

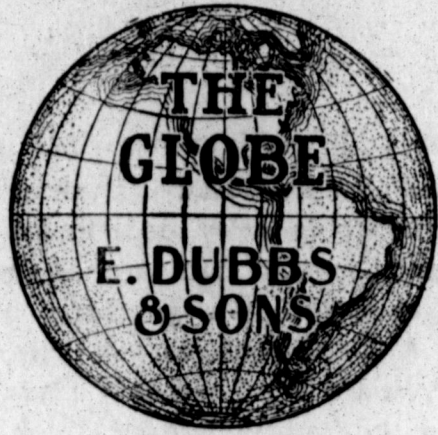

PLANNING IMPROVEMENTS

Local Water and Light Company Expect to Improve Both Branches of the Service.

L. W. Chase, of Cleburne, the biggest stockholder in the Clarendon Water, Light & Power Co., was here one day this week looking into the water and light situation. As stated in these columns some weeks ago the company is planning for some changes in the plant looking to an improvement in the service as well as a cutting down of expenses in operation. Mr. Chase stated that they had in contemplation the erection of a modern standpipe at some point on Clarendon Heights to take the place of the present substitute for a standpipe, and which has about seen its best days. He wants the city to take some additional fire hydrants along the line of the proposed extension of the mains, and was assured by Mayor Beville that three new hydrants would be contracted for in the college district.

Mr. Chase stated that the improvements in view, both as applied to the water service and the light service, all depended upon whether or not the present financial panic affected the money market and the company's ability to secure the funds. He interviewed a few of the business men while here and learned enough to convince him that the company would have to improve their light service if it expected to retain even the present patronage, and in fact, he was assured by the mayor that the company would have to base its application for patronage in all lines upon its ability to give satisfactory service. It is no longer a secret that the light service in Clarendon is poor and very unsatisfactory to the patrons. They are beginning to demand better service, and the company is simply up against a proposition to give the required service or else lose a lot of business. The Banner-Stockman, in common with our business people, trusts to see the improvements made at an early date.

A. B. Clark, of Lelia Lake, was here Tuesday. Mr. Clark is now gathering his corn, and reports that on 30 acres he will raise better than 1200 bushels of as fine corn as he ever saw. It is selling at 50 cents, and is being shipped as fast as it can be loaded, going to points in Central Texas, J. B. Jenkins being the buyer and shipper. Mr. Clark says if the weather remains favorable a few days longer he will get his fifth cutting on a part of his alfalfa, and the fourth cutting on the balance. He thinks that alfalfa is the best crop for this section and he will continue planting until he has 100 or 150 acres.

Special Wrecked.

The special train chartered by the "Amarillo Boosters," and which left Amarillo at ten o'clock last Friday night bound for the Dallas fair, was wrecked two miles south of Goodnight at 2:10 o'clock Saturday morning. The tender jumped the track, the baggage car was turned over completely, and the first several day coaches left the rails. No one hurt, but the train was delayed in reaching Ft. Worth about eighteen hours. The Ft. Worth Board of Trade had arranged a big reception for the Panhandle boosters, were to meet the train with a brass band and serve a big luncheon at the Worth hotel, all of which, of course, fell flat as a result of the wreck. The train consisted of four day coaches, four Pullman sleepers and a baggage car, and carried several hundred people.

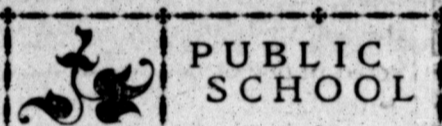

The second month of school closed the past week. Examinations have been in progress nearly all the week. Monthly reports are sent to parents each month with the expectation that parents will be interested in them and note the progress their children are making in their studies.

The desk of Prof. Willis was recently, during the noon hour, decorated with confectionery, fruit and flowers. A like compliment was paid Miss Proctor by her pupils recently. These tokens of friendship between pupils and teachers serve to strengthen the ties of sympathy that should exist between them.

