Funeral services for C. W. Avary, 54, a citizen of the Meadow community for 21 years, and former Mayor, was held Friday afternoon at the Meadow Methodist church with the pastor, G. H. Bryant officiating. Burial was in charge of the Sanders Funeral Home.

Mr. Avary was leaving the Dyer-Lee Oil place in Lubbock late Thursday afternoon, when the heart stroke hit him. Apparently he just slumped down to the floor of the truck, and the truck rolled slowly across the street, striking a pole, and a tree on a lawn. Firemen from the nineteenth Street fire station picked him up and summoned an ambulance, but he died before reaching the hospital. He had been in ill health for some time, but was naturally a hard working man, and continued to drive one of his trucks.

He is survived by Mrs. Avary, a son, J. D. Avary, a student at the University of Texas, two daughters, Mrs. Herman Chesshir of Brownfield and Mrs. D. C. Flowers of Meadow, his mother, Mrs. E. D. Avary of Seymour, and numerous other relatives.

Mr. Avary had an enormous number of friends, due to his life time policy of befriending people when they needed help. 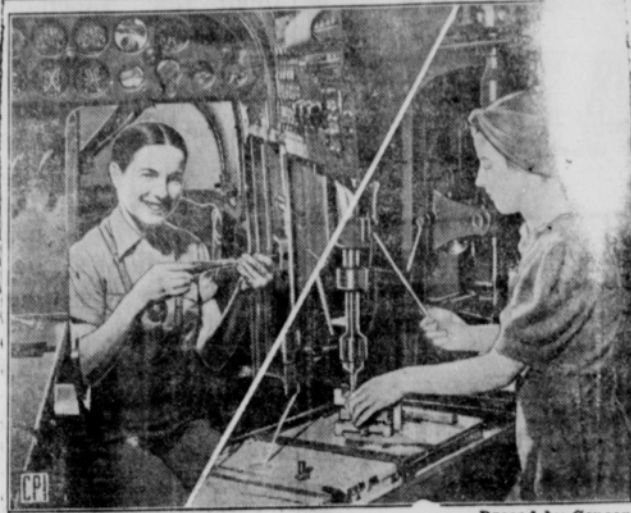
