Rising Star Needs An Ambulance

Just last week there was a near fatal accident just on the outskirts of town and help was on the scene within minutes. The police and Fire Dept. crew did what they could but precious minutes were lost because of the simple fact Rising Star does not have an ambulance. Luckily the Cross Plains ambulance was available to rush this injured boy to Abilene.

This has just been one of many occasions when an ambulance was needed in our community. Next time it may be your wife, husband, close relative, children or even you that will require the use of an ambulance. When this happens, TIME is of the importance. Time until an ambulance with trained personnel arrives could mean life or death. When a loved one is lying in pain those precious moments till help arrives can be the longest wait anyone can imagine. Then is when we will say "If only we had an ambulance here."

It's true we're busy with our families, jobs and every day duties but we must stop thinking, "If I sit back and say I don't have time, that's true. I'm sure there will be enough people to volunteer without my help!" That attitude will get us NOWHERE. We need your help and without your help, who will help?

The words help look small on paper but they mean everything when someone is hurt and you can stand there and say, "I took the time to care. I can help this person that would otherwise lie there until an ambulance from another town arrives."

Another reason for ambulance volunteers

is that our city of Rising Star consists mostly of elderly people. Many of them would like to see this dream become a reality. Many would volunteer themselves but cannot because of their health. How many of you reading this now know someone like that? Perhaps a grandmother or grandfather? What would you do if that loved one suddenly had a heart attack? Would you put that person in your own car and rush to the nearest hospital? Would you call the ambulance from a near by town and sit there waiting and waiting, while those first few crucial moments slip away? What if that person stopped breathing?

If this town does have an ambulance, the personnel will receive training that would answer all the questions above. These people will know how to administer C.P.R., how to transfer patients, how to administer oxygen and how to treat shock.

Back in June there was an article in The Rising Star explaining that Cross Plains has offered to help us in developing and training all volunteers. Time is running out and Cross Plains is waiting for our volunteers to say we're ready. So far only five people have offered to help. We need more so the work load will not fall on these few and require them to be on call constantly.

If you can volunteer your help and be on call for the weekend, at night or any other times we will be glad to have you.

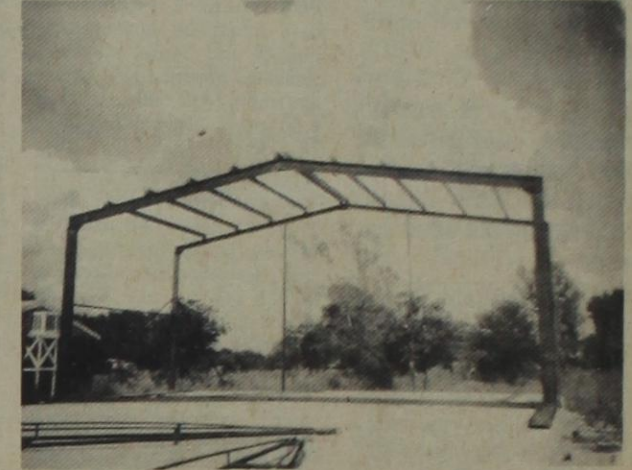

School Board Discusses Tax Relief Amendment

The Rising Star Independent School Board of Trustees met in regular session on Saturday, July 7th. Members present were Sue Barnes, Jack Hubbard, David Harris, Bob Clark, Aubrey Lawrence and R.L. Rust. Members not present were Douglas Walker. School personnel present were Bobby Fortune, Weldon Hill and Nan Owen.

President, Jack Hubbard called the meeting to order.

1. Minutes of the regular board meeting June 11, and special board minutes of June 25, and 28, were read and approved by the board by general consent with no corrections or additions.

2. Motion by Sue Barnes second by Bob Clark that the bills incurred by the Rising Star Independent School District be ordered paid. Motion carried.

3. Motion by Aubrey Lawrence second by Bob Clark to hire Mrs. Rawson for Librarian for the fiscal year '79-'80. Motion carried.

4. Discussion HB 1060 "Tax Relief" Amendment, Nan Owen Tax Assessor-Collector.

5. Motion by Bob Clark second by R.L. Rust to adopt a resolution to rescind the \$3,000.00 over 65 Homestead Exemption because of Art. 7 of HB1060 which grants the \$10,000.00 exemption. Motion carried.

6. Motion by David Harris second by Jack Hubbard to adopt a resolution to waive the AG-Use Valuations for the 1979 Tax Roll due to the fact that the market value for open space land in Rising Star ISD is now less than the state recommended AG-Use Value. Motion Carried.

7. In obedience to HB 1060 art. 6 which ap-

plies to school districts only defines a residence homestead as a structure used as a residence together with land and improvements used in the residential occupancy of the structure, and is unrelated to the 200 acres which applies to the State and County Homestead exemption.

Motion by R.L. Rust second by Sue Barnes to set two (2) acres to be considered as Residential Homestead for the 1979 tax roll. Motion carried.

8. Discuss lots 14, 15, and 16 located at the school football practice field owned by Jane W. Griffin.

9. Discussion of high school principal. By general consent, the board agreed to adjourn at 10:50 P.M.

Work Begins On Plans For Restoring Mobley

Preliminary work was begun last week in preparing plans and specifications for the restoration of the Old Mobley Hotel for the Conrad Hilton Foundation by the University of Houston School of Architecture, the Cisco Lions Club was told Wednesday in a talk at their weekly luncheon meeting.

Benson Walls, senior architecture student at UoH, arrived here last Monday to spend some six weeks on the

preliminary work. He will study the old building and gather as much data as possible regarding the structure.

Dr. Ronaldo Petrini of the UoH faculty is in charge of the project of restoring the Mobley, which was the first Hilton Hotel.