During the second month of school 450 pupils were in attendance. This is the largest enrollment for a single month in the history of the school. This indicates that citizens of Clarendon appreciate a first-class school. It further shows that the public school is keeping pace with the growth of the town.

The public school library is soon to receive special attention from the teachers. There is nearly money enough in the library fund to buy a book case and fill it with good books. Recently a splendid history of the presidents of the United States was presented by a friend of the school. It is just from the press, and cost the purchaser over \$50. Who else has a valuable book for the library?

Sensitiveness is one of the greatest foes to successful school work. Parents are sometimes overly sensitive about their children and expect them to be allowed special privileges. The pupils themselves are often very sensitive about their rights and duties. Teachers themselves are not free from this fault, especially where a question of au-

thority is involved. One can not afford to take offense at small matters connected with school work.

An effort has been made during the past week by the teachers to find all pupils who are not entitled to free admission to the public school and present bills for tuition. It seems but just that this rule should be enforced. Because the public school is free does not indicate that it costs nothing, nor that it is inferior.

New pupils have been enrolled in the various rooms since our last report as follows: Aris Baldwin, Capres Hatcher, Pearl Beckner, Georgia Hamilton, Nat Martin, Olive Martin, Edgar Keasler. Pupils have withdrawn from the school and moved as follows: Johnnie Williams, to Lelia; Gentry Brooks and Grady Triggs, to Memphis.

Miss Stevens, the teacher of the fifth grade, reports fifteen pupils in her room who have neither been absent nor tardy since the opening of school. Although every available square foot of floor in this room is occupied by pupils, the best of interest prevails at all times.

The primary rooms have received the following visitors recently: Mrs. Walters, Mrs. Leonard, Mrs. Bromley, Mrs. Smith and Miss McKeown. Mr. W. A. Adair, of Dallas, an old acquaintance of the Misses Stout, gave the little folks an interesting talk.

WILL CLOSE TOMORROW

Piano Contest Comes to an End at Six O'clock p. m., Saturday, November 2nd.

The piano contest closes tomorrow evening at 6:00 o'clock. Promptly at that hour the various boxes will be finally closed and no votes received after that hour. The various boxes with all the votes cast during the entire contest will then be turned over to the judges for a final count, which count will be published in next week's issue of the Banner-Stockman. The judges selected to do this work are County Judge Geo. F. Morgan, Sheriff J. T. Patman and Cashier W. H. Patrick.

Regarding the statement published last week by Mr. Boles the committee submits the following reply:


TO THE PUBLIC.

Last week's issue of the Banner-Stockman contained an article over the signature of Mr. E. A. Boles making grave charges of conspiracy and systematic fraud against some party or parties whose name or names he failed to mention. These charges preceded the withdrawal of his daughter's (Miss Loxa Boles) name from the piano contest. About three weeks ago a written complaint was handed one of the undersigned by a party interested in the contest, stating that he believed some votes were being cast that were not legitimate and asking for an investigation. This matter was brought before all the firms giving out these votes, and we were appointed to investigate the matter, and adopt some plan to insure absolute fairness in this contest. As a result of this we decided that all tickets must be stamped with the name of the firm issuing them before they are voted, and due notice of this rule was given through the Banner-Stockman. On Thursday of last week, our attention was called to the fact that 1616 votes had been voted in one of boxes that were not thus stamped. We called on the party in whose box votes were found and ascertained that the said 1616 votes thus unstamped had been voted for Miss Loxa Boles. We also found who had voted them, and that the party voting had been told not to vote them until they were stamped. In view of all the facts we decided to put these votes in a sealed envelope and hold them for action of the judges of the final count, which we did. They WERE NOT THROWN OUT but simply set aside for the decision of the judges. In this connection we will further state that unstamped votes have been offered for another candidate than Miss Boles, and THEY were not allowed to go into the box; and we will also state that the number was more than the 1616 votes of Miss Boles which were in controversy. But upon investigation it develops, that Miss Boles' total vote last week, even had she gotten the benefit of the 1616 that were set aside, was only 2367 which added to her total of week before only made her total 49,350, against 60,490 for Golda Stanton. Or in other words, Miss Boles was 11,145 votes behind the leading candidate, Golda Stanton. So it seems that perhaps the 1616 set aside was not the ONLY reason for Miss Boles' withdrawal. These facts and figures can be verified at the office of the Banner-Stockman. We feel that Mr. Boles might have at least given us the opportunity of stating these facts to him before he placed accusations of conspiracy and systematic robbery against us before the public.

