

gospel. About 400 Latin American churches and missions throughout the state are participating in the widespread effort called Cruzada Bau-Crusade.) It is being sponsored by the Baptist General Convention of Texas August 30 - October 11. In addition, Baptist churches near the border in Mexico and New Mexico are joining in the
