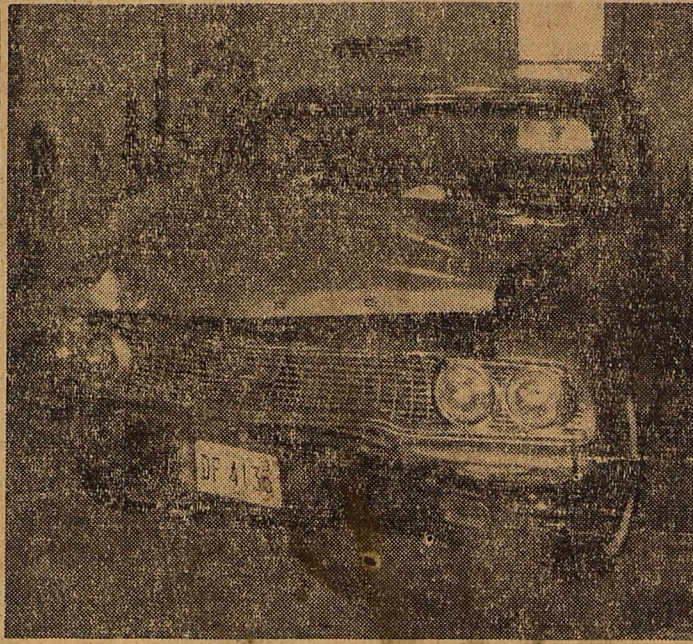

Texas School Teachers' Salaries Are Below Average

AUSTIN — Texas public school teachers this year will receive a salary almost \$600 below the national average — and Texas will drop to 29th place among the states in salaries-paid teachers.

That was the statement today by Mrs. Elizabeth Little of Corpus Christi, state president of the Texas State Teachers Association. She based her statement on an annual national survey by the National Education Association, "Estimates of School Statistics, 1963-64."

Nationally, the average salary for teachers is estimated to be \$5,963 for the current school year. In Texas the figure is \$5,390.

This drops Texas to 29th position among the states. It is down from the 24th position Texas held temporarily after the last statewide teacher pay boost was provided effective for 1961-62. There is danger

that the state will slide farther behind.

The total amount spent for each school child — including teacher pay — is one measure of how well a State supports education. And here again Texas is below average.

All 50 states will spend an average of \$455 for each public school pupil in attendance this year; Texas will spend only \$387. This puts Texas in a tie with Vermont for 35th place.

"These are just some of the reasons that TSTA will ask the 1965 Legislature to provide a \$45 per month increase in the minimum salary for teachers," Mrs. Little pointed out.

Such a salary increase could not be effective before the 1965-66 school year, the TSTA president noted. Meantime, other states will continue to make improvements and it is probable that Texas will again be near the 34th position it held on teacher salaries before the Texas Legislature acted in 1961.

"The '\$45 for 65' program will not solve the problem completely," Mrs. Little, a first grade teacher, said. "But it will prevent Texas from falling farther behind in the race for excellence in education."

ART SHOW TO BE FEATURED AT SAN ANTONIO STOCK SHOW

A new event this year at the 15th Annual Stock Show and Rodeo, February 7th through February 16th, is the National Western Invitational Art Show, Exhibit and Sale, sponsored by the Alamo Kiwanis Club of San Antonio.

Under the direction of Dr. William Burns, Curator of the Witte Museum, the Western Art Show, Exhibit and Sale will be held in a special exhibit room located in the Dairy Barn on the Joe Freeman Coliseum Grounds.

"A great number of local artists have entered paintings, and entries from other sections of this state, California, Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, and many of the other states are coming in every day, so the Show will have approximately 250 paintings on exhibit," stated Dr. Burns.

In addition to the Art Show, and Sale, a special exhibit of some of the most valuable art collections in the world today will be on display. Including nine bronzes by the famous western artist, Frederic Remington. These bronzes, depicting life in the Old West around the turn of this century, were secured by Dr. Burns from the Omon Carter Museum of Western Art in Fort Worth.

Remington, born in Canton, New York, in 1861, graduated from art schools in New York City. He then became a cowboy and stockman, and through actual first-hand experiences, Remington became one of the America's foremost animal painters and illustrators of western scenes. Most of the magnificent bronzes to be displayed here were created during Remington's latter years; he died in 1909.

The following pieces of art to be shipped to San Antonio for the Western Art Show, Exhibit and Sale from the Omon Carter Museum are:

"THE BRONCO BUSTER": Cast in 1905, showing a cowboy on a rearing horse. This bronze is 32" high.

