FDR CHEERED AT SAN JUAN

Vacation Journey Takes Him to

Puerto Rican Capital.

San Juan, Puerta Rico, July 6-President Roosevelt's long vacation journey brought him at sunset today to San Juan, Capital of Puerto Rico.

For ten hours he had been traveling acorss the island from Mayaguez but the familiar smile lighted his face as his automobile paused in front of the San Juan city hall. A great crowd of Puerto Ricians cheered tumultously. Once they broke thorugh the police lines to swarm about the president's automobile, and many managed to shake his hand besteered them away form the car.

The ride from Mayaguez was long and at times precarious, but the presidetn showed by his ilvely interest in the countryside that it was not tedious. For much of the distance rain fell and pavements through the

Governor Blanton Winship rode with the president. The hill folk came down to the highway and hundreds gathered in the villages thru which the American president pass-

From the city hall here the president was escorted to the 400-yearold governor's mansion. There he shook hands and chatted briefly with 20 leading citizens and legislators. Before going to dinner he accompained Governor Winship on an inspection tour of the ancient stone structure.

President Rosevelt passed the night at the governor's palace, before retiring he yielded to the insistent demands of cheering crowds by appearing on a balcony.



PLOW AND PLAN NOW FOR FALL GARDENS

College Station, July 6 .- With gardens cut short in a wide-spread drouth it is of unsound importance this summer to plow up garden plots and keep the min good tilth in anticipation of rains which will make fall gardens possible, garden demonstrators throughout the State are being told by J. F. Rosborough, extention horticulturist at Texas A and M College. If weeds are kept down and the garden lan dkept in good condition to eatch and hold moisture it should be fairly easy to get good early fall garden stuff, he thinks.

Granting rains come, fall gardnes may be planted in early August in South Texas, and in late August in all the rest of Texas. The most dependable early fall garden plantings are onion sets, Swiss chard, Irish potatoes, pinto beans and radishes.

A method of saving much of the tomato fertilizer appiled this past spring is offered by Mr. Rosborough About 500 to 600 pounds of fertilizer were applied per acre on the average, he says, and 30 percent to 40 per cent of this remains available in the ground. If the land is not planted fall and winter rains will leach out the fertilizer and it will all be lost. He sugests that farmers plow up and destroy the dried tomato vines to clear the land and prevent disease and insect infection, and when rains come plant in early fall to adapted crops. The surest truck crops are Irish potatoes, beans, and fall roasting ears. If rains come very early, sweet potatoes will make a good crop.



ON TEXAS FARMS

Darrow, Extention Editor So successful was the huge beef canning program for relief purposes last winter in Texas that the Extention Service has been asked tto help national relief leaders work out the same program for the entire drouth area in the United States. Miss Mildred Horton, state home demonstration agent, has been helping with details in Washington. The re-opened canning plant in Amarillo is to be visited by workers from other states for guidance.

Relief agencies spent about \$500-000 on the entire beef canning relief program in Texas last winter, including cst of cattle and all labor and material charges. A product worth \$776,936 was obtained, value being determined by the lowest competitive commercial bid received in a cost

investigation. Texas farmers and ranchers sold 21,320 cutter cows for an average of about \$5 per head above market quotations, and 9439 unemployed persons were given wages of \$12 per week. An average of about 3000 people were employed steadily for

26 days. With hundreds of thousands of starving cattle in drouth regions, it is not surprising, in view of the remarkable success of the Texas experiment in killing, cutting and canning beef the A and M way, that national relief leaders have adopted the Texas plan for national application.
