



The Official Election Returns

Final Figures From Last Tuesday's County Election.

The following table shows the result of the recent county election as canvassed and made official by the Commissioners Court. It will be noted that in the tax assessor's race the Jericho vote is not given for Mr. Baker. He received 14 votes there, but the election officers, through error, failed to show his vote on the returns. There were many other discrepancies, caused by the peculiarities of the Terrell election law, and nearly all the candidates received votes for offices for which they were not running.

OBJECT TO CHRONOMETER

Boys Register Kick at Farmer Using Nature's Time Piece to Work By.

A couple of Clarendon youths had a cotton-picking experience in the Rowe neighborhood recently which will last them for a long time. They had gone to Rowe on the train, and applying for work in the cotton field received employment from a prominent farmer some twelve miles from Rowe. They secured a buggy and drove out, arriving in time to get in half a day in the field. They ate supper by candlelight, retired to bed early and were called for breakfast at 4:30 next morning, the hour they usually applied to "beauty sleep" at home. By the first light of dawn they were picking cotton, and by noon they were hungry—oh, so hungry. One of the boys possessed a watch, and when twelve o'clock showed on the dial thereof he gently called the attention of their employer to the fact that it was time to eat. "Oh, no," said the farmer, "you've got railroad time." And taking a squint at the sun he calmly informed them that by a close calculation he estimated it to be yet an hour and three-quarters until dinner time. This was too much for mortal town-bred youth to stand, consequently a severance of business relationship between the boys and the farmer took place then and there, and they immediately started on the twelve mile "hike" to Rowe, where the prospect of a well-loaded dinner table was as alluring as the smell of bock beer to a Dutchman. The boys finally arrived in Rowe just in time for

supper, and Willie says they were barely able to crawl into the dining room. Death of Sid Moore.

Sid Moore, formerly a highly respected citizen of Clarendon, and father of Mrs. W. H. Cooke, of this city, died suddenly at Dalhart Saturday of apoplexy or something similar thereto.

Mr. Moore on Wednesday left his home in Amarillo in good health, and went to New Mexico where he filed on a claim. He was on his return home and had stopped over in Dalhart because of an enforced change of cars at that point. He was seen and greeted on the streets of Dalhart by numerous old friends, and seemed well and hearty, but a few hours later was found unconscious on the street where he had fallen when attacked by the grim reaper. He was carried to a physician's office and everything done for him that could possibly be thought of, but without avail, and he died the following day without having ever regained his senses. His wife, from Amarillo, was present with him at the end, as were also Mr. and Mrs. Cooke.

The remains were brought to Clarendon for interment, and were laid to rest in the Citizens cemetery Monday morning, burial services having been conducted at the home of W. H. Cooke, Rev. W. P. Dickey officiating, assisted by Rev. Fincher, of Amarillo.

Mr. Moore was about 62 years of age. He was of a kindly, jovial, yet modest and retiring disposition, and numbered his friends by the score. He died a christian, and a member of the Presbyterian church.