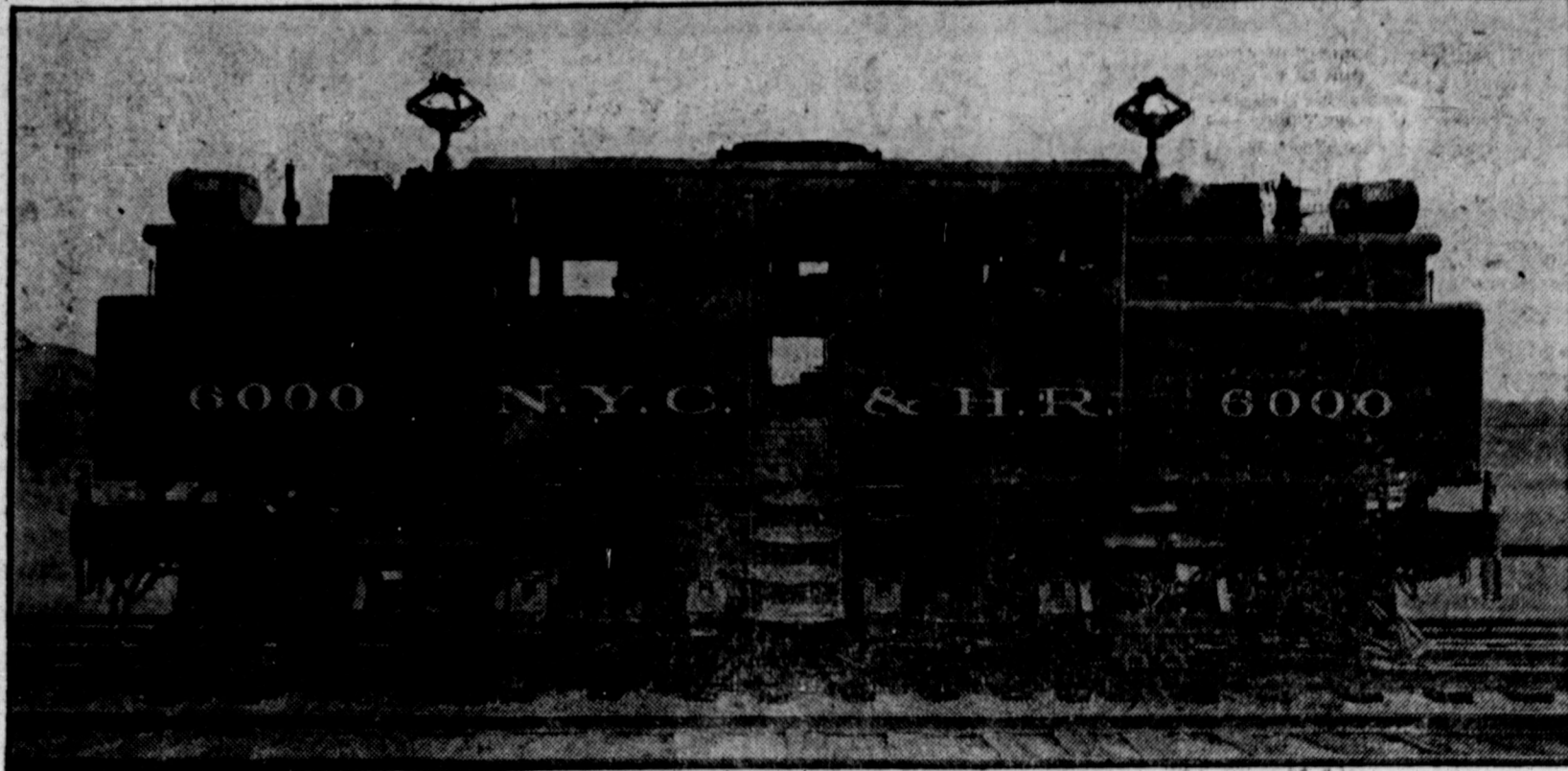

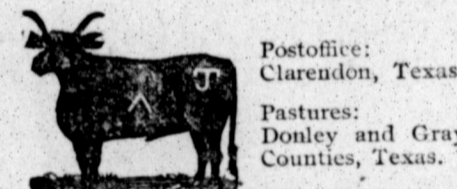

PRESENTS OF PAPER.

May Be Made at Home in a Few Hours.

It is not too late to make attractive Christmas presents at home, even if the selection has been delayed until the last few days, for the woman who is ingenious can fashion decidedly effective gifts out of cardboard and bright colored paper, and by choosing

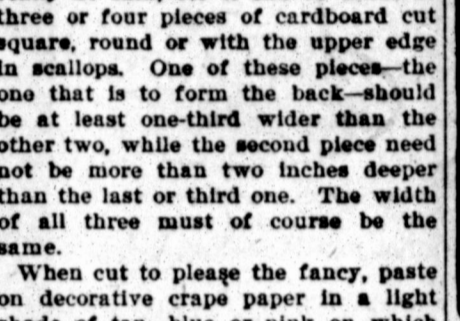


practical and artistic models can turn out just as acceptable articles as those made by experts.

In making paper gifts the amateur must remember that, though the actual work is easy, consisting only of cutting and pasting, this must be carefully done or the materials will be spoiled and the labor wasted. For this reason the simplest kind of models should be decided upon as gifts to be made in a hurry, for the easier they are to fashion the less difficult the task will be.

If an envelope holder should be chosen as a gift, the work on it would require but a short space of time and really no skill, for it can be made of three or four pieces of cardboard cut squares, round or with the upper edge in scallops. One of these pieces—the one that is to form the back—should be at least one-third wider than the other two, while the second piece need not be more than two inches deeper than the last or third one. The width of all three must of course be the same.

When cut to please the fancy, paste on decorative crepe paper in a light shade of tan, blue or pink on which there are bright colored flowers, such



as red roses and yellow chrysanthemums, tied prettily with long ribbon.

When the paste is thoroughly dry, an edging of heavy paper or tape to finish the pieces at the top should be added. At the bottom or about an inch from the edge of each two holes should be made, one on either side, for through these openings ribbons that tie the pieces together are run. The ribbons are made into pretty knots and help decorate the holder. Through two holes at the top of the large piece of cardboard a ribbon is fastened with bowknots, so that the holder may be attached to the wall or a desk—wherever it will hang conveniently.

