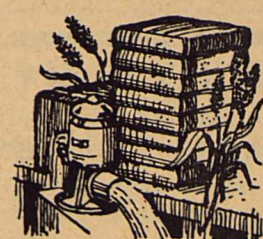

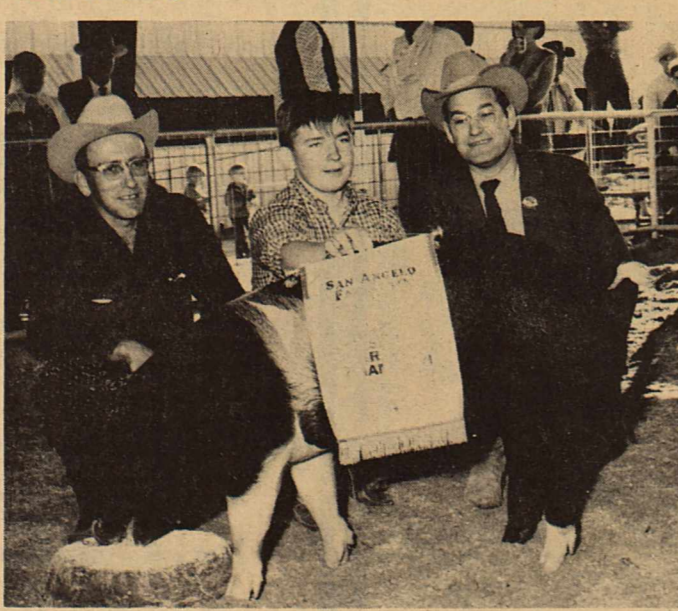

Rochester To Host Invitational Track And Field Meet Sat.

ROCHESTER - Rochester will be host to the 11th annual Invitational Track and Field Meet, here Saturday, March 15.

There will be about twelve B-schools in the meet. Finals in the following events will take place at 9 a.m. Shot Put, Broad Jump, and High Jump.

Preliminaries in running events with the seven best times going to the finals except in the hurdles where there will be 6. 9:45 - 440 yard Relay; 10:05 - 120 yard High Hurdles; 10:25 - 100 yard Dash; 11:05 - 330 Intermediate Hurdles; 11:30 - 220 yard Dash.

Noon will be from 12 until 1:30 then the finals in the Pole Vault, and Discus will be held. Finals in the running events will begin at 2:10 - 440 yard Relay; 2:20 - 880 yard Dash; 2:40 - 120 yard High Hurdles; 3:00 - 100 yard Dash; 3:10 - 440 yard Dash; 3:25 - 330 Intermediate Hurdles; 3:45 - 220 yard Dash; 3:55 - Mile Run; 4:15 - Mile Relay (will be run in heats against time.)

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EDITORIAL

Legislative action can soon be expected on proposals that will have tremendous impact on our state's public school system and the young people of Texas for years to come.

The recent and controversial report of the Committee on Public School Education is represented in several bills already introduced in both houses of the Legislature.

Of primary concern is the proposal to force the consolidation of 865 of the state's 1,218 districts, creating 353 districts containing no less than 2,600 students. This would obviously eliminate practically every rural and small community school in the state.

Also of great significance is the proposal to institute a sweeping re-evaluation of all real property in Texas, a program that will, for all practical effect, establish the state board of education as a statewide tax assessor for local school taxes.

That this is aimed directly at the thousands of rural landowners and residents in Texas can hardly be doubted, as the committee's report declares: "The Bartlett study verified the fact that city school districts are being cheated in the distribution of state school aid because county tax rolls favor rural areas."

Certainly it should be recognized that there are schools, supporting only a handful of students, that should consider consolidation with neighboring districts; certainly it should be recognized that tax inequities, favoring some rural districts, do exist.

But we submit that arbitrary elimination of our rural schools

and the resultant decay of thousands of rural communities, and the many complex problems arising from the establishment of county-wide and multi-county school districts, is not the answer. Voluntary consolidation should be encouraged, but mere bigness is no guarantee of quality or economy.

We also submit that the tax proposal, that will result in tax bills to our state's rural residents - farmers and ranchers who live on their land and make their living from the land - increasing two, three and four times in size, is certainly as inequitable as is now claimed by the committee on behalf of citizens of metropolitan centers. The old saying that two wrongs don't make a right certainly seems appropriate in this area.

It would appear much more logical and practical, then, while encouraging voluntary consolidation of many of our smaller schools, to seek new ways to improve and upgrade the curricula of these schools and to spend our tax money to help accomplish this goal: to bring advanced and improved educational opportunities to the students rather than forcing them to travel many additional miles per day for their education, and to keep control of our schools where it always has been and always should be - in the hands of our local citizens and taxpayers.

Tech Research Compliments Area Program

The proposed vegetable research program at Texas Tech will compliment the vegetable research already underway in this area. Cultural and variety studies conducted at Texas Tech during 1969 will be designed to incorporate the latest concepts in production practices. Findings that prove to be of value will be evaluated in the area in an effort to establish uniform production practices and thus maintain a continuous supply of a uniform product in the market.

Current studies underway consist of:

1. 5 varieties of cabbage (F1 hybrids) and 5 varieties of onions planted on October 8, 1968 to evaluate over-wintering possibilities.
2. Early spring applications of selective pre-emergence herbicides to control early spring weeds in cabbage and onions and reduce production costs.
3. 11 varieties of fresh market and chipping potatoes planted February 11, 12 and 13.
4. Pre-emergence application of a selective potato herbicide at planting to give all season weed control.

SPRING AND SUMMER VEGETABLE RESEARCH

In addition to the studies already underway in the area, several other vegetable crops will be added to the program as the season progresses.

1. Crops planned:
 - A. Cucumber variety trials in conjunction with chemical herbicide studies for season

long weed control.

- B. Cantaloupe variety trials with herbicide studies.
- C. Sweet potato variety trials. Adaptation evaluation.
- D. Over wintering of cabbage and onion varieties. Second year following current study. *****

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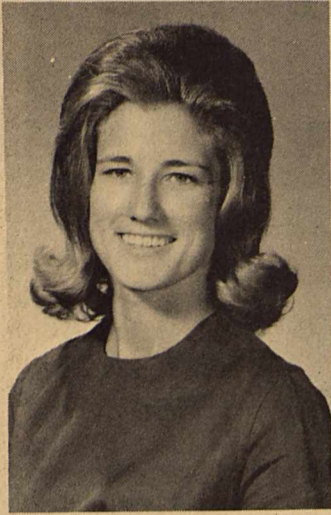

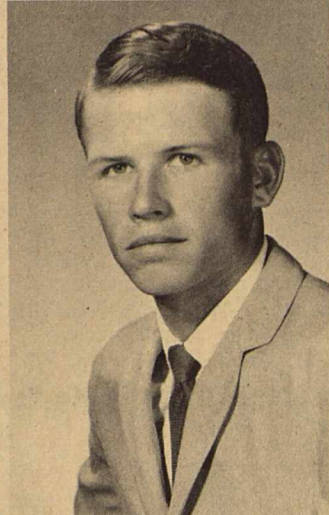
