## An Open Letter From County Judge Lincoln

Dear Editor Richards:—  
First let me say thanks for the Christmas remembrances to me. I visited Meadow a few days ago with my good friend Mr. Fulton. I did not have very much time to visit with my friends as I wanted to.

I was happy to learn that the school at Meadow was sponsoring the National Youth program. In my opinion this is one of the best movements a town or school could sponsor. It gives our young folk a chance for work and too, teach them by doing things that are worthwhile a future needs of knowing how to do things for themselves. In these times of needful defense preparation for National security, I would like to see the town of Meadow give to our county at least 15 or 20 young men from 18 to 21 years of age who would join our National Unit of the home defense guards.

If you can assist me calling the young men from 18 to 21 years of age together, I am sure we of the Legion can get a bunch of Legionares of Meadow and Brownfield along with the patriotic citizens of the county to meet at Meadow and have a mass meeting and a discussion of the plans regarding the organization of this company. Please advise me on what date they would like to set for the meeting in Meadow.

Recently the Commissioners' Court has sponsored the Surplus Commodity program. This will provide the school children fresh fruits, such as apples and oranges during the school day, which in my opinion is a worthy program, and does not cost the county anything but the freight bill.

## Mattress Center In Meadow

The Mattress making center at Meadow is to open January 20, in the tile building across street from the Red & White. Twenty-eight mattresses are scheduled to be made during the ten days the center is to be open, according to Mrs. S. H. Kellesey and Mr. Hartzog, vocational agriculture teacher of the Meadow Schools, chairman of the program.

The Meadow women who have volunteered to supervise the making of the mattresses will attend an all day trainers' meeting January 18th, beginning at nine o'clock a.m. at which meeting a demonstration in mattress making will be conducted by the county home demonstration agent.

The mattress applicants from the Meadow and Challis communities are being notified on which days each will be expected to come to the center to make their mattress, and it is most important that the family come on the days designated and that four or five persons be brought to help make the mattress.

The mattress program is a government project established by the Surplus Commodities Administration to use to the best advantage the nations surplus cotton as