Quite as serviceable as the holder and equally appropriate for man and woman is a blotter for a desk. It is made of a square piece of cardboard, over which a light blue or delicate pink blotting pad is placed. This is held down by four decorative corners made of cardboard covered with crepe paper in pretty floral designs. These corners are made like right angled triangles to fit the square edges of the bottom and are attached to the latter by fine wires.

A Knitting Needle Case. A most suitable present for a lover of knitting is a case in which the different sizes of needles may be kept and preserved from rust when not in use.

The cutter cover, composed of any pretty material, may be as elaborately worked as you like. It must be cut a little longer than the length of the longest needle it is to hold, and about three times as wide as it is long. In making the case you will be guided by your own or the recipient's usual requirements in the way of knitting needles, as one or two sizes may be preferred to the entire "set."

The lining should be of wash leather. Choose a piece with a not too aggressive yellow tint and not "thin" in places. Cut it to the size of the case and allow half an inch over to be pinked out and show over the edges.

Before fixing in, place a moderately wide piece of leather down the center piece and make as many runnings across it as will correspond with the number of knitting needles the case is destined to hold. If desired, the leather lining need only meet the edges of the case, which may be bound with ribbon. The case can be rolled up when not in use and tied with a ribbon from the outside. These cases can be adapted for various uses by regulating the size of the center runnings, into which can be slipped embroidery silks as well as knitting needles, and such a case lined with oil silk would make an admirable brush holder for a student in water color painting.

