AUSTIN (Spl.)-John Ben Sheppard, Attorney General, was notified January 29 by District Judge Paul Martineau of Corpus Christi that the multimillion dollar Texas Company case had been decided in favor of the State of Texas.

The suit was the first major case tried under Shepperd's administration.

In Austin, Shepperd termed the judgment a "far-reaching victory for the school children of

All funds recovered will go to the Permanent School Fund.

The Corpus Court set aside two mineral deeds and held the State has title to the mineral rights under 4000 acres of Duval County land including all oil and gas produced. The land now has over 40 producing oil wells,

drilled by the Texas Company. Under the judge's decision, the Texas Company will be allowed to deduct good faith expenses spent in developing the property.

John Peace, Executive Assistant Attorney General tried the case for the State. He was assisted by Special Assistant Charles D. Mathews of Austin.

If upheld by the appellate courts, the trial court's decision will mean several millions in income to the Permanent School Fund. Approximately one million dollars in past income and the value of the minerals and the wells would immediately accrue to the State.

Experts Say Good Prices for Eggs During New Year

College Station, January 27 .-Texas market egg producers should find the year ahead to their liking. This forecast comes from Professor E. D. Parnell, poultry husbandry department of Texas A & M College.

He backs up the forecast with a lot of reason. First there are fewer layers on the farms to produce the eggs needed to supply the demand from the nation's increasing population. There also exists a shortage of frozen eggs as compared to past years and too, the demand for stored shell eggs has recently been heavy.

Another very important factor, says Parnell, has been the recent decline-it's been slightin the price of some feed ingredients and a rise in egg prices resulting from heavy demands and a declining supply.
