## Two-Car Crash Claims KC Man

A two-car crash claimed the life of Gary D. Carver, 19, of Knox City at 7:15 p.m. Wednesday of last week when the car he was driving was struck broadside while he was leaving the parking lot of a Knox City store.

Carver was dead on arrival at Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene, where he was taken after his small foreign car was in collision with the car driven by Albino Garcia, 16, also of Knox City.

Garcia was admitted to the Knox County Hospital for observation.

According to DPS Officer Bryan Williams, Carver was turning onto Texas Highway 6 from the parking lot when his car was in collision with the northbound Garcia vehicle. Carver's body was thrown from his car.

Services for Carver were

at 10:30 a.m. Friday at First Baptist Church of Knox City.

The Rev. Roger Butler, a Baptist minister from Cleburne, and the Rev. Hardy Cole, a Methodist minister from Munday, officiated. Burial was in Johnson Cemetery at Munday, directed by Smith Funeral Home of Knox City.

Born Nov. 11, 1956, in Knox City, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Carl Carver who died in 1958. He had lived in Knox City all his life, attended Knox City schools and was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include his step-parents, Bill and Johnnie Pearl Smith of Knox City; two step-brothers, Freddie of Brownwood and Ben of Stamford; and grandparents, Mrs. Vera Mae Carver of Munday, Glen Smith of Munday, and W.H. Robinson of Ft. Worth.

## Baptist Begins New Church Year

The FBI (First Baptist Informers), a new children's choir, will be led by Bobby and Regina O'Neal, with Debra Jeffreys playing the piano. The CIA (Christians-in-Action) will be taught by Bruce Morgan, minister of music and youth. Annie Marshall will teach a Bible class on Sunday evenings for adults while Mrs. John Nichols will lead Sunday School workers to begin thinking about next week's lesson.

## Steers Blank Bronte 39-0

The Mighty Fighting Steers ended their pre-district play in Bronte Friday night with a

39-0 victory over the Longhorns.

The first score of the game came on a two-yard run by End David Adkisson in the first quarter. Minutes later Halfback Mickeal Pisasale added six more on a 30-yard sprint. Neither of the PAT kicks were good and the game went into the second period play with a score of 12-0 for the Steers.

In the second period, Steer Quarterback Jim Harris passed to John Michaels for six and then ran a keeper to add the bonus points, giving the Steers a half-time lead of 20-0.

The Longhorns held the Steers to a scoreless third period, but the Mighty Steers made up for it in the last period of play by scoring three touchdowns and one extra point. Rod Townsend crossed the goal line twice on runs of 45 yards and seven yards, and Jim Harris ran an 19-yard keeper for the third TD of the quarter.

Harris also added the extra PAT to a Townsend TD.

During the game the Steers had two call-backs on penalties; the first one at the beginning of the game when Pisasale crossed over on a 58-yard run, and the second when Gary Strickland crossed over from the 37.

The Steers meet the Goree Wildcats in Goree territory Friday night for their District opener. The Steers go in with a record of 3-0-1.

