Steers Win 35 to 16, Travel To Throckmorton Fri. Night

"We won over Hermleigh". Lets all travel to Throckmorton, this Friday night, October 9, 1964, and see the Greyhounds and Steers clash on the Throckmorton home field, at 7:30 p.m. Come on Steers fans, lets get out a bigger crowd at the games. There was such a small crowd out Friday night to see the Steers beat the Hermleigh Cardinals, that there were even several choice seats left unwanted. Lets back our team, Win or Lose.

The 6-B slate this week includes: Rule at Hermleigh; Jayton at Turkey; and Rochester at Throckmorton.

Hermleigh Game

The Rochester Steers ran over the Hermleigh Cardinals, Friday night in Fields Stadium, October 2, 35 to 16, in a hard fought battle between the two Class B teams.

Halfbacks Buford Berryhill and Steve LeFevre found running room more than once as Berryhill scored three touchdowns and LeFevre, two, with the most competent assistance of fullback Johnny Wyatt and quarterback Tommy Holmes, and an outstanding group of linemen to pave the way.

A most eager hard working defensive line held the Cardinals to 16 points and four first downs. The Cardinals were defeated before entering the game with the Steers, but with the well trained defensive line and the fast offensive backfield, the Steers earned their first victory in the 1964 season.

Johnny Wyatt scored four extra points and John Hudspeth kicked one extra point.

Berryhill scored the first touchdown after a pass interception by Bill Penman and yardage by Wyatt set up the play on a 13 yard run with 8 minutes and 19 seconds left in the second quarter. Wyatt carried for the two extra points. Three minutes later, Troy Fischer covered a Cardinal fumble on the Cardinals' 24 yd. line and three plays later, Steve LeFevre plunged the ball over from the one yd. line. The try on a pass for extra points, fell incomplete.

Berryhill, with two minutes and 50 seconds left in the second quarter, scored again on a pitchout from Tommy Holmes. Extra points try was no good. This brought the halftime score to 20 to 0, in the Steers' favor.

Two minutes deep in the third quarter, Berryhill rambled 20 yards to pay dirt, and his third touchdown. Wyatt again ran the two extra points.

Hermleigh, not to be forgotten, got into the scoring column with 2 minutes left in the third quarter, when quarterback Curtis Brown plowed over from the three yd. line. End Mike Roemisch

Road committee reported on its work toward a new Farm to Market road.

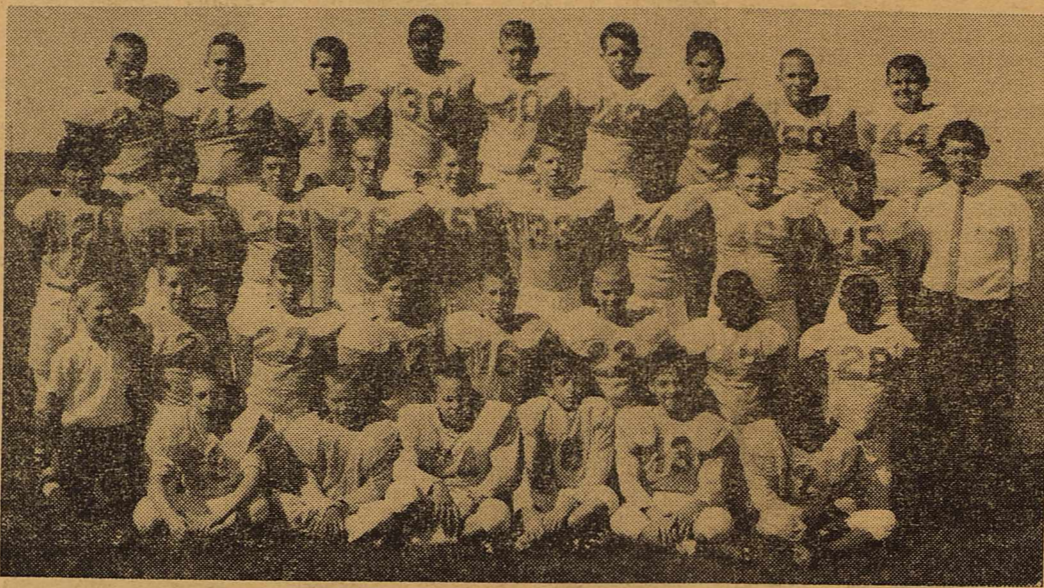
C. Hollingsworth Receives Training In San Diego, Calif.

SAN DIEGO, CALIF. (FH-TNC) — Carroll L. Hollingsworth, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Hollingsworth of Rochester, Tex., began basic training September 23 at the Naval Training Center, San Diego, Calif.

The nine-week training includes naval orientation, history and organization, seamanship, ordnance and gunnery, military drill, first aid and survival.