Mr. Walls said the project is expected to cost about \$750,000 and actual work on the building is slated to begin by the end of the

Extensive landscaping is being planned for the grounds. Plans call for an outdoor theater area, a statue of the late Mr. Hilton and other features.

Lion Gene Abbott presented the speaker. President Archie Chamness asked club members to make an effort to achieve 100 percent attendance during the coming year. "We will have a nice pin for the wives of all with perfect attendance records," he said.

Major issues of national significance are discussed in studies commissioned in the areas of economics, energy, foreign affairs, government, defense policy, health, law and legislation.

Dr. Don L. Smith, associate professor of social science, has received to date over 600 books, tapes, and other materials for the center. He said, "The materials we have received will be important to Howard Payne University's academic program and will supplement the Democracy-In-Action and Chair of Free Enterprise programs. They will also help students who take our new business path in the Academy of Freedom".

In addition to the materials received at HPU, the school receives three journals from AEI: "Regulation," "Foreign Policy and Defense Review" and an annual review of Congress. Other subscribers to AEI publications include some 90 per cent of the members of the U.S. Congress, as well as numerous congressional staff experts and key officials in the executive branch. College departments and faculties, national organizations, leading corporations and members of the press also subscribe to AEI publications.

AEI's television series, "Public Policy Forums," features recognized authorities in an open exchange of views and opinions on specific issues. Proceedings of the forums are published as books and are available on film, audio, and color video cassettes.

Recent forums have included "Professors, Politicians and Public Policy;" "Prospects For Peace in the Middle East;" "U.S. Energy Policy: Which Direction?" and "Does Government Profit From Inflation?"

A Special television production featured "A Discussion with Gerald R. Ford: The American Presidency" in which the former President, now the Distinguished Fellow of the American Enterprise Institute, met to discuss the powers and limitations of the presidency with a group of Princeton University students; their professor, Fred I. Greenstein; and three resident scholars of AEI—Irving Kristol, Robert Bork and Austin Ranney.

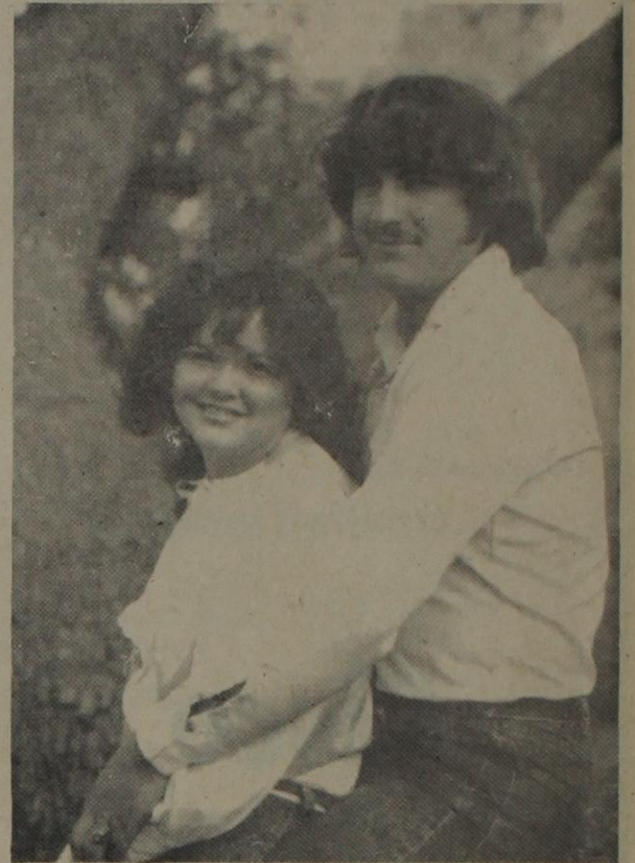

The search is on throughout Texas for outstanding cattle brands to include on county panels at the Kleberg Center's "branded stairway" at Texas A&M University.

L.A. Maddox, chairman of the unique branding project, said that some 3,500 brands, or more, are expected to be imprinted on the 254 "county oak panels" in the University's new \$9.5 million Robert J. Kleberg Animal and Food Sciences Center.

"County Extension agents are working with their local beef cattle committees to select eight brands per county, and with historical societies to select other brands for the panels," Maddox, Texas Agricultural Extension Service beef cattle specialist, said.

Recently, a delegation from Eastland County added local brands to the County's oak panel. Participating were: The late Edward Harrison (who died less than two weeks after the branding ceremony), Mrs. Harrison and son Joe Harrison who applied the Blackwell Ranch

brand. Mrs. John Clark, Son Fraiser Clark and his wife applied the John "Skeet" Clark brand. Mrs. T.C. Fambro and son Luther applied the T.C. Fambro and son's brand. Witnessing the branding of Mrs. J.A. Hart's brand was Mr. and Mrs. R.D. Hart and Truet, Mr. and Mrs. J.E. Ragsdale and Kim, and Mrs. James A. Hart. Jim Wells, manager of the Terrell Ranch applied that ranch's brand. Mr. and Mrs. John Kidd branded the C.M. "Clint" McCain brand.

Later this summer Robert Donovan will apply the Donovan brand on the Eastland County panel.

There are some 200,000 brands recorded in Texas and on file with the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in Fort Worth. This is the state's most complete record.

The "branding" was an idea of Dr. O.D. Butler, for many years head of Texas A&M's Animal Science Department and now associate vice president for agriculture and renewable resources. He said that not only are cattle brands a rich part of Texas livestock history but a prized possession of ranchers in identification of their cattle.

"We felt that the branding ceremonies would bring about a closer tie-in between cattlemen and our animal science facilities on campus as well as with research and educational work throughout Texas," Butler said.

Maddox said that branding ceremonies will be conducted by Extension district groups until "all panels are branded."
