'll

get better."

While many players stayed around campus during the summer to work out and take on odd jobs for spending money, Bednarz went home to help his father with the farm. Summer was always the toughest part of the cotton-growing season, and he would spend hours digging irrigation ditches, applying pesticides and fer-

tilizer, driving the tractor.

After a long, strenuous day, Bednarz would retire to the family's garage, where he stored the weight equipment he had rented for the summer. He always lifted weights and ran to stay in shape.

"He's probably one of the most determined people I know in my life," Wisenbaker said. "He is hardheaded. That's just his way. Someone will tell him he can't do something but he'll do it."

People told Bednarz he was not good enough to play major college football, but he is becoming one of the best linebackers in the Southwest Conference.

People told Bednarz he would not fit in at SMU and that he should go to a school more like himself, say a Texas Tech or West Texas. But Bednarz, a former Mr. Macho at Slaton High School who is affectionately called "Jethro" by his teammates, is on target to graduate from SMU with a degree in marketing and promotions. He also plans to return for graduate school.

Bednarz still drives that old pickup truck around campus. But he is no country bumpkin.







Whooping Crane Poachers Billy Inman of Marble Falls has probably shot his last whooping crane. On August 19, he pleaded guilty to shooting the endangered crane during a spring fishing trip on the Colorado River. The Federal Judge sentenced Inman to serve two months in prison, five years probation, \$10,000 fine, \$8,100 in civil restitution to Texas, 200 hours community service and forteiture of his 12-gauge Winchester Model #12 shotgun. Curtis Sayers is awaiting sentencing for his role in aiding and abetting in the same killing.

During migration, whooping cranes are frequent guests in our area, so please make sure of your target or you might make a tragic mistake. Whoopers are very distinc-

tive large white cranes with black wing tips. The number of whooping cranes sank to a low of 38, but thanks to extensive efforts by sportsmen, federal, and state officials, their numbers have increased to 140 wild

WARNING - You may legally use lead shot during sandhill crane hunting, BUT take a shot at a goose or a duck you will be in violation of the law. Effective this hunting season, only steel shoot can be used for hunting any water fowl in Texas. Cranes are not considered water fowl.

Many hunters report success by using steel shoot that is two sizes bigger than their normal duck load.



The Philippines - How The Spanish Won

The Spanish did not return to the Philippines until 25 years after the death of Magellan; this time, not from Spain but from the west coast of

Many years earlier, the kings of Spain and Portugal had drawn a line around the globe and decided that everything on one side belonged to Spain and the rest of the world to

When Spanish explorers set foot on land in "their half of the world," all they had to do was plant their flag on the beach and say, "I claim this land for Spain." Then, automatically, everything in the land belonged to Spain. It didn't matter how many people already lived and worked there; they no longer had rights to any property except what their conquerors allowed.

The Spanish originally invaded the large northern island of Luzon then spread their empire south into the Visayas A governor was appointed by the king of Spain to rule each

island.

The land was divided into large estates overseen by Spanish families. Each overseer controlled everything within his territory, usually with a small private army of thugs. The natives worked for them and made them wealthy. They kept most of the wealth but passed some up the line to the governor to placate him. He in turn kept most of what he received and passed a little on to Spain to

satisfy the king.

This, basically, was the pattern of rule established in every Spanish colony. Thus, every nation ever ruled by Spain developed a social pattern of corruption and bribery, all property was owned and controlled by a select few; everyone else worked for the elite, usually for wages bordering on