During the training recruits receive tests and interviews which determine their future assignments in the Navy. Upon completing the program they are assigned to service schools for technical training or to ships and stations for on-the-job training in a Navy rating specialty.

Naval training produces the power in seapower by supplying qualified personnel to man the ships, planes and shore stations of today's Navy.

FORT GORDON, GA. (AH-TNC) — Pvt. James E. Pope, son of Mrs. Emma L. Pope, Rochester, Tex., completed eight weeks of military police training October 2, at the U. S. Army Training Center, Fort Gordon, Ga.

Pope was instructed in civil and military law, map reading, prisoner-of-war control and self-defense.

The 24-year-old soldier entered the Army last May and completed basic training at Fort Polk, La.

He is a 1958 graduate of Rochester High School and received his B. S. degree from Abilene, Christian College, in 1962.

He was employed by International Minerals & Chemicals, Carlsbad, N. M., before entering the Army.

Haskell County Bond Sales Total \$17,931 For August

Mr. J. M. Crawford, Chairman of the Haskell County Savings Bonds Committee, announced that the county's August Savings Bond sale totaled \$17,931. Sales for the first eight months of this year were \$126,700, which represents 57.5 percent of the 1964 sales goal.

Total sales in Texas for the first eight months of the year were \$100,643,333 or 67 percent of the state goal. Savings Bond sales have increased approximately \$900,000 compared to the same period in 1963.

"In a recent brochure the Treasury Department stressed the tax advantages of buying E Bonds. While the interest is subject to Federal income tax, the reporting of E Bond interest may be deferred until the bonds are cashed or reach final maturity. This means that the owner of the bonds can choose to cash his bonds in years of low income. This fact makes E Bonds particularly attractive to the large investor and for those persons either planning retirement or supplementing an existing retirement program," Chairman Crawford stated.

Mr. Richards has published the Rule Review since 1946. The Rule Review Fire Department had the blaze under control shortly after 11 p.m., as reported by Haskell County Deputy Sheriff, Raymond K. Denson.

He will be unable to work for approximately three weeks.

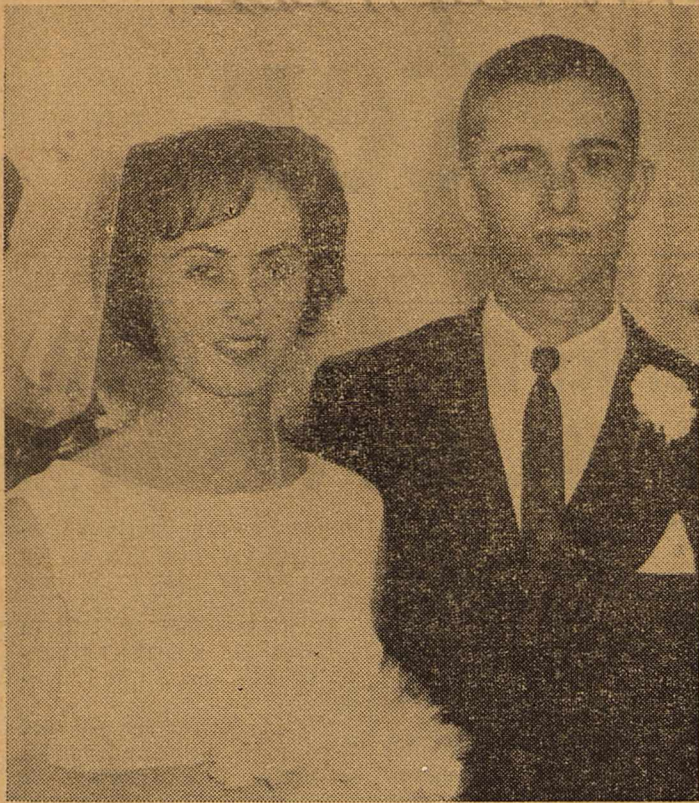

The Reverend Gene Louder officiated. Nuptial music was presented by Mrs. B. O. Robertson and Carolyn Bean, soloist of ACC.

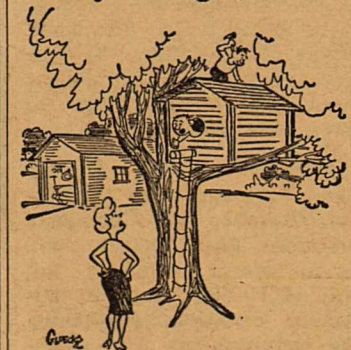


Graveside Rites For Mrs. J. B. Whitaker Wed., Sept. 30th

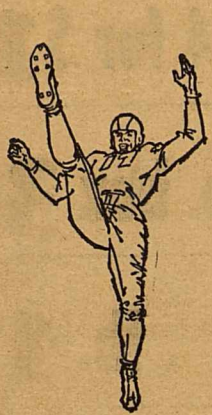
