The Texas Legislature is still in a quandary in regard to acreage reduction by legislation and it seems that the more the different plans are discussed the further the different factions get from a solution. As cotton is moving to the market with increasing rapidity, and the dry, hot weather is opening West Texas cotton fast, the Long plan may well be discarded for the reason that even in the event of its passage, by the time that other Southern States called their Legislatures together and radified the plan the cotton would practically all be out of the hands of the producer and the adoption of the plan would mean financial suicide for the producer as well as all other businesses directly dependant on the prosperity of the cotton producer for their welfare. The doubt of the constitutionality of acreage reduction by legislation is still manifested and it would be a sorry state of affairs indeed to call a special session of the Legislature at a cost or around \$2500.00 a day to pass a law which would not be worth the paper that it was written on. While we are trying to find a solution to he predicament in which we find ourselves, let us first seek the cause. We hear loud talk of overproduction of cotton and fail to consider that all other agricultural products are in the same shape. Is there an overproduction of anything when people are in need of these very articles but havenot the means of obtaining them? By people we do not confine ourselves to the inhabitants of the United States alone but include those of England, the Continent, China and Japan as well. We find that the United States has in the near vicinity of half the world's supply of Gold. Between America and France, there is very little of th Worlds supply of gold left for the foreign nations to trade on. Having no gold with which to trade how can we expect England, Germany, Belgium or any of the other large importers of American agricultural com modities to trade with us rather than to trade us some of their manufactured products, and this they cannot do because the United States has such high tariff wall as to be unsurmountable. If the countries on the Continent can not take our cotton at six cents, can we reasonably expect them to take more in case the price is raised to fifteen or twenty cents? Our candid opinion is hat we need legislation but the kind is Democratic Legislation in Washington and not some compromise bill by the Texas Legislat ure, and that is what we may reasonably expect. Until our tariff walls are lowered to the extent that trade channels are unclogged, the cotton farmer has two alternatives to raise for a protected home market only, or to face slow starvation by raising for export consumption. Next year is another political year, and if the people go to the polls with a clear mind and asteadfast purpose, they have the opportunity that comes to the Democratic party but once in a life time, to pu the party in power that can help them by legislation. Another regime of the Republican Party in the United States and all of us that are not sold in to peonage, will be on the dole.
