NEW MEXICO OIL FIELDS.

Several of Hereford's Leading Citizens Interested in the Project.

Increased interest in the oil project, now in the embryo, is rapidly developing into the chrysilis stage and if reports are true, it will be only a matter of a few weeks until the beautiful butter-fly, which will be a full-sized oil boom, will be fluttering in this vicinity and will be generally known over the entire country.

The Argus received information, this week from a reliable source, that the reports which have been circulated during the past few week's about the oil prospects, have not been exagerated in the least, and that so far very little has been told regarding the true conditions of affairs, and what the real prospects are for a promising oil field.

It has been known for some time that the surface indications in this territory were especially flattering and everything taken into consideration, it was considered one of the best prospective fields which has ever been discovered in the country Experts have been working on the proposition for the past two or three years, but not until last year did they succeed in interesting enough capital in the proposition to justify the beginning of work.

Last year a company of California capitalists visited this section which is now being developed, and, after procuring reports from several of the best oil experts in the country velop the field. Accordingly, this last spring, the first steps were taken and the land was surveyed and filed upon and now the work necessary to bring the oil to the surface is ready to begin.

Prof. Carleton on Hard Wheat. In response to inquiry from Farm and Ranch, Prof. M. A. Carleton, Cerealist of United States Department of Agriculture, writes the following on August 10, concerning the milling qualities of macaroni wheat

"I have heard from several sources recently that some Texas millers have declined to handle macaroni wheat. Of course I am not at all surprised at this after the rather severe experience we have had in the Northwest. The whole thing has settled down now to a quiet basis in that region, however, and the wheat of the last year's crop was quite exhausted long ago while still in great demand and selling at more than \$1 a bushel at Buffalo, N. Y. There is no doubt but that the millers in Western and Northwestern Texas will ultimately handle the wheat, because it is the only wheat that will successfully grow there, and there is no question at all now that it is profitable to use it in the mills. However, I have never supposed that the mills in such places as Dallas or other towns that far East would find it profitable, for the reason that they can obtain other wheats so easily. 

HEREFORD'S NURSERY.

There are at Present About 120,000 Trees Growing at the Nursery.