"THE STAMPEDE": Cast posthumously in 1910, depicting a mounted cowboy in the midst of a group of stampeding cattle.

"THE SCALP": Cast in 1898, representing a mounted Indian triumphantly holding up a scalp taken from a defeated enemy.

"DRAGOONS -1850": Cast in 1905, showing two Indians and two dragoons, all mounted, and engaged in running combat. One riderless horse in full gallop leads the group.

Other famous Remington bronzes to be on exhibit are entitled: "THE OUTLAW", "THE MOUNTAIN MAN", "CHEYENNE", "THE TROOPER OF THE PLAINS-1868" and "COMING THROUGH THE RYE".

The Alamo Kiwanis Club has set an admission price to the Art Show, Exhibit and Sale of 50c and children under 12 admitted for 10c when accompanied by an adult. All proceeds will benefit Boysville, Children's Service Bureau, and other Alamo Kiwanis Club's charity projects.

There were also some capable entries from Rochester, although they didn't place.

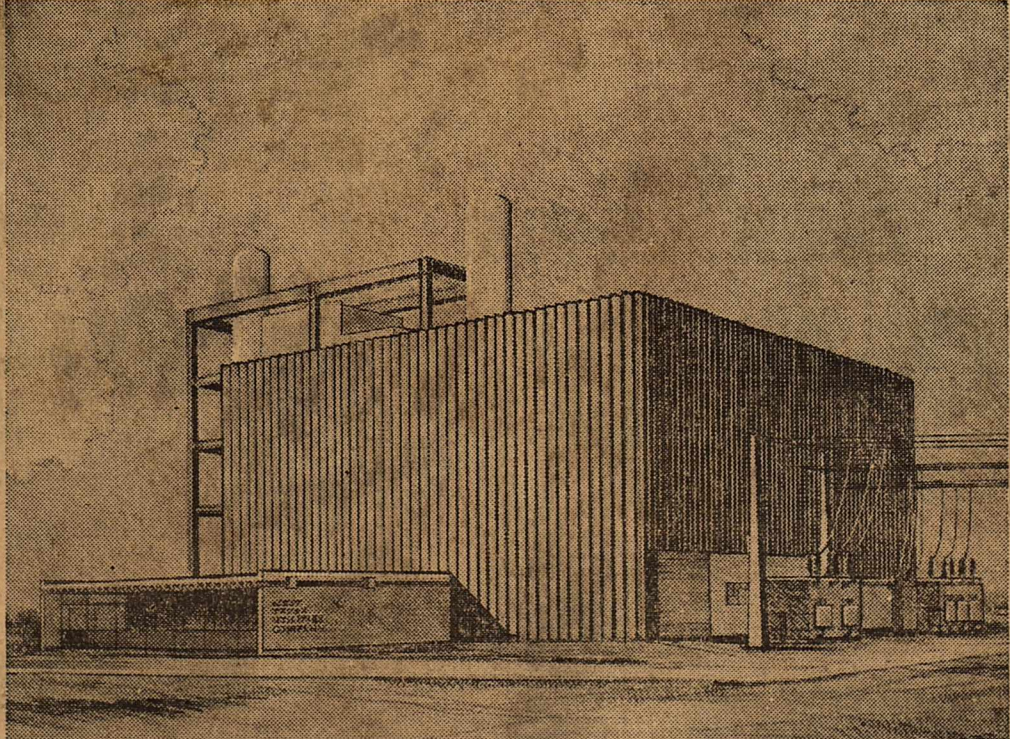

Santa Fe Railway Has Bargain Fares

F. E. Hanlon, general passenger agent for Santa Fe Railway at Amarillo said that Santa Fe was not presently included in the Interstate Commerce Commission authority to boost passenger fares. Hanlon said Santa Fe was one of the railroads that remained within the Texas statutory passenger fare limits of 3c per mile when other roads were permitted to increase rates to 3.183c per mile.

"Actually the Santa Fe Railway, instead of raising fares at this time, has instituted a bargain traffic fare reduction for both first class and coaches which started January 10, and will be continued through April 30, of this year," he declared. This reduction, he said, provides a fare cost of 140 percent of a one-way ticket for a round trip fare between two points on the Santa Fe with a limit of 30 days.

Plaintiffs specially plead the five and ten year statutes of limitations of the State of Texas, as a basis for their title to said lands and premises, and pray that on final trial, they have judgment against the defendants, and each of them, for the title and possession of said lands and premises, and that writ of restitution issue, and for rents, damages and costs, and for all such other and further relief, general and special, legal and equitable, to which they may show themselves justly entitled, as is more fully shown by Plaintiffs' Petition on file in this suit.

