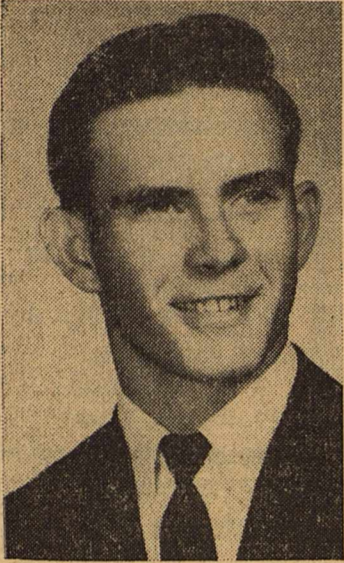

Tornadic Winds Cause Some Damage

High damaging winds and hard rain hit the Rochester area about 1:45 p.m. Wednesday morning.

Rains measured from one to one and a half inches, over the surrounding communities and in town.

High winds of tornadic speed, and a possible tornado picked up a garage on the Everett Berryhill farm, scattering it over about a five acre strip, leaving their son, Buford's pickup, completely undamaged, also the house and other surrounding buildings were unharmed.

There was a report of a steel catwalk being blown from around an oil tank, in that area.

Damage at press time was at a minimum, but more may be reported, later.

Another cloud around 6:30 to 8:00 a.m. Wednesday, also brought on plenty of thunder and lightning, and that much needed moisture, rain.

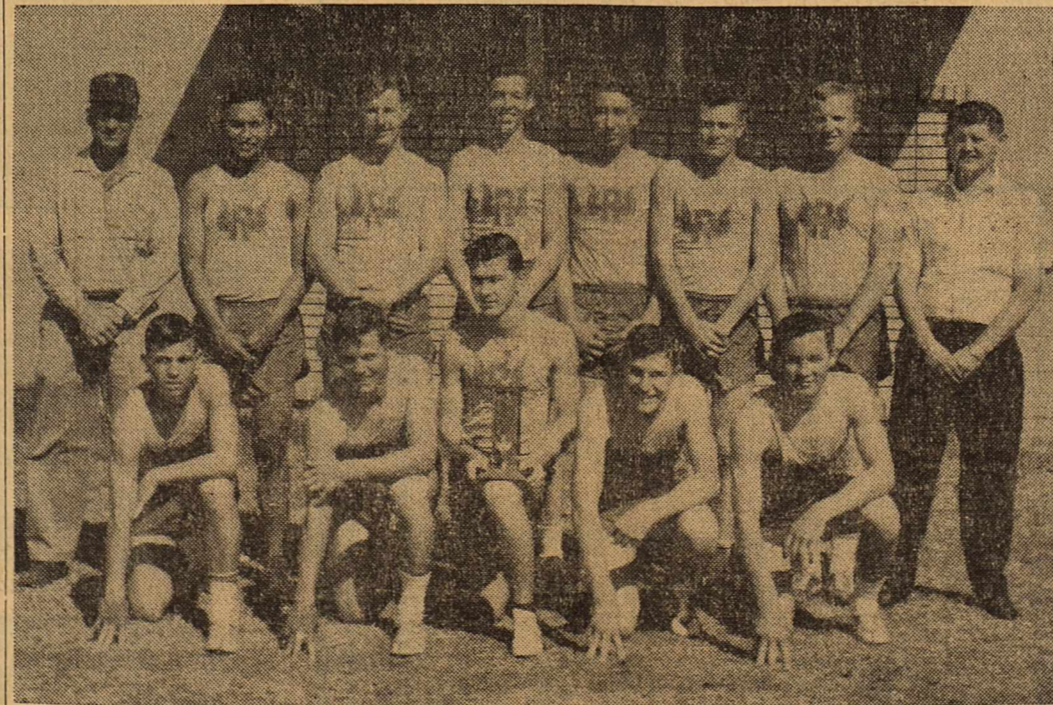

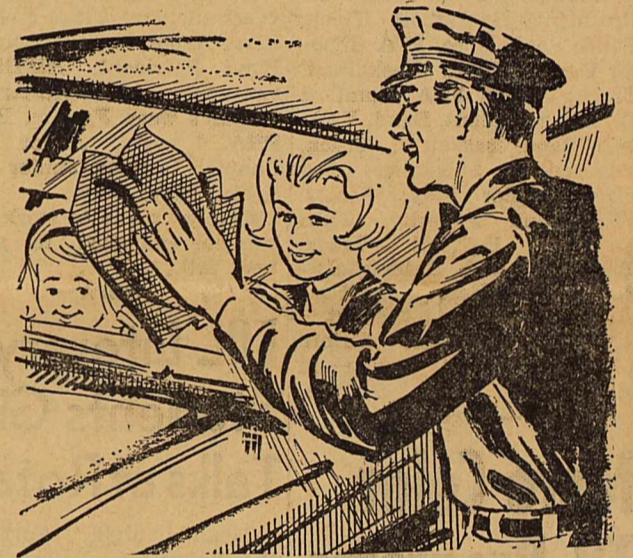
