Panhandle News

Clarendon will have a big fourth of July celebration.

Bro. Russell announces that the Livestock Champion will come out in its new dress the first week in June.

Our electric lights will soon materialize. Only a few days more of darkness, and we can say "let there be light," press the button and light it will be.—Plainview Herald.

The Federal government has refused to take any interest in the railway well at Childress. Mr. Stephens will take up the matter again the coming winter and see if he cannot get the government to put down a well.

The Hereford Grove stock farm cut alfalfa this week. On a field that was three years old the yield was estimated at two tons per acre, and they will get two more cuttings this season. On a field sown last fall the yield was estimated at one ton per acre. This alfalfa is not grown on sub-irrigated land, but on ordinary farm lands and demonstrates what any farmer in this section can do with alfalfa if they would only give it a chance.—Childress Index.

While in Floydada last week we were informed that Texans were returning from Portales and other parts of New Mexico; some selling their claims and others leaving them unable to sell for anything. When a man leaves Texas to hunt a new country he is simply left.—Lockney Beacon.

About sixty thousand cow hides have passed through the hands of Amarillo hide dealers since the first of January. These hides have been shipped in here from all parts of the Panhandle country and practically represent the cattle losses during the winter.—Champion.

It will be a year next Tuesday since the rain which filled the railway lake. At that time the prediction was freely made that the water would not supply the company over four months, some saying three months. The year has been exceptionally dry, in that no rain has fallen in that time which has put over a foot of water in the lake, and not more than three feet has been added during the year. Yet there is fourteen feet of water in the lake, which would indicate that the railway has a lake that holds from eighteen months, to two years, supply of water. The results of the past year ought to, and has to some extent, put a stop to all talk about the company having an insufficient water supply.—Childress Index.

It is rumored at Wichita Falls that the Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf extension from Ardmore via Waurika will pass through Wichita Falls, absorb the Wichita Valley Road and extend from Seymour to the terminus of the Texas Central Road.

Geo. Owens of Northfork was in the city Wednesday. Mr. Owens is preparing to get a large number of Jerseys and furnish Amarillo and other towns of the Panhandle with good fresh butter. He will also conduct a hennery in connection to supply the market with poultry and eggs.—Miami Chief.

Reports have it that a hail stone as large as a water bucket fell through the roof of a house over in Oklahoma last Friday and then didn't kill anybody. If that hailstone should have fallen in Texas the cattle loss where it "struck" would have been something fierce.

Work Commenced Tuesday Morning-Will be Brick.

Judge Jno. E. Ferguson, president of the Hereford National Bank, on Monday received notification that his proposition (acting for the bank's stockholders) to furnish a 25x25 brick building on Illinois avenue, between the bank and The Brand office, and equip the same with suitable postoffice fixtures, had been accepted by the postoffice authorities. The work on the new building was commenced Tuesday morning and Judge Ferguson informs us that it will be ready for occupancy early next month. The office will be equipped with up-to-date fixtures costing in the neighboahood of \$1000. When completed and the postoffice installed Psstmaster Walters will have one of the neatest and most commodious places of business to be found in the west.

The Judge also informs us that it is the intention of the bank officials to replace their banking house with brick in the near future, which will be run back and attached to the postoffice building. It is with pleasure that we note that Hereford's frame business houses are being gradually replaced with brick.

The shipment was made April 10, and the vessel was out thirty-six days. In that time but ten cattle died out of the 2550 on board. This is considered a remarkable record as the loss was less than half of one per cent and it was thought that a loss of two per cent would be a good record.

HELD UP.

T. A. Cox Robbed at His Camp in New Mexico.

Wednesday morning two men armed with Winchesters came upon T. A. Cox at his cow camp in New Mexico before he was aware of their presence and ordered him to throw up his hands. Tom is far from being afraid of anyone and had he been given any kind of a show, would have given a good account of himself, but when a command is given, backed up by two determined men with rifles, it would be foolhardy not to obey, so Tom did as requested, after which one of the men casually gathered up the armaments of the camp, consisting of two rifles and two six-shooters, and what cash was on Tom's person, his companion still keeping a rifle in a position commanding respect, in an outward manner at least. They then took the only two horses remaining in the camp, one belonging to Mr. Cox and the other to Rat Jowell, the latter having no saddle, and made their departure. It was afterwards learned that they came upon a railroad man, journeying from one camp to another on horseback, and compelled him to dismount from his horse, which they appropriated, turning Rat's horse loose.

As soon as Mr. Cox had recovered from his surprise he made his way to where the rest of the boys were working with the cattle and appraised them of the holdup. They immediately started in pursuit and trailed them to the cap rock, where the trail was lost. They learned, however, from a passing freighter that two men answering to the bandits' description were seen traveling eastward. Notification of the crime was sent by telephone to Sheriff Inmon, who in turn notified other officers hereabouts including the Ranger force at Amarillo, and he in company with Conner Jowell started on a still hunt for the desperados. The fact that they were leaving New Mexico for Texas gives strong hope that they will be captured.

