

THAT after the conclusion of the hearing above mentioned such sum or sums that may be determined by the City Council to be payable by said property owners shall be assessed against them respectively and against their respective properties, by ordinance or ordinances, in the manner prescribed by the provisions of Chapter 9, Title 28, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas 1925, and the Ordinance of the City of Benjamin.

THAT the City Secretary of the City of Benjamin is hereby dir ected to give notice to said propery owners their agents or attorneys, and to all interested persons, of said hearing, as prescribed by the provisions of Chapter 9, Title 28, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas 1925 and the Ordinance of the City of Benjamin by publishing this Ordinance three times in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Benjamin, the first of said publications to be made at least ten days before the date set for said hearing. Said City Secretary may also mail a copy of said notice by registered letter to each of said property owners or agents or attorneys if known, said letters to be deposited in a postoffice in the City of Benjamin at least ten days before the date set for the hearing. However said notice by registered letter shall be cumulate only, and notice by publication shall be due and proper notice of said hearing.
