





### HARMLESS SNAKES.

They Are Valuable as Aids to the Agriculturist.

It is not generally known that the preservation of harmless snakes is as important as the destruction of the hosts of pests met with in farming and in market gardening.

tion of many animals which are useful or beautiful or both.

Yet there are few animals more useity alone prevented the killing of harmless snakes, how can we justify it of a snake to an ear of corn or a row of potatoes. Snakes live almost entirely upon creatures which are destructive to growing things-that is, they cat literally millions of insects. small mammals and worms. Especially are potato bugs, worms, flies, beetles, maggots, ants, grubs, grasshoppers, locusts and the larvae of these the food of most of our snakes.

Of considerably over eighty different kinds of snakes found throughout the United States and exclusive of the rattleshakes and mocassins there are but two which can be termed dangerous. We exclude the rattlesnakes and the moccasius because all are large, easily recognized forms, which cannot be confused with harmless kinds. Living in water, the moccasins are not often troublesome to farming regions and are confined to the south from North Carolina around the gulf coast and the Florida peninsula and along the southern Mississippi, living in swamps. The two really poisonous snakes which might be mistaken for harmless ones are the copperhead and

the coral snake. Of the two the copperhead only needs our attention. This truly poisonous snake is slender and has few features to distinguish it from harmless milk snakes. It is found usually in rocky hills or stone piles, old cellars being a favorite spot. But it should not be greatly feared, for unless attacked or stepped on it will not bite. and it is seldom found where there is cultivation of the ground in progress .-St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

### AMERICA'S MOUNTAINS.

Grander and Greater In Variety Than the Old World's.

North America has suffered shamefully from Alpine arrogance. Its masters have looked upon glacierless Colorado, the ridges bulging faintly above the continental plateau; upon Popocatapeti and his sister titans reaching isthmusward, upon the snowy dead craters of the Cascades, and pitied us Americans that our lands offered mountain sport for none but women and old men. Volcanoes? An inferior sort of mountain. The Appalachians?

But on their continent are fields for climbing greater in variety, wider in for the night." appeal to every sort of mountaineer. lpinist included, than on any other of the world's six areas and among the summits physically attainable probably the hardest in the world. The Himalayas, with greater real elevation, have bases of attack discountingly high, and the accepted idea that thin air prevents climbing above 25,000 feet bars their tiptops. If South America offers greater height and heroic weather, Alaska requires training in a sport quite new, a subarctic Alpining for which you must persist and endure like a polar traveler, work ax and rope, cordel or pack cayuses across tundra. Its ten or more summits between 10,000 and 20,300 feet present the greatest effective height, the longest snow and ice slopes, in the world. All but Mount St. Elias and Mount McKinley, 20,300 feet, the highest on the continent, are virgin. Mount Logan, 19,500 feet, is the world's remaining Alpine problem. Swiss training alone will not win it. Climbers have avoided Alaska, oftener accepting challenges from Asia and the Andes. Alpinists must succeed in this ultimate field or come to judgment for their condescension. Alaska lacks only that prohibitive elevation for which you may as well train in a laboratory vacuum.-Robert Dunn in Outing Maga-

SOME CURIOUS SPOONS.

Uses to Which They Were Put by Peo-

ple a Few Conturies Ago. We are familiar nowadays with spoons of many shapes intended for every variety of purpose, but some old

osities. There is the old fashioned narrow spoon, for instance, which was used for extracting marrow from bones. It was made double, one end being used for small bones and the other for those of larger bore.

Another example is the mulberry spoon. This has a perforated bowl and spiked and pointed handle, says the London Globe. The implements were made for use in a day when mulberries were much more commonly eaten than they are at the present time. With the perforated bowl a little sugar was sprinkled on the berry, which was then conveyed to the mouth on the spiked end of the handle.

The introduction of tea led to the making of a variety of new kinds of spoons, including the necessary teaspoon itself, some of which still remain in use, while others have disappeared. At South Kensington may be of the little scoops so well known spoons. Tea caddies of the old fashioned kind have long been superseded. and when the caddy with its two lidded and metal lined end compartments and the sugar bowl in the cavity between went out of use the caddy spoon or scoop disappeared also.