If this citation is not served within 90 days after the date of its issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The officer executing this writ shall promptly serve the same according to the requirements of law, and the mandates hereof, and make due return as the law directs.

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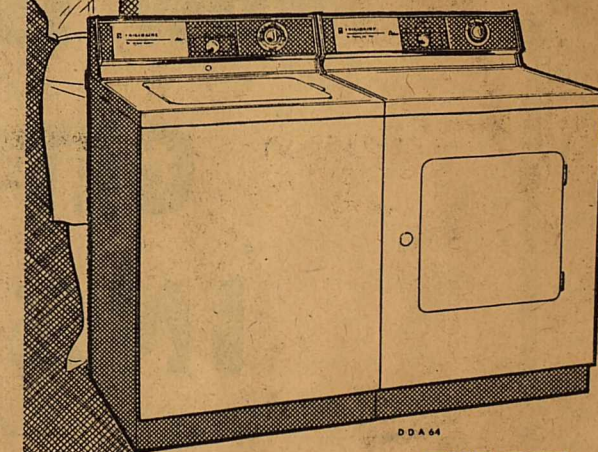

Put Return Address On Tax Return For Refund Checks

"When will I get my refund?" is one of the most frequent tax questions according to Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue. He said that the failure to receive a refund — check or savings bond — is usually caused by illegible names or addresses.

Mr. Campbell said that it is permissible to sign your name at the bottom of the return the way you always sign your name, even if your signature is a hurried scrawl. At the top of the return, however, your name should also be carefully printed or typed along with your social security number. In other words, eliminate any doubt as to who you are and where you live.

Each year thousands of refund checks are returned to Internal Revenue offices because the postman cannot deliver them.

Director Campbell said that if the taxpayer has moved, he should show his new address to promptly receive refunds and other mail from Internal Revenue. If he moves after filing, a forwarding address should be left with the post office.

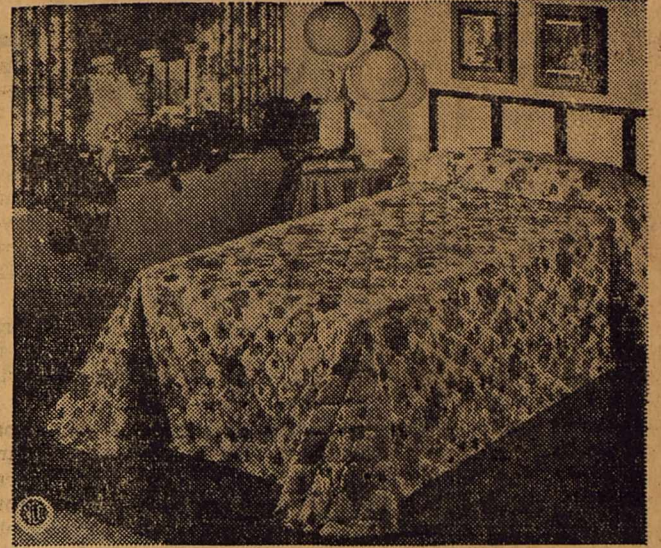

Legal Checkup A Safety Measure

Legal trouble is easier and cheaper to prevent than to cure.

Most wage-earning, child-bearing, home-buying, installment-paying families don't see much need for a family lawyer.

Often only under prodding, one may have his lawyer prepare a will.

But can you tell a big legal risk from a small one? Can you spot the signs of legal trouble?

Check with your family lawyer when:

1. Your Status Changes: upon coming of age, marriage, the birth of your children, buying a house, divorce or death. For you may then need to draft or revise your will, change your insurance, or re-figure your taxes.

2. You buy or sell. Look out for flaws in the papers before you go into debt, part with money, or sign anything involving big expenditures or long-term obligations.

3. You enter into other contracts. Promises, spoken or written, bind you if they call for a "consideration" something of value in return.

Do you drive around in your auto on cold winter days with all windows and vents tightly closed?

Do you sometimes warm up the car engine in your garage without first opening the garage door?

Do you neglect a checkup of exhaust and manifold on your car unless something starts rattling or falls off?

If your answer to any of these questions is "Yes" — you are flirting with carbon monoxide poisoning.

Carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless, tasteless gas that comes from your auto exhaust. In the open air it usually is dissipated without harm to anyone. But in an enclosed space it can be deadly.

Each winter brings reports of deaths from carbon monoxide poisoning. The gas can seep up through the floor boards from a leaky exhaust. The victim becomes drowsy and then "falls asleep." It takes only a short time for an engine running in a closed garage to fill the building with deadly gas.

