& Editorial

If your servant is able to dress in style while you wear old clothes are you contented?

With the selection of those officers who will represent us in state, district and county offices to be made within the next few months up for consideration it would be well now, before the heat of the campaign into which personalities and other side-stepping issues will be ejected, to determine the stand of those various candidates on such issues as are of vital and direct interest to us locally. Those things that affect our pocketbooks daily, monthly, and yearly should be of greater concern than, we shall say whether or not John Doe has the courage, the ability, and the integrity to represent the majority instead of the minority who will seek to influence him after the election, then we say let's get behind John Doe. To be specific, it would be well to find out the stand that our candidates for representative, state senator, congressman and United States senator take upon the question of regulation of public utilities. In Benjamin the rate we pay for gas is \$1.50 for the first thousand feet, \$1.25 per thousand for the second thousand feet, 75c per thousand for the next three thousand feet or \$5.00 for five thousand feet of gas. With gas selling in the Panhandle at the rate of about four cents per thousand there is entirely too much difference between the producers and consumers price. What chance has Benjamin to expand and attract new residents with an exhorbitant rate as this? Now on the other hand, in direct contrast to this condition, we may take the example of our municipal water plant. The rate for fifteen thousand gallons of water is \$2.50. That is a better rate than we find most cities give their patrons. We are able to regulate our water rate but until yet we have no choice as to what rate we may be charged for gas. For that reason we say that it would be well to find out the stand of those who will represent us in the different capacities.

In a country where agriculture and husbandry provide the chief income, rain means cash.

General rains have vastly improved crop prospects in Knox County as well as cattle prospects. Wheat and other small grain crops were needing moisture in most parts of this section and with planting time for cotton and row crops at hand, most farmers were beginning to worry a bit about the season. Knox is one of the major cotton producing counties in the state and a general rain at this time of the year means much in the terms of dollars and cents.

KNOX COUNTY COUNCIL HOLDS REGULAR MEETING

The regular meeting of the Knox county Home Demonstration Council met Saturday, April 7, in Benjamin with Gillespie, Knox City, Union Grove, Munday, Hefner, Hood and Benjamin clubs answering roll call with reports of work done by club members the past month.

Reports were given by the expansion and educational committees. A report from the Lubbock meet show was given. Mrs. Roy Jones told of the visit to the Jones county home demonstration council at which time Misses Atienza and Brodeth, Phillipine girls who are in the United States studying Extention methods, were visitors.

Plans and arrangements were made for sending an exhibit to the Albany Dairy Show and sending a delegation of some 25 women done for the second day, April 14.

The Council voted to publish a Home Demonstration Club cook book. The publishing of this book will be financed through advertisements from the business people of the county, while the receipts of the sales will go into the council to finance county fair, encampments, meat show and the sending of delegates and winners to the various contests to the Annual Short Course and the Dallas Fair.

The motion was made and seconded and carried that we adjourn until the first Saturday in May.

"I use my foundation pattern for all my sewing," said Mrs. J. C. Pattreson, Benjamin Home Demonstration Club. "I can use it not only for my clothes but for my daughters clothes by merely making it a little longer. This saves me so much time and expense and I really enjoy sewing with it."

PREPARE FOR WAR ON BUGS

How about bugs? Are there any in your garden? Maybe the cut worm has cut your cabbage and tomato plants. If so, mix up some poison bran mash as follows: 2 lbs. dry bran, 2 oz. white arsenic or Parris Green, and 1 pt. molasses. Mix together thoroughly and add enough water to make the bran particles hold together. Apply in the late evening along the rows, placing in small piles the size of a twenty five cent piece.

To wage war on Cabbage bugs, dissolve 1 lb. of soap in 2-3 gallons of water and spray the plants every ten days. This will not kill the bugs but will keep them off the plants. Where tomato worms are damaging the fruit, dust the plants once a week with 1 part of lead arsenate to 4 parts of lime or spray with 1 1-2 tea spoons of lead arsenate to 1 gallon of water.

Lice can quickly destroy such plants as mustard, turnips, cucumbers, canteloupes and watermelons. To combat them, spray the plants thoroughly with nicatrol, using 1 1-2 tablespoons of this solution to 1 gallon of water. Spray the plants every 5-7 days to insure keeping down these pests.

A few cents spent for bug dope may save a hundred d*ollars worth of vegetables. Don't delay spraying as insects which work day and night can cause serious damage in a very short time.