Another obsolete curiosity is the snuff spoon, which in the days when nearly everybody took snuff and took it everywhere was used for conveying the scented powder from the box to the hand or in some cases direct to the nose. Candle spoons and pap spoons also are out of date. A Llangollen gentleman a few months ago wrote in a Shropshire paper that he had in his possession a silver pap spoon which had been originally given by the Marquis of Exeter to a member of the Hoggins family of Bolas. The possessor of this spoon remarked that it had been given to him by his father with the wish that it should be handed over to the first married in each succeeding generation, for as such it had come to him through the intermarriage of the two families in years gone by.

Three hundred years ago there was one at Ilford, in Essex, which held more than a quart. Others of more legitimate make were such as the curfous combination implement with which folk of that date were familiar. When most people still dipped their fingers into the general dish to help themselves to meat more dainty diners carried about with them an implement which was a combination of spoon and fork and toothpick.

The fork was at the back of the spoon, while the handle of the double rticle was finished off with a little figure terminal, which served as handle for the toothpick. The terminal figure was a very favorite form of

It is most familiar in the apostle spoons, of which original sets fetch such high prices and of which latter day imitations are so abundant, but the figures were by no means confined to the apostles. In some cases the spoons were curiously finished with double heads, which can hardly have conduced, one would think, to convenfence of handling. A curious but decidedly unpleasant form of ornament gave its name to the "death's head" spoon, which was made for commemorative purposes, a very unattractive kind of "memento mori."

### BUILT FOR ETERNITY.

Romans Constructed Their

Archer B. Hurlbert in the Chautauquan says regarding the cost and methods of building the much quoted Roman roads:

"A careful estimate shows that the Romans spent from \$30,000 to \$100,000 per mile on their roads, yet Europe knew no road building worthy of the name from the fall of Rome, about 400 A. D., to the coming of Napoleon's Tresaguet, 1,400 years later. For a millennium and a half the roads of these men who built for eternity were the best roads in England, Europe and Asia Minor, and, though many of them quickly disappeared if neglected, a large number remain to this day, and tion. "'The furrows were first made,' writes W. B. Paley, 'at the proper distance apart; the earth between was dug out for a foot or two, and the bottom rammed and beaten down tightly. Upon this the first stratum of material was laid and the lime poured over it; then larger stones were placed upon that and the interstices filled in with mortar, after which sometimes came another layer similar to the bottom one. The whole was often three feet thick or more and was rounded in the center to prevent water lodging upon

### GOOD ROADS FOR THE WEST.

Convict System Employed to Advan tage In California.

California is rapidly coming to the front in regard to a good roads system, says the Philadelphia Ledger. Frank Lindsey, who has been demonstrating some automobile cars, relates some of his experiences while on his trip through California. He says: "I endured more hardships the year and a half I was out there than all the rest of my life. There are very few roads out of San Francisco. In fact, they are not roads, but mere passes. While fair, they are far from being excellent. Our severest test was while touring the southern part of California through sand and over mountains. At times we were compelled to use flat bottomed boats, the rain having washed

away the roads entirely. "Now California has recovered from the earthquake the state has taken up the good roads movement that is so rapidly advancing and which in time will place our country on a par with

our foreign neighbors. "California has adopted the convict system of road building so successfully employed by other states. While touring through southern Callfornia we saw convicts at work on the improvement of roads, with their camps every few miles. The convicts work in gangs of twenty each, with an armed guard to each gang.

"California holds charms which draw arge and increasing numbers of motorists each year, and now that good roads work is being done the Golden Gate State will become one of the most popular touring sections of our coun-

Hardware Dealers on Good Roads. At the annual meeting of the State Retail Hardware association, held in Syracuse, N. Y., last month, the president, Louis J. Ernst, in his annual address discussed among other subjects that of good roads. Mr. Ernst said

among other things:

"A great factor in business is that of good roads, and it behooves all of us to do what we can to have as many roads throughout the state put in such condition that travel over them is possible at all seasons of the year. Good roads enable the farmer to drive to the nearest market place with ease, dispose of his produce and make his purchases. This is a matter that has received any amount of attention during the past few years and great strides have been made toward improvement. We, however, as interested merchants, should give the matter our active and moral support to the end of extending this good roads system and to see that other roads through the rural districts be improved and that they be kept !n TEXAS repair. In that respect there is much carelessness.
