



WASHINGTON LETTER.

No Extra Session of Congress.

INDIANS SERIOUSLY OBJECT

To the Opening of the Kiowa Reservation—General Pearson of the Boer Army Says the Boers
Have Plenty of Men in the Field.

(From our regular correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, June 12, 1901.

The republican scheme for reducing the congressional representation of the southern states which restrict negro suffrage has been revived and it is said to have more influential backing than the movement that was started last winter. At that time it was understood that Mr. McKinley had just began to believe in the possibility of a white republican party in the south, opposed the idea and was instrumental in having it laid aside. It is doubtful if he has changed his mind on the subject, but some of the men who are quietly pushing the revived scheme express the opinion that by next winter the failure of making white republican recruits in the south under the name of McLaurinism or any other, will be so plain to Mr. McKinley that he can be counted upon to keep his hands off if not to help along the scheme. The increased power given to congress by the insular decisions of the supreme court is used by the men who are working the scheme as an argument for the political necessity of cutting down southern representation so as to make it certain that the republicans will retain their majority in the house, the loss of which might play havoc with the party's insular policy. There are not a sufficient number of senators and representatives in Washington to form any idea of the strength of the revived scheme, but it is being manipulated by shrewd men who have no scruples about securing political advantage in any way, and it will be wise for democratic senators and representatives to be vigilant.

There were other than legal reasons for the decision of the administration not to call an extra summer session of congress to legislate for the Philippines. One was that it was thought that a few months' exercise of the autocratic authority conferred by the Spooner amendment would get things on the islands in a condition that would be less inviting to congressional interrogation than they are at this time, and another was the fear that a congressional debate on a Philippine tariff bill might precipitate a general calls.

General Samuel Pearson of the Boer army passed through Washington this week on his way to New York, where he has been called to confer with the agent of the Boers on important business which he hopes relates to an honorable peace.

Speaking of the situation in his unfortunate country, he said: "We still have about 26,000 men in the field, we have all the amunition we need, and we have sufficient horses and food stuffs, British reports to the contrary notwithstanding. My regular information from the seat of war tells me that only half of what is going on in South Africa is known and published in the newspapers here, and then it is not at all reliable. All news goes through English censors. There has been considerable more fighting down there lately than the American people have been informed of. Much activity is displayed throughout the Transvaal, the Orange Free State and Cape Colony. Kirtzinger's command has been very successfully recruiting Cape Dutch for operations against the British, and if Kitchener or Roberts can boast of having invaded the Transvaal, we can reply with the invasion of Cape Colony. Our soldiers are only fifteen miles from the sea coast which speaks for itself. The men who our at the head of our army are young, energetic, prudent and just. They know when to strike and how to do it to obtain the best results with the least difficulty and at the smallenteros) of life. We are just as anxious for peace as you, but it must be an honorable peace, otherwise we will fight—fight until the last man falls."

Ex-Representative and ex-Judge Springer accompanied three Indian chiefs to the White House, where they went to present a petition asking the president to withhold his signature to the proclamation opening the Kiowa, Commanche and Apache Indian reservation to settlement until a delegation representing these tribes can reach Washington and be heard. They claim that the treaty under which the 2,000,000 acres involved are alleged to have been ceded was never approved by a majority of the Indians and that to allow it to be put into effect will be a rank injustice. Mr. Springer says that Mr. McKinley can, if so disposed, defer opening the land to settlement until congress has an opportunity to reconsider its action providing therefore. But inasmuch as Secretary Hitchcock has turned down all protests against the opening, it is not likely that he will be so disposed.

The alleged civil government that is to be established in the Philippines will be civil in name only until after congress legislates on the subject, as it is to be under military control. The islands are to be kept under military control because of the belief that the establishment of a real civil government would put them on the same footing that was was given Porto Rico by the supreme court decision. Representative Livingston of Georgia, who is in Washington to attend a meeting of the Industrial Commission, is strongly opposed to any constitutional amendment restricting the negro suffrage in his state. Speaking of the matter he said: "I think our people are against such amendment to our state constitution. We are getting along nicely with the negro in Georgia."
