This Thing Called Ventilated Pantry

Ventilated pantry is a hard sounding title for so convenient and desirable food storage closet, and one which is quite simple to construct after all. Many a clothes closet has been turned into an ideal ventilated pantry with little or no cost, the size, of course, depending on the needs of the particular family.

A ventilated pantry is one so constructed that the cool air which is stored up under the house is drawn slowly through the pantry during the day and keeps the food in the pantry at a desired temperature.

To make this possible.

Locate the pantry as near the center of the house as possible—that means on an inside wall. Use beaver board, corrugated pasteboard boxes or several layers of paper to line an old closet to make the walls tight enough to aid in the proper insulation of the walls.

Make a screened opening in the center of the pantry floor to permit the cool air from under the house to force the warm air out of the pantry through a screened opening directly above in the ceiling of the pantry; usually an 18" square screened opening in the floor and ceiling will serve for the average size pantry. Circulation of air under the house should be made possible. Solid foundation walls should have openings in them, particularly on the south side of the house and at least on one other side. The opposite gable ends of the house should be also ventilated, as it is better to open the pantry into a well ventilated attic.

The shelves should be so constructed as not to interfere with a free circulation of air which aids in controlling the temperature. Three four inch boards have been found to be very satisfactory. In placing containers in the pantry, care should be taken not to obstruct the free circulation of air.

That is all there is to a ventilated pantry.

Gross for the system was \$13,319,983 an increase over January, 1940 of 19.66 per per cent.

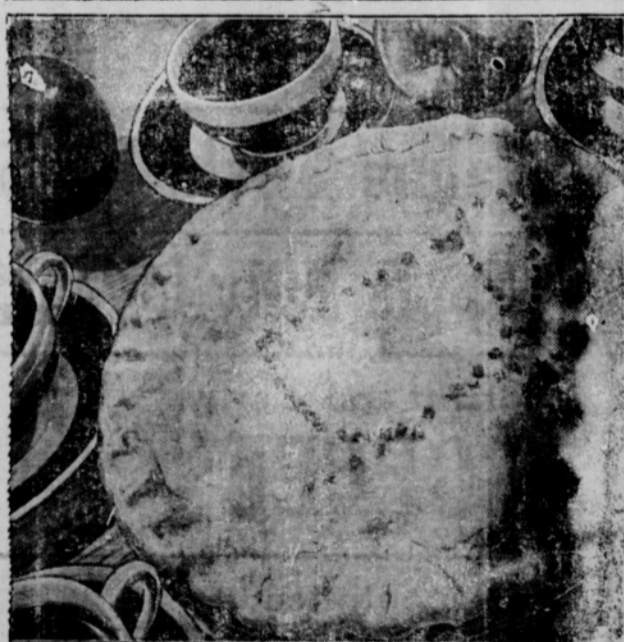
Fried Chicken And How!

He has been inviting the Star editor over there for some time to look his battery over, so one afternoon this week we called on him. He has one of the finest set ups for raising chickens for the market we have ever seen. They are kept in a small feeder, and during their entire feeding period are never turned out nor do they see daylight. The feeder room is lighted by colored lamps.

Mr. McCoy has his own formula for feeding, and special vitamins are furnished to substitute for the sunshine they do not get. By this method they grow very tender as their muscles do not develop. You easily see why they make such tender, delicious meat,

At the present he is feeding 1700 chicks, and they consume around 750 lbs. of feed each week. He has a good market for them, but if people of the community want to buy some mighty good eating he can accomodate them.

Surveys prove men order it in restaurants more than any other meal-order; indicate it's their favorite dessert at home. Learn to make good coffee; learn to make good apple pie and you've gone a long ways toward getting and holding the man in your life! Here's how:

To Make Good Coffee:
Keep the coffee maker clean. A scrupulously clean coffee pot is essential to making good coffee.
Use fresh coffee and freshly boiled water. Measure both coffee and water accurately. Use 1 heaping tablespoon of coffee for each measuring cup of water.
Coffee should be in contact with the water, a definite length of time, depending on the type and capacity of the coffee maker.
Coffee should be served as soon as possible after making. Never serve reheated coffee.

For Good Apple Pie:

Pastry	1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1 cup sugar	2 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon flour	1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg	Whole cloves
	6 to 8 large apples

Line 9-inch pie pan with pastry. Combine sugar, flour, nutmeg and cinnamon. Pare apples and remove cores cut in sixths. Arrange half of apple slices in pan; add one half of the sugar and spice mixture. Add remaining apple slices and sugar. Dot the top with butter. Moisten lower edge of crust with water. Place top crust over apples; press edges together with a fork; trim. Press whole cloves into the top of pastry to form the shape of a coffee cup. Bake in a moderate hot oven (425° F.) 40 to 45 minutes or until apples are tender. Make 6 servings.
