Expired Suddenly at Hotel Denver in Clarendon Saturday Night-Just From Hospital

Gus Jacques, formerly a respected citizen and business man of Clarendon but latterly a citizen of Dalhart, and county treasurer there died at Hotel Denver this city, Saturday night. As told in these columns last week H. B. White went down to Ft. Worth to accompany Mr. Jacques to Clarendon, he having been in a hospital there for a month taking treatment for Bright's Disease. A brother, T. L. Jacques of Dalhart, also went down for the same purpose. The party arrived in Clarendon Saturday on the delayed train shortly after noon. Mr. Jacques was feeling well except being tired from the trip and went over to the hotel. He spent the afternoon there and ate a hearty supper. Sometime after supper he went to the toilet, and about 10 o'clock when another guest visited the toilet he found Gus dead on the floor. Physicians were summoned but to no effect except to pronounce his death due to a form of apolexy, succeeding his long siege of kidney trouble. The remains were shipped to Dalhart Sunday and there interred.



#### AMERICA'S NEW WOMAN.

Whether it is the climate or the tre dition of independence, which ruins in forty-eight hours after landing the best servants in the world, or the mental training in our schools, cer tainly the American woman does not hink in the same way as the women other races. She reads the newspamore frequently. Mr. James ques her pronunciation, but she coninues to discuss every problem of cre ation with unfailing volubility.

As to her outward appearance writes James Huneker in Everybody's Magazine, we believe that she wil approximate more to the Slavic and the Italian in fifty years than to Abglo-Saxon or Celt. But there is the solid foundational support of Teutonic and Dutch-health, sanity, common sense, thrift. More marvelous still is the racial conquest of the Semitic. In no country have Hebrew physical pe cultarities been so profoundly modiled as in America. A quarter of a century ago or a half century the German Hebrews were in the majority of emigrants. Today it is the Russian-Polish. Haggard, persecuted, of mis erable physique, exploited even now on the east side, nevertheless they struggle toward the light. They edu cate their children. They develop thek artistic gifts. Who knows? They may be the artistic leaven in the huge loaf of prosperous American philistianism. The children of the men who reached our shores poor and ambitious a few lecades ago may be seen at the Saturday theater matinees, at plano re itals, Wagner operas and picture galleries. They are dressed like Parisiennes, but their eyes and coloring are of the east. Their children will not be puritanic. America will profit. has profited by this exotic strain; art has been benefited. In this conglomer ate we recognize Italian, Semitic, Celt, Slavic, little English or French, much Scandinavian. Where is the American type? Ask a century hence. The orignal Yankee man and woman, the descendants of those who fought in the Revolution, will soon be as extinct as he dodo. Even the directory is losing ts familiar American names.