The farmers' department has helped many. It is not the theory of farming written by college professors and others up north on conditions that don't fit Texas. It is the actual experience of farmers here at home who have turned over the soil.

Law Enforcement.

The prime object of the law enforcement department of League work is not to do the work that officers are elected to and paid for doing. It is to bring an influence to bear upon officers to get them to do their duty, to assist them sometimes, and encourage them all the time. The League members should stand by the officers when they do their duty. It is further the purpose of the law enforcement department to keep such a watch over the actions of officers charged with enforcing the law as to know whether they have been faithful or unfaithful, and to give the information to the voters in case the officer should be a candidate for re-election.

Where officers will not do their duty the League sometimes brings the evidence of violations to the attention of officers and puts them to the test as to whether they will take hold of the evidence and act upon it.

But where the temperance people act as detectives or employ de-

tectives at their own expense, and then bring cases before the courts, it is only temporarily satisfactory at best. For when you have fined the violator he will continue his evil work, or some one will take his place soon, and the work is to do over again and again.

But when we can create such a sentiment that an officer will fear not to do his duty, then the work is permanent. The officer will be the vigilance committee and will be there all the year, and the county

will foot the bills.

Yet our temperance people are almost compelled to do this work in some places, because of the neglect of officers to do their duty. The State League will be glad to assist those desiring to enforce the law, whether they be officers or private citizens. The town officers sometimes ask for our secret service help and report that it was efficient. But do not forget the main purpose should be to secure efficient officers and encourage them to their duty.

CORPORATION ELECTION

As the day of the election for annulling or continuing the incorporation of the City of Hereford draws near (next Saturday being the day of election) it is of vital importance that each and every qualified voter go to the polls and cast his vote as his honest convictions direct. Each voter should weigh the matter well before casting his vote, remembering that by his vote he aids in progressing or retarding the growth of his town.

Prejudice should in no way influence your vote. If your honest convictions lead you to believe that the annulment of the corporation will in any way harm the city or retard its growth, you should, as an honest American citizen, cast your vote in favor of corporation, no matter what others may say to influence your vote. On the other hand, if you believe that corporation is ad etriment to the city's progress, you should vote to annul that incorporation.

It is not right that prejudices should shape a man's course in a matter so vitally affecting the public weal. Our men should rise above this plane in contemplating this question of corporation. The only manner in which Hereford can be built up and pushed forward to the pinnacle of future greatness, which is practically assured her by her business location, is for her people to lay down all small, petty differences and come together unitedly on every question which is of vital interest to the town.

Among these vital questions that of municipal incorporation is first in importance. It is the inital step in the city's progressive march, and until it is an assured fact, other things, notably the improvement of our school interests and of our sanitary situation, and the establishment of a water works system for fire protection, must remain in abeyance. Hereford's citizenship must widen their views to correspond with the growth in business importance and and population of the town and country.

THE BRAND comes with an olive branch. It is anxious indeed to see the present controversey which will close at the polls tomorrow cleared of the features of personal feeling. So long as that is a factor, just so long will it be impossible to present the case to all on its merits alone, as should be done.

THE BRAND by no means sets up the claim that the present municipal board is perfect; it has doubtless made mistakes, of course, as all members of the human family must; but that is no reason why the people of this town should tomorrow vote to dissolve the corporation and thus take a long step to the rear, and from personal interviews which we have had with members of the City Council we have the assurance that any mistakes they may have made will be rectified for the asking, or upon their being brought to the notice of the Council.

A majority of the voters at the previous election decided they wished to live in an incorporated city. Why should not the will of the majority rule? All had an opportunity to vote their sentiments. The vote was taken upon a clear-cut issue involving the public good; the present contest is so mixed up with prejudices, so discolored by misrepresentations, so warped by exaggerations and mistatements (on both sides, perhaps) that many men may be swept from their feet and may vote without a clear understanding of the real issues.

THE BRAND is pleased to note that the recent election to annul the incorporation of San Angelo resulted in the continuance of corporation by a large majority. This was as it should be and we trust that the Hereford election will meet with the same result.

Now that our college is an assured fact let every citizen do his utmost to make this coming year a banner one in its history as a successful institution of learning. If you have friends who have children to educate, endeavor to have them investigate the merits of our college before placing their children in some other school. Point out to them the moral tone of Hereford, the excellency of our climate and water, and the healthful conditions of Hereford. Announcement of the members of the faculty of the college will be made soon, and you may rest assured that it will be the strongest obtainable.

How about fencing the public school grounds, providing a well and windmill and planting trees and shrubbery therein this fall? If this were done, our school grounds would be the pride of the city in three years' time and be worth far more than the cost.

In three years' time the county court house grounds will be a place of beauty indeed. Sheriff Inmon is very faithful in the care of the trees and shrubbery planted therein and the different societies holding picnics on the gounds should take especial care that the small trees are not injured. Of course we do not infer that there would be any wilful damage done, but children, in their play, often trample on a six-inchhigh tree or shrub without thinking of the damage they may inflict.

Personal friends will come toyour store anyway. You want the trade of the rest of the people. You can't reach them, but proper advertising can reach them. 
