Legislature Passes Omnibus Tax Bill 179 to 1

More Eggs per Hen Advised By Wickard

A. L. Hartzog this week received the following telegram from H. W. Hochbaum, Acting Director of Extension work. The telegram is self-explanatory.

Secretary Wickard launches nation wide drive to produce every possible egg from present laying flocks this spring and summer in a press release today. Goal to increase egg production for the whole country in the next fifteen months about ten million cases. Goal to be achieved partly by ample feeding, holding hens for late summer and fall production, and filling poultry houses to capacity with laying birds this fall. Previous department announcement to support long term prices at an average of about 22 cents Chicago basis until June 1943 feed supplies are plentiful, and if necessary department will release loan corn at the loan rate plus certain carrying

Johnson to Open Campaign For U. S. Senate Sat'day

Congressman Lyndon Johnson will open his campaign for the United States Senate, Saturday night, May 3 at San Marcos, where he worked his way through the State Teachers College and which is in the heart of the congressional district he now represents.

His opening campaign speech will be carried over the major radio networks of the state at 8 p. m., and a huge statewide rally will be held.

Following the opening of his campaign in San Marcos Saturday night, Johnson will conduct an active speaking campaign, his itinerary calling for more than 200 speeches in every part of the state.

West Texas campaign headquarters have been opened for him in Lubbock, and he is the first senatorial candidate to open a West Texas headquarters. Lloyd Croslin, Lubbock attorney, will be in charge of the Lubbock office.

The Texas Legislature Wednesday passed an omnibus tax bill estimated to raise \$22,087,501 annually in new revenue. The Senate passed the bill 31 to 0, the House 146 to 1.

It was the largest tax bill ever to be passed by the Texas legislature and the first in approximately five years. It climaxed a long and bitter fight, which extended over a period of many years, to raise more money, especially for old age pensions.

The bill increases and revises many present taxes and adds new ones affecting a score of businesses, industries and occupations.

The tax on crude oil was increased from 2.75c a barrel to 4.12c which it was estimated would raise an additional eight and a half million dollars annually.

That on natural gas production was increased from 3 per cent of value to 5.2 per cent. The sulphur tax was upped from \$1.03 a ton to \$1.27.

Other tax increases included those on telephone companies, utilities, liquor, business franchises, carbon black production and insurance companies.

New taxes were on liquor prescriptions, cosmetics, radios, playing cards, contract and community motor vehicles, stock transfers and oil and gas well servicing.

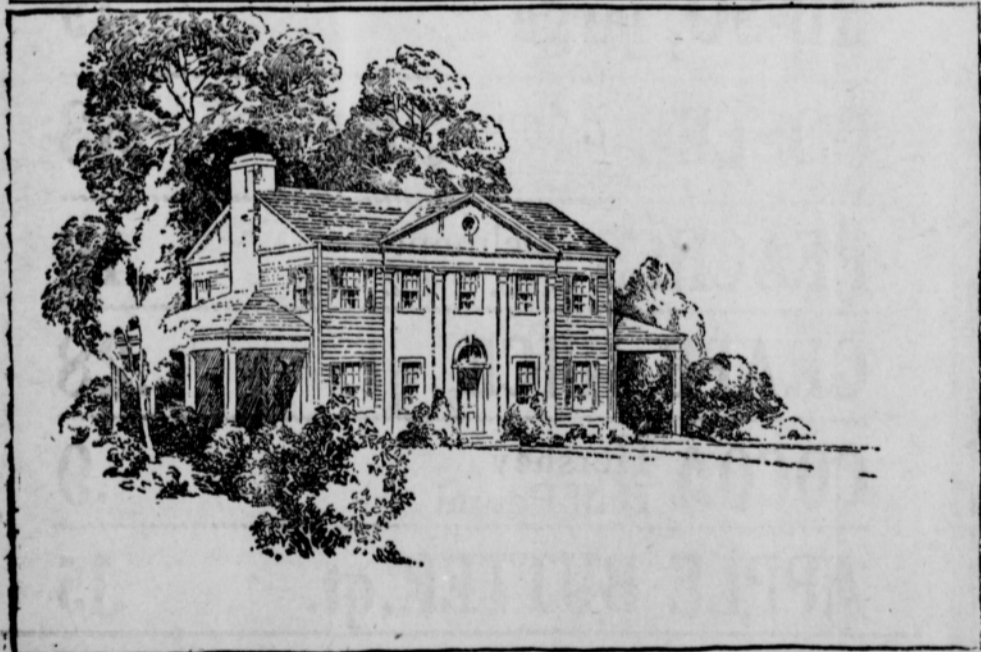
It is expected that the Governor will sign the bill without delay.

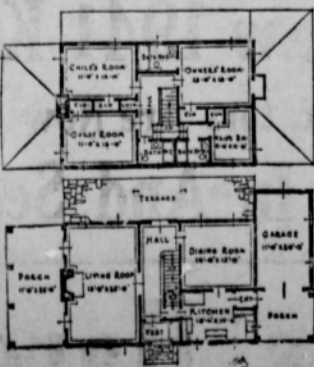

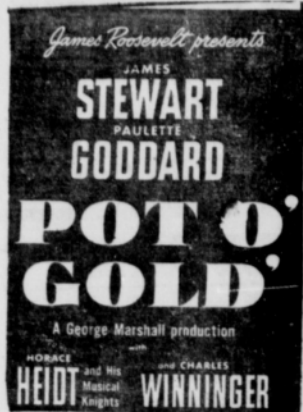

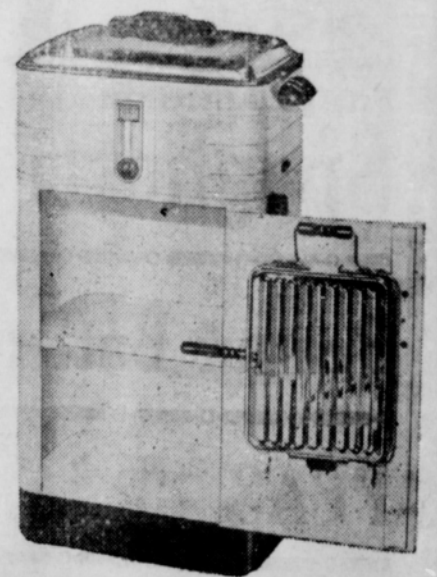