No one knows how many auto accidents are caused by motorists whose reaction time is somewhat slowed by a small seepage of carbon monoxide into a closed auto. If your exhaust and manifold are in good shape and fitted tight, you likely are safe. But it's even safer to leave a rear window open a crack.

While the car is moving you probably can escape danger even with a leaky exhaust. The most dangerous time comes sitting in a parked car with the motor running and the windows closed. This is a frequent occurrence in cold weather when the auto heater is turned on. Always open a window when you're parked.

ed with the motor running. Carbon monoxide poisoning is a serious health hazard. Remind yourself and your family to be on the alert to the danger.

AUSTIN — "A lone man's companion... a sad man's cordial... and a chilly man's fire... there's no herb like unto it under the canopy of heaven."

That's James Russell Lowell's personal reflections toward tobacco or cigarettes.

But medical science points out some disconcerting parallels of smoking to health.

With this in mind, the Division of Cancer and Heart of the Texas State Department of Health is determined that today's generation should have the facts when confronted with the decision of smoke or not to smoke.

A first and basic point is that smoking is a habit — similar to an addiction. "The habitual use of tobacco," according to the recent report to the Surgeon General by the Advisory Committee, is related primarily to psychological and social crises, reinforced and perpetuated by the pharmacological actions of nicotine on the central nervous system.

Secondly, teenagers should be aware of the relationship between smoking and health.

Lung cancer, heart and circulatory diseases are linked to the smoking habit. And statistics show that these diseases increase in proportion to the number of cigarettes smoked per day.

Teenagers are challenged to

add it all up. A smoke lasts about six minutes, but cuts ten minutes off your lifetime.

Teenagers are further advised that the habit decreases physical endurance and ability, slows thinking processes and discolors fingers and teeth.

Inevitably, the question arises... why do teenagers start smoking anyway?

Teenagers say, according to recent studies, they are lured by the persuasive voice of advertisers. They also start because the gang does it, in search of security and stability and in imitation of people they admire.

Parental example appears to be an important contributing example. When both parents smoke, a teenager stands a 40 percent chance of taking up the habit. But when neither

parent smokes, the teenager stands only a 22 percent chance of starting.

Today's teenager will make his own decision to form or reject the habit. But he and his generation will have the facts, as well as the myth of the TV commercial, as a bulwark for an adult decision.

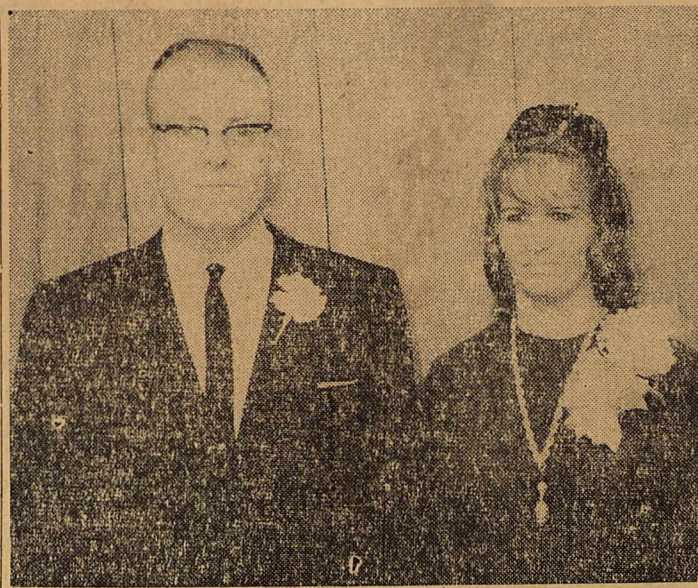

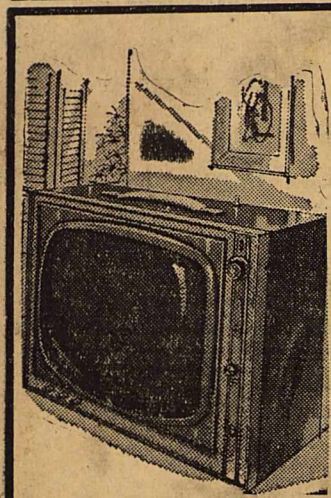

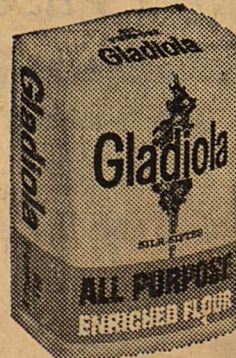