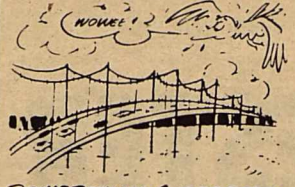

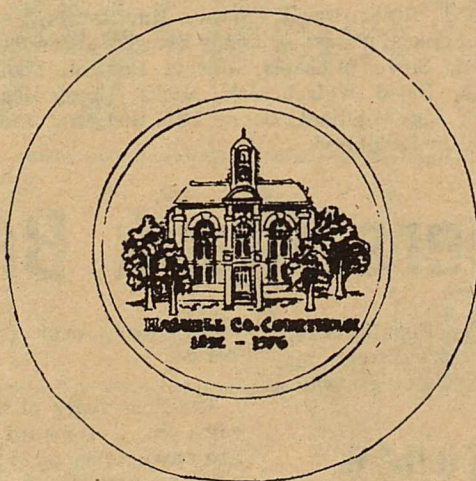

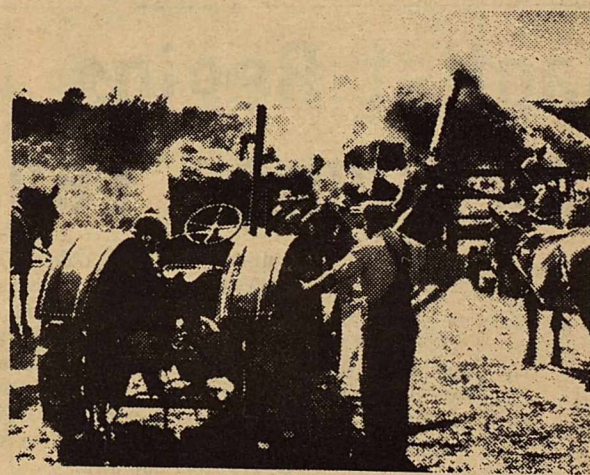

## From the TAP Kitchen



Texas Department of Agriculture - John C. White, Commissioner  
**CRUNCHY PEANUT BRITTLE**

3 cups sugar  
1-1/3 cups white corn syrup  
1/2 cup water  
4 cups raw peanuts  
3 tsp. butter  
1 tsp. vanilla  
2-1/2 tsp. baking soda

Combine sugar, syrup and water in large saucepan. Boil until thread spins or until temperature reaches 250 degrees on candy thermometer. Add peanuts and stir continuously until temperature reaches 300 degrees (hard crack stage). Be careful that mixture does not burn. Pour onto 2 buttered 15-1/2x12-inch cookie sheets; spread quickly to about 1/4-inch thick. Cool, break into pieces. Yield: 2-1/2 to 3 lbs.

## CONSERVATION VIEWPOINTS USDA Soil Conservation Service

Assisting  
California Creek and Wichita-Brazos  
Soil and Water Conservation Districts

After the horse is out, it is too late to repair the fence, the old adage says. So it is with wind erosion control. Once the soil starts blowing from lack of proper cover, it is so often too late to stop the blowing.

Soil Conservation Service field reports from 352 counties in the 10-state area of the Great Plains showed 6.2 million acres damaged from November 1975 to May 1976, compared to 3.8 million acres during the same period a year ago. More than 90 percent of the damage was to cropland.

Haskell Field Office of SCS covers the entirety of Haskell County in this reporting. Our 1975-1976 damage was 20,500 acres, and was only 1500 acres for the same period a year ago.

States reflecting the highest percentage of damage increase were Kansas, Oklahoma, and Nebraska. But Texas reported the most land damaged, nearly 1.6 million acres, but that figure is less than the 2 million acres damaged in Texas the year before.

SCS considers land damaged if enough soil has been removed or deposited to subject the land to further erosion hazard, to materially lower yields, or to impair its capacity to produce.

Crops or cover, preferably, growing crops, is still our best source of control. However, weather conditions so often limit the heavy growth of cover crops in the early fall months, that their effectiveness is not measurable in controlling wind erosion.

Residues, left standing in the field, cotton burs applied to the land in amounts of three to five tons per acre, or old hay

spread over the land and tucked into the top of the soil are considered very good wind erosion control measures.

Maize harvesting is well underway, and many have started some type of plowing this residue. For the sake of the land, if you must plow, plow with sweeps, shallow, leaving most or all of the residues on the soil surface to protect the soil from blowing.

Many producers feel that the maize residues must be "turned under" for it to properly decay prior to next year's crop. This isn't always true.

In periods of drought, residues completely turned under are often found the next spring in the same condition or state that they were in when turned under. Residues left on the surface will often deteriorate much faster due to the action of the elements, such as freezing and

thawing, snow or other forms of moisture aiding in the decomposition of the organic material.

Haskell County has approximately 140,000 acres of land that is considered to be of high or moderately high wind erosion susceptibility. Over 95 percent of this total acreage is situated in the northwestern one-third of the county, or from a line drawn from Rule to Munday (Knox Co.) This is the area that is considered the sandy lands of Haskell County.

Let me urge you to maintain your residue on the soil surface, get your winter cover crops in as early as possible to allow for sufficient growth prior to the start of the windy season in November. Help yourselves and help me, in not having so great an acreage damaged this coming blow season as we did last year.

Mend the fence now before the horse gets out.

The Adult Basic Education classes will be offered again this year. Registration will begin at 7 p.m. Monday night, October 4, and classes will be held each Monday night at the Rochester High School. Classes will be held for three hours from 6 to 9 p.m.
