

Flouridation of public water supply has been one of the most widely discussed and debated health issues during the past quarter century.

Almost all water supplies are naturally fluoridated to some extent, containing a mineral form of fluoride. Controllfluoridation brings the amount of fluoride in water up to the optimum level, says the Texas State Department of Health.

Lack of sufficient dietary fluoride can render the teeth more susceptible to decay. Flouride is a nutrient, working in the body through normal body processes. In addition to strengthening the teeth, there is some evidence that fluoride may help to prevent other diseases of the bones and circulatory system. The optimum level of fluoride as a nutrient is extremely small. Even if a person received eight to 10 times this optimum level there would be no serious danger, say health authorities.

The water of many communities contains much more fluoride than is needed, providing a natural laboratory in studying its effect on the body. Some of the earliest studies of fluoridation were conducted in Texas communities with natural fluoride of optimum of higher

Since fluoride is a natural part of the environment, adding minute quantities to water won't hurt plants, animals, machinery or anything else. Even if some of the fluoride is unused, watering lawns, for example, it still is much cheaper to distribute and control the fluoride level in water than in any other way. Fluoride can be applied directly to the teeth, but it isn't as effective and is more expen-

Fluoridation of water would get help to those who need it most, lower income groups who cannot afford expensive dental care.

Fluoridation is an extremely valuable preventive tool against dental trouble. It benefits everyone in a community by reducing the incidence of tooth decay. In Texas alone, two and one-half million people in nearly 70 cities drink water in which the fluoride level is controlled. Another four million people in 586 communities have naturally fluoridated water. Texas is 17th in the nation in total population served by fluoridation. Total number drinking fluoridated water in the United States is 92 million. To add to the emphasis on fluoridation. seven states now require water fluoridation.

Suppose you are sitting in a theater when the man next to you slumps to the floor, unconscious. In alarm, you shout:

"Is there a doctor in the house?" And a doctor comes and gives moned the doctor, could you be

held legally liable for his fee?



As a general rule, when you request any kind of services to be performed for someone else, you may indeed be responsible for payment. But in the case of a medical emergency, the law usually makes an exception and denies liability. As one court explained:

"Persons commonly call for medical aid for the sick solely out of a spirit of kindness, without any expectation of becoming personally responsible.'

Would it matter that the sick person was your friend or relaive? Not necessarily. Thus: A man brought his daughterin-law to the hospital for some tests while her husband was away on a trip. When surgery became necessary, he told the doctor to go ahead. Did this re-

tient, make him responsible for the surgical fee? A court said no, because it was not customary for a man to be responsible for his daughter-inlaw's medical expenses. To make him liable, said the court, there would have to be a more specific understanding between him and

the doctor. Still, the understanding need not be as specific as a formal legal contract. In another case, a man was driving his girl friend home from a party when he had an accident. The girl was badly injured, and he rushed her to a

hospital. There he begged the doctor to do everything he could to save her life. He said he "felt responsible" because she had suffered the injury in his car.

Later, he tried to avoid liability to the doctor by pointing out that he had not made a specific agreement to pay. But a court him responsible anyhow. The judge said the comments he did make, under such circumstances, could fairly be interpreted as a promise to foot the bills.

### TDA Seed Lab **Now Located** At Giddings

square foot Texas Department of Agriculture Seed Laboratory at Giddings is now open for business, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Commissioner White and Seed Division director Bill Staffel said persons formerly using the TDA Seed Laboratory in Austin, should now send seed samples for purity and/or germination testing to the Giddings facility.

The move from the expensive Capitol area complex in Austin to Giddings will save taxpayers nearly \$3000 monthly in rent and utilities.

A new concept in cooperation between state agencies coincides with the lab construction. The TDA will provide training programs for youths under detention at the Texas Youth Council in the labs, greenhouses and 85 acres that will be used for seed testing, explained White.

TDA seed analyst John Metcalf will head laboratory operations. He will have about 20 employees, most of whom transferred from the old lab at
