Meadow came out on the short end of a 12 to 6 score in the Meadow Ropes foot ball game last Friday.

The honors were pretty evenly matched between the two teams. Meadow made 4 first downs, Ropes 3. Ropes completed 4 passes out of 7 attempts, Meadow completed 5 in 9 attempts. Meadow gained 56 yards rushing to 35 for Ropes. All three scoring plays were from passes. Ed. Warren blocked both of the Ropes tries for extra point. The game was fraught with fumbles, Meadow making 4 of the 6 committed.

Beasley gained 32 yards and Liles next with 19. The longest run was Peugh for 12. Ed Warren led the defense with 9 tackles, Bell next with 6 and Moorhead 5.

The players, Lunceford,

Farrar and Liles, ends; Warren, Upton and Tilger tackles; Fox, Gibson and Bell, guards; Moorhead, center; Smith, Beasley, Price, Peugh, and Farrar, backs.

The largest crowd in the history of Meadow football attended this game.

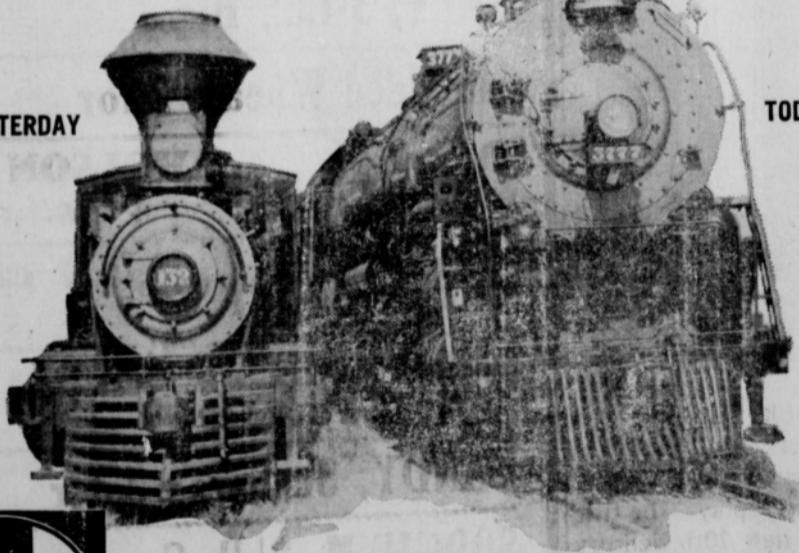
