The Busses and Trucks will probably come in for considerable discussion by the 42nd Legislature now in session and in all probability some measures will be taken to remedy this problem. The busses and trucks have been getting bigger and bigger every year and aside from being a nuisance to every one that uses the highways they are doing considerable damage to the reads. In the first place the highways were not built to stand the strain these huge truck and busses and vans subject them to. In the second place the roads were not built wide enough for traffic to move without congestion when cluttered up with the trucks and busses. It might be unconstitutional to ban them from the highways but they could be taxed out of existance very easily. It they want to compete with the railroads in freight and passenger hauling let them construct their own high ways and, if after they have done this, they are able to compete with the railroads profitably, more power to them. The public should not have to build hard surfaced roads for any private business to use commercially. 