Miniature Ironing Board. A simple little gift that may be made for a friend who is going away from home is a small ironing board of a size suited to a toy iron. Cut a piece of asbestos the size required and make a linen cover for it, with a button and buttonhole at end. This is useful for pressing out collars and ribbons.

GIFT MAKING HINTS.

Presents Clever Women May Construct at Home.

WORKBOX AND TIE HOLDER.

Two Attractive Christmas Remembrances, in the Manufacture of Which Embroidery and Amateur Carpentry Figure.

THERE is an interesting variety of pretty Christmas gifts that women can make at home this year for trifling expense if they are ingenious enough to do a little carpentry work and have also the ability to embroider and crochet or knit.

One of these practical and desirable presents for either a man or woman is a necktie holder. It can be fashioned as simply or elaborately as is wished once the woodwork is made. These holders that may be hung on a bureau knob, attached to the gas jet or nailed to the wall in a bedroom are made of an oval piece of light whitewood that



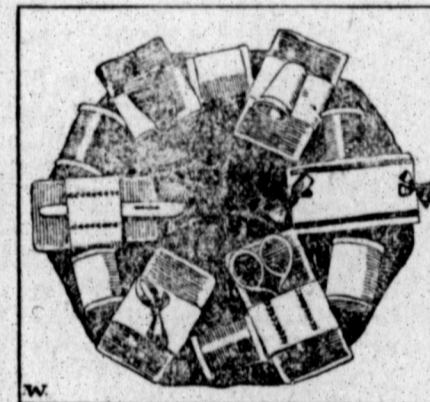
NECKTIE HOLDER.

is covered with denim, crash, linen or satin in any shade desired. They are serviceable if the material is left plain, but when embroidered with tulips in red, white and yellow silk with green leaves or in a solid rose pattern in natural colors they are decorative and are really an ornament to any apartment. On this wood plaque a round steel rod is screwed, and on it the scarf and ties are hung when not in use. At the back two ribbons—any length needed to suspend the holder from a desirable place—are attached and tied in a bowknot. The ribbons may be of a color to match the material.

Instead of an oval of whitewood a six sided piece about ten inches in diameter is needed for the modern workbox that is just now so acceptable because it contains all the necessary things that a housekeeper wants when she sits down to sew or mend.

Once the wood is carefully sawed into a hexagon it may be covered with dark red or deep green satin or with less expensive material, and then the task of fitting the workbox with spools, miniature boxes for needles, pins, tape measure, etc., may be started.

In the center a cushion for pins and needles is essential, and it may be

made as decorative as is desired. Around it the small cardboard or pill boxes, covered with satin or whatever goods is used on the base, are glued in place, and between these boxes spools of thread are tied into place with narrow baby ribbon. On the tops of the boxes slips of ribbon are attached so that scissors, bodkins, knitting needles, thimbles and emery bags will have a place on the workbox.

Novel Pincushion.

A pincushion is a very necessary adjunct to the average woman's dressing table, and she is apt to be specially appreciative if the one bestowed upon her at Christmas is made in some novel form.

Brooches that are worn often are generally kept somewhere within easy reach, and they are preserved in better condition if their ordinary resting place is a wash leather cushion instead of a china or metal pin tray.

To make this brooch pincushion, use a round cushion covered with wash leather for your center and sew to this four flaps of velvet, heavy silk or any other material that you choose, lining each flap with the wash leather. Stick your brooches into the center cushion and fold the flaps over. The two that fold on top are tied together with ribbon.

Needlecase.

A charming present the business woman will appreciate is an individual needlecase. It is so small that she can slip it in her purse and take it down to the office, where it will not occupy any space in her desk. It is made just a little larger than a package of needles and is of silk covered cardboard. On one side is a strap to hold the package, and there are, besides, three thin fannel leaves for the loose needles.
