

## Farmers Signup Dates, 3 Through Mar.

for farmers in Haskell County, Texas who wish to take part in the 1969 feed grain, wheat and cotton programs have been announced by Frank W. Moeller, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation, Haskell County Committee.

All commodity program signups will be held during the same period - February 3, through March 21. Signup apeach of the districts of the plications indicate the farmer's program intentions, including the extent of his participation in the programs.

Under the feed grain program for 1969, farmers may earn di-Mr. Fain and Wadzeck will version and price-support payprice-support loans on their corn, barley and grain sorghum crops; feed grain diversion payments will be available to all program participants in 1969. The wheat program provides diversion payments for reducing acreage below the farm allotment, and price-support loans on all the wheat produced on the farm. It also provides marketing certificates to bring returns up to full parity on the part of the wheat crop allocated for domestic use. No diversion payment is available for cotton.







### GUARANTEED INCOME IS NOT THE ANSWER

Guaranteeing everybody an adequate income might seem to be the most direct and simple method to end poverty. But it could be the most destructive, dividual income taxpayers who and family spent Sunday with between semesters with her according to a Stanford University economist.

Dangers in the various income supplement proposals, such as the Negative Income Tax and the Guaranteed Annual Income, are easily apparent, says Roger A. Freeman, Senior Staff Member of the University's Hoover Institution on War, Revolution,

Easy access to public funds, in Freeman's opinion, is economically wasteful and socially destructive. "There is an inherent danger," he says, "in dividing the people into two classes: those who produce and pay taxes and those who are permanently dependent on the public treasury although they could perform useful work."

Freeman says society does owe its members an opportunity to earn a living, and he calls on the nation to maintain adequate incentives to work rather than incentives not to work, as some of the currently proposed income maintenance programs would do.

"If a 4-person family can get from the government without work \$3,335 and a household of different size a proportionate amount—who will take a job paying \$3,500, \$4,000 or \$4,500?," Freeman asks. "Entire occupations would be wiped out . . . a large part of the labor force would immediately retire and most agricultural employment would end. ...The combined impact of demand-push and costpush inflation and a reduced supply of goods would

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


