Rites Pending For Resident, Mrs. Porter

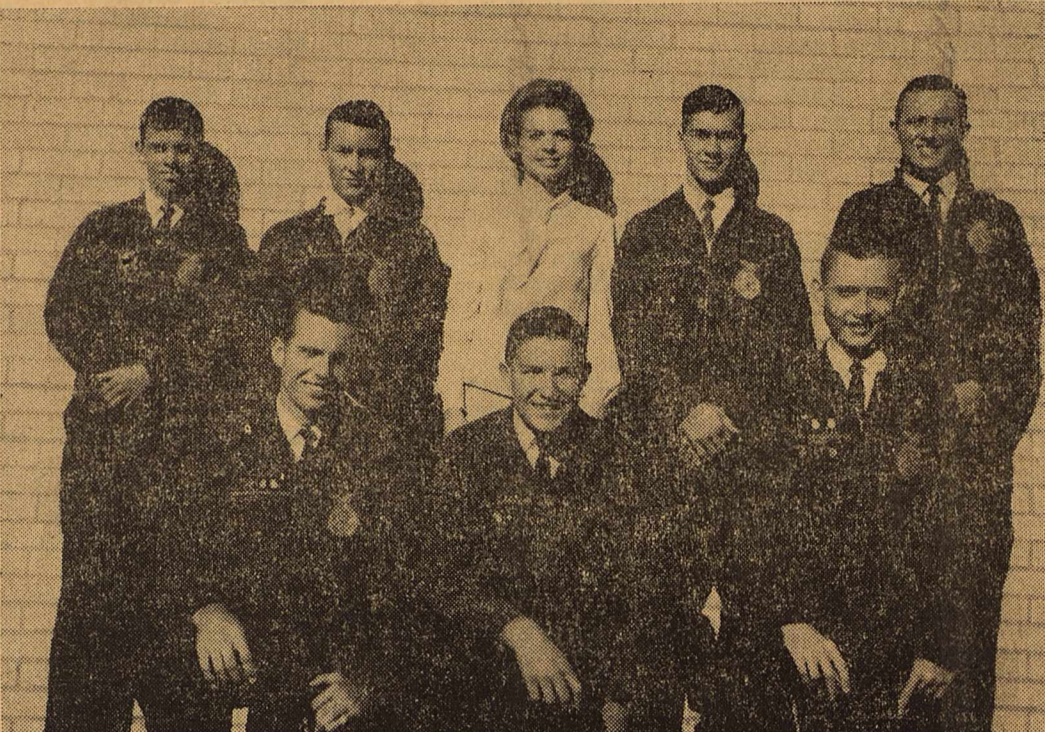

Great Plains Conservation Program Aids Land Owners

According to Arche Lieb, Work Unit Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service at Knox City, Great Plains Conservation Program money is now available in this District. Any land owner or producer who has control of the land, in the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District is eligible to participate in this cost share program, Lieb stated. To date 86 producers in the District have received cost share assistance on the program, on 90,000 acres of farm and ranch land.

The purpose of the Great Plains Conservation Program, Lieb continued, is to help the farmer and rancher carry out a program that will help to minimize climate hazards and protect his land from erosion and deterioration by natural causes. Practices eligible for cost sharing include: establishing permanent grass cover, range seeding, brush control, building terraces, waterways and farm ponds, constructing wells for livestock water, installing irrigation pipe, land leveling, fencing and constructing ponds for irrigation. Any eligible producer may earn up to \$25,000 cost share. The cost share rate on practices runs from 50 percent to 80 percent of the average cost of installing each eligible practice.

Producers in the Rochester area have taken advantage of the Great Plains Conservation program. Mr. Earl Alvis, livestock producer and vice-president of the Home State Bank in Rochester, started a Great Plains Conservation Program contract in 1963. One item in the contract called for land use conversion from cropland to grass on 50 acres. Accord-

Cotton Classing Office Reports

Harvesting operations have remained at a standstill due to cool wet weather and only 354 samples have been classed this week at the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Munday.

This season's total bales classed is 2,262 as compared to 22,275 at this time last season, according to A. D. Peebles in charge of the office.

Grades for the week ran 5 percent Strict Low Middling White, 14 percent Strict Middling Light Spotted, 38 percent Middling Light Spotted, 38 percent Middling Light Spotted, 11 percent Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, 24 percent Middling Spotted and 3 percent Strict Low Middling Spotted.

Staple lengths for the same period were 14 percent 7-8, 59 percent 29-32, 14 percent 15-16, 3 percent 31-32, and 10 percent 1 inch and longer.

Micronaire readings were good with 92 percent between 3.5 and 4.9.

This defeat for the Steers brought the losing streak of three losses and no wins, to the Rochester team this season, and the victory over the Steers, brought the Greyhounds to a three wins, and one loss total, this season.

The Steers showed quite a bit of improvement over the previous games, with the defense putting forth a great deal of fight and holding power to hold a big, experienced Class A team like the

Greyhounds. The Steers' offense's only threat to score came early in the fourth quarter, as they moved to the Greyhound's five. Buford Berryhill set up the threat by intercepting a Knox City pass on the Greyhound 40 yard line and made a good gain.

Johnny Wyatt, Steve LeFevre, Tommy Holmes and Berryhill made small gains to the five yard line, before bogging down, and the Greyhounds took over on downs.

Knox City scored a touchdown in each of the first three quarters, the first being with 3 minutes and 20 seconds left in the first quarter, as Brack Shaver made a one

yard plunge from the quarterback position. This was after a drive downfield, of 70 yards. The extra point try failed. The second quarter touchdown came with 9 minutes and 55 seconds to play, as Phil Williams drove over from the three. This time, the second try for the two extra points was good, on a pass from Shaver to Richard Rodriguez. The halftime score was 14-0 in the Greyhound's favor.

The final touchdown came in the third quarter on a pass from Shaver to Ray Penman. The extra point try, failed.

Baptist Mission To Hold Services Sept. 27 - Oct. 4

The Zion Baptist (Latin American) Mission, O'Brien, Texas, will conduct evangelistic services at the church, September 27 - October 4, as part of a state-wide Crusade aimed at reaching 2 1/2 million unevangelized Latin American people of Texas with the gospel.

About 400 Latin American churches and missions throughout the state are participating in the widespread effort called Cruzada Bautista Nueva Vida (the Latin American Baptist New Life Crusade). It is being sponsored by the Baptist General Convention of Texas August 30 - October 11. In addition, Baptist churches near the border in Mexico and New Mexico are joining in the Crusade.

The Crusade is being held in four stages with the state divided into three zones for better coordination. The first week of the campaign in each area is devoted to area-central campaigns held chiefly in tents at 43 strategic locations.

Personal witnessing campaigns take up the second week, with local revivals in about 400 churches slated the third week. The fourth and final week features major-central campaigns in auditoriums and stadiums in 23 cities across the state.

Seven Anglo churches have been assigned to each of the Latin American churches as prayer partners, said Dr. T. A. Patterson, executive secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

He said the meetings are being promoted throughout the state through newspapers and radio and television. TV stations across the state have carried or will carry a 28-minute documentary film on the Crusade and on the contribution Latin Americans have made to agriculture, foods, architecture and other vital areas of life in Texas.

Crusade leaders predict that 25,000 professions of faith in Christ will result in the six-week campaign.
